FINISH SEASON AT BIG SPRING

Sweetwater High School Football Team Loses to Heavier Outfit, 40-0, in Final Tilt.

BANQUET FOR PLAYERS

Sweaters and Letters Also Coming to Gridsters—McLain Praises Spirit of Team.

The Sweetwater High School football team finished their 1924 season Friday afternoon when they suffered a hard defeat at the hands of the Big Spring eleven on the enemy's grounds, the final score being 40-0. Outweighed greatly by the more experienced eleven, the Salty Pups put every atom of their strength into the one sided game in efforts to stem the tide that swept over them for score after score.

Facing a list of hard games at the opening of the year, the Salty Pups consisted of an inexperienced but willing crew of men, many of whom were playing their first year of high school football. The removal of several players caused by ineligibility rulings weakened the machine at the start, but on the whole, a creditable showing was made by players who stuck with the team in the face of great odds. "Sweetwater has no apologies to offer for the spirit of the team," Superintendent B. H. McLain stated Saturday. "They finished the season fighting, and at all times every player."

ARREST FUGITIVE

Man Wanted in Connection With Largent Death Caught Here, Transferred to Roby Jail.

Ed Anderson of Fisher County was arrested by Sheriff Yarbrough Saturday in Sweetwater. Later Rufe Green and Tom Hughey, Fisher County deputies, transferred the man to the Fisher County jail at Roby.

Anderson was wanted in connection with the killing of J. B. Largent at McCaulley a week or so ago. He had been at large since the shooting until taken into custody by local authorities.

One or two others wanted in connection with the same killing have not yet been apprehended.

The trial of Jones Polk on a habeas corpus proceeding to obtain bail refused by the Fisher County authorities is set for the coming week.

SWEETWATER WINS

Victors in Two Basketball Games With Trent Teams.

The Sweetwater boys' and girls' basketball teams were both victorious in two games played here with the cagers from Trent Friday afternoon. In the first game, the Sweetwater girls defeated the girls from Trent 23-9. In the second game, the Salty Pups beat the Trent five, 25-13.

A queer incident of the game was that at the end of the first half of the girls' game, the score stood 7-9, Trent. In the boys game, the score at the end of the first half was 15-13, Sweetwater. Neither of the two Trent teams scored in the second half.

EAST GETS RAIN

Long Drought and Threat of Further Fire Damage Broken—Severe Storm Coming.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 22.—The East was drowned in a welcome deluge of rain today, breaking a drought of more than six weeks and saving millions of dollars of damage in forest fires and other blazes that have caused heavy damage in the past month. The storm and blinding rain along the Atlantic seaboard was developing marked intensity and was coming north with even greater force, the weather bureau at Washington warned.

U S THREATENS TO QUIT PARLEY

American Delegation at Conference For Suppression of Drug Traffic May Withdraw.

BACKED BY CHINA AND JAPAN

Other Countries Opposed to the U. S. Delegation Declare League Settled Dope Question.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 22.—The American delegation, supported by those of China and Japan, today threatened to withdraw from the International Conference for the Suppression of the Traffic in Drugs if reservation in connection with the parley's program was accepted.

A bitter fight developed at the Plenary Session when Steering Committee prevented progress by limiting the scope of the conference, a serious check to the American project. It is impossible to limit the production of and the traffic in narcotic drugs as long as the immediate production of prepared opium for smoking in Pacific countries is permitted, Congressman Porter, head of the American delegation, said.

Other countries opposed the United States spokesman, insisting that the League of Nations having entrusted the question of reducing smoking to the first conference, the second conference must limit its scope to the agenda, which does not include prepared opium for smoking on its list of things to be restricted. China and Japan supported the U. S. position.

SEND ULTIMATUM IN STACK DEATH

Trouble Between Great Britain and Egypt Looms as Apologies Are Demanded for Assassination.

BRITISH TROOPS ENROUTE

Parliament Waiting in Session While Impending Trouble is Indicated—Pasha May Resign.

