## ADD MANY NEW WATER PATRONS

Forty New Residences Added to City Water Lines Since January 1, This Year.

### BEAUTIFY FILTER PLANT

Rubbish Cleared Away from Grounds—City Using More Water Than Ever.

Records in the Water Commission's office showing new patrons of the water department and new taps on the city mains reveal that up to Friday a total of 40 new residences and other buildings have gone up in Sweetwater since January 1 of this year.

The many new water taps are taken as a sure indication of the city's growth, water commissioner Musgrove stated, and the average this year is more than one new tap every other day, or a total of 40 taps within the first 65 days of this year.

Five new taps were made Thursday, being a record business for any one day. So far this month 10 new customers of the water department have been added. There were 20 new buildings connected with water lines in February and 10 in January.

With Sweetwater's new filtration plant fully completed and running at full blast, turning out nearly 600,000 gallons of water daily, work has begun to beautify the grounds adjacent to the plant and make that location one of the beauty spots of the city.

All rubbish and trash accumulated during construction have been cleared away, and workmen have just completed banking the dirt about the lot on which the plant is located, terracing it up preparatory to planting grass. Twenty-four poplar trees have been set out around the edge of the plant property, and more trees will be planted about the plant buildings, according to water officials.

Side walks will be built around two sides of the plant grounds in the future, it was reported.

The city is using more water now than ever before, according to the water department. Approximately 600,000 gallons a day flow from Lake Trammell, through the filtration plant and into hundreds of Sweetwater homes and buildings. Vast amounts of water are also used daily by the Texas and Pacific and the Orient railroads. Other plants, factories and commercial concerns use large amounts of water. The filtration plant has a capacity of a million gallons every 25 hours. The water is being pumped only half a day, or 12 hours out of every 24. When the demand is increased, it is probable that it will be necessary to operate the plant on the 24 hour basis.

## INSPECT ORIENT

Superintendent A. J. Clary and Trainmaster H. H. Allen Visit in Sweetwater Thursday.

"As a result of a splendid freight business during the past fall and early winter, the Orient is in a much better condition than it has been in during recent years, and is really on the upgrade" H. H. Allen, trainmaster for this division stated Thursday.

One passenger train which runs through Sweetwater has been equipped with electric lights. Mr. Allen stated, and present plans call for equipping other trains similarly. When the electric lights are installed on trains, the entire train is thoroughly overhauled, he stated, thus requiring several days to complete the job. For this reason it will be naturally slow progress in improving all engines and coaches on this line, but it is hoped to accomplish this in the near future, Mr. Allen declared.

There is no immediate indication of equipping Orient engines with oil burners, Mr. Allen said, as the nearest refinery to the Big Lake oil field is the one at Sweetwater.

With Mr. Allen in Sweetwater Thursday were: A. J. Clary, superintendent of the Texas division, and Henry Jackson, assistant general attorney for the road. The three officials are on an inspection tour of this division, and were in Sweetwater to attend the paving hearing Thursday.

From Sweetwater they will go to Hamlin and Altus, Okla., before returning to headquarters at San Angelo.

## CHARGES FRAUD IN STOCK SALES

Warrants Issued Against Cashier Kansas City Firm for Selling Fake Oil Stock.

### ANOTHER UNDER ARREST

Member of Concern Held at San Antonio Under Similar Charge—To Federal Court.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. March 6.—Warrant charging use of the mails to defraud in the sale of alleged fake oil stock, was issued today for J. S. Brown, cashier for Coursem and Brothers.

L. H. Coursem, member of the firm is already under arrest in San Antonio on a similar charge, according to Geo. H. Husker, Secretary of the Better Business Bureau, the organization which uncovered the alleged fraud stock sales carried on by the company. Brownbridge will be arraigned in Federal court.

## TEXAS MAN GETS MITCHELL PLACE

Secretary of War Weeks Recommends Lt. Col. Fechet of Kelly Field Succeed Mitchell.

### TO HEAD AIR SERVICE

Brigadier General Mitchell Reverts To Rank of Colonel—President Takes Weeks' Side.

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 6.—Brigadier General Mitchell, Assistant Chief of the air service today reverted to the rank of Colonel when Secretary of War Weeks failed to reappoint him to the post he has held for the new term beginning March 26.

