Forest Blazes Threaten Ervine, Ky., as Flames Draw Close to Oil Storage Tanks.

ERVINE, Ky., Nov. 7 .- Forest fires sweeping the mountain ranges were within half a mile of 700 large crude oil storage tanks on the outskirts of Ervine today.

Five hundred men were fighting the flames, which were said to have gained such headway that only a heavy rain could stop their advance. Seven homes have been destroyed. Forest fires are reported to have broken out in four adjoining counties.