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 22.—Great Britain tonight delivered an ultimatum to Egypt threatening "appropriate action" if apologies for the assassination of Sir Lee Stack are not forthcoming. One of two British notes demanded \$2,500,000 indemnity, and has created an immense sensation here.

Premier Pasha is expected to resign. Another British note demands the withdrawal of Egyptian officials of the Sudanese troops, the troops to come under the control of the government proper. Britain also insists upon the retention of judicial and financial advisors.

The British notes, accompanied by word that troops were en route, came as a thunder bolt. Parliament waited in session to see what the Cabinet would do. Failing in immediate compliance with demands, the government will at once take appropriate action to safe guard its interests in Egypt and the Sudan.

CHOICE SCANDAL THRILLS LONDON

Case of "Mr. A," Son of Indian Potentate, Chief Topic of Conversation in British City.

WITNESS WHISPERS ANSWERS

Testimony of Book Maker's Wife Too Delicate for Public Ears—Papers Withhold Royal Name.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 22.—The case of "Mr. A," son of an unnamed Indian Potentate, who either wooed and won a book maker's wife, or has been the victim of a blackmail plot, has been adjourned till Monday.

Meanwhile, little else is discussed in London drawing rooms, clubs and bars. Everyone knows who "Mr. A" is, but his name is not used in the newspapers for reasons of state. Mrs. Robinson, the lady in the case whose quick wit and slow drawl have withstood the cross examination of Sir John Simon without a break, may again take the stand.

Already her confession of her activities as mistress to the young Rajah, including whispered answers to whispered questions considered too delicate for public ears, has made the case in which her husband is suing the Midland Bank for part of the money paid by her-Indian lover to prevent a divorce, one of the most sensational in British legal history.

OFFICIAL BETTER

Bartlett Makes Definite Improvement Saturday, Physician Reports—Train Victim Wednesday.

Definite improvement in the condition of W. H. Bartlett, city secretary, struck Wednesday morning by a Texas-Pacific passenger train, was reported late Saturday by Dr. Fortner, attending physician.

Mr. Bartlett has not yet entirely regained his senses and does not yet know what struck him but is much quieter and more rational than has been the case previously.

No unfavorable symptoms have been noted nor other injuries discovered except the one in the base of the skull.

New Schedule Sunday.

The new Texas and Pacific passenger trains schedule went into effect at midnight Saturday, and westbound No. 5 arrived in Sweetwater at 6:30 a. m., Sunday instead of 5:45, the former time. The new train, which was formerly the Oil Belt Special which went to Cisco, arrived in Sweetwater at 5:25 a. m., Sunday. It will go as far west as Big Spring.

Baptists Object To Use Of State Building For Ball

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 22.—Opposition to the use of the Capitol building for the proposed inaugural ball at the installation of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson as Governor of Texas was formed in the report adopted by the Baptist Conference in convention here today.

The report adopted at the convention strongly condemned the use of the building for the ball. In the report, it was charged that an all-night dance had been planned.

In the report, approval of the anti-Saloon League of Texas was expressed.

Department of Justice Agent Nabs Two Who Use Abusive Language in Talk of President.

CHARGE THREATENED LIFE

Workers in Stock Yards Plant Held For Grand Jury—"We Ought to Kill Him," One Says.

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Nov. 22.—Two men were arrested here today by a Department of Justice agent on the charge of threatening the life of President Coolidge, and were bound over to the grand jury on bonds of \$5,000 each.

One of the men furnished bond, and was released. The other is still in jail.

"We ought to kill Coolidge," one of the men said, according to the warrant issued by Federal Judge English. The two men were talking with others at a packing plant at which they worked in the stock yards here.

"Just be quiet, they'll get him," the other is said to have replied.

Vile names were applied to the Chief Executive by the two men, according to the Department of Justice agent.

Baptist Convention Closes With Rejection of Doctrinal Resolution—No Invitations.

Labor Federation in Convention at El Paso Urge Creation of Federal Department

FAVOR STERLING-REED BILL

Will Work For Legislation to Provide Adequate Funds For All—Want Advisory Council.

