## MY TURN

OKAY, LET'S TALK about this proposed Clinton Health Care Program.

"I'm from the government and I'm here to help you," are words that strike fear in the hearts of every grassroots American. Now we are going to hand over our medical facilities to this crowd? Wow!

Your lady column writer would not pretend to be smart enough to understand and analyze the entire 1,342 page Clinton health plan, but I know several people who are a lot smarter than me and they have gone over this thing with a fine-toothed comb.

My heroine Phyllis Schlafly is one such person. (I'd like to see her in a face off with Hillary Clinton. Then we'd find out who is the smartest woman in America.) Mrs. Schlafly notes that the Clinton Health Program mentions the word "penalty" 59 times, "mandatory" 24 times, "prohibit" 51 times, "restrict" 54 times, "enforce" 87 times, "obligation" 56 times and "limit" 269 times. This is socialism vs freedom, folks.

If there are elderly people in your family (over age 65) then you have good reason to be worried. Three-fourths of every health care dollar is spent on our older folks. But the primary objective of the Clinton health program is not to keep the quality of care up but the cost of care down. Saving money will become more important than saving lives. Whether or not your life is worth saving, under the circumstances and in light of the costs, will be determined by the bureaucracy.

Under this system, people-pruning will be the most efficient way of reducing costs. The most vulnerable will become the most expendable. . . elderly people in need of life-extending surgeries, babies with severe birth defects and everyone who has an expensive ailment and a poor prognosis. This is how national health care works in other countries which already have socialized medicine, according to Don Feder.

My pal Anne Spring says her relatives in England (a long-time socialized medicine country) tell the story of two women in need of hip-replacement surgery who were in the ward of a hospital located directly on the line between England and Wales. The woman in the hospital bed in Wales was due to have her surgery within two weeks. The woman in the bed which was on the England side, was due for her hip-replacement in two years because England had already used up their allotment of hip surgeries for that length of time.

A recent *Reader's Digest* article showed the waiting time for orthopedic surgery in Canada was about 10 months. In Sweden, life-sustaining care is withheld from premature babies with low birth weights. And in England, senior citizens are not allowed to get kidney dialysis.

Under the Clinton plan, open-heart surgery will also come under restrictions, and budgetary constraints will cut research and development. I don't understand why these people want to completely wipe out a medical and research system which is the envy of the rest of the world.

No system is perfect, of course, and there are certainly areas that need improvement. Texas' own Sen. Phil Gramm has come up with an alternative plan which would leave us our freedom but would cut our health care costs in half. We need to get behind him on this. (S. Bill 1807)

## Local Area Receives Most Beneficial Rain

The Parmer County area received much needed moisture this past week, even if some of it was in the form of ice. This should really help the farmers out with their spring planting season.

Ron Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers reported that farmers he had spoken with had received anywhere from 1/2 inch to 1.10 inches of total moisture while reports from West Friona Grain were one inch of moisture.

Reports from Randy Thomas at Black Grain were .09 to one inch, "a real lifesaver," Randy said. And at Sherley-Anderson Grain at Rhea one inch of moisture was measured.

Howard Fleming of Hub Grain said that reports he had heard were about 3/4 of an inch while reports from West Hub Gin were 7/10 of an inch.

## DSEC Hosts Membership At Meeting

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative held its annual membership meeting Tuesday night and some 500 people braved snowy conditions to attend the session in the Bull Barn.

A highlight of the session was the awarding of \$1,539,800 in capital credits from 1978 and 1979 which were returned to members.

Also during the session, Clark Andrews, Clarence Martin and Donald Wright were re-elected to the board of directors.

In addition, members heard entertainment from the Chuck Wagon Gang and a business meeting featured remarks by general manager, Steve Louder.

## Hutchison Remains Popular Locally

Republican Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison remains popular with local and Parmer County voters.

Ms Hutchison, who recently was cleared of wrongdoing in regard to her earlier activities as State Treasurer, was given a big "thumbs up" in Tuesday's primary election.

