## SCOUTS MAKING GREAT PROGRESS

Report of Buffalo Trail Council Shows Work in Four Counties Advancing Rapidly.

MAY INCLUDE GARZA CO.

Barcus to Investigate Possible Extension of Territory—Buffalo Camp One of Best.

The election of officers for 1925, report of the Scout Executive Council and the fixing of the budget for the coming year were high points in the regular meeting of the members of the Buffalo Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, held at the Robinson Cafe Thursday night with 20 men from the four counties of the council present. Plans for the campaign drives were discussed, and dates were set for rally days in each of the four counties.

A dinner for the council members proceeded the business session, and was followed by the appointment of the nominating committee who retired to make the nominations for officers for the coming year. All officers of 1924 were nominated and were unanimously reelected, with the addition of several new members to the council.

The report of Scout Executive Barcus showed a highly satisfactory year's work in the Buffalo Trail Council. A slight deficit in the budget of the year was shown, but this was due to the non-collection of pledges in the district. The budget was cut down during the year, it was reported, after some of the pledges failed to come in. The summer camp of Scouts in the Buffalo Trail Council was declared by officials of the organization to have been one of the most successful camps held in this region of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

The report of the summer camp showed that 8 troops aggregating a total of 108 Scouts attended, 892 tests made, with 42 Scouts making the second class tests, 4 Scouts making the first class tests, and 5 Scouts completing merit badge tests. Scout Executive Barcus reported that there were 10 troops in the Buffalo Trail Council, composed of Nolan, Mitchell, Scurry and Fisher Counties.

There are 238 Scouts in the Council, he reported, 10 Scoutmasters, 17 Assistant Scoutmasters, 23 first class Scouts, 77 second class Scouts, and 138 tenderfoot Scouts.

The budget for 1925 was set, and amounts to \$5,000 which is the same as in 1924. The money is apportioned for various uses including executive's salary, transportation, postage, telegraph and telephone, camps and hikes, rallies, publicity and other miscellaneous expenses. The drive will start at once for the raising of the funds, it was decided. The budget is apportioned among the counties of the council as follows: Nolan County, \$1,400; Fisher, Scurry and Mitchell Counties, \$1,200 each.

President Elliott announced campaign dates for the drive, and rallies will be held in the various counties in the dates named. The rally will be held in Mitchell County, Nov. 17-19; Nolan County, 20-22; Scurry County, 24-26 and Fisher County 27-29 of this month.

The annexation of Garza County to the Buffalo Trail Council was discussed. The county is becoming interested in the Scout movement, it was announced, and has the organization of troops under way in Post City, and other towns of the county. Should the county be admitted into the union with the four counties of the Council, it will enlarge the district and increase the expenses to some extent, it was pointed out. Scout Executive Bar-

## MA STILL GAINS OVER DR BUTTE

Complete Returns From 80 Counties Out of 252 Given to Texas Election Bureau.

MAJORITY NOW 32,634

Official Count at Noon Stands Ferguson, 128,611; Butte, 95,977—Count Complete Soon.

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 7.—"Ma" Ferguson increased her lead over Dr. George C. Butte for the State Governorship upon the basis of complete returns from 80 out of 252 counties in the state to the Texas Election Bureau at noon today.

Mrs. Ferguson's majority was listed at 32,634. The official standing at noon was: Ferguson, 128,611; Butte, 95,977.

## SMITH LEAVES

World Flyer Hops Off From Dallas Friday Morning Enroute to Belleville, Illinois.

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 7.—Capt. Lowell Smith, world flyer, hopped off in the "Chicago" from Love Field at 9 o'clock this morning headed for Scott Field, Belleville, Ill.

Perfect flying weather was in prospect, Smith said, and he indicated that he would probably not make the scheduled stop at Muskogee, Ok. The aviator planned to reach Scott Field late today.

It is believed that Capt. Smith passed over Sweetwater at noon Thursday, as he arrived in Dallas about 2 p. m., from El Paso. A plane passed high above the city shortly after noon, but its identification as a member of the world flight squadron was not reported.

