Record Greatest Year In History

Sweetwater Achievements in 1924 Recounted in Annual Banquet of Civic Organizations Thursday Night.

PREVIOUS RECORDS ARE SMASHED

Building, Postal Receipts Attest Material Prosperity With Community Enterprises Flourishing Successes.

The most prosperous and progressive year in the history of Sweetwater, one in which all building records were broken, local office elevated to first class rating, a year noted by striking community achievements of every description from the organization of a Building and Loan Association to a most successful County Fair was brought to a fitting close Thursday night by the annual banquet of the members of the Board of City Development, Sweetwater Club and Ladies Auxiliary of the Board, in the large banquet room of the Hotel Wright.

Nearly 200 representative citizens of the town faced Clyde B. Payne, toastmaster, after the meal, enlivened by the Sweetwater Saxophone Orchestra under the direction of Harry Le Maire, was concluded. A telegram of congratulations from the Colorado Chamber of Commerce was read.

After Secretary of the Board J. A. McCurdy had read the report of the year, W. C. Calvert, county agent, Miss Parr, new Home Demonstration Agent, W. E. Wade president of the Sweetwater Club, Mayor Joe H. Boothe, and James Henry Beall Jr., responded to brief remarks.

Mrs. George Parker, president of the Ladies Auxiliary to the B. C. D., reported on the year's work of that organization.

Roy W. Thompson, retiring potentate of Khiva Temple, Amarillo, and new citizen of Sweetwater, John T. Thomson, on the advertising staff of the Reporter, J. W. Thurman, laboratory man for the United States Gypsum Co., from Chicago, were introduced to those present.

Dr. Hamilton introduced some very effective sleight of hand diversion in the program.

The report submitted by the Board of City Development showed that from every standpoint 1924 has been a year of uninterrupted prosperity and development for Sweetwater and her surrounding trade territory. Following on the heels of the prosperous year of 1923 the past twelve months have seen the completion of many projects started in the preceding year as well as the accomplishment of many things which had their beginning in 1924. The year has been one of well rounded development. As indicative of this it is interesting to note that the bank statements of December 31, 1924, as compared with the statements of December 31, 1923, show a marked increase in deposits and resources. An intuity into the business of the banks shows an increase of more than one thousand individual accounts in the three banks over the number on the books a year ago. It is estimated that 75 per cent of these accounts are now residents in Sweetwater, and if each new account represents two new citizens we have had an increase of at least 1500 people during the year. Another interesting indication of growth is the fact that during 1924 Sweetwater's postal receipts increased from \$33,708.78 to \$40,766.00. This constitutes an increase of about 20 per cent during the year, and places Sweetwater in the first class postoffice division as well as reflecting the commercial expansion during the period. The building program of 1924 was by far the largest Sweetwater has ever seen, totaling in the aggregate about \$1,650,000.00. This amount was well distributed among the four major divisions of building development; residential, commercial, industrial and institutional.

According to the building permits taken out with the city secretary, there has been an average of one new home completed every third day the year round, and even at that, the report, continued, Sweetwater is suffering a house shortage. Commercial building for the year was over \$125,000 and in addition, many old buildings were improved and remodeled.

The advance of the county's highway program was pointed out, showing the great amount of work done during the year after \$600,000 bonds were voted, and the big program scheduled for 1925. Attention was also called to the advancement Sweetwater made during the latter part of the year in its paving program which will get underway with actual paving shortly. This very important step was absolutely necessary if the town's progress was to be maintained, it was brought out.

During the year the Board of City Development and the Sweetwater Club have entertained the Annual Convention of the West Texas Retail Druggists, the Annual Meeting of the Executive Board of the West Texas

HOOVER SAYS NO

Secretary of Commerce Declines President Coolidge's Offer Agriculture Secretaryship.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 16.—Secretary of Commerce Hoover today declined suggestions from the President that he transfer from the present position he holds to Secretary of Agriculture after March 4, he announced.

"I appreciate deeply the confidence President Coolidge has shown in me," Hoover declared. "But I have told him that I believe it to my best interest to decide against his decision on which I have done."

BRITAIN PLANS GREAT AIRSHIPS

Research and Construction Underway For Two Crafts Larger Than America's "Los Angeles."

