Installation of laboratory equipment is being forwarded and beginning probably next week, the water will be submitted to a daily test by Louis Geldert, in charge of the plant laboratory, to ascertain that the plant is giving the required results.

According to Water Commissioner Musgrove the entire water system has been prepared for the new filtered water. Several "dead ends" have been flushed, the stand pipe was drained and given a thorough cleaning and the entire system is in fine shape.

The pumping of water from the clear well of the filtration plant to the standpipe began at 1 o'clock Saturday. There was some water, however, already in the various mains and lines and this naturally had to be used up before the filtered water came out of the hydrants in hundreds of Sweetwater homes. By late Saturday afternoon, however, it was estimated that all the water had been used out of the mains and that the water that followed had been through the process of filtration.
