Star Lites

"HOW AMERICAN!" This was evangelist Billy Graham's description of Richard M. Nixon, the nation's 37th president, who died last Friday and was buried on Wednesday.

The son of a groceryman, Nixon has been lauded for "pulling himself up by his bootstraps," from humble beginnings to becoming one of the world's most powerful figures.

Like many in our age group, Nixon was one of the early national political figures we had to deal with.

In fact, Nixon was on the ballot when we cast our first vote for president in the 1960 election. But that was in his race against John F. Kennedy, and like the majority of Americans, Ye Editor voted for the charismatic JFK, who had clearly dominated Nixon in the series of TV debates, the first of this nature for presidential candidates.

Later, we voted for Nixon when he defeated Hubert H. Humphrey in 1968, and again on his re-election in 1972. Did you know that Nixon was one of only two people who was on a national ballot (president or vice president) five times? His record was 4-1, so that wasn't too bad.

We approved of Nixon's leadership, and felt that he did a good job during a turbulent time for our nation.

The scandal of Watergate proved to be Nixon's political undoing, and the irony then, as now, was that Nixon would have won re-election with a big landslide over George McGovern, without any of the Watergate antics.

Having come to Nixon from the Lyndon Johnson administration, and having heard stories of LBJ's wheeling and dealing in politics, we thought at the time that Watergate was no worse than many of the Democrats' shenanigans. It was just a case of the Republicans getting caught--and then the cover-up that followed, which brought Nixon down.

By today's standards, Nixon would probably be considered "too square" to run for president.

We still recall the day in 1974--almost 20 years ago--when Nixon became the first U.S. president to resign. We were a witness as history was being made.

But we believe that Nixon will be recalled for his leadership in helping bring about the end of the Cold War--even though he first won attention as an anti-communist.

He opened up relations with the People's Republic of China, and began dialogue with the Soviet Union that resulted in Henry Kissinger negotiating the Strategic Arms Limitations Treaty. (How any interpreter could understand Kissinger well enough to explain to the Russians still remains a mystery, however. Maybe they just thought they understood what Henry was saying!)

As a member of the U.S. Navy during World War II, Nixon was another of our presidents, like Eisenhower, Kennedy and Bush, who knew the real meaning of war, and that a good deterrent to war was in keeping a strong military in place. He didn't run off to Canada or England, but enlisted in the U.S.N.

Also, like those other leaders, those in power in the Communist Bloc knew exactly the type of person they were dealing with as leader of the Free World.

We may need someone with his leadership and backbone again sometime in the future.

Friona Library Expansion Plans Are Now Underway

Work is scheduled to begin soon on the first phase of the remodeling of the building at the corner of Seventh and Euclid, which originally housed the post office.

This building has been purchased by friends of the Library and the City of Friona and will be used for expansion of the floor space of Friona Public Library from approximately 3500 square feet to approximately 6200 square feet.

Plans for this project have been in the making about ten years and a building fund had sufficient cash on

hand to pay for the building and the new roof.

Nancy Edelson, Susie Perez and Debbie Rector are currently serving on the building committee of Friends of the Library. They are working with the advisory board, whose members are Claire Blanco, Don Kimbrough, Debbie Rector and Darla Bracken on the expansion project.

Completion of the project will be determined by the amount of money available for it.

Friona Public Library came into existence June 15, 1963 through

the efforts of members of Modern Study Club. Members of the first library committee were Mrs. J. T. Gee, Mrs. J. G. McFarland, Mrs. V. J. Zeman and Mrs. Bill Stewart.

The library was opened in the Woman's Federated Club House with 150 books borrowed from the Texas State Library. Very soon more than 100 families had donated books. Book cases were donated by Friona Public Schools, Modern Study Club and George C. Taylor.

Financial assistance was provided by Friona's four federated clubs, the Jaycees, the City of Friona and many interested individuals.


The library was staffed by volunteers about three years. The first paid employee was Joy Morton, who served as librarian during the summer of 1966. That fall Mrs. Zora Gaede was hired as the first regular librarian.

She has been followed by Beverly Sweeney, Mary Ford, Billie Fairchild and Darla Bracken, who has filled the position since 1982.

Mary Rose Brito was the first assistant librarian. She held this position from 1985 to 1992. Brenda Patterson has been the assistant since 1993.