WILL BUILD OF STEEL

Ships Will Be First Built of All Steel—Plan Passenger and Mail Air Service.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The British air mammoth R-100 and R-101, each twice as large as the American "Los Angeles" are planned to be weather-proof, accident-proof, and fool-proof.

"Safety First"—that's the British slogan—and the air people are living up to it.

Many innovations in aircraft engineering are to be comprised in the new ships, their sponsors say. One is a self-photographing motion picture device—a camera ingeniously trained on the airship itself to note the varying stresses of wind on steel.

For both the R-100 and the R-101 are to be built, not of aluminum or duraluminum, but of steel. They will be the first all-steel airships—their main hulls being formed of stainless steel and their seven great propellers being also of steel to resist tropical conditions.

Safety devices are to reinforce the steel equipment. Work has been delayed so far in construction and design until a series of researches aiming at complete safety can be pursued. A small British airship, the R-33, will be used for these experiments.

It is regarded certain that the strange "movie" camera will be one phase of this safety equipment. Another is a series of offices, already affixed to the R-33.

Pressures which occur at these offices during different maneuvers will be recorded by special monitors. With 200 orifices thus under inspection, an infallible indicator to the stability of the ship is expected.

When an airship maneuvers, it swings a considerable mass of air with it, which may be as much as sixty tons in the case of the R-101. This mass of air exerts reactive forces on the ship and must be carefully recorded. New devices are to be installed on the R-101 as a safeguard in this direction.

Arrangements have already been made for increasing the stability of the R-101 as it approaches a mooring mast, and an automatic stabilizing device will be used to keep the airship in trim while it is riding at the mast. A moored airship will ride out a gale of anything up to 100 miles per hour wind speed.

Whereas 300 men are required to drag an airship into a shed, only 8 or 10 men are required when a ship is moored by means of a mast. And whereas an airship cannot be brought into a shed safely when the wind exceeds 18 m. p. h., an airship can approach a mooring mast in almost any weather.

Special masts are soon to be under construction for use of the R-100 and R-101.

The following figures are the official approximation to the specifications of the R-101. It is thought that the A-100 will be very closely similar.

Length, 720 feet; height, 140 feet; diameter, 130 feet; number of engines seven; H. P. for each engine, 600; total H. P., 4,200; speed, 70 miles per hour; capacity, 5,000,000 cu. ft.

The R-101 will consume no fewer than 1,750 lb. of fuel an hour in her heavy gas oil engines and she will be able to lift a weight of 155 tons of which 75 tons will be available as fuel, water, ballast, goods and passengers. On a commercial run of 2,500 miles to Egypt, 20 tons will be available for passengers and mails.

Two things are holding up construction of the great airship. One is the necessary preliminary accessory steps, such as satisfactory hangar arrangements and the erection of the mooring masts. The other is the further necessity for research.

It is also expected that the small ship, the R-33, will take several short trial flights, experimenting with safety devices, before her big twin sisters definitely adopt them. The whole construction program is proceeding with the utmost caution.

Nevertheless, it is also in progress rapidly. In spite of the necessary delay, the official announcement states that the R-101 will probably be assembled beginning in the early summer of this year, most likely in July. She will probably be ready for trial flights by the end of 1926 and will make her first trip to India in the early summer of 1927, calling at Egypt on the way.

Building of the R-100 will proceed by approximately the same schedule.

Officers and directors of all three Sweetwater banks were without exception re-elected at the annual stockholders meeting held this week. Proof that the past year was prosperous locally is seen in the dividends declared by the financial institutions.

J. G. Wilkinson, president of the Continental National Bank of Fort Worth and his son, H. H. Wilkinson, vice-president of the same institution attended the annual meeting of the stockholders of the City National Bank, when a six per cent stock dividend was declared. The Fort Worth financier was considerably impressed with the growth and development of Sweetwater, he said. He was re-elected president of the City National, with Mose Newman, vice-president, Oscar Pate, cashier, and Dan G. Shields, assistant cashier. Directors re-elected were J. G. Wilkinson, Mose Newman, J. P. Majors, Mrs. W. S. Douglas, S. T. Edwards, Oscar Pate, S. C. Glass, J. H. Tubb and A. W. Canfil. The directors and officers were guests of Mose Newman at luncheon at the Hotel Wright at noon Thursday.

