SCOUT CAMPAIGN OPENS THURSDAY

Breakfast of Leaders of Drive in Nolan County Starts Work Officially Here.

OUTLOOK IS PROMISING

To Raise \$1,400 For Week in Nolan—Boys Plan Field Day at Rotan Thanksgiving.

The campaign funds for the Buffalo Trail Council Boy Scouts officially opened Thursday morning when Sweetwater citizens actively directing the campaign met at breakfast at Hotel Wright and discussed plans for the drive. Contributions have already begun to come in, and the full \$1,400 quota for Nolan County is expected to be raised by the time the drive closes Saturday.

Approximately \$500, or one-third of the quota, has already been raised, according to Scout officials here, with two more days in which to raise the balance of \$1,000.

"There is little doubt but what the campaign will be successful," Scout Executive W. S. Barcus stated Thursday morning. "We expect to raise the funds but people must respond when called on if the drive is to go over."

The nine men present at the breakfast Thursday morning were Rev. J. T. McKissick, chairman of the drive; W. S. Barcus, Scout executive; Judge A. S. Mauzey, Dr. L. O. Dudgeon, J. A. McCurdy, Hubert Toler, Luther Watson, D. A. Clark, and Rev. B. B. Hestir.

PAPER INDICTED BY U S OFFICIALS

Baltimore Post, Scripps-Howard Paper, First to be Indicted in Income Tax Test Cases.

OTHERS ARE TO FOLLOW

Government to File Against Six Other Newspapers in Tax Suits For Publishing Lists.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 20.—The Baltimore Post Co., publishers of the Daily Post, Scripps-Howard newspaper, was indicted by the Federal Grand Jury here today charged with the printing of income tax returns.

There were five counts in all, all charging the unlawful publication of income tax returns.

This is the first suit brought under the plan to test the legality of the publication of income tax returns under the recent law changes.

Six other newspapers will be indicted similarly.

The ruins of six business houses, representing a loss of approximately \$150,000, were searched today for additional victims.

DOUBT RECOVERY OF MRS HARDING

Wife of Former President Passes into Semi-Coma, Fear She May Never Regain Consciousness.

COOLIDGE SENDS WIRE

"Isn't That Nice," Says Mrs. Harding—One of Few Times She Has Spoken in Several Days.

MARION, O., Nov. 20.—Mrs. Warren G. Harding today passed into a semi-coma and her physicians entertained grave doubts that she would ever again completely regain consciousness.

Dr. Carl W. Sawyer in a bulletin issued at 8:30 a. m., said: "Mrs. Harding was restless most of the night. This morning she is in a semi-comatose condition. Her heart action is only fair, and she is very weak." President Coolidge talked to Dr. Sawyer last night and was informed that the late President's widow was sinking.

The following telegram from President and Mrs. Coolidge was received today at the White Oaks Farm where Mrs. W. G. Harding widow of the late president is near death.

"Mrs. Coolidge and I send affectionate regards. You are constantly in our thoughts and we anxiously await word of your continued improvement."

George Christian, the secretary of the late President Harding, took the message into the sickroom and read it.

"Isn't that nice," Mrs. Harding said. It is one of the few words she has spoken in the past several days.

CONDITION SAME

Report Little Change in Condition of W. H. Bartlett, City Secretary, Injured at Crossing.

Very little change in the condition of W. H. Bartlett, Secretary of the City of Sweetwater, seriously injured when struck by T-P west bound passenger train Number Five at the Hailey street grade crossing Wednesday morning, was reported at the Sweetwater Sanitarium late Thursday afternoon.

Bartlett was still in a semi-conscious condition Thursday. Attendants reported that he slept quite a bit through the day. His general condition was considered about the same.

Several relatives of W. H. Bartlett have arrived in Sweetwater after being summoned to his bedside by the family here. Mrs. Gardner of El Paso arrived in Sweetwater early Thursday morning. She is Bartlett's sister. Lee Ring, a brother-in-law, and son from Quanah, formerly residents of Sweetwater arrived here Wednesday night. Dan Bartlett and Mrs. Higginbotham, both of Fort Worth, brother and sister of Mr. Bartlett's are here, and another brother, George Bartlett of Commerce has also arrived.

TO PLAY BIG SPRING

Salty Pups to Leave Friday Morning For Hard Battle.

Coach Joe Gibson will take his team of Salty Pups out to Big Spring Friday where they will meet that high school eleven for what may be the last game of the 1924 season for the locals. The game will be played in Big Spring instead of Sweetwater, it was announced Thursday.

Marshall Building Booms.

MARSHALL, Texas, Nov. 20.—Building permits issued here during October totaled \$60,430, exceeding all marks for any month this year with the exception of June. Permits during June, amounted to \$227,850, due to the issuance for two new high school buildings. Permits for the first ten months of the year totalled \$583,672.

START DRIVE ON US TAX DODGERS

Internal Revenue Bureau to Seek Collection of Back Taxes—Expect Millions of Dollars.

WILL ATTACH PROPERTY

Warrants Being Prepared For Drastic Government Move—To Begin Action About Dec. 1.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20.—A nation-wide drive against tax dodgers will be started by the government it was learned today at the Internal Revenue Bureau.

Warrants attaching the property of tax delinquents are being prepared and will be issued about December 1. The government hopes to secure millions in back taxes by this drastic move.