## FINAL ORDER ON TRAINS WRECKED PAVING TALKED WITHIN TUNNEL

Commissioners Set Monday, Nov. 24 as Date of Hearing on E. N. 3rd Street Work.

DISCUSS TYPHOID CASES

May Adopt State Health Ordinance Requiring Testing and Grading of Milk by Dairies.

The final passing of the paving orders and the setting of Monday, November 24, as the day on which the hearing would be held, occupied the biggest part of the regular City Commission Thursday afternoon. The paving ordinance was in connection with contract and prices on the E. N. 3rd street and adjacent territory project. The commission will complete plans for the Crane street sidewalks at an early meeting.

A member of the city health force was in session with the commission, and the typhoid fever disease relative to the milk supply of the city was discussed. The Commission is considering the adoption of an ordinance, planned and drawn up by the State Health Department and found to be very satisfactory and safe in many cities where used. The ordinance enforces the testing of milk regularly, and the milk graded according to the results of the tests. A dairy is forced to label milk bottles or tops with the grade of the milk as found by health officers. In this manner, the public may know whether they are buying first grade milk, or milk of a lower grade.

Matters pertaining to the filtration plant being built here, and also to Lake Trammell, were discussed. The water commissioner stated that the completion of the filtration plant was expected in December. Fishing in Lake Trammell is probable, after the plant is opened, it is thought.

Negotiations by the city are underway with T-P railroad officials relative to a subway or viaduct across the tracks here. The legal department of the city is investigating cases of similar nature where cities have secured safe crossings at railroad tracks.

## WEATHER COLDER

Mercury Drops to 49 Degrees—October Dry Month.

A taste of real winter was felt in Sweetwater Friday as cold weather settled down over West Texas, the thermometer here dropping to 49 degrees at 8 o'clock Friday morning.

October was a dry month in this section, records at the Sweetwater Vulcanizing Co., volunteer weather observers, show. A total of 2.85 inches of rain fell during the month which is considerable lower than records of past years. Approximately 8 inches of rain fell during October, 1923.

According to reports to the Santa Fe here, temperature on the Plains was a few degrees lower than that here, but no snow fell in the Amarillo section Thursday night.

"London Express" Leaves Rail in Mile Long Tunnel, Four Cars and Dinner Smashed.

FREIGHT CRASHES DEBRIS

Second Train Roaring Through Darkness Hits Express—Two Known Dead, Many Injured.

RUEN, Eng., Nov. 7.—A wreck occurred in the pitch darkness of the mile long railroad tunnel near Ruen last night when the "London Express," carrying Americans and many British from Havre, was derailed.

Two were killed and six injured. The New York Times, had both the express, including the train, and the rails when the train was derailed through the tunnel. Following the crashing, wild confusion reigned in the darkness.

While rescue workers were struggling to clear the tunnel with lanterns, a freight train thundered into the tunnel and crashed into the debris. Darkness hindered the work of rescuers. There was a panic among the survivors, and the full extent of the catastrophe has not been determined.

## FORMING STATE SAFETY LEAGUE

Organization of State Highway Officials and Railway Heads Holds Meeting at Austin.

AIM AT GRADE CROSSINGS

Primary Object of State Wide Organization Will Be Reduction of Accidents at Rail Crossings.

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 7.—The Texas Council of Safety, having for its purpose a state wide movement leading to the adoption of safety measures aimed particularly at the reduction of the rapidly increasing number of accidents at highway grade crossings in the state, was organized here today at a conference of members of the Railway Commission, State Highway Commission, Highway Department officials, and officials of the leading railroads of Texas.

The organization will be made permanent and all civic organizations in the state will be invited to co-operate in the effort to save lives at highway grade crossings on railroads in Texas.

## FIRES RAGING

Forest Blazes Threaten Ervine, Ky., as Flames Draw Close to Oil Storage Tanks.

ERVINE, Ky., Nov. 7.—Forest fires sweeping the mountain ranges were within half a mile of 700 large crude oil storage tanks on the outskirts of Ervine today.

Five hundred men were fighting the flames, which were said to have gained such headway that only a heavy rain could stop their advance. Seven homes have been destroyed. Forest fires are reported to have broken out in four adjoining counties.