A semi-annual dividend of ten per cent was declared by stockholders of the First National Bank at the annual stockholders meeting this week. Officers and directors re-elected included E. K. McAdams, president; Walter L. Payne, cashier. They, with J. H. Beall and R. H. Fitzgerald, comprise the board of directors.

The stockholders of the Texas Bank and Trust Co., held a regular meeting Monday and re-elected the same board of directors and officers. The directors and officers are G. E. Bradford, president; R. A. Ragland, vice president; T. L. Hughes, vice president; J. N. Dulaney, cashier; E. B. Hull, assistant cashier; Dr. H. C. Scott, and J. R. Hendrick.

W. C. Morton and Will Lagow were made assistant cashiers at the meeting.

The bank paid its regular five per cent semi-annual dividend.

Harry Snodgrass Goes From Prison To Vaudeville

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Jan. 16.—The prison made man, Harry Snodgrass, left the State Penitentiary today to embark on a future paved with dollars and prestige.

As "King of the Ivories," the popular radio entertainer of Station WOS, Snodgrass dropped the role of a convict "hold-up guy" to start with a "two a day" vaudeville circuit—which incidentally is to pay him \$600 weekly—with a lot of thank you's to the only alma mater he has ever known, prison.

After serving a trifle more than a year of a three years' sentence for hold-up in St. Louis, the time off being allowed for good behavior, the King, as he is known here, was released from prison with fame and popularity rather than the stigma of being an ex-convict.

Wednesday night he played his farewell concert before opening on the vaudeville circuit at Evansville, Ind., Sunday.

Senate Confirms Neff Appointees

R. B. Walthall Named For Board of Control, and W. W. Boyd State Fish and Game Commissioner.

SLAP FERGUSON ADMINISTRATION

Governor Elect Had Named Roy Tennant For Board of Control and Turner Hobby by Game Commissioner.

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 16.—The State Senate today confirmed the official appointments recommended by the nominations committee.

Included were the appointments of R. B. Walthall as member of the State Board of Control, Mrs. Epps Stanford, Industrial Accident Board, W. W. Boyd, State Fish and Game Commissioner.

Governor-elect Mrs. M. A. Ferguson had appointed Roy L. Tennant of Temple to the Board of Control and Turner Hobby of Waco to be State Fish and Game Commissioner.

The action of the Senate is a direct slap at the Ferguson Administration.

Speaker Lee Satterwhite announced the appointment of R. M. Chitwood as chairman of the House Committee on Education. Chitwood was placed on educational committee at the instance of educational leaders of the State after he had been tentatively selected to head the Prison Committee. Satterwhite authorized the change. Chitwood made the nominating speech of the Panhandle candidates speaker and was one of the two directors of his campaign.

PASS ORDINANCES TO FINAL READING

Commission Adopts Ordinances to Order Sidewalks and Paving on Principle Streets.

SALARIES UNCHANGED

Pay of City Officials For Two Ensuing Years Will Remain at Present Rate.

Two ordinances, one for paving and one for sidewalks, were passed by the Sweetwater city commission in regular session at the city hall Thursday afternoon. Both ordinances were passed on the second and final readings.

The sidewalk ordinance is the same that was passed some time ago on first reading, and now goes into effect following the final reading. It calls for sidewalks to be laid by property owners on both sides of Crane street from E. N. 3rd street to the high school building.

The street ordinance also passed on final reading calls for the paving of E. N. 1st street from Lamar street to the subway under the Texas and Pacific tracks on Musgrove street, the same portion on E. S. 1st street, and the short portion of street between E. N. 2nd and E. N. 1st streets leading to the proposed subway. This ordinance was passed as part of the agreement between city officials and Texas and Pacific officials in regard to the railroad crossing situation. It was brought out in the session Thursday that the Texas and Pacific indicated that their part of the agreement would be carried out, and that preliminary plans for a large and modern concrete subway on Musgrove street were already underway.

The salaries for city officials, for the ensuing two years were set at the meeting according to the ordinance which provides that these salaries be set before February 1. The salaries, for all city officials remain the same for the next two years, according to action taken by the Commission. No changes were made in the present salaries.

OPERATION ILLEGAL

Dallas Doctor and Nurse Are Indicted Following Operation.