The library's second home was in the American Legion Building at the corner of Seventh and Washington and the present building was built in 1982.

During the year of 1993, a total of 10,210 patrons were served and this year the checkouts are averaging 3,000 per month.

Candidate Forum Draws Large Crowd

Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture officials estimated that more than 140 persons were present for the Monday evening candidate forum at the Friona Elementary Cafeteria.

Byron Boyd, chairman of the legislative affairs committee, presented the welcome address and introduced Paula Wilson, city manager; Hal Ratcliff, Friona Independent School District superintendent; and Bill McCoy, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, who introduced candidates for mayor, city council, school board and hospital board.

Each candidate stated his aims and goals for the office for which he desired to be elected and answered a question concerning the duties of the office.

The candidates included Clarence Monroe, mayor, who is running for re-election; city council candidates, Chris Carrillo and Tom Randolph; school board candidates, Rick Carr, Mickey Harrelson, Butch Preston, Don Carthel, Arthur Cabrera and Paul (Lucky) Gonzales, Jr.; and hospital board candidates, Dale Schueler, Anne Corn and Arthur Cabrera.

Clint Mears filmed the forum, which will be broadcast by Mission Cable. Viewing times for the broadcast are Saturday, April 30 at 10 a.m.; Tuesday, May 3, 7 p.m.

Cost of the rabies vaccination and city tags will be \$7.00. Other vaccinations will be available upon request.


Pre-K'garten Enrollment Set May 2-6

Friona Primary School is asking for assistance in contacting all parents of children who qualify for the pre-kindergarten program for the 1994-95 school year. A pre-kindergarten enrollment has been scheduled for May 2-6 at the Primary School office.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, a child must be four years old on or before September 1, 1994, and meet one or more of the following qualifications: (1) Low-income--eligible for assistance; (2) Language or learning deficiency; (3) Physically handicapped.

Parents are asked to bring their child's birth certificate, immunization record, Social Security card, parents' proof of income and proof of federal assistance to the primary office. A copy will be made and the original returned to you. All the above records must be completed before a child can be enrolled.

According to the Texas Education Code, in order for a student to enroll in school, his/her immunizations must be current. If all records are completed at pre-registration time, parents will not have to wait in line when school starts this fall.

Letters To The Editor

(Editor's note: The following letter was submitted to the Friona Star by Wilma Wise, a reply to her letter to Gov. Ann Richards):

Dear Ms. Wise:
Thank you for your letter regarding the cost of your insurance, the lottery revenues, and school finance. I appreciate hearing from you and hope that you will pardon the delayed response.

As a result of the 1991 legislation that I strongly supported, as well as the actions of my appointees to the State Board of Insurance, many pro-consumer changes have been made in the regulation of auto and homeowners insurance. Texans can now shop for insurance in a market that is based on competition. Also, programs are in place to fight the kinds of fraud and theft that contribute to higher rates.

My administration is looking forward to seeing even greater progress as 1993 legislation governing the rate-making process is implemented. Regulatory authority has shifted from the three-member State Board of Insurance, which will be phased out over the next year, to a single insurance commissioner. I have appointed Bob Hunter, who brings to this office a vast knowledge of the insurance industry and a national reputation as an effective consumer advocate.

In addition, the Texas Department of Insurance and the Office of Public Insurance Counsel are continuing to give consumers the information that will help them understand their rights and assist them in shopping for the best rates available. I encourage you to contact the Texas Department of Insurance at P. O. Box 149104, Austin, Texas 78714-9104, telephone 512/463-6169, or the Office of Public Insurance Counsel, telephone 512/322-4143, if you have questions or concerns about insurance regulation in Texas.

In regard to school district property taxes, I have heard from many senior citizens who are having a difficult time trying to stretch their fixed incomes to cover unexpected increases. I assure you

that I am listening and I am aware of your plight.

However, you should remember that local districts decide for themselves whether or not to raise property taxes. School districts have the taxing authority as well as the responsibility to set priorities and promote efficiency. For example, the school board could decide to pare administrative costs and/or to cut back on funding for athletics, thus reducing the need for increased funding. I hope you will let the members of your school board know your feelings on this matter.

You may also wish to file an affidavit with the court that would allow you to postpone your tax payments for as long as you own and live in your home. If you ever decide to sell your property, you will have to pay the delinquent taxes plus interest added at the rate of eight percent a year, but you would not be spending your fixed income on property taxes in the meantime. For more information on tax deferrals, you may call the Property Tax Division at the Texas Comptroller's Office at 800/252-9121.