**IT IS COOLIDGE**

Continually "cuss out" a man and there will come a reaction. Folks will begin to wonder first what kind of a creature he is and then they will flock to see. Directly human sympathy will get in its fine work and there you are. Something like that must have been the mental reaction responsible for the Republican landslide that swept Coolidge into power, on the heels of the graft exposure under the direction of a relentless Senate.

Al Smith went back in as Governor of New York State. The big Republican vote for president in the Empire State rather leads to the suspicion that "Al" bartered some votes. He knew well enough that if Davis were elected he would be the Democratic candidate in 1928. But with Davis defeated,—well the presidential bee may still be lingering in Al's bonnet.

And now we have "Silent Cal" for another four years. It is Coolidge, the Vermont Sphinx almost as silent as the wooded hills of his native state. Big business is evidently satisfied with the Republican choice, demonstrated at a cut and dried convention that side stepped any issues that might prove entangling, and elected in a machine made landslide where the engineers pulling the steam roller were backed by probably more dollars than they were votes.

The Senate campaign investigating committee met in Chicago and discovered that the Republicans had plenty of money. This startling information was recorded, and the committee journeyed to Washington, where a party given by President Coolidge for Broadway actors and actresses took up most of the committee's time. Had that they weren't in Chicago several men were shot down at the polls and an election booth burning duty in some of the precincts of New York City where Al Smith up his 200,000 majority. At it is better to have

The close shave of his head is also more pleasing to lots of folks than the long glossy locks that the killer so carefully cultivated. Members of his family did not ask that Loeb be permitted to attend his father's funeral, for fear of the curious crowds.

Coolidge at the helm, Coolidge, son of the soil, just before election time, than to witness the red shirt tail of Robert M. La Follette waving from the president's chair. Coolidge is elected, and John W. Davis, acclaimed as the greatest candidate of recent years, has been sacrificed.

**DEMOCRACY TRIUMPHANT**

The Lone Star Democratic Party, sorely tried by some of the strangest political situations that could be imagined, has once more emerged triumphant in Texas and has shown the world that the Lone Star State is hardly ready as yet to enter the fold with Fall, Daugherty, et al.

Although the esteemed Dr. Butte still refuses to concede his defeat, no one will believe Mrs. Ferguson's election will be other than decisive when the returns are completely canvassed. And with the lessons of the second primary as well as of the general election clearly in mind, it is hardly likely that any candidate will ever again come out for state office wearing the gonfalon of the Ku Klux Klan, either solicited or unsolicited.

The vote for Coolidge and Davis in Texas is sufficient evidence that the

Republican party has not received any great accession in numbers in recent years. While the state laws provides that the Republican must hold a primary of their own in two years, the assumption is that it will be the only one. This time they have polled over the required number of 100,000 votes. Next time, what? It will depend upon whether the Klan has read the handwriting on the wall and determined to retire from politics. It will be to their interest.

In the meantime it is the Ferguson administration among the most successful in the history of the state. It is in that for the first time will hold the reins of

**SIX MONTHS**

In Japan, a citizen who tore down the flag of the United States of America in an American embassy grounds in Tokyo on July 1, last, has been sentenced to six months in prison. Two of his accomplices were sentenced to two and four months, respectively, with a suspension of sentence for two years, which means that if they keep on their good behavior during that period of time,

they will go practically unpunished.

It will be recalled that after American flag was torn down, Japanese authorities made great promise of what would be done to the parties responsible. After a great fuss, three Japanese were taken into custody, and nothing more was heard of them until they were given the "severe" prison sentences ranging from a minimum of probable freedom to a maximum of 180 days.

The judge in announcing his decision said that the unselfishness of motives prompting the deed justified the suspension of the sentences. Thus does Japan regard an insult to the United States, as an unselfish act.

Should an American tear down the flag of a foreign nation at one of the Washington embassies, this government would go the limit in punishing him. As long as diplomatic relations between this government and a foreign nation are in effect, the foreign power will receive justice from Uncle Sam. There is apparently a difference in the interpretation of "unselfish acts" in Japan and the United States. At the same time, rumors of Japanese colonization in Mexico and Lower California are emphatically denied by Jap officials.