DALLAS, Jan. 16.—Indictments were returned here today charging Dr. Wm. Hubbert, former American Legion official, and Theda Burch, nurse and Hubbert's assistant, with the performance of an illegal operation.

BURNED TO DEATH

Explosion of Chemicals in Varnish Plant Results in Two Deaths—Others Missing.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 16.—Two men were burned to death in a fire caused by an explosion of chemicals which razed the Frank S. Lewis Varnish plant here today.

Twenty men were at work in the plant when the explosion occurred and several are still missing.

Senate in Session.

AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—The State Senate committee considering the recess appointments of Governor Neff went into executive session shortly after the upper body met this morning. A report on a part of the appointments is expected some time today.

Three bills were placed before the Senate this morning. One is for the purpose of regulating the height of bridges over steam and electric railways and relative to buildings adjacent to the right-of-way. Another would empower cities to regulate the weight of horse drawn loads over streets and bridges.

Senator Davis of Dallas introduced a bill to amend the law relative to the salary of court officials.

House leaders are sewed up in a conference over committee appointments.

Both houses will probably recess over the week-end and presumably will not reconvene until after the inauguration of "Ma" Ferguson.

House at Work.

AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—Announcement of House Committee appointments is expected this afternoon.

The selection of committees will permit early consideration of the appropriation bills and other measures advocated for action early in the session.

This morning the session was devoted to introduction of bills and routine organization work. Appointments of various employes and stenographic personnel was made late yesterday.

A flood of bills wound up the session this morning. There were 56 bills introduced and a joint resolution to amend the state constitution—all referred to the various committees.

Included were a renewal of the fight to prohibit unaturalized citizens from owning property in Texas, amendment of the indeterminate sentence law, a measure giving the State Tax Board additional authority to work for the equalization of taxes.

The Senate also received a bill recommending that the control of the State Prison Farms be vested in the legislature with the abolition of the Prison Board.

The rules of the 38th Legislature with two minor amendments will hold for the present session.

Members of the house are allowed \$30 during the session for postage and \$10 for telegraph and telephone tolls according to a resolution introduced in the house and passed after spirited wrangling.

A resolution by R. M. Chitwood of Sweetwater providing for a legally qualified copy ready for bills submitted in the House met with strenuous opposition and action was postponed when a point of order was made that the time for consideration was past.

The Chitwood measure would place a legally qualified man in the engrossing room to inspect the wording of all bills to prevent the passage of improperly constructed measures.

Mrs. J. T. Thompson of San Angelo will be guest of Mrs. R. C. Ledford tonight and go to Amarillo with her Saturday to attend the four days meeting of the Episcopal Convocation. She is a delegate from the San Angelo Auxiliary.

LEGISLATURE

The prediction that the present session of the Legislature would be either a very lively one or a very quiet one is apparently about to be born out by the events transpiring today in the Senate when appointments by Governor Ferguson are disregarded in favor of those of retiring Governor Neff. Ferguson is not a man to stand rebuffs quietly and a lively session is apparently around the corner.

As predicted, Chitwood has been given the very important chairmanship of the Educational Committee, on which his talents peculiarly fit him.

WIFE POISONED

Body Lamesa Woman Exhumed and Stomach Examined—Husband Indicted—Death Months Ago.

LAMESA, Jan. 16.—Two months ago when the nineteen year old wife of Herman Jackson, young Dawson county farmer, died almost suddenly at the family home eighteen miles west of here, neighbors were suspicious as to the cause of her death, and some hint that she had been killed was rumored.

The Dawson county grand jury that was in session at a regular term of the district court at that time gave the case some attention, but upon a hurried investigation was unable to obtain sufficient evidence to warrant indictment, and Jackson was not held.

In the meantime, an insurance agency in which the life of the dead woman had been insured for two thousand dollars heard that the case had received some attention, and payment of the insurance to her husband was withheld for one month, but after the grand jury failed to indict Jackson he was paid the full amount of the policy by the insurance company.

This, however, did not conclude interest in the case and recently the remains of the dead woman were exhumed and her stomach was sent to Austin for examination, where it was learned that she died as the result of taking arsenic. This report caused another flare of interest in the case to bring Jackson again under the scrutiny of the law, resulting in his arrest.

