WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 17 .-Influenza and pneumonia were mainly responsible for the jump in the death rate which amounted to 50 more persons per 100,000 population in the death registre than in the previous year, the Department of Commerce announced today.

Increases were also registered by heart disease, which led all causes of County Poultry Association Third An- death. Deaths from whooping cough, cancer and accidental falls also increased.

Death rates decreased were registered in tuberculosis, diphtheria, malaria, and typhoid. Accidental deaths claimed 74,131, of which automobile accidents were responsible for 14,411. Autos killed only 11,666 the previous vear.