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 22.—Creation of a Federal Department of Education on a par with the other federal departments was urged today by the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, which voted to support the Sterling-Reed bill now before Congress.

The federation's executive council was instructed to work for legislation to provide adequate funds for the purpose of the Sterling-Reed bill. The convention also recommended the establishment of a National Advisory Council, on which Labor would be represented, to co-operate with the proposed department.

Chicago Catches Western Football Title—Yale Beats Harvard 1-0 Big Three Flag.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 22.—The University of Chicago won the undisputed championship of the "Big Ten" Conference here today.

By playing a scoreless tie with Wisconsin, Stagg's maroon warriors kept their slate free from the stain of defeat by any conference team. The University of Missouri, contender for the Missouri Valley Conference championship, defeated Chicago 3-0 in the inter-sectional game that opened the season for both teams.

Every other team in the Big Ten lost at least one conference game.

Yale Wins Title.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 22.—Yale won the championship of the "Big Three" here this afternoon, and incidentally the world's championship at water football. The blue team splashed its way to a 19-6 victory over Harvard after they were almost beaten in the first half by a combination of torrential rains and lucky breaks for the invaders.

CHRISTMAS SEALS
The sale of Christmas seals, sponsored by the Texas Public Health Association, Austin, has opened, according to Mrs. Hubert Toler, director of sales here, and the campaign will run until Christmas. The seals will be on sale all over Texas in order to raise a quota of \$100,000 for public health work in the State.

A wonderful record was made by the Association in 1923 by the sale of the seals, when hundreds of thousands of Texas people were directly or indirectly benefitted by work done by the association.

Money raised this year by the sale of the seals will be used for various causes including the increasing of the number of nurses available for school nursing, increasing the staff of lecturers and field workers, erecting county tuberculosis hospitals, enrolling of school children in the Modern Health Crusade and to continue the work in general of the Association in preventing disease and saving human lives.

GRADE CROSSING
In an address before the Sweetwater Club, State Representative R. M. Chitwood referred to the Texas-Pacific railroad grade crossings in Sweetwater as "Death Traps." The term is most apt. They are nothing else.

The Reporter sees but one solution in this proposition. That is, make such improvements as may be needed to the underpass that already exists on Crane Street extension, build another at Lamar, Bowie or such other central street as shall prove most feasible from an engineering standpoint, and then CLOSE ALL OTHER GRADE CROSSINGS IN THE CITY.

This procedure will work some little inconvenience on some people—they may have to drive a block or two out of their way—but it will be a whole lot less inconvenient than being prematurely bumped into eternity, crippled for life or something like that.

The Texas-Pacific has added two more passenger trains a day to the already heavy traffic which flows in to this town. Sweetwater is steadily growing and furnishing more traffic to cross the Texas-Pacific right of way. And the law of average means an inevitable increase in the accidents that may be expected to result. Nobody is particularly to blame for this condition—it is a natural result of the growth of this town and of the Texas-Pacific.

But most assuredly there will be definite blame hitched to somebody if

the situation is not remedied as soon as it is humanly possible. The remedy is going to cost some money—but what is money compared with human life?

The Texas-Pacific maintains crossing watchmen on two crossings to prevent accidents. One recent fatality occurred in spite of the watchman, which proves this method is ineffective.

Removal of the yards out of town is suggested. This will be a good thing, but the most recent accident occurred outside of the yard limits. Evidently that is not the solution needed.

There is talk of "educating the public"—but children and aged people who must pass from one side of the town to the other are not susceptible to this method of prevention—and all of us get careless sometimes.

Every day people who cross the Texas-Pacific in Sweetwater are verily "walking in the shadow of death." And any day we may expect the sinister sirens on the big moguls to become once more a requiem of death.

BETTER SERVICE
With the addition of two new trains to its schedule here, the Texas and Pacific railway is making a move to better the service to Sweetwater and West Texas in general, and recognizing the importance and volume of express and passenger traffic in this

part of the State.

