

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 15 .- Renewed development activity throughout the southern states is reflected in building permit totals for the month of October, which reached a new high Five figure of \$53,015,132 in 106 cities according to records compiled by the survey department of G. L. Miller and company, real estate mortgage bond house, of this city.

This total is as large as the figures advance of the building for October, legger. 1923.
