## MRS FERGUSON OUTLINES PLANS

### Sends Her First Message To State Legislature With Recommendation for Proposed Legislation

### ASKS FOR STRICT ECONOMY

#### Advises Construction New Insane Asylum And Suggested Sweet- water as Central Location

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 21.—String-  
ent curtailment of appropriations for  
state departments in order to keep  
within revenues collected during the  
next two years and avoidance of govern-  
ment upon a deficiency basis was the  
opening suggestion of Governor  
Miriam A. Ferguson in her message  
laid before the Thirty-Ninth legisla-  
ture today.

Early consideration and passage of  
the appropriation measures was set  
forth with the high-water mark placed  
at \$35,000,000. Passage of any special  
appropriations before adoption of the  
regular program "will be viewed with  
great disfavor" by the woman govern-  
or.

No mention was made in the mes-  
sage to one issue upon which the  
woman governor made her race for the  
governor's office—vindication of her  
husband's political record by legisla-  
tive enactment.

The reorganization and reduction of  
the ranger force was advocated with  
dispatch of the state police dependent  
upon the call of county officials. Leg-  
islation involving the cattle industry,  
tick eradication and highway legisla-  
tion based upon conferences held at  
various points in the state recently  
was outlined fully by the executive.

Comment upon various state depart-  
ments and institutions together with  
suggested changes and improvements  
were set forth under the following  
headings:

### Banking Departments

The present condition of the depart-  
ment was condemned as being "in a  
deplorable state of confusion." Special  
consideration of the legislature invited  
to remedy existent conditions "with  
more than sixty banks under special  
consideration" of the department.

### Insurance Department

The legislature should more clearly  
commissioner and specifically consider  
changes in the laws governing the de-  
partment. Abolition of the Fire Rating  
Board asked.

### Game, Fish and Oyster Department

Continuance of the plans for great-  
est protection of the state's game re-  
sources. Increased protection for fish  
and other marine life in rivers and  
waters adjacent to the state.

### Adjutant-General's Department

Re-organization and curtailment of  
the ranger force asked. Discontinu-  
ance of arbitrary dispatch of state po-  
lice to various points unless in cases  
of highest emergency. Citizenry asked  
to give local officers greater co-opera-  
tion. Reasonable appropriations asked  
to provide storage facilities for  
National Guard equipment. Stiffer  
penalties recommended for conviction  
for murder, robbery, speeding and il-  
legal sale of liquor, together with the  
passage of a law "to put the bootleg-  
drugstore out of business in Texas."

### Cattle Tick Eradication

Endorsement of the cattle raising as  
a Texas industry. Endorsement of  
the tick eradication plan worked out  
at the San Antonio convention with  
full sympathy promised upon any gen-  
eral measure coming out of the legis-  
lative session.

### Penitentiary Measures

Continuance of the Neff honor farm  
"until such time as reason and discre-  
tion will require abolition." Exten-  
sion of an incentive to prisoners for  
good conduct with "adoption of a lib-  
erary policy in the matter of pardons".  
Suggested legislation be passed mak-  
ing prisoners eligible for clemency af-  
ter serving fifteen years with good  
conduct irrespective of crime commit-  
ment. Employment of prisoners, men-  
tioned to less than two years upon  
county roads. Retention of some  
"humane system" of punishment for in-  
fraction of prison rules.

Amendment to the law relative to  
place of residence of prison commis-  
sioners to allow at least two to re-  
side at Houston. Suggested sale of  
Bowie prison farm. Revision of the  
financing system of the prison suggest-  
ed.

### Highway Department

Endorsement of the Dallas highway  
conference program levying a three-  
cent per gallon tax upon gasoline.  
Recommended construction of better  
"lateral road systems" and condemna-  
tion of "four-year roads upon  
forty year bonds."

## Ten Iron Beds To Be Installed County Bastile

Crocks who have occasion to spend  
a night in Nolan County's bastile will  
be housed in cells containing new beds  
for the entire jail is being equipped  
with new beds throughout.

Although they are not exactly in the  
class of the ivory bed room sets  
neither are they polished mahogany  
or oak, but they are well constructed  
and suited for the needs of the prison-  
ers. The beds arrived recently and  
now officers are wondering how they  
will get them installed. The beds are  
almost too large to go through the  
doors and are constructed of heavy iron.

The beds are of the "double deck"  
type and there 10 of them, the county  
will be able to house 20 prisoners  
over night. Herebefore the concrete  
floor has served as beds.