**BAR DOORS**

HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 7.—A padlock and chain on the door of an eastern cafe, cabaret or dinner club in-

variably means that the place has been raided, but not so in Houston.

Recently several business houses have been found by early workers with the front entrances chained, wired and even nailed. Failure of merchants to lock their doors at the close of the day's business caused the police department to issue a warning. 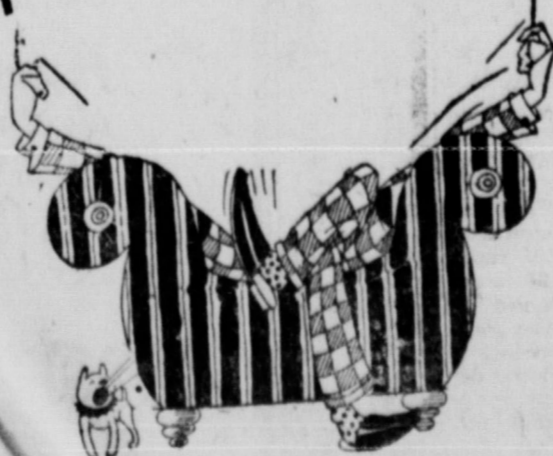

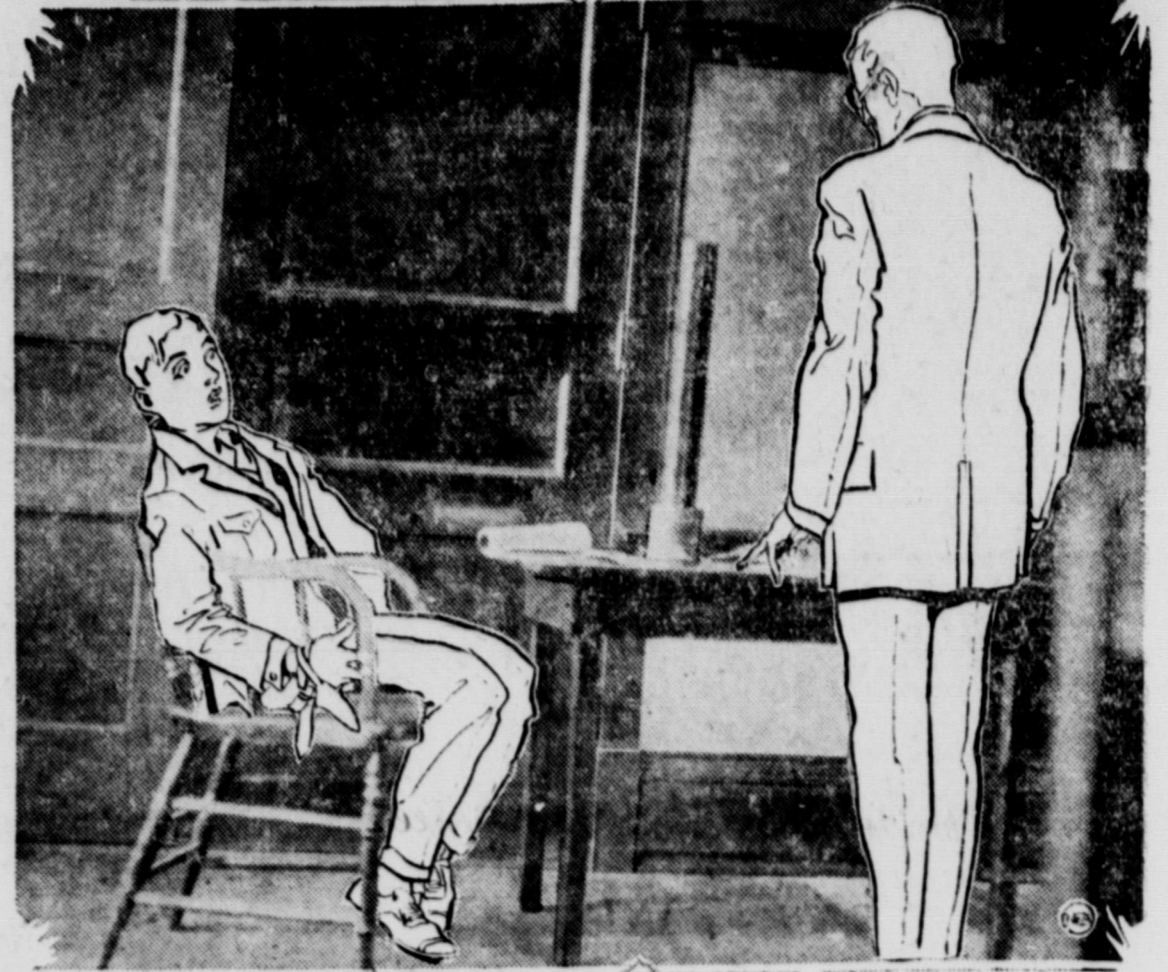

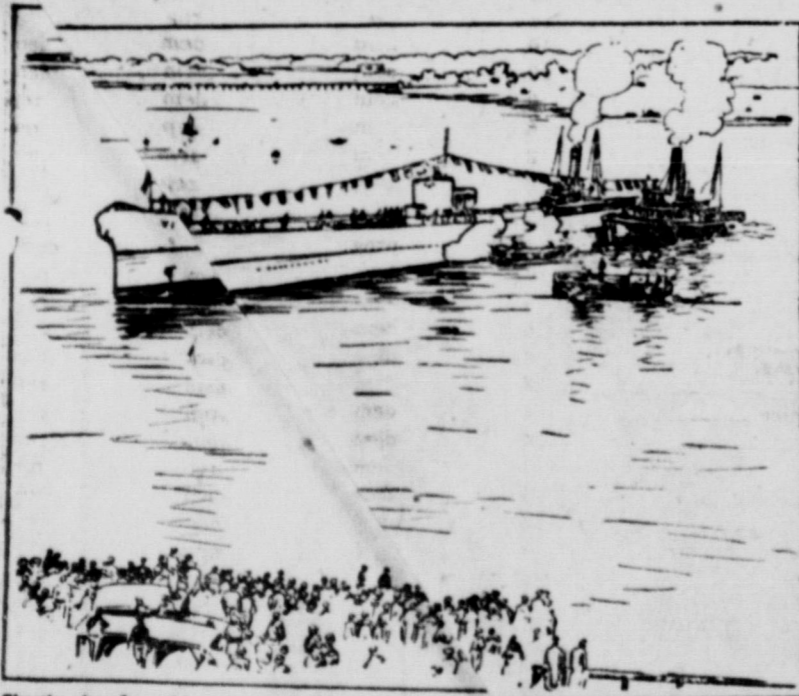

An Artistic Storm Door for the Home

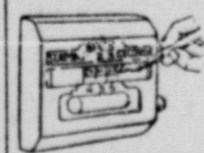
There seems to be no happy medium between the expensive glassed-in porch and the ugly, drab storm doors used on the more modest houses. One home owner could not afford the glass porch but he could see no reason why he could not make the storm door as artistic as possible.

Almost every storm door on the street was painted a dull gray, regardless of the color of the house or its trimmings. His house had rich brown shingles trimmed with cream, so he made the storm door of teagued and grooved cypress, which has a pretty grain, put in a generous window, and stained the door with a dark-oak oil stain, then finished it with spar varnish. The door was hung with iron T-hinges painted with gold-bronze paint, which gave a pretty effect against the dark-brown stain.

The result was a sturdy storm door which harmonized with the quiet tones of the house and was not an eyesore. This hint may be useful to other house holders who are dissatisfied with the appearance of the front of the house in storm-door time.

Logging Radio Stations

Neatness and compactness are the outstanding features of a new device for logging radio stations.



The call letters and other data concerning the various stations are printed on a strip of paper, which is held on two rolls and turned forward or backward by means of two small knobs. When a station is received as loudly and distinctly as possible, one of the knobs is turned until the call letters of that station are found, and the dial readings are jotted down so that the same station can be tuned in later without delay. There is plenty of blank space on the paper so that call letters, etc. of new logging stations can be added.

