The power of the press has never been more strikingly exemplified than in the case of Floyd Collins. Only a few days ago Collins was very much unknown with the exception of his own immediate circle of friends and acquaintances. While exploring one of the caves of Kentucky in search of new passages for his summer work, a large boulder caught his foot. For 24 hours he lay alone. Then he was discovered and food and drink brought him while rescuers sought in vain to remove the rock from his foot. Just as success crowned their efforts, after many days of hard work, the walls of the passageway bulged shut and Collins was more than ever a prisoner. For now his friends could not get to him at all. During the 17 days that he was in this natural dungeon, screaming headlines in every daily and weekly newspaper in the United States and many foreign countries pic-

tured his plight. Millions and millions of people, as they went about their daily occupations, wondered if Collins would be freed that day or when. It was a situation that made every one instinctively shudder by its very unpleasantness. And when it ended in tragedy, it seemed to come very close to everyone. By the power of the press.