Finally, let me explain how the lottery revenues are allocated. The Texas legislature decided that the net revenues from the Texas Lottery would be deposited into the state's General Revenue Fund. Money from sales taxes, interest and dividends is also deposited into the General Revenue Fund, the state's "bank account" from which it pays its bills. The fund helps support a long list of state-run programs, such as health and human services, parks, public safety, public schools, and prisons.

The biggest slice of the General Revenue Fund--approximately 53 percent--goes for higher and public education. Since the Texas Lottery so far has generated \$927 million in general revenue, it will contribute approximately \$491 million to help fund public schools and universities. That sum amounts to just 2.3 percent of the \$21 billion required to fund Texas education over two years. In other words, lottery revenues DO provide funding for education, but not enough to offset the effect of increases in the school population combined with growing demands on the state budget from the courts and the federal government.

I hope this information addresses your concerns. Thank you again for writing.



My collection of Farmer County cookbooks increased by one over the weekend. Each lady who was present at the Saturday morning session of a Ladies Retreat at Sixth Street Church of Christ was presented with a cookbook made up of recipes contributed by those who attended the Friday evening session, so, it was really "hot off the press" Saturday morning.

Several younger homemakers burned some midnight oil in putting the book together. Most of the recipe contributors were local residents, so we're "borrowing" recipes from the book for this week's Happy Homemaker.

One of the first ones is:

Recipe For A Christian Life

- 1 cupful of consideration
- 1 cupful of courtesy
- 2 cupfuls of flattery
- 2 cupfuls of milk of human kindness
- 1 gallon of faith in God and in others
- 2 cupfuls of praise
- A generous dash of cooperation
- 3 teaspoons of pure extract of "I am sorry."
- 1 cupful of contentment
- 1 cupful each of confidence and

encouragement
1 cupful of blindness to our brothers' and sisters' faults
Combine carefully and apply generously to everyday living.

Unlike the first one, the others have instructions for making dishes for good eating any time you want to use one of them.

Chocolate Crunch Brownies

- 1 cup oleo or butter, softened
 - 2 cups sugar 4 eggs
 - 6 tablespoons cocoa
 - 1 cup all purpose flour
 - 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 jar (7 oz.) marshmallow creme (I used about 28 big marshmallows)
 - 1 cup creamy peanut butter
 - 2 cups (12 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate chips
 - 3 cups crisp rice cereal

In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar; add eggs. Stir in cocoa, flour, vanilla and salt. Spread into a greased 13"x9"x2" pan. Bake 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until brownies test done. Cool, then spread marshmallow creme over brownies. In a small saucepan, melt chocolate chips and peanut butter over low heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, stir in cereal. Spread over marshmallow layer. Chill before cutting. Store in refrigerator. Yields 3 dozen.

Strawberry Pretzel Jello

- 2 cups crumbled pretzels
 - 3 tablespoons sugar
 - 1/2 cup margarine, melted
 - 1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 cup whipping cream
 - 1 package (6 oz.) strawberry Jello
 - 1 package (16 oz.) frozen strawberries, thawed
 - 3 cups boiling water
- Combine pretzels, 3 tablespoons sugar and margarine, then press into a 13"x9"x2" dish. Bake

10 minutes at 325 degrees, then cool. Beat the cream cheese, 1 cup sugar and whipping cream together, spread over the cooled pretzel mixture and chill. Dissolve the Jello in hot water, add strawberries, chill until mixture is slightly thickened; spoon over cream cheese layer and chill.

Ice Cream Dessert

- 28 Oreo cookies, crushed
 - 1/3 cup melted oleo
 - 1/2 cup chocolate chips
 - 3 tablespoons butter 1 cup sugar
 - 2 small cans Pet milk.

Mix the cookies and oleo together and press into a 13"x9" pan. Cook remaining ingredients in microwave until thick and pour over oreo crust. Top with 1/2 gallon soft ice cream and 13 oz. Cool Whip. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

 - 1 cup crushed saltines
 - 1/8 teaspoon salt (optional)
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
 - 1-2 cups grated cheddar cheese
 - 12 oz. can evaporated milk
 - 1 egg
 - 1-8 count package hamburger buns
- Mix all ingredients together. Separate buns and place a portion of the meat mixture on the bottom half of each bun. Wrap the bottom half with meat in foil. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

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

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

Friona Little Dribblers completed the basketball season last Thursday night with three Junior High teams seeing action.