With six "token" opponents on the ballot, Hutchison easily won the nomination statewide Tuesday, with 88 per cent of the vote.

In Parmer County, she received 184 votes cast in the Republican primary to only ten scattered votes for her opponents--94.8 per cent of the vote. Her margin was broken down as follows:

Precinct 1, Friona: Hutchison 69, Roger Henson 1 (98.6%); Precinct 2, Bovina: Hutchison 18, Henson 1 (94.7%); Precinct 3, Farwell: Hutchison 42 to none for the opponents (100%); Lazbuddie, Precinct 4: Hutchison 14, Stephen Hopkins 5 (73.7%) and early

voting: Hutchison 41, Henson 1, Tom Spink 1 (95.3%).

George W. Bush, who cruised to the Republican nomination for governor, won Parmer County in a walk. 184-7 (96.3%).

Ann Richards, incumbent governor, wasn't quite as popular with her party's voters as was Ms. Hutchison.

Richards won nomination Tuesday, but received only about 73 per cent of the vote, compared to Hutchison's runaway. Ann Richards' opponent was Gary Espinoza, an unknown. Espinoza received 37.8 per cent of the vote in Parmer County, to 62.2 per cent for Richards (102-168). This might be an indication of a battle shaping up for the governor's chair in November.

In other statewide contests Tuesday, Jim Maddox led the Democratic field for the senate nomination with 116 votes to 93

for Richard Fisher.

The non-binding proposition on the Republican ballot, to bring up a vote on authorizing the D.P.S. to adopt rules for licensing and training qualified citizens to carry handguns for self-protection, passed in Parmer County, 115-41, and won statewide by more than a 3-1 margin.

## Three Spots Are Open On Hospital Dist.

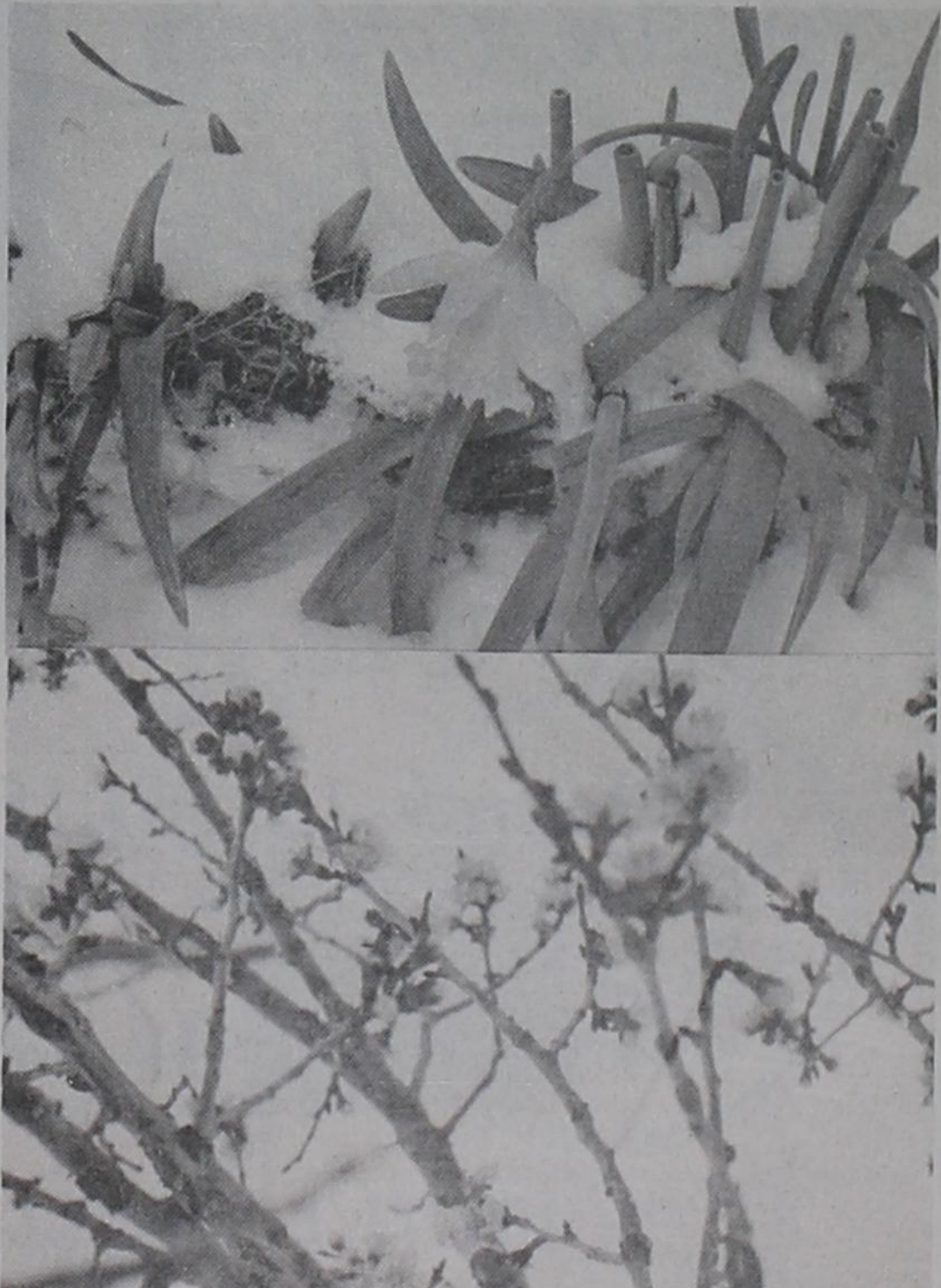
It was announced this week by Bill Neely, administrator of the Parmer County Hospital District that three positions on the Board of Directors will be up for election on May 7.