An examining trial was held before Justice of the Peace J. R. Lowery who bound the defendant over to the grand jury under a bond of \$3,000 which has been made.

BUILD HIGH LINE

Westbrook to Get Electricity From West Texas Electric Co., High Line, Colorado to Big Spring.

 WESTBROOK, Jan. 16.—This city will receive its electric light and power from the West Texas Electric Co., as the result of a franchise granted that company by the city officials here.

The West Texas Electric Co., agreed to furnish electric current from a high tension line to be built from Colorado to Big Spring and promise service within four months. This is taken here to indicate that work of construction on the high line will begin immediately.

Officials of the West Texas Electric Co., here to complete arrangements with the city officials also indicated that Coahoma would be supplied with current from the same high line.

Chamber of Commerce, the Annual Meeting of the Federal Farm Loan Secretaries of West Texas, a meeting of the Justices of the Peace of West Texas. In addition the Luncheon Club has been hosts on two occasions to the officers and members of the Buffalo Trail Four County Boy Scout Council, the boys of the Sweetwater Booster Band, the poultry exhibitors at the December Poultry Show, and twice has entertained the wives of the club and the ladies of the Auxiliary.

In addition, Sweetwater was very much in evidence at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention at Brownwood, with the Boys' Band winning two prizes and the city otherwise well advertised.

The trade extension of the city was very large in 1924, the report continued, aided by the three days trade trip made by over 100 business men. The Fourth of July picnic of the American Legion, and the first annual Nolan County fair, both complete successes, aided greatly in establishing a closer relation and co-operation between Sweetwater and the county, the report said. From the standpoint of the farmer, 1924 has been another successful year in the territory surrounding Sweetwater. In spite of a dry summer, a recent statement of W. C. Calvert, county farm agent, places the cotton production in Nolan County in 1924 at 13 bale to the acre average. During the year many new farms have been cultivated and many improvements, both to farm lands and farm homes, have been realized thru the work of the two county agents.

The schools are in a better condition than in previous years, the report indicated. Increases in enrollment have taken place and the schools have been improved with new and needed equipment.

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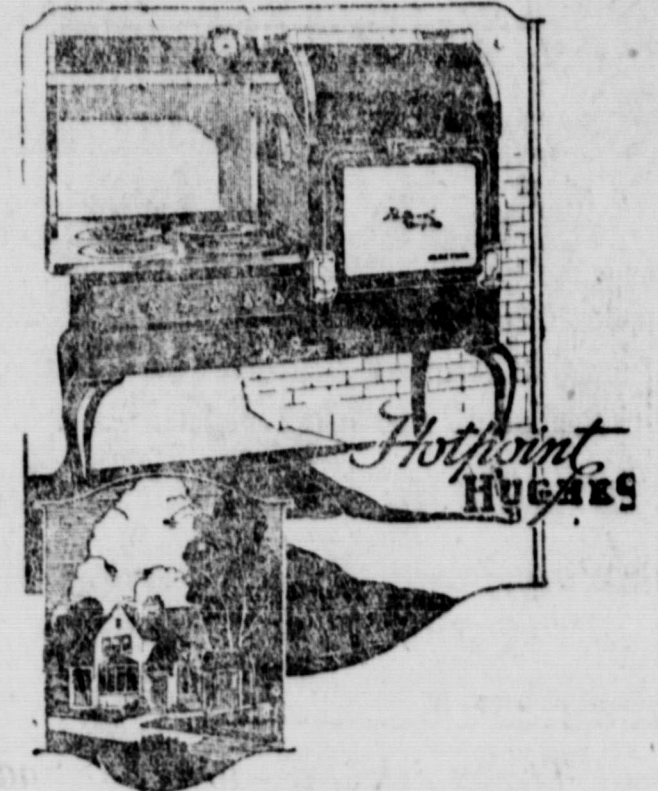

