BIG FIRE LOSS IN JERSEY CITY

Exploding Dynamite and Strong Wind Spread Flames Rapidly in Water Front Section.

FIRE CAPTAIN HERO
Crowds Cheer as Child is Rescued—New York Fire Boats Aid in Battling Flames.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Nov. 14.—Amid the thunder of exploding dynamite, several blocks near the Jersey City water front were destroyed by fire which was far from under control at 1 p. m. The loss will run into millions.

Fought on land and river by hundreds of firemen, and streams of water from New York fire boats, the blaze destroyed a salt peter factory, a large warehouse of the American Sugar Refining Company, and a dozen tenement dwellings as it spread whipped by a high wind.

Scores of firemen were overcome and a dozen injured were rushed to hospitals. Red Cross stands and coffee stands were set up in the neighborhood. Three school buildings were damaged while more than 2,000 residents, driven from their homes, were cared for in police stations and private buildings.

Cheers went up as Captain George Bush went up a fire escape, broke a window in a tenement building, and brought down a small boy.

Five hundred families were homeless at 1 o'clock and cots were put up for the refugees in the Fourth Regiment Armory. The fire was rapidly approaching the huge warehouse of Colgate and Co., where 6,000 tons of soap were stored.

BANK CLOSED

K. C. Institution Under Examination By State Official.

After midnight she developed what the physician termed "air hunger". The attack was severe and prolonged, but attendants succeeded in reviving Mrs. Harding by opening all the windows in her room. She was too weak today to take but little nourishment.

PREMIERS DENY STORY OF DUEL

Clemenceau and Lloyd George Declare No Truth to Statement of British Writer.

BOOK IS SENSATION
"Through Thirty Years" Gives Side Lights on International Diplomats and Conferences.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 14.—Both Clemenceau and David Lloyd George today declared that there was no truth in Wickham Steed's account of how the two ex-Premiers sought to fight a duel in the days of Versailles. The former editor of the Times was undisturbed by the denials. "Naturally I would not have written what I did if I had not been sure of the facts," Steed said.

Steed's book, "Through Thirty Years" is causing a sensation. Beside describing the alleged row between George and Clemenceau, in which Steed said the Welchman had "The Tiger" by the collar and that Woodrow Wilson had to interfere, the author makes his book intriguing by the casual way in which he tells of giving advice to cabinet officers and Kings.

SURVEY PIPE LINE

Marland Visits San Angelo—Enthusiastic Over Reagan Field.

SAN ANGELO, Texas, Nov. 14.—Surveying for the pipe line which one of the Marland oil companies will lay from the Reagan County oil field was to begin Thursday at San Angelo extending west, according to an announcement here Wednesday by E. W. Marland of Ponca City, Okla., president of the group. Mr. Marland would not say whether his means that the line will follow the Orient to San Angelo, thence either to a possible connection with theumble line of Pipe line, or more direct to the Gulf. The pipe line through San Angelo, would, more than anything else, increase the chances for a refinery here, it was stated.

"It's a great oil country out there, and we will get ready right away to take some oil out of it," said Mr. Marland. "In all my years in the oil business, I've never seen a better looking situation than the Texas and Big Lake companies have in Reagan County.

Jones Polk, Fisher County constable, was denied bond in the examining trial and is being held in the Fisher County jail at Roby in connection with the shooting of J. B. Largent, young Royston boy who was killed at McCaulley late Saturday night. Ed Henry, T. Cooper and Rufus Retes were allowed bonds of \$1,500 each in connection with the shooting. Polk will be held in jail pending the action of a Fisher County grand jury, it was reported Friday. Two other men have been indicted for murder in connection with the affair, it is reported, but have not been located.

Largent, who was employed at a gin at Royston, was shot at McCaulley late Saturday night and died while being rushed to a Stamford sanitarium.

The United States Government, Bureau of the Census, is arranging to take the agricultural census of the United States in the year 1922. The 6th District of Texas will have headquarters in Sweetwater during the taking of the census, it is announced. The 6th district includes 31 counties in this section of Texas, and Walter Boothe of Sweetwater will be the director of the district with headquarters on the third floor of the court house.

In this census, the general condition of crops and livestock all over the Nation will be observed, and a report on every piece of land owned in the country will be made. A general check-up on the resources of the Nation is one of the objects of the census which will get under way early next month.

TREASURE SHIP FOUND

A few weeks ago two trawlers, the Foam and Spray, left New York on a treasure-hunting voyage. As several prominent financiers were named among the backers of the expedition, it would have been reasonable to suppose that no wild-goose chase had been undertaken even if it had not been announced that the subject, instead of visionary pirate gold, was to locate the Ward liner Merida which went down in a collision off the Virginia capes in 1911. Though the attempt had often been made before, there was still room for hope, and now the news comes that the sunken ship has at last been found on the ocean floor under 200 feet of water some 50 miles east of Cape Charles, the dispatch stating that the wreck had been caught by the dragging of a mile long iron sweep.