George Muller was born in Germany, the son of a tax collector. He lived a wicked life as a youth but was converted to Christ at about 20 at a Moravian mission. He went to England in 1829 to do mission work and eventually became a preacher affiliated with the Plymouth Brethren.

He determined to rely totally on the Lord for his financial support. He would submit his needs to God in prayer but would not make his needs known to man.

This policy continued even after he started an orphanage for children in Bristol. Without direct appeals for funds, his orphanage was supported and grew. By the time he died more than 10,000 orphans had been cared for in his orphanages. His own possessions amounted to merely a few hundred dollars. His personal journal records countless times the Lord supplied his needs.

On the occasion of the opening of the first orphanage building. The announced opening day came but no children were brought to the orphanage. The Lord reminded him that he had prayed for knives, forks, spoons, bed linens, etc., but he had

not asked for children. The next day they came in.

Phillipians 4:19--And my God shall supply all your needs according to His riches in glory in Christ Jesus.

Being a farmer, rancher, I caught myself getting anxious about "my needs." The persistent dry weather, wheat needing moisture, cattle needing grazing.

The Lord reminded me that it was His before I came along and it would be His when I left. For every beast of the forest is Mine, the cattle on a thousand hills, I know every bird of the mountains, and everything that moves in the fields is mine. Psalms 50:9, 10.

I placed it back in His hands and once again His peace was mine. I read Psalm 23 and verse 2 spoke to me in a new and fresh way. He makes me lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside quiet waters. Even in the midst of turmoil and seeming difficulties, God's way is green pastures and quiet waters.

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
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


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
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SWCD Observes Soil, Water Stewardship Week

Reinvest Earnings and Compound Your Investment

Remember learning about the magic of compounding? Remember the teacher explaining about \$10 in the bank earning 8 per cent? After a year, it would earn 80 cents. Leave the earnings in your account, and during the next year, your \$10.80, earning the same 8 per cent, would earn 86 cents. The point was that you earn interest on top of interest by leaving it in your account.

Some investors have forgotten the magic of compounding, even though it is one of the most valuable tools in the accumulation of wealth. If you can do without receiving income from investments, and allow that income to accumulate and compound, your investments will grow much more quickly.

As an example, consider a \$10,000 investment earning 10 per cent with no principal fluctuation. If you withdraw your interest rather than reinvesting it, you earn \$1,000 per year. After ten years, you earn \$10,000 on your original investment of \$10,000, for a total of \$20,000.

However, if you reinvest the monthly income at the same 10 per

cent, your investment nearly triples in ten years--to \$27,070. By letting your interest compound rather than withdrawing it, you earn another \$7,000 in the same ten years.


After 20 years, the numbers are more dramatic: You earn \$43,281 more than you would by taking your earnings in cash.

A higher yield can increase the benefits of compounding. For example, in 20 years, \$10,000 compounding monthly at 12 per cent would grow to more than double what the investment would if it were earning only 8 per cent (\$108,926 vs. \$49,268). Of course, because higher yields typically carry higher risk, you should select a yield level that is compatible with your safety requirements.

Compounding also works best when given time. Starting today, if you were to invest \$100 monthly compounding at 8 per cent, 20 years from now you would have \$58,902. But if you waited ten years to begin investing, 20 years from now you would only have \$18,295--more than \$40,000 less.

When investing for long-term goals such as retirement or education, leaving your earnings to compound can make a tremendous difference in the growth of your investment.

What "Legally Blind" Means

The term "legally blind" generally refers to someone whose vision is so severely limited that effective vision is no better than 20/200 after correction.

This does not mean that the person cannot see at all or take care of personal needs. There's a wide variety of low-vision aids that use magnification to improve what visual acuity remains, ranging from hand-held magnifiers to telescopic lenses or microscopic segments for regular lenses--even computer programs to display extra-large letters.

It is usually the optometrist who must certify that this person is "legally blind." This certification entitles the individual to state and/or federal assistance to pay for vision services to make the most of the vision that remains.

The optometrist plays a special role for the patients with severely restricted eyesight--not only prescribing and providing the devices that enhance remaining sight, but helping the patient adjust to them.

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