## SENATE FAVORS ANOTHER PARLEY

### Adopts Amendment To Naval Approp- riation Bill Urging President To Call Arms Parley

### ASKS FOR PARLEY TERMS

#### Senate Adopts Resolution By Senator Johnson Asking Secretary Hughes For Particulars

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The Sen-  
ate today went on record as favoring  
another World Conference for the li-  
mitation of naval armament.

Without objection, the Senate adopt-  
ed the amendment to the naval appro-  
priation bill as moved by Senator  
King of Utah.

The amendment urges the president  
to call another arms limitation confer-  
ence whenever in his judgment such  
action may be advisable.

The same amendment was included  
in the naval appropriation bill last  
year.

Without a word of debate the United  
States Senate today adopted the John-  
son resolution requesting the Secretary  
of State Hughes to furnish the Senate  
with complete information concerning  
the Paris Reparations Agreement.

A few minutes after the Foreign Re-  
lations Committee of the Senate for-  
mulated the resolution, Senator John-  
son, of California, leader of the ir-  
reconcilables protesting against the  
Paris Reparations Act, moved its ad-  
option. It was passed without a  
record vote.

## WATCH ECLIPSE

### Sun Will Rise Saturday In Partial Eclipse—Northeastern Section U. S. Totally Dark

The sun will rise in eclipse Satur-  
day morning, and for more than an  
hour will be hidden from view. The  
eclipse will be total in the Northeast-  
ern part of the United States, but only  
partial here.

According to astronomers the sun  
will rise at 7:25 o'clock and at that  
time will be about one-half obscured to  
the people of this part of Texas. The  
eclipse will increase until 7:41 when  
sixty-seven per cent of the eclipse will  
be visible, and it will last for about an  
hour.

This is the first total eclipse in this  
country since 1879, and will be the  
last for at least half a century. There  
have been a number of total eclipses  
since 1879, but none were visible in  
this part of the world. The eclipse  
Saturday will give the astronomers  
the best opportunity in history to  
make observations, if the weather is  
favorable, as the scope of country over  
which the sun will be totally eclipsed  
embraces the largest observatories  
which in recent years have made won-  
derful progress in studying the move-  
ments of the planets.

The moon passing between the earth  
and the sun is the cause of the forth-  
coming eclipse.

Texas and Oklahoma to Omaha, Ne-  
braska.

The increase asked for was from one  
half a cent to ten cents on a hundred.

## Dallas Pastor Says Bible "Agin" Mrs. M. A. Ferguson

### By United Press DALLAS, Jan. 21.—The Bible for- bids a woman to rule over men, Rev. W. E. Anderson, pastor of the East Dallas Baptist Church announced to- day following the inauguration of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson as governor of Texas.

Rev. Anderson cited Timothy 1, 12,  
"But I suffer Not a Woman to Teach  
Nor Usurp Authority Over the Men",  
and announced that he would preach  
on that text next Sunday.

"Woman suffrage may be the law  
of the land, but it is not of God," Rev.  
Anderson declared. "Woman suffrage  
is popular but I propose to preach  
the word of God."

Rev. Anderson's statement is one of  
the first reactions to the election of  
the first woman governor in the state  
of Texas. He concluded by saying:  
"God has granted woman the right  
I love from her husband and the right  
of motherhood and God knows bet-  
ter where a woman's place is. Even  
if it does become necessary to break  
the law of the land, the nation's mor-  
ality must be maintained."

## VICTIM OF LOVER GIRL WONT LIVE

### Shot Twice In Head—One Bullet Re- moved—Doctor Probe For Other—Her Lover May Live

### PARENTS OPPOSED MARRIAGE

#### After Couple Spent Two Days and Nights In Car, Girl Pleaded For Death Instead of Marriage

### GIRL WILL DIE

PEKIN, Ill., Jan. 21.—Little hope  
was held out today for the recovery  
of Miss Mary Eltenmiller, 20, who  
was shot by her sweetheart Fred Liech-  
tenberger, 20, who also shot himself.  
The boy may recover. The girl was  
shot twice in the head and one bullet  
had been removed.

How he shot his sweetheart, Mary  
Eltenmiller, daughter of a prominent  
farmer, twice after she had pleaded  
spent two nights in his automobile,  
and then turned the gun on himself  
and inflicted two wounds was related  
to Sheriff Neuhaus of Tazewell Coun-  
ty, and State's Attorney Dunkelburg,  
late Tuesday afternoon by Fred Liech-  
tenberger, 20, at a Pekin, Ill., hospital,  
in a signed confession according to  
advices from Pekin Tuesday afternoon.