## Did You Know?

"God sent His son--they called Him Jesus; He came to love, heal and forgive; He lived and died to buy my pardon; an empty grave is there to prove my Savior lives. How sweet to hold a new-born baby and feel the pride and joy he gives; but greater still the calm assurance; This child can face uncertain days because Christ lives."

This is the first two stanzas of the song "Because He lives". It was written by Bill and Gloria Gaither in the late 1960's.

He relates the story of its writing this way: "We wrote 'Because He Lives' after a period of time when we had had a kind of dry spell and hadn't written any songs for a while... Also at the end of the 60's, our country was going through some great turmoil with the height of the drug culture, and the whole 'God is Dead' theory was running wild in our country. Also it was the peak of the Vietnam War. During that time our little son was born--at least Gloria was expecting him. I can remember at the time we thought, 'Brother, this is really a poor time to bring a child into the world.' At times we were even quite discouraged by the whole thing. And then Benjy did come. We had two little girls whom we love very much, but this was our first son, and so that lyric came to us, 'How sweet to hold our new-born baby and feel the pride and joy he gives, but better still the calm assurance that this child can face uncertain days because Christ lives.' And it gave us the courage to say, 'Because Christ lives we can face tomorrow' and keep our heads high."

Last week I wrote about 'Scholars' redefining Jesus as human and not divine. In the 60's men were declaring "God is dead". Just as there will be those who deny Him, so there will be new song writers to proclaim that He lives. And so it will continue until He returns.

The chorus of the song is what most of us are familiar with: "Because He lives I can face tomorrow, because He lives all fear is gone; because I know He holds the future and life is worth the living --just because He lives."