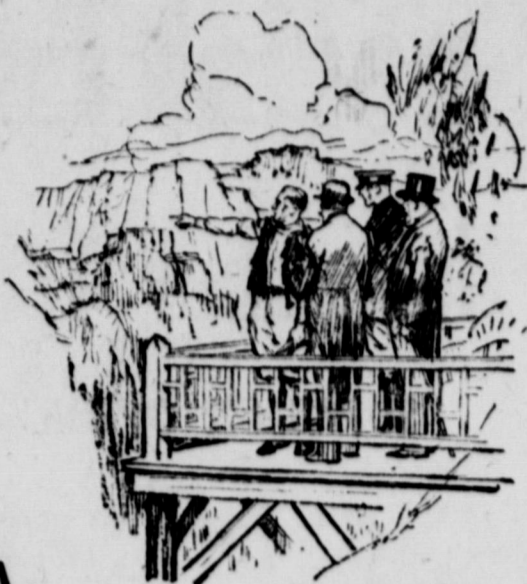

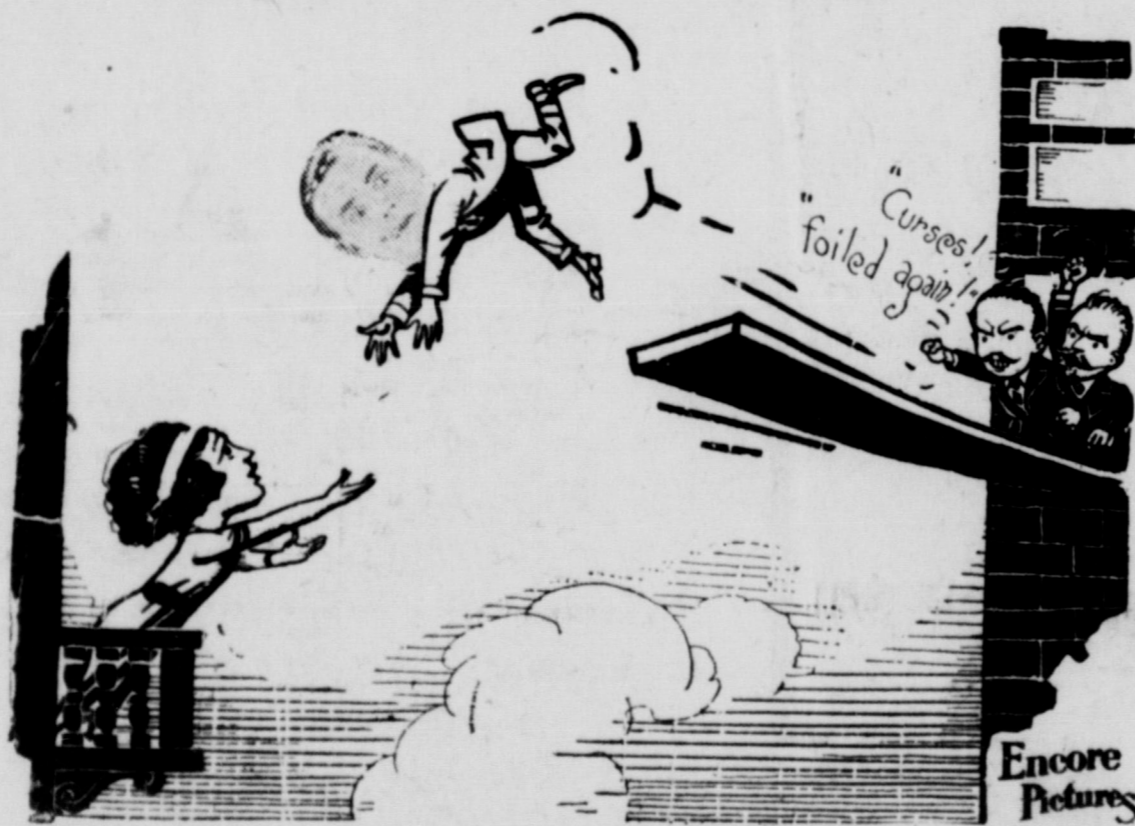
