



# British Legislative Body Has Hard Row to Hoe at Forthcoming Ses-Tax Reduction Is Main Feature-Per

By CLIFFORD L. DAY (United Press Staff Correspondent.) LONDON, Jan. 29 .- Great problems confront the British Parliament when it canvenes Feb. 10, after a two-mon-

ths Christmas vacation. The Conservative (Tory) party will ding or Industries Act. According to Family have a chance to show what it can do with the strongest majority that party has held in a British Parliament for more than 100 years.

The public is watching the session with even keener interest perhaps than it displayed a year ago when the empire's first Labor administration took office. It was certain then that the Laborites were too weak numeric ally in Parliament to alter much the existing state of things; today the Conservative are powerful enough to do just about as they please.

It appears that domestic problems will take precedence in its deliberations, although a number of vital foreign questions still are hanging fire. Outstanding features promised to include, primarily: The Budget, Tariff Policy, Unemployment, Cost of Living, Agriculture, Housing, Industrial Dis putes, Interallied Debts, Ireland, Ge-

neva, Protocol, Russia, Mexico. The man in the street is waiting to see, mainly, what alleviation in taxes may be forthcoming in the budget to be submitted by the new Chancellor of the Exchequer, Winston Churchill.

Churchill is credited with a desire to knock a shilling per pound off the income-tax. If he does that both the masses and the classes will rise up and call him blessed, for the total taxation per capita in Great Britain is now more than \$75 per year. The income-

tax alone is a veritable nightmare. Whatever Churchill's good intentions may be, however, treasury returns so far have indicated that sixpence is the closest shaving in this respect that the Federal exchequer can permit. But, if some unforseen windfall develops in the meantime-such

uctions will be attempted.