The confession as given out by  
Sheriff Neuhaus follows:  
"I met Mary Eltenmiller Sunday  
night about 7:35 at St. Paul's Evan-  
gelical Church. Got in an auto and  
drove out South Fifth Street. We  
drove up to a schoolhouse and stayed  
there all night. Then we went to South  
Pekin in the morning and bought  
something to eat. Then we drove back  
north on South Fifth Street and stop-  
ped near Muetzelfeldt's and stayed  
there all day in the car. About 6 o'-  
clock Monday evening we drove to  
South Pekin and got some coffee.

"Then we drove down near home in  
a field. There we ran out of gasoline,  
but I wanted to keep the engine run-  
ning to keep us warm in the car. I  
wanted to take her home Sunday  
night but she would not go. She want-  
ed me to shoot her and then go away.  
When we saw her father coming  
across the field toward the auto about  
7 o'clock this morning she grabbed the  
revolver and said she was going to  
shoot herself.

"I took the gun away from her and  
said I would go with her. I then shot  
her once, and she told me to shoot her  
again. And I did. I closed my eyes,  
I could not look. I don't know where  
I shot her. Then I shot myself twice.

"I wanted her to go away and get  
married, but she would not because  
her folks did not want us to marry.  
I took the revolver from my uncle's  
home Saturday. She wanted me to get  
chloroform, but I could not, so got the  
gun."

## WILL ORGANIZE FOR NOLAN FAIR

### Officials of Last Year's Fair Call Meeting of Saturday Afternoon —Everybody Invited

### PLAN TO INCORPORATE

#### Plan Of Organization And Officers And Directors To Be Elected At Meeting Saturday

A meeting at which it is believed  
a permanent Nolan County Fair as-  
sociation will be formed has been called  
for Saturday afternoon as the result  
of a conference of the officers of last  
year's fair held Tuesday night.

The officers of the fair held last  
year came to the decision at the Tues-  
day night meeting that the proper  
course to pursue in perfecting the or-  
ganization would be the forming of a  
corporation and the selling of stock in  
the association. Last year's fair was  
put over successfully, it was pointed  
out, on practically no capital, and the  
close of the fair saw a neat sum of  
money in the bank to the credit of the  
Nolan County Fair.

It is believed that by selling stock  
in the association, the fair can be  
made larger, permanent and a yearly  
feature, therefore, according to offi-  
cers of the association, at the Satur-  
day meeting, plans will be made to-  
wards forming the association and  
disposal of stock.

Preliminary plans call for a cor-  
poration with a \$10,000 capital. The  
stock to be sold at \$25 a share, mak-  
ing a total of 400 shares to be pur-  
chased. When half the capital was  
paid in, application for a charter  
would be made to the Secretary of the  
State and upon receiving this, the or-  
ganization will begin functioning as  
an authorized corporation. These,  
however, are only preliminary plans  
of last year's officers and directors.

The entire plan of procedure will be  
completed at the meeting Saturday  
afternoon. At this meeting, officers  
and directors for the coming year will  
be elected. The meeting is open to all,  
the fair officials stated and every man  
woman and child in Nolan County who  
is interested in seeing the Nolan Coun-  
ty Fair placed on a permanent basis  
is urged to attend the meeting.

However if they should object, it will  
be easy to avoid the tax by cutting  
down upon the smokes, according to  
wording of the woman governor's  
message.

## AUSTIN SLEEPY AFTER HILARITY

### Only Few Members of House Lolling In Seats Prior to Joint Meeting To Hear "Ma's" Message

### MANY BILLS COME IN Over 100 Introduced Last Week And Hundreds More Are Expected —Crowd at Inaugural

AUSTIN, Jan. 21.—The Ferguson  
administration got down to business  
today with many details pressing for  
attention of the new executive.

There are a number of vacancies in  
the personnel of the state official fam-  
ily still to be filled and other matters  
to be taken up with the legislature at  
the joint session at two o'clock today.

There were only a few members of  
the legislature lolling in their seats  
this morning following the late hours  
of revelry last night. Committee  
work this morning on the floor of  
the house followed during the week of  
session. Another deluge of bills is  
expected after Mrs. Ferguson's mes-  
sage is delivered.

Approximately two hundred mes-  
sages will be introduced in the leg-  
islature prior to the close of the Neff  
administration.

The inaugural ceremonies wound up  
in the small hours of the morning. So  
large were the crowd attending the  
hall that hundreds stood hours in the  
open in a vain attempt to get Mrs.  
Ferguson in the reception line.

Several women fainted but so large  
was the crowd that no check on the  
number was available on account of  
the vast throngs in the corridors.