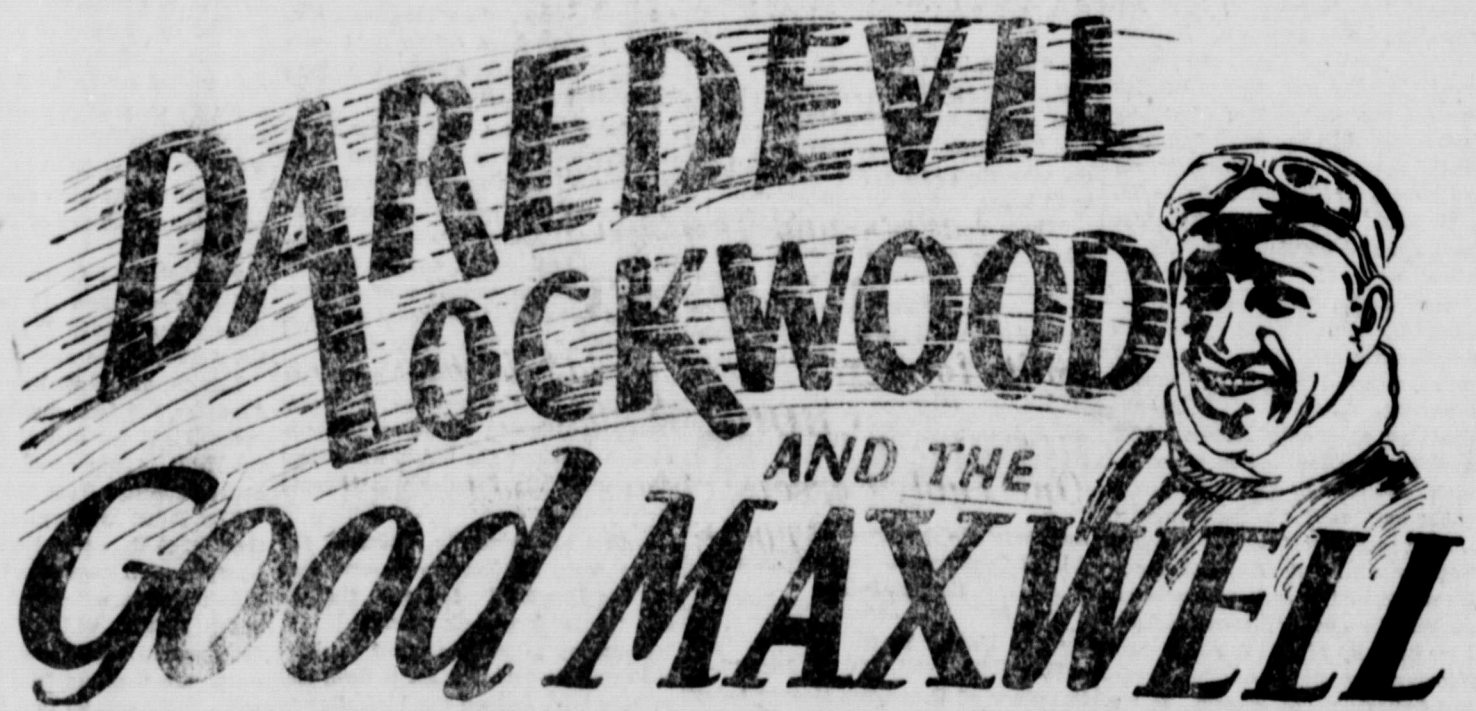

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Cooked Salad Dressing.
Four tablespoons sugar; 1 teaspoon salt; 2 1-2 tablespoons cornstarch; 1 tablespoon flour; 1 tablespoon mustard; 1-8 teaspoon red pepper; 6 tablespoons vinegar; 1 1-2 cups boiling water; 2 tablespoons cooking oil; 2 eggs.
Mix dry ingredients. Add vinegar, water and oil. Cook until thick. Add two eggs slightly beaten. Thin with cream.

Fruit Salad Dressing.
One-fourth cup pineapple juice; 1-4

cup orange juice; 1-4 cup lemon juice; 3 tablespoons water; 1 tablespoon cornstarch; 1-2 cup sugar; 2 eggs.
Heat the liquids in boiling water. Sift dry ingredients. Stir hot liquid into dry ingredients. Cook in double boiler 15 minutes. Slightly beat eggs, adding a little of the cooked mixture at a time, beating constantly until all has been used. Put back on stove one minute. Thin with whipped cream.

Russian Dressing.
One cup Mayonnaise; 1 pimento—chopped; 1 tablespoon chopped chives or white onion; 2 tablespoons chili sauce; 2 teaspoons tarragon vinegar; 1-2 teaspoon salt; 1-4 teaspoon pepper

Mix thoroughly and serve on cabbage, spinach, or romaine salad.