Traffic and railroad conditions reflect the economical condition of a section of the country as readily as any other barometer of trade or commerce. For some weeks, T. & P. passenger train Number Five has carried sixteen or seventeen Pullman cars nightly out of Fort Worth and Dallas, the great volume of mail and express has taken more than the allotted time to handle, and as a result, the train has often been behind.

Sweetwater will profit by the new T. & P. schedule in passenger, mail, and express traffic. Our city now has 14 passenger trains daily on its three railroads, as many switch crews on duty as any city in West Texas, and is universally recognized as one of the Southwest's most important rail centers.

THE BUSINESS CYCLE
Business experts are pretty well agreed that the nation is entering upon a new business cycle. The present year, as they see it, has marked the end of the last cycle, the slump and the period of readjustment. Now begins the up-turn. They do not promise any "boom" remarkable in intensity or duration, but they believe there is now beginning a period of general and prosperous activity which will last through next year, at least.

This is a cold, scientific conclusion of level-headed observers. Recent Wall Street activity, with a buyers'

market and records broken on the Stock Exchange, is merely a more temperamental manifestation of the same conclusion.

The renewed activity comes, the observers say, because the country is ready for it. Conditions are right, and there is nothing, political or otherwise, likely to interfere.

The November bulletin of one of the country's leading banks, accepting this favorable opinion, pays it respects to three obstacles which loom large in the minds of pessimists.

The first of these is the fear of greatly increased competition from abroad, as Europe recovers economically. The bank discounts this fear on the ground that as foreign nations increase their outputs of manufactured goods, they also become better consumers for our raw materials and many of our manufactured goods—also, better customers for their own products.

The second obstacle feared, that of high wages, is considered largely offset by the high purchasing power of the American people which is made possible by the high wages.

The third obstacle, a belief that

American industries are over-developed and over-expanded, is pronounced true only in exceptional cases. Industry in general seems sure to be fully occupied.

OPPOSE AMENDMENT

National Grange Expected to Take Stand on Child Labor.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 22.—The National Grange is expected to adopt a resolution at the closing session of its convention here opposing the proposed amendment to the constitution prohibiting child labor. Delegates say that three-fifths of the children under 16 are on farms, and that the amendment would have an important bearing on agriculture.

MENNONITES EN ROUTE

Immigrant Train Passes Through Bound For Old Mexico.

An immigrant train of 27 cars passed through Sweetwater over the Texas and Pacific during the week with 280 Mennonites enroute to Old Mexico from Canada. Large colonies of these people are being settled in the interior of Mexico, the majority of whom come from Canada. The train which passed through here Tuesday included four coaches and 23 stock, box and baggage cars. The Mennonites were taking all their

possessions along with them to settle in a new land. Horses, cattle, hogs, farming implements and other possessions were loaded on the train. This is reported to be the 27th train load of these immigrants who are making up the colony in Mexico. It is the first train, however, that has passed thru here over the T-P, the other trains traveling over various lines. This special group will settle about 200 miles in the interior of Mexico, they stated. Only a few spoke English. The majority of the Mennonites here were Russians, while a few were Poles and other foreigners.

