LOST MILLIONS Town Pump IN WAR SURPLUS

United States Government Disposing of Huge Quantity War Materials At Big Loss.

ARMY FIGURES TOTAL LOSS

Much Unsuitable Material Purchased and Sold at Loss-Auction Sales Are Commended.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Ridding his stock room of surplus materials, most of which is equipment gathered together in a hurry for use in the World War, Uncle Sam is finding the road to normalcy an expensive one.

As far as numbers go, this loss of population by the country does not hurt the country, but helps it instead. Farmers can spare these people to the city and still cultivate well all the land available and produce all the food and raw material of clothing that can be sold to advantage. This is because the family farm is growing larger. With the use of improved machinery, fewer and fewer farmers are required to till their farms. In this respect agriculture, unlike other industries, is actually contracting.