Club Dressing.
One-half cup French dressing; 1-2 cup chili sauce; 1 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce; 1 level teaspoon chopped chives or onions.
Mix all ingredients thoroughly and serve on lettuce.

Vinaigrette Sauce.
Two yolks of hard boiled eggs; 3 tablespoons oil; 2 tablespoons finely chopped white onion; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon white pepper; 3 tablespoons Tarragon Vinegar.
Press egg yolk through sieve, add gradually the oil and when thoroughly mixed add seasonings.
Serve with broiled or baked lamb or veal, or stuffed heart.

Potato Salad.
Two cups diced potatoes; 1-2 cup diced celery; 2 tablespoons chopped parsley; 2 tablespoons chopped green peppers; 2 tablespoons chopped onion; 1 teaspoon salt.
Add French dressing and sprinkle with chopped parsley.

Waldorf Salad.
Two cups diced apples; 1-2 cup chopped nuts; 1 cup diced celery.
Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing.

French Dressing.
Eight tablespoons cooking oil; 3 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar; 1-2 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon sugar; 1-8 teaspoon paprika.
Mix dry ingredients. Add oil and lemon juice or vinegar and beat until creamy. This dressing may be made in larger quantities and kept in a bottle and shaken as used.

Sauce Tartare.
(For fried fish, oysters, crabs, scallops or entrees).
One cup Mayonnaise; 2 tablespoons capers; 2 tablespoons olives; 2 tablespoons gherkins; 1 tablespoon parsley; 1-4 tablespoon onion juice or finely chopped shallots or white onions.
Chop capers, olives, gherkins and parsley very fine. Fold into the mayonnaise and serve cold.

Hollandaise Sauce.
Two egg yolks; 1-3 cup cooking oil; 1-3 cup boiling water; 1-3 teaspoon salt; 1-8 teaspoon paprika; 1 1-2 tablespoon lemon juice.
Beat egg yolks. Gradually add oil, with seasoning and boiling water. Put into double boiler and cook until thick. Remove from fire and add lemon juice.
May be served hot or cold.

To be served on asparagus, boiled fish or salads.

Mayonnaise Dressing.
One cup cooking oil; 1 egg yolk; 1-2 teaspoon sugar; 1-2 teaspoon salt; 1-8 teaspoon paprika; 3 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar.
Add well mixed seasoning to egg, with one teaspoon lemon juice or vinegar and beat well, adding one teaspoon oil at a time until mixture thickens, after which the oil may be added more rapidly. Thin with lemon juice or vinegar when necessary. The white of egg may be beaten stiff and folded in last.

To Co-operate.
AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—Co-operation between the State of Texas and the Federal government is called for in a bill prepared for introduction in the House by Representative B. L. Foster of Del Rio.
The measure calls for the appropriation of \$50,000 annually for two years to eradicate prairie dogs, gophers, wild cats and other carnivorous animals, which take a heavy toll from farmers and stockmen yearly. County commissioners would be empowered to distribute the eradication funds under direction of the Department of Agriculture and the State A. & M. College. Foster also submitted a bill in the house similar to one placed before the Senate by Senator Ben Berkeley of El Paso, authorizing salaried inspectors of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association and the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association as peace officers to serve without pay. The bill provides that not more than twenty inspectors are to be authorized from the Cattle Raisers Association and not more than seven from the Sheep and Goat Raisers body.

Health Certificate.
AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—Certificates showing that persons planning to marry are not infected with venereal disease of any type would be required in event of adoption of a bill placed before the house by Representative Lane of Harris County.

POY POLL TAXES

City Poll Taxes Paid Number 286, With 1,284 For County; Payments Are Slow.

Payments of both city and county poll taxes are coming in slow, according to reports from the city hall and county tax collector's office. To date, there have been only 286 city poll tax receipts issued last year was over 1,200. It is estimated that there will be from 1,250 to 1,300 issued this year.

Payments of county poll taxes are being made in larger numbers than payments for city poll taxes. There were 1,284 receipts issued up to Thursday morning. A total of over 3,500 county poll taxes were paid last year.
