

At Least 23 Known Dead With Millions Dollars Property Damage Caused by Severe Storm.

Trains Behind Schedule in Midwest-Wires Down-200 Fires in Chica-

go Alone.

CHICAGO, III., Dec. 20 .- Taking a toll of at least 23 lives and ten millions of dollars property damage and tieing lines of communication into knots, the cold wave and storm that has held the Midwest in its icy grip for the past 36 hours, swept eastward tonight.

Reports compiled by the United Press showed that at least 23 deaths have been caused by the storm, with more expected from isolated sections.

Intense suffering from the cold was experienced. Thousands of people in Chicago alone sought refuge in "free" hotels and charitable organization headquarters. Michigan led the midwest in number of deaths with six, Oklahoma reported five dead, Milwaukee and Chicago four each, Missouri three, and HERE Kansas one. Injuries were numerous especially in the larger cities where traffic was tangled by icy streets.
