


OKAY, LET'S TALK about this proposed Clinton Health Care Program.

If there are elderly people in your family (over age 65) then you have good reason to be worried. Three-fourths of every health care dollar is spent on our older folks. But the primary objective of the Clinton health program is not to keep the quality of care up but the cost of care down. Saving money will become more important than saving lives. Whether or not your life is worth saving, under the circumstances and in light of the costs, will be determined by the bureaucracy.

Under this system, peoplepruning will be the most efficient way of reducing costs. The most vulnerable will become the most expendable. . . elderly people in need of life-extending surgeries, babies with severe birth defects and everyone who has an expensive

ailment and a poor prognosis. This is how national health care works in other countries which already have socialized medicine, according to Don Feder.

My pal Anne Spring says her relatives in England (a long-time socialized medicine country) tell the story of two women in need of hip-replacement surgery who were in the ward of a hospital located directly on the line between England and Wales. The woman in the hospital bed in Wales was due to have her surgery within two weeks. The woman in the bed which was on the England side, was due for her hip-replacement in two years because England had already used up their allotment of hip surgeries for that length of time.

A recent Reader's Digest article showed the waiting time for orthopedic surgery in Canada was about 10 months. In Sweden, lifesustaining care is withheld from premature babies with low birth weights. And in England, senior citizens are not allowed to get kidney dialysis.

Under the Clinton plan, openheart surgery will also come under restrictions, and budgetary constraints will cut research and development. I don't understand why these people want to completely wipe out a medical and research system which is the envy of the rest of the world. No system is perfect, of course, and there are certainly areas that need improvement. Texas' own Sen. Phil Gramm has come up with an alternative plan which would leave us our freedom but would cut our health care costs in half. We need to get behind him on this. (S. The Parmer County area received much needed moisture this past week, even if some of it was in the form of ice. This should really help the farmers out with their spring planting season.

Ron Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers reported that farmers he had spoken with had received anywhere from 1/2 inch to 1.10inches of total moisture while reports from West Friona Grain were one inch of moisture.

Reports from Randy Thomas at Black Grain were .09 to one inch, "a real lifesaver," Randy said. And at Sherley-Anderson Grain at Rhea one inch of moisture was measured. Howard Fleming of Hub Grain

said that reports he had heard were about 3/4 of an inch while reports from West Hub Gin were 7/10 of an inch.

tection in quality lenses; your optometrist will check that the glasses are aligned properly.

Winter sports like skiing call for tougher glasses with frames designed for the sport. For protection in case of a fall, frames should be cushioned and all sharp edges covered; impact-resistant lenses provide extra safety.

Choose any color lenses that absorb from 70 to 85 per cent of light and permit the wearer to distinguish between red and green. Polycarbonate lenses offer extra protection but are most likely to scratch. Extra coatings are available to block more ultraviolet light; anti-reflective coatings reduce glare. It is unwise, though, to combine anti-reflective coatings with scratch-resistance protection.




He is best known for his Western and Christian art, however, his landscape, still life and character study work is among the best anywhere.
