(By The United Press) Washington, D. C., Dec. 10 .-Further hearings at the investigation of the election of Senator Earl B. Mayfield by the Senate Privileges and Elections Committee were postponed till Saturday because of the illness of witnesses.

The Senate today agreed by unanimous consent to consider the Isle of Pines trea y between the United States and Cuba immediately following the disposition of Muscle Shoals. The treaty was to have come before the Senate today under the terms of an agreement made last June.

In answer to the plea of Secretary of the Navy Wilbur for modernization of the American fleet, chairman Hale of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee announced that he would move to take un the naval reconditioning bill tomorrow. It provides for an expenditure of \$111,000,000.

The U.S. Government today began the preparation of the reply to a note received from Great Britain protesting against this government's sharing in the German reparations payments. The reply is expected to refuse recognition to the objections of American war claims.

ASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10 .-The League of Nations Conference to regulate traffic in arms which the United States has agreed to attend will not interfere with the proposed Washington Disarmament Conference.