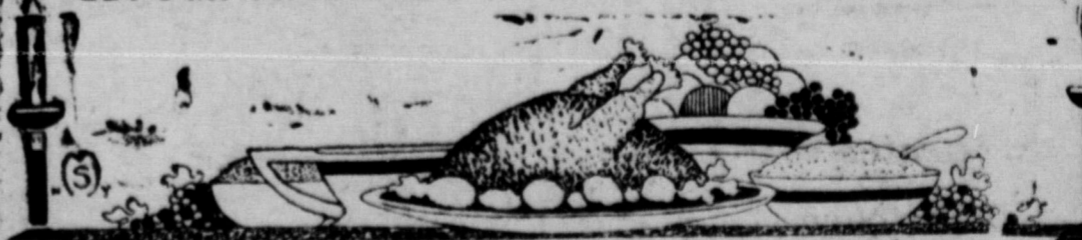

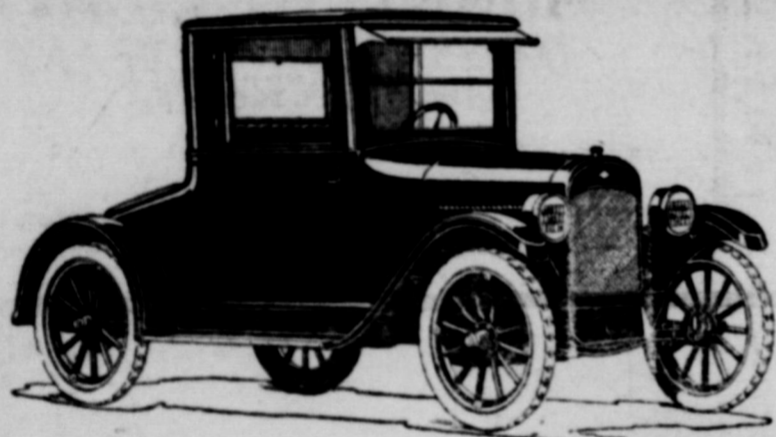

There is more flying in this country than most people suppose. It is announced that army aviators during the year 1923 flew 9,093,000 miles, which is equal to more than 314 times around the world. The total mileage is based conservatively on 120 miles an hour, the speed of the slowest plane. Army flyers were in the air nearly 76,000 hours. The present year will probably show as good a record.

In this vast amount of flying there was a loss of 18 lives.

Aviation officers are quoted as saying that no other form of transportation can produce similar figures. In point of safety, however, the United States army showing does not seem quite as good as that of the British commercial aviation companies, which in five years have flown 4,000,000 miles with a loss of six lives.

In considering this record of army achievement in the air, one naturally wonders why commercial aviation lags so in the United States.

costing approximately \$50,000, is to be built in Runnels County. Details of the structure have not been worked out.

BOOM NEW TOWN

Work Begins on Site of Anton, on Main Line of Santa Fe 24 Miles Northwest of Lubbock.

LUBBOCK, Texas, Nov. 22.—Work on the site of Anton, Texas' newest town, has begun in earnest despite the fact that lots will not be opened for sale for approximately two weeks more. Anton is located on the main line of the Santa Fe Railway in the center of the famous north pasture of the old Spade Ranch, in the northeast corner of Hockley County, twenty-four miles northwest of Lubbock near the Danforth switch. The townsite has been surveyed and platted by Sylvan Sanders, local engineer, and in its 250 acres are contained 1,100 lots.

W. L. Ellwood, local financier and large West Texas landowner, is father of the town, but the building is in the hands of the Anton Townsite Company, which is backed extensively by Dallas capital. R. F. Duggan, who has recently moved to Lubbock from Dallas, is supervising the selling of the town lots and the building of the city, and he has surrounded himself with a coterie of assistants who will aid in the putting over of the project. Stanley Watson, manager of the Ellwood Farms Company and the man who became famous almost overnight as the builder of Amherst, in Lamb County, is general agent, while A. O. Duggan, formerly of Long Beach, California, is manager of the townsite proper and will remain on the grounds as soon as the town is opened for settlement. A. O. Duggan and R. F. Duggan are brothers of T. B. Duggan, well known Lubbock loan man, Arthur and C. J. Duggan, prominent West Texas land men. Although he will not take an active part in the executive work of building the town,

Ellwood will act in an advisory capacity.

The Townsite Company, with an eye for the development of the new city, has already made arrangements to take care of the building of Anton and three large lumber companies have already taken locations. The three companies are Higginbotham-Bartlett, Whaley and Panhandle. The first named concern contracted for a whole block of ground while each of the other two took a half of a block.

FIGHT SWINDLERS

N. Y. Stock Exchange Plans Nationwide Stock Campaign.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—A nationwide campaign against activities of stock swindlers and other promoters of fraudulent securities has been launched by the New York Stock Exchange.

The Exchange's plan, according to a statement by its president, E. H. H. Simmons, includes the co-operation of 240 Better Business Bureaus located in the principal cities of the country, besides the Exchange's own correspondents located in 42 states of the Union.