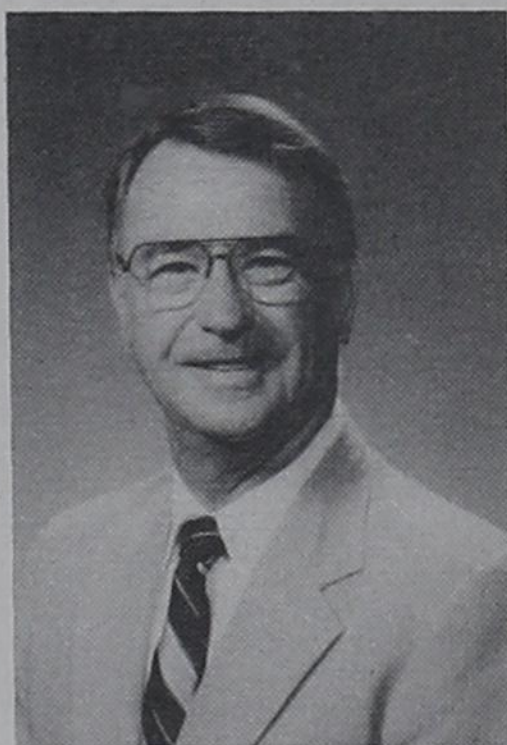

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

### 65 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 8, 1929

It is authoritatively reported that there are a number of cases of scarlet fever in the town, and community and that a number of cases have been confirmed at school.

Mrs. Elizabeth N. Shelby, mother of Ben G. Shelby and widow of a famous general in the Civil War, died at the home of her son here last week. She was 88.

### 60 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 9, 1934

J. A. Guyer, who has served as postmaster and assistant postmaster for the past ten years, has left the post office as of this week.

### 55 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 10, 1939

Friona FFA chapter's dairy judging team won the first place trophy in the meat identification division in competition at Lubbock last week. Team members are Duan York, B.O. Wyly and Francis Rector. Wyly was high point individual in the contest, which drew 107 teams.

### 50 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 3, 1944

The Friona Lions Club has elected officers for the ensuing year. Elected were O.F. Lange, president; J. R. Roden, secretary-treasurer; C. C. Mauer, lion tamer and Dr. E.B. Knolhoff, tail-twister.

The Friona Squaws won the District 9 tournament at Hedley recently, and qualified for the state tournament. At Hedley, the team defeated Samnorwood, 16-7; Shamrock, 27-2 and Quail in the finals, 21-14.

### 40 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 4, 1954

A contract has been signed with Pioneer Natural Gas Company for the construction of natural gas lines north of Friona. Some 62 miles of line will be laid, serving between 100 and 120 irrigation wells.

### 35 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 5, 1959

Customers who drive will now be able to conduct their banking business in a matter of seconds since the new electric drive-in window was put into service by the Friona State Bank on March 3. The window is constructed of bullet-proof glass and framed in stainless steel.

Former superintendents of Friona Schools will be special guests at a dedication of the new building on the school campus at 2 p.m. Sunday.

### 30 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 5, 1964

Two men were killed in separate accidents on the eastern outskirts of Friona the past week. Robert Newton Isbell, of Clovis, was killed Monday when a freight train struck the cattle truck he was driving at the crossing two miles east of town. Last Friday, Cristobal Rodriguez, an employee of I.T. Graves, was killed in a freak tractor accident just outside the city limits near Benger Air Park.

## CHERRY DELIGHT

- 1-1/2 cups flour
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1-1/2 sticks + 2 tablespoons oleo
- 3/4 cup pecans, chopped
- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 8 ounce cream cheese
- Large Cool Whip or 2 packages Dream Whip
- 1 or 2 cans cherry pie filling

Mix flour and the 2 tablespoons sugar, add melted oleo and nuts. Press into 13"x9" cake pan and bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Mix powdered sugar and cream cheese, fold in Cool Whip. Spread over cooled crust. Spread pie filling over top and refrigerate.