Hundreds more stood for hours out-  
side the capitol buildings waiting vainly  
for a chance to get inside.

Mrs. Ferguson returned to the capitol  
shortly after midnight to meet  
the huge throngs still there. She  
showed traces of weariness but smile-  
d bravely in response to greetings.

## FIXED NITROGEN

### Varied Products Turned Out as "Every Thing But Squeal" Laid From Animals

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (United  
Press).—"The world is turning to ni-  
trogen as the heart of explosives and  
the mainstay of the food supply, Dr.  
J. M. Graham of the U. S. Fixed Nitro-  
gen Laboratory, Washington, de-  
clares in a report on the development  
in the nitrogen problem prepared for  
the American Chemical Society. A  
cut in cost is also forecast.

All the leading nations, says Dr.  
Graham have organized intensive re-  
search in this field, which has under-  
gone enormous expansion since the  
outbreak of the World War. Ger-  
many it is disposed today as a com-  
manding lead in production, but in  
the next decade the United States, it  
is predicted, will make an enormous  
advance.

"The problem of meeting the rap-  
idly increasing demand for nitrogen  
in combined form is now engaging the  
attention of all the important and  
progressive countries," says the state-  
ment made public by the society here.

The reason for this is that nitro-  
gen is not only the heart of explosives  
and hence of prime military impor-  
tance, but it is also the key element  
in fertilization of crops and conse-  
quently of utmost importance in meet-  
ing the food requirements of the  
world."

Mrs. Jack Ripley was elected Sec-  
retary of Supplies for the North Texas  
Missionary District of the Episcopal  
Church. Her election was made at the  
recent Convocation meeting of the  
church at Amarillo.

## HIGHWAY WORK TO START SOON

### Construction on Highway 70 South of Sweetwater to Begin When Weather Permits

### CONTRACTOR HERE WITH

#### C. C. O'Neal And His Superintendent On Ground—Material And Eq- uipment Arrive

Work on the 12 1-2 miles of high-  
way No. 70 south of Sweetwater will  
start as soon as the weather permits,  
according to county officials, who  
stated that practically all the prelimi-  
naries had been disposed of and  
everything is in readiness for con-  
struction to start soon. This work  
is to be on the 12 1-2 miles of road  
near the hill nine miles from town  
and continuing towards Blackwell.

The preliminary work included the  
drilling of water wells on the route,  
jury of view work, and solving of  
right of way problems. This is all  
practically completed and it is be-  
lieved that the work will get under  
way this month.

C. C. O'Neal of Dallas, who was  
awarded the contract for the con-  
struction has been on the ground for  
several days in connection with the  
work. His superintendent of con-  
struction is also here. A portion of  
the equipment, teams and materials  
that will be used in the work are also  
on the ground.

This particular stretch of road is  
to be graded, drainage fixtures and  
bridge work installed, and then paved,  
and when completed will be in a  
splendid stretch of road and a part  
of the county's program for a com-  
plete system of paved roads. The  
cost of construction will run consid-  
erably over \$100,000.

Engineers' plans for the grading  
and paving the Bankhead highway  
east 15 miles to the Taylor county  
line and for similar construction on  
Highway 70 south of Sweetwater to  
the mountain to join with the 12 1-2  
mile stretch of pavement are in Aus-  
tin to be approved by the State En-  
gineers.

**FIRST MESSAGE**

The first message of Mrs. M. A. Ferguson was presented to the State Legislature today and is before that body for their consideration. It is a document that will repay careful reading and one which will find every one in sympathy with its opening paragraph "stringent curtailment of appropriations." The State of Texas has been on a deficiency basis too long for an empire of its rank and wealth. Avoidance of an extra session of the legislature is also a desirable aim. With hundreds of half baked bills already in the legislative hoppers, and more promised, the longer the legislature is in session the more confusion is likely to be created in the present none too clear statutes of the state.

Evidently the message was prepared some time in advance for the paragraph referring to the uses of the ranger force did not take into consideration the injunction of Saturday which has, temporarily at least, abolished that force. The basis for that injunction, however, is a case in point concerning "too many laws" not sufficiently conformed to that which preceded them.

There is a paragraph calling for the construction of another insane asylum and there is no doubt but what such a institution is badly needed. Sweetwater is suggested as a central location for the proposed institution. There is no room for argument on the question of either location or transportation facilities.

All in all it is a message of state that with all the possible suggestions of the tick eradication asked for and one or two other points, will meet with similar general approval.