The backers of this undertaking are in luck, for it is stated that under the law of the sea a lost wreck is the prize of the finders, and that the Merida contained gold, silver, copper and jewels worth from two to five million dollars. Obviously the exact location will be kept secret, and of course the treasure when raised will be carefully guarded and quietly removed to a place of safety. There is said to be fear of "hijackers," a term usually applied to robbers of liquor-laden automobiles on land. Undoubtedly there is good reason to fear

those "rum-runners" of the sea who board and loot liquor-laden "rum-runners." Judging from the accounts these latter have all the necessary daring to attack in regular pirate fashion any boat suspected of carrying treasure from the sunken Merida, and even the announcement that the wreck has been located about 50 miles east of Cape Charles would seem to be more definite than is prudent.

Express Officer Investigates Truck Thefts—Arrests Negro.

W. E. Vaty, special agent of the American Railway Express Co., was in Sweetwater on official business Friday. Mr. Vaty has headquarters at Fort Worth and is in this section investigating the theft of property from the Express Company trucks.

CAMERON VISITS HERE

Don't Appreciate Sweetwater 'Till You Leave, Former Resident Says

"You folks in Sweetwater don't appreciate all the advantages you have in mail service, rail facilities and many other good features until you live in a town that has them not," said C. E. Cameron, who left Sweetwater last summer to take charge of the West Texas Electric Co., at Lamesa. According to Mr. Cameron, Lamesa is a boom town with all that is implied therein. The postoffice is stacked up every day like the ordinary office is day before Christmas. On ordinary days it takes about twenty minutes standing in line to get to the teller's window in one of the banks; on Saturday the line is longer than the one for the World Series games.

The burned section of the town has been completely rebuilt with new and modern buildings and there is not a vacant store anywhere. There is a woeful shortage of houses and rents are higher than a cat's back.

"When I first went to Lamesa, the power plant had a capacity of 200 horsepower. Now it has 500 and more is needed to supply the demand," he said.

Over 40,000 bales of cotton will be marketed in Lamesa this season, rais-

ed in the surrounding county, Mr. Cameron said.

"And we would sure appreciate a daily newspaper. We need one badly," he told a Reporter representative. Mr. Cameron attended a District meeting at the Sweetwater office of the West Texas Electric Co.

BRITAIN PAUSES

In London and Through All the Kingdom Signing of Armistice is Observed Tuesday.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 14.—The sixth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice in the World War was celebrated throughout Britain Tuesday with impressive solemnity.

Everywhere a two-minute silence was observed at 11 a. m.—the hour at which the armistice was signed—and as far as possible, without dislocating the vital public services, all movement came to a halt.

At naval and military stations troops and sailors were paraded for the "Great Silence," and impressive services followed, while at all churches special services were held, and were largely attended by the general public and ex-soldiers.

The biggest ceremony was that at the Cenotaph, on Whitehall, London, where King George, the Prince of Wales, and other members of the royal family participated.

Sir Edwin Lutyen's simple pillar may not rank as one of the world's sculptural wonders, and it in fact is far less imposing than many a village memorial, but the modest plaster cast, which, originally intended as a mere model, was erected in Whitehall for the first Allied "Victory Parade" of 1919, caught the popular imagination as few things have done in modern history. All attempts at removal or the construction of a more imposing memorial have been strenuously resisted by public opinion. The plaster cast has been replaced by a marble duplicate and is scheduled to remain as long as London lasts.

TO BAND MANAGERS

University Official Plans Organization of City Managers.

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 14.—Bandings together of the 24 city managers of Texas into an association are the plans being made by R. D. Jackson of the government research division of the University of Texas. The organization would have annual conventions and various other functions during the year.