## CHRISTMAS STOLLEN

- 3 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 package dry yeast
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup nut meats
- 2/3 cup chopped candied fruit
- 1 tablespoon grated lemon peel

Combine flour, sugar, salt and yeast in large mixing bowl. Heat milk and butter until very warm, add to dry ingredients. Add egg. Mix fruits, nuts and peel with about 1/4 cup flour and add to yeast mixture. Stir in additional flour to

make soft dough and knead until smooth. Put in greased bowl and allow to rise until doubled. Punch down, and divide into half. Roll each half into an 8" circle and spread with softened butter. Fold in half. Place on greased baking sheet and allow to rise again until doubled. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Glaze with your favorite powdered sugar glaze. Or, use powdered sugar, milk and vanilla glaze and decorate with nuts and candied fruit. Makes 2 coffee cakes.

## LIME COOLERS

- 1-1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 (3 oz.) or 1 (6 oz.) package lime Jello
- 4-1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs, vanilla and Jello and mix well. Sift together remaining ingredients and add slowly. Shape into 1" balls, and place on ungreased baking sheet and flatten with fork. (Cookie press may be used.) If dough is too soft, add 2 tablespoons flour. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) for 6 to 8 minutes. Do not brown.

## FROZEN BREAD CARAMEL ROLLS

By Dawn Gibson Landrum

- 2 loaves frozen bread
- 1/2 cup butter or oleo
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 small packages vanilla pudding mix (not instant)
- 2 tablespoons milk
- May add 1/2-3/4 cups pecans, if desired
- Also may add 1/2-1 teaspoon cinnamon

Thaw bread; do not allow to rise. Break or cut one loaf up into greased 13"x9" pan. Melt butter, add sugar, pudding mix, milk and cinnamon and mix over low heat until smooth. Pour over broken bread. Break second loaf on top and let rise (approximately 2 hours).

Bake 25 to 30 minutes at 375 degrees. Let set in pan about 10 to 15 minutes before inverting on serving tray.

## DUETTE DEW

By Susan Weiland

- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup canned cream
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 pound chopped dates
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Beat eggs until foamy, add cream, sugars, dates and nuts. Mix dry ingredients together and add to above. Pour into well greased 8"x12" pan. Cook 20 minutes at 350. When cool, pick apart with fork and top with whipped cream. Do not double recipe.

## BANANA MUFFINS

By Carol Dement

- 1/2 cup margarine, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3 ripe bananas, mashed
- 1-1/4 cup flour (all-purpose)
- 1/2 teaspoon soda

Combine margarine and sugar; beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Stir in bananas. Combine flour and soda; add to creamed mixture, stirring just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Fill muffin pans 2/3 full. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until done. Makes about 1-1/4 dozen.

## CHRISTMAS CANES

By Jeannette Maurer

- 1 cup milk
- 4 cups unsifted flour
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 1 cup (2 sticks) margarine
- 1 package dry yeast
- 1/4 cup warm water
- 2 eggs (beaten)

For cranberry filling: 1-1/2 cups finely chopped cranberries, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup raisins, 1/3 cup chopped pecans, 1/3 cup honey. 1-1/2 teaspoon grated orange peel. Combine the ingredients in a pan. Cook over medium heat. Bring to a boil and cook about 5 minutes. Cool.

Scald 1 cup milk. Cool to lukewarm. In large bowl, combine: 4 cups flour, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon lemon peel.

Cut in 1 cup margarine until like coarse meal. Dissolve 1 package dry yeast in 1/4 cup warm water. To flour mixture, add yeast, lukewarm milk and 2 beaten eggs. Combine lightly. Cover dough tightly; refrigerate for at least 2 hours (or up to 2 days). When ready to bake, prepare filling. Divide dough in half. On a floured board, roll out 1/2 of the dough into an 18"x15" rectangle. Spread with 1/2 of the filling. Fold dough into a 3 layer strip 15" long. Cut dough into 15 strips. Hold each end of strip and twist lightly in opposite directions. Place on greased baking sheets. Bake in 350 degree oven 10-15 minutes or until done. Frost with confectioners sugar frosting.

