### FERGUSON Soviet Celebration **Features** Decorated **CARRIES COUNTY** Statue Of Liberty

Official Returns Show Her Nolan Majority Over Dr. Butte For Governor 303 Votes.

BUTTE TAKES 5 PRECINCTS

Carries Nolan, Hylton, Blackwell, Dora, and Rocky Crossing-Pension Wins 5 to 1.

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 8.-Mrs M. A. Ferguson held a lead of 75,440 votes over Dr. G. C. Butte as candidate for governor of Texas on the basis of complete returns from 156 out of 252 counties in the State to the Texas Election Bureau at 6 o'clock tonight. The tabulation gives Mrs. Ferguson 292,197 and Dr. Butte 217,751.

The final majority of Mrs. Ferguson is estimated at 120,000 by the Texas Election Eureau. No more reports will be given out until Monday.

Mr. Talbot said that while undoubtedly many votes were thrown out by elec-tion officials contrary to the ruling of GUARD the State Attorney General, the list was comparatively small as a whole.

According to complete official returns in Nolan County from the general election held Tuesday, "Ma" Ferguson now leading her Republican opponent for Governor, Dr. George C. Butte, by approximately 50,000 votes, carried the county by 303 votes. The county totals are: Ferguson, 1,170; Butte, 877.

Butte carried five presincts in No n County. Dora, Nolan, Hylton, Mackwell, and Rocky Crossing. His Argest majority was in Hylton, where he carried the precinct by 48 votes. The Confederate Pension amendment carried in Nolan County by more than five to one, incomplete re-





Advance Largely Due to Stock and Grain Market Conditions-N. Y. Exchange Active.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8. -The condition of the cotton crop on November 1 was 55.9 normal, forecasting a total this year of 12,816,000 bales, the Department of Agriculture reported today. The cotton of the 1924 crop ginned to November 1 totaled 9,694,920 bales, the Census Bureau reported in a simeltaneous statement.

Following the government report on the condition, forecasted yield, and amount ginned of the 1924 cotton crop, on November 1, issued Saturday, the cotton market advanced 40 points, January closing Saturday at 2353-55 in New York, and 2341-45 in New Orleans.

The spot market at New York, New rleans, Dallas, Galveston, Houston, and Fort Worth advanced 40 points.

According to the report received in sweetwater the advance Saturday was ae mostly to the strength shown in stock and grain markets, which has caused a much better feeling in the trade condition. The crop estimate was about what was expected, while the ginnings were about 100,000 bales