This new move is in line with a promise made by President Coolidge to co-operate with the Federal Government in fighting the fraudulent stock evil.

According to Simmons, this new department will segregate all evidence of stock swindling which comes to its attention and if this evidence warrants Federal action, the government will be notified.

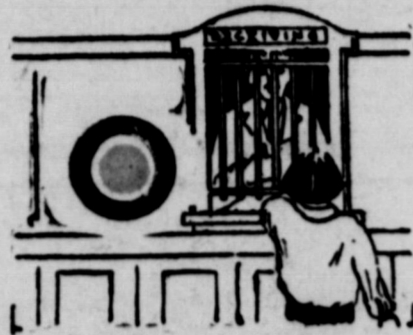
PORT ARTHUR, Texas, Nov. 22.—Balmly spring weather which has held throughout the fall, is setting a new record of things in Port Arthur.

GOLDEN RULE DAY TO AID NEAR EAST

Five Million Dollars Needed for Refugee Orphans Under American Care.

23 NATIONS JOIN OBSERVANCE

State and County Committees Organized to Insure Success of Nation-Wide Campaign.

With the co-operation of civic and religious leaders throughout the United States, the Near East Relief has inaugurated its campaign for the second observance of International Golden Rule Sunday on December 7. The aim is to raise funds to provide during the coming year for 100,000 orphan children under American care in Bible Lands. More than five million dollars is the minimum needed. The national Golden Rule committee was organized several months ago, under the chairmanship of Cleveland H. Dodge, the well known philanthropist. An executive council is under the chairmanship of John H. Finley, formerly Commissioner of Education of New York State and now prominent as a New York editor. State and county committees are being organized throughout the United States to insure success of the nation-wide campaign.

Setting aside of one day each year in honor of the Golden Rule as a guide to individual, national and international life, is an American idea which has been approved and adopted by twenty-three nations. The day

will be observed throughout Europe and in many non-European countries, such as Japan, Korea and Palestine.

Four annual holidays—Christmas, New Year, Easter and Armistice Day—have heretofore been celebrated internationally. A fifth has now been added to the list. The movement was started in America by the Near East Relief as a new, striking and intensive method of raising funds for the feeding of the children in American orphanages in Bible Lands.

On this day—December 7—Americans are asked to eat a dinner of soup, bread and stew, or of corn grits and condensed milk, or of rice, macaroni and cocoa. As they eat this novel meal, they are asked to remember that, coarse as it is, it is all that holds body and soul together for the orphaned boys and girls overseas, to whom the elemental factor of hunger is each day's vital problem.

People here are reminded that, however poor the fare may seem, they can at least have two bowls of soup if they like, and two slices of bread. As they finish their second serving, they are asked to remember that the orphan wards of the Near East Relief can have only one serving, for there is not enough to allow more. They are asked to remember that these children exist on such a diet 365 days out of each year, and they will not live to become men and women unless more bread and more soup are provided.

Those who eat the Golden Rule dinner will not lack distinguished company. Such a meal will be served on Sunday in the homes of kings, prime ministers and presidents.

The Golden Rule is a universal creed. It is a common denominator of all religious and social welfare organizations. It is a test of our religion and our sincerity. Golden Rule Sunday is a day for personal stock-taking, for measuring our lives by a universally accepted standard of life to ascertain how nearly we have attained to an ideal. It is a day of plain living and high thinking. The dinner, however, is not an end in itself. It is an occasion, in the words of President Coolidge, "for bringing to the minds of those who are prosperous the charitable requirements of those who are in adversity."

On Golden Rule Sunday the citizens of all nations will be seated figuratively at the same table, partaking literally of the same food, thinking the same thoughts and entering into a new realization of the brotherhood of mankind.

Jerusalem.—A gift of 200 live turkeys has just been received by the Near East Relief from an Armenian farmer in Egypt. The birds are to provide Christmas dinners for 1,200 Armenian children in orphanages here.