## PUMPKIN BREAD

By Charlene Harper

- 3 cups sugar
- 1 cup corn oil
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 1 can pumpkin
- 3-1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 1-1/2 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice or 1 teaspoon each of cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 2/3 cup water
- 1 cup pecans

Combine sugar and oil. Add beaten eggs and then the pumpkin. Sift together all dry ingredients and add to first mixture. Add water. Stir in nuts. Pour into greased loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 55 minutes to 1 hour.

## SUGARPLUM RING

By Karon Zachary

- 1 package active dry yeast or 1 cake compressed yeast
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/2 cup milk, scalded
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3-3/4 to 4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 beaten eggs

- 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup whole blanched almonds
- 1/2 cup candied whole red cherries
- 1/3 cup dark corn syrup

Soften active dry yeast in warm water (110 degrees) or compressed yeast in lukewarm water (85 degrees). Combine scalded milk, the 1/3 cup sugar, shortening and salt; cool to lukewarm. Stir in 1 cup of the flour; beat well. Add softened yeast and eggs. Add remaining flour or enough to make a soft dough. Mix thoroughly and place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease surface. Cover and let rise until double, about 2 hours. Punch and let rise 10 minutes. Divide dough into 4 parts. Cut each part into 10 pieces and shape into balls. Dip balls in the melted butter, then in the 3/4 cup sugar blended with the cinnamon. Arrange 1/3 of the balls in well-greased 10 inch tube pan. Sprinkle with some of the almonds and cherries. Repeat with two more layers. Mix corn syrup with butter left from dipping balls; drizzle over top. Cover and let rise until double, about 1 hour. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Cool 5 minutes. Invert and remove. Makes 1 ring.

Mercer concluded his report with, "I've had lots of birthdays, but never had such an elaborate party before."

