CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 6 .-Henry Cabot Lodge, 74, senior Senator from Massachusetts, is dying in a hospital here. Senator Lodge suffered a paralytic strokie at noon yesterday and has been unconscious since with death expected momentarily.

Also remember that when you are reporting a fire, it will greatly facilitate matters to ask the operator for the "fire department." The same rule applies to the "police department" calls. Both the police and fire departments have special plags on the telephone board, put there for the purpose of speeding up emergency calls.

Telephone companies in many cities ask their subscribers not to ask where fires are. Other cities make it against the law to follow fire trucks to the scene of a blaze, where the work of the firemen may be easily hindered. Let's be a little less curious, and a little more safe.