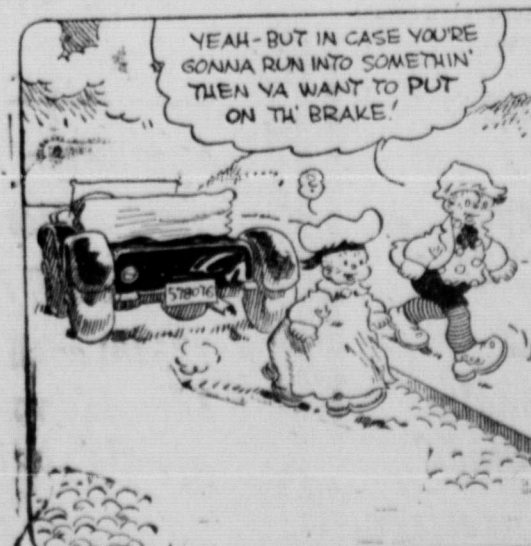
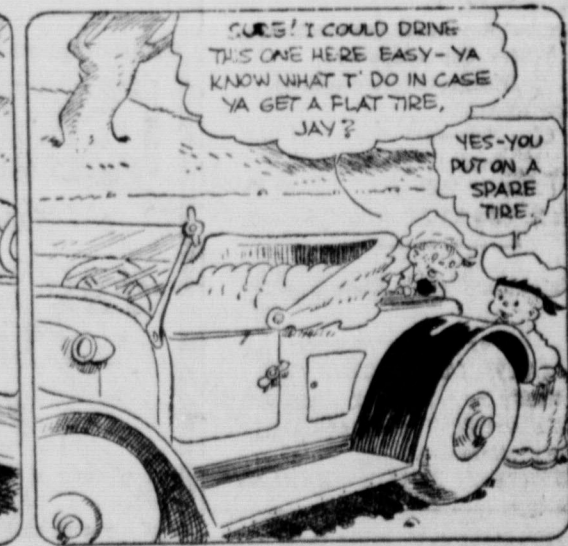

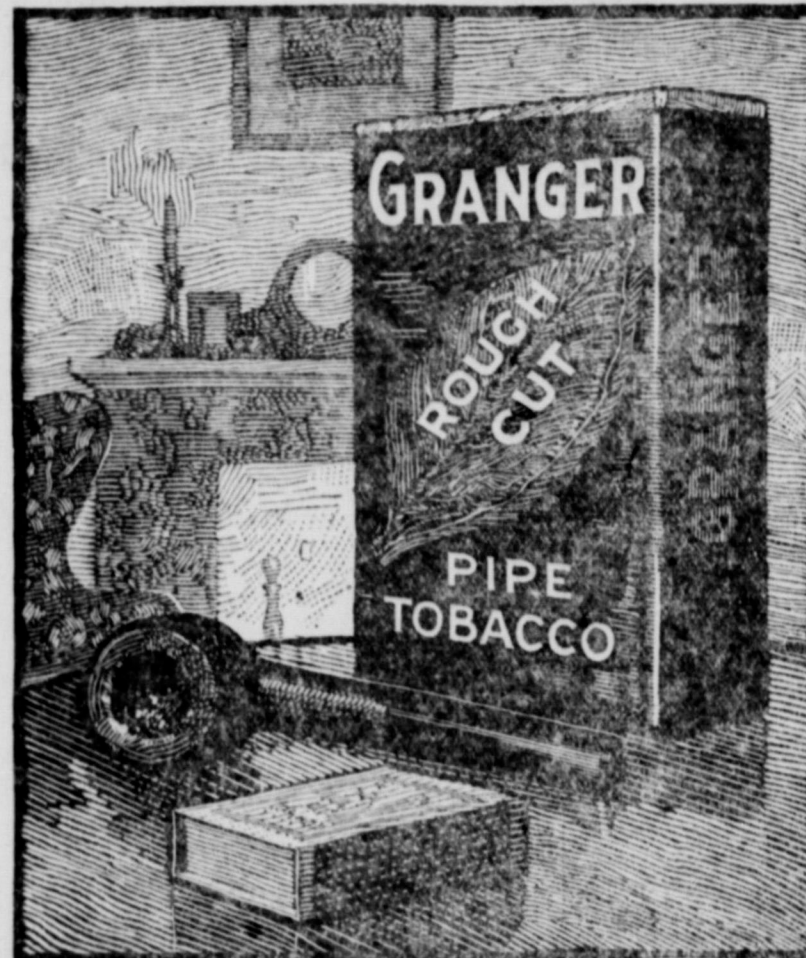