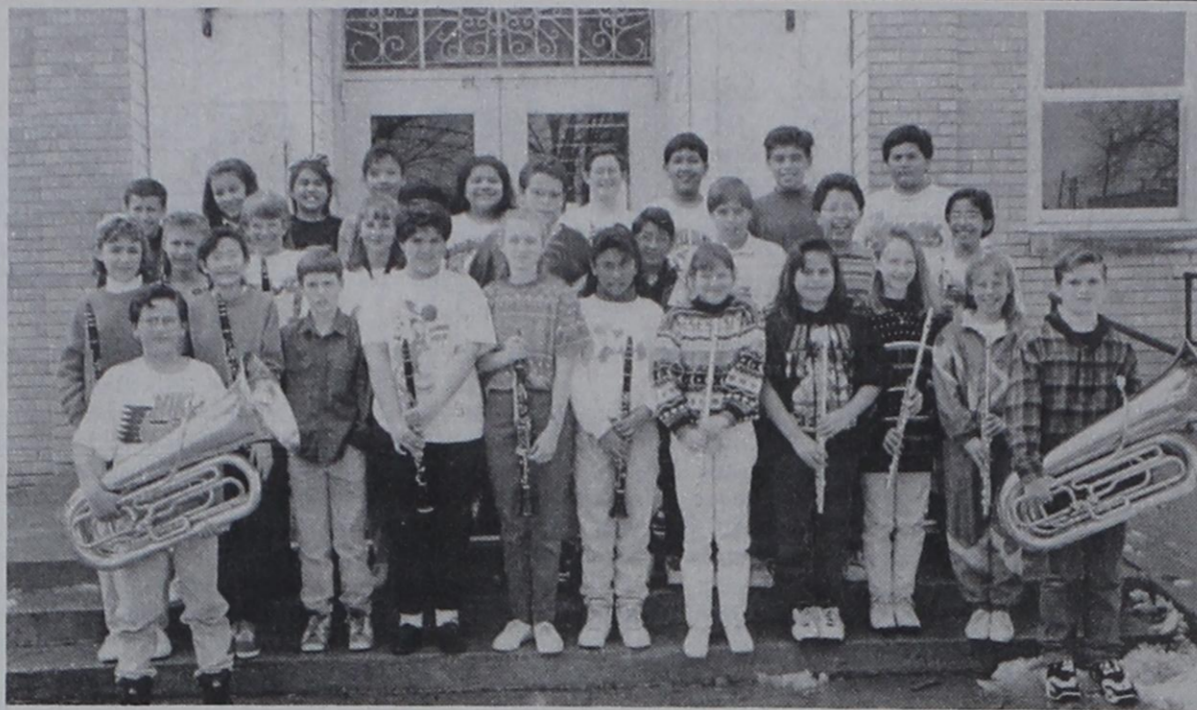
### Reporting Crimes Pays

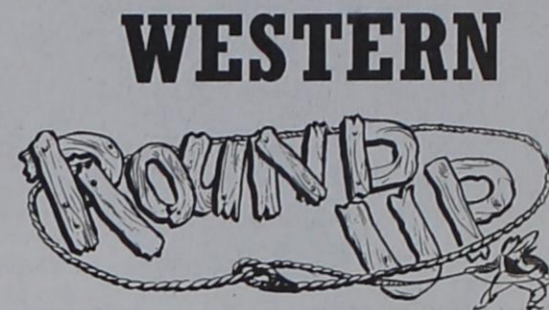

### Understanding IRA Regulations

Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs), an excellent way to plan for the future, are one of the most frequently asked about investment vehicles. Following are some of the most common questions about IRAs:

**Can I roll over my employer retirement plan distribution into an existing IRA?** Yes. By doing so, you only have one retirement account to monitor and pay only one annual fee. However, by rolling your distribution into a new IRA, you have the right to roll those funds back into any future employer-sponsored plan. **What if I overcontribute to my IRA or roll over more than is eligible?** If possible, you should avoid overcontributing to your IRA. If this occurs, you may be subject to certain penalties.

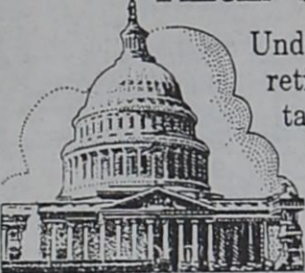

### The Winter Sun

The winter sun shines brightly, and protection against its rays is just as important now as it was last summer. Sunglasses offer another plus: they shield the eyes against wind, dirt and dust as well. Look for ultraviolet protection in quality lenses; your optometrist will check that the glasses are aligned properly.

Winter sports like skiing call for tougher glasses with frames designed for the sport. For protection in case of a fall, frames should be cushioned and all sharp edges covered; impact-resistant lenses provide extra safety.

Choose any color lenses that absorb from 70 to 85 per cent of light and permit the wearer to distinguish between red and green. Polycarbonate lenses offer extra protection but are most likely to scratch. Extra coatings are available to block more ultraviolet light; anti-reflective coatings reduce glare. It is unwise, though, to combine anti-reflective coatings with scratch-resistance protection.