A recent action of Commissioner of Internal Revenue Blair has fixed a limit on the time allowed for the delinquents of 1923 to make their tax payments.

GIN LESS COTTON

State Gains, But Nolan and Surrounding Counties Show Less Compared to November, 1923.

With a gain in the state over last year of 296,436 bales shown in the Department of Commerce preliminary report of cotton ginned in Texas prior to November 1, Nolan and surrounding counties are behind the marks made in the preliminary report issued for the same period last year.

Big gains are shown in the report on the Plains, in Lubbock, Hale, and Dawson counties. Nolan County showed a loss of 1,500 bales; Mitchell County, 7,438 bales loss; Scurry County, 1,626 bales loss; Fisher County, 6,115 bales loss; Taylor County, 5,963 bales loss.

LABOR IN STAND ON IMMIGRATION

American Federation Instructed by Convention to Oppose Modification of Laws.

REAFFIRM JAP POSITION

Report Not One Measure Adopted in Congress Opposed by Labor, Eleven Approved Adopted.

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 20.—The Secretary of the American Federation of Labor was today instructed by the Convention to oppose any attempt to modify present immigration laws.

The convention also re-affirmed the stand of the Federation of Labor against the admission of Japanese to the United States or the entrance of any immigrants ineligible to citizenship in the United States.

The legislative activity of the Federation was noted in a report made to the convention in which it was stated that not one measure opposed by the Federation had been enacted into law while pointing out that 11 measures approved by Labor had been passed by Congress.

Rates On Shipping Calves.

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 20.—Under an order issued by the Railroad Commission, beef cattle rates shall apply on calves, except stocker calves, shipped in single deck cars. The order is effective not later than December 31 next.

COLLECTOR DEAD

Arkansas County Official Found Dead With Carboic Acid Bottle By Side—Investigate Accounts.

TEXARKANA, Ark., Nov. 20.—Simon Eason, 42, county tax collector, was found dead in his office here today with an empty carboic acid bottle beside the body. Discovery of the dead man was made by the janitor.

An apparent shortage in his accounts, which are now under investigation, family trouble and ill health are held to be responsible in a letter in Eason's handwriting found near the body.

DECLARES WIFE LURED TO DEATH

Rev. Sheatsley Gives His Explanation of Death of His Wife, Found in Furnace.

BLAMES FANATICISM

His Eloquent Description of Heaven Also Advanced by Preacher—Theory Called Possible.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 20.—Insensibility to pain because of religious fanaticism which unbalanced her mind and lured to self destruction by her husband's eloquent description of Heaven, Mrs. Addie Sheatsley crept into the red hot coals of the furnace at the Lutheran parsonage and was burned to death.

This is, according to the woman's husband, the Rev. C. Z. Sheatsley, the solution of the now famous "furnace mystery" which came into being last Monday night when the pastor found his wife's charred remains smouldering in the furnace fire.

Theory Believed Possible.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 20.—It is possible that an insane person of a certain type may become so insensible to pain as to permit such a method of suicide as is said to have caused the death of Mrs. C. Z. Sheatsley, the head of the State Hospital for the Insane told the United Press today.

OFFICIAL BETTER

Sir Lee Stack, Governor-General of Soudan, Still in Serious Condition After Shooting.

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 20.—Sir Lee Stack, Governor-General of the Soudan and Sirdar of the Egyptian Army, is improved this morning, but still in a serious condition, according to physicians' bulletin.

Sir Lee received three wounds from an assassin's attack yesterday.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Hestir of the Baptist Church at Snyder.

AWAIT DECISION

Action of Court in Divorce Proceeding Will set Interesting Precedent in Cases.

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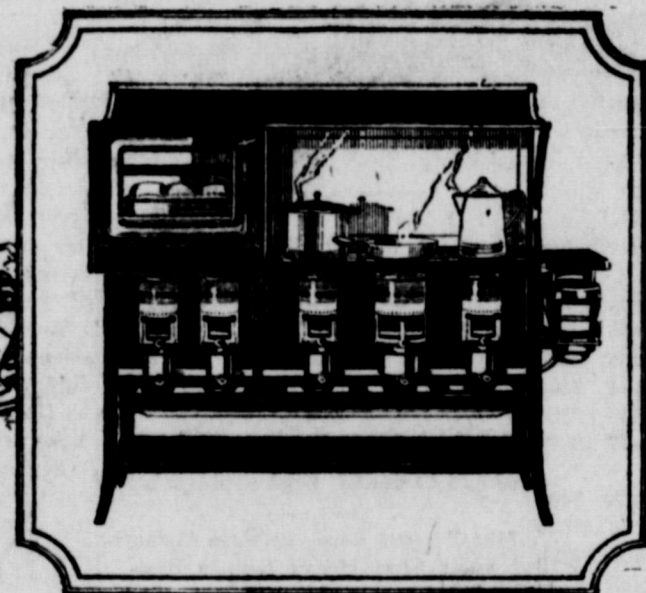

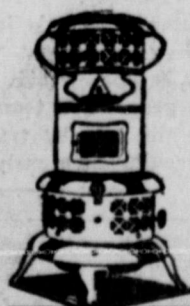

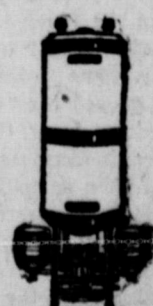