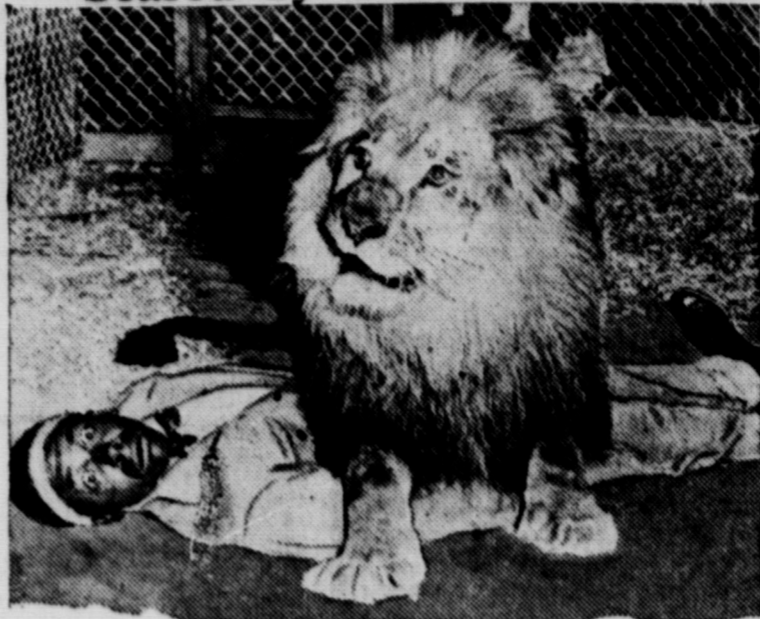

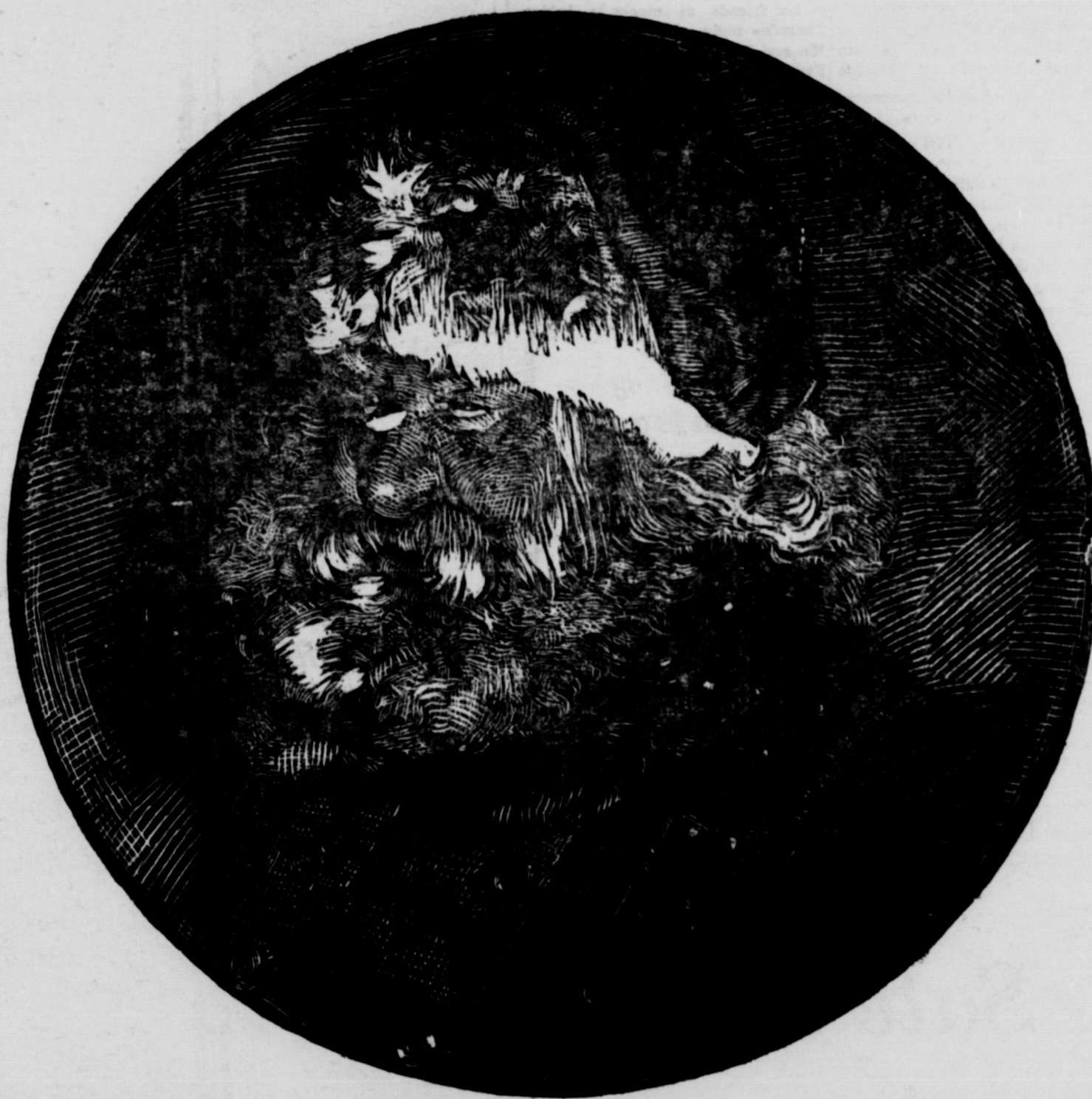

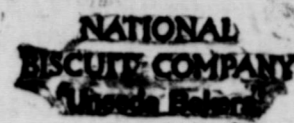