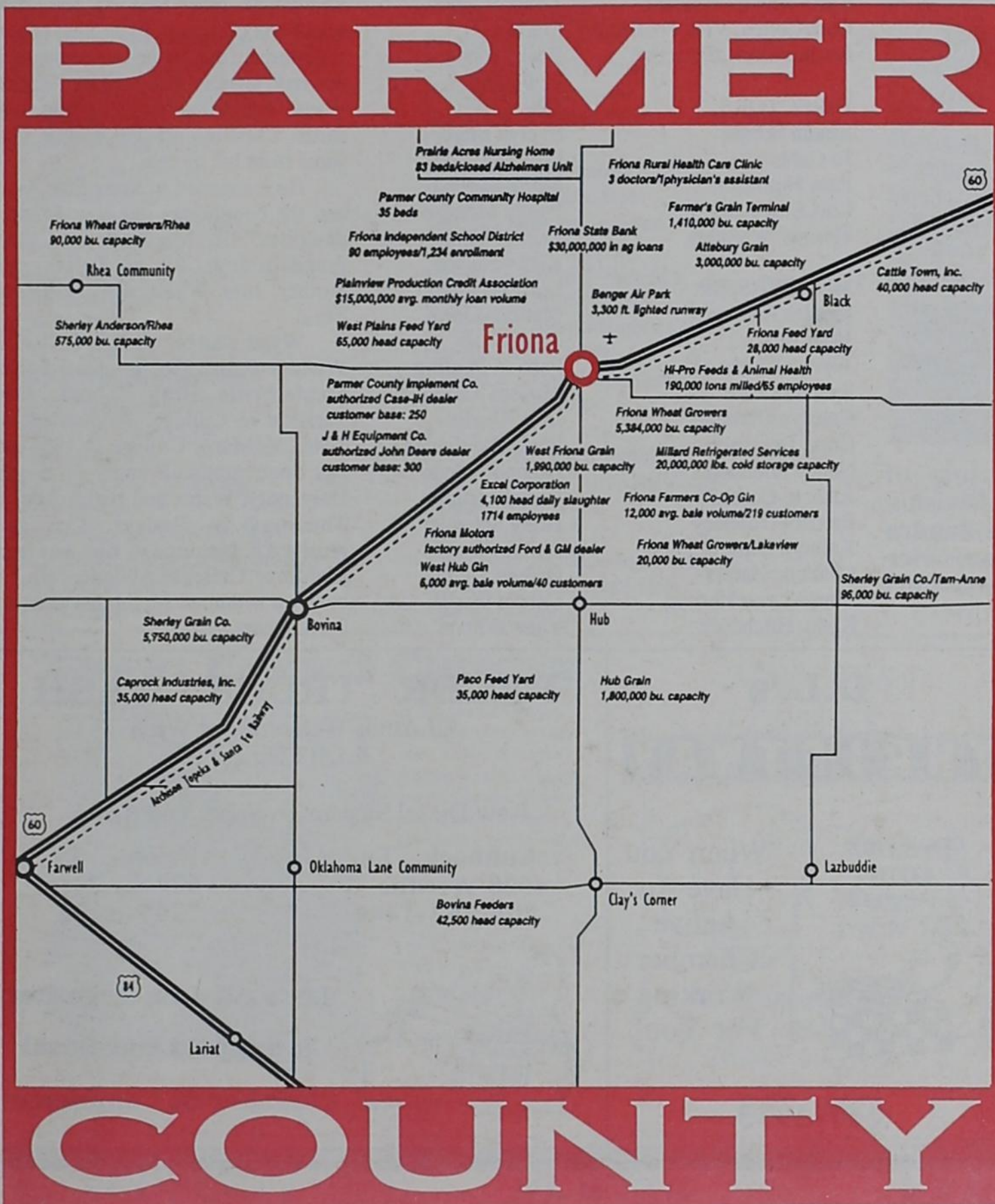

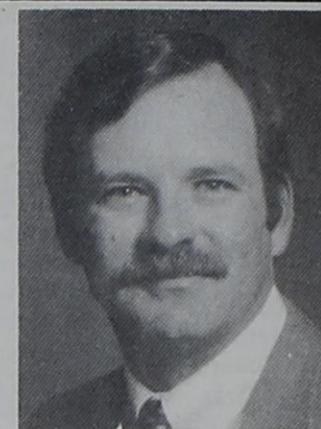

Two members of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture's board of directors have finished out their terms of office.

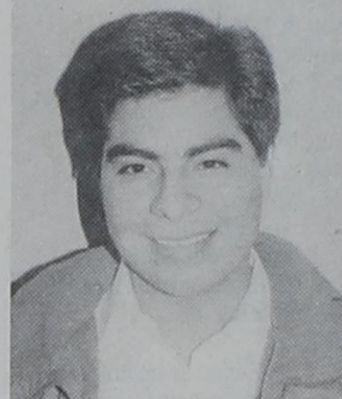