Secretary of War Weeks recommended to the president the appointment of Lt. Col. James E. Fechet to succeed Mitchell. The president has already announced that he would appoint whoever Secretary Weeks recommended for the post.

Fechet is commandant of Kelly Field, Texas.

Mitchell was today at Fortress Monroe, Virginia, aiding in a test of anti-aircraft guns against airplanes.

### Before Senate.

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 6.—Acting on Secretary of War Weeks' recommendation, President Coolidge sent the nomination of James E. Fechet to the Senate today at noon.

## MOSES ELECTED

New Hampshire Senator Chosen President Pro Tem of Senate—Vote 50 to 36.

H. was elected president pro tem of the Senate today by a split party vote which resulted when 3 senators were ousted for non-support of members kicked out of the Republican party. Senators Brookhart, Frasier and Ladd voted for Moses when a roll call was demanded.

The vote was 50 to 36.

### PLAN GAS SUPPLY

Pittsburgh Interests Discuss Pipe Line From Wheeler County

FORT WORTH, Texas, March 6.—As a result of surveys over West Texas made by E. P. Hamlett of Pittsburgh, Pa., representing eastern capitalists, it is reported that the Gillespie interests of that city are prepared to spend several million dollars in laying of trunk gas lines for municipal distribution from the source at Wheeler county field, extending down as far south as Sweetwater.

The route, preliminary surveys indicate would touch Shamrock, Wellington, Memphis, Childress, and if the demand warranted it, would extend south to Stamford, Benjamin and Sweetwater.

The plan in its preliminary stage calls for first contracting with West Texas towns for the natural gas supply, and then extending the trunk mains to the towns from the potential source in the Wheeler field.

## Revive Seventeen Men Unconscious From Bad Mine Air

By United Press. SPRINGFIELD, Mo. March 6.—Seventeen men overcome by bad air, were rescued today from the Peabody mine at Rivertown, a mining town near here, after reports of an explosion had been circulated.

The presence of bad air in the mine is believed to have been caused by a "windy shaft" which last night caused the miners to be overcome by fumes and also injured a mine examiner.

The 17 miners, who were overcome following the escape of 88 of their comrades, were carried to the surface today and revived.

## BRING STEPHENS TRIAL TO NOLAN

Prominent Fisher County Man to Be Tried in Nolan County District Court for Murder.

### ROBY JUROR DISQUALIFIED

Death of Father-in-Law Removes Juror—Stephens Charged With Shooting of Son-in-Law.

ROBY, March 6.—Due to the sudden death of H. E. Roberts, the father-in-law of C. C. Roby, one of the jurors, the case of the State of Texas vs. Dan W. Stephens on a charge of murder for the shooting of Otho Martin last June was transferred to Nolan County by agreement of attorneys.

Stephens, prominent Fisher County resident, was indicted for murder following the shooting of his son-in-law, Otho Martin. The shooting took place at the Roby Court House just prior to a trial wherein Martin was charged with a statutory offense with another daughter of Stephens as complaining witness.

Both the state and prosecution are represented by numerous array of counsel. Beall, Beall and Beall of Sweetwater, Jim Cunningham of Abilene and M. A. Hopson and L. B. Allen of Roby represent the defence and Brooks and Sinson of Abilene aided District Attorney Tom Davis and County Attorney Formway in the prosecution of the trial at Roby.

It is not likely that the Stephens case can be set for trial at the present term of District Court, in the opinion of interested attorneys. Transfer of papers, summons to witnesses and drawing of a special venire of jurymen would not be apt to be concluded in time for the current session.

## T-P TO IMPROVE

## MITCHELL TESTS AERIAL BOMBING

Successfully Demonstrates That Airplanes Can Accomplish Destruction of Battleship.

### IS NOTIFIED OF REMOVAL

Has No Criticism to Make of War Department Relative to Action Concerning Him.

By United Press. FORTRESS MONROE, Va., March 6.—Thirty army airplanes dropping 100 bombs containing 10 pounds of explosives each completely demolished a model of a battleship on the field here today.

Brigadier General William Mitchell, assistant chief of the army air service in a fast pursuit plane, directed the experiment, and was an added attraction to the aircraft ground demonstration arranged by the war department for representatives of the House Aircraft Committee.

As Mitchell dropped down and stepped out of his plane, Lieut. Moffett, one of his associates, notified him that he was to be succeeded by Lieut. Col. Fechet as announced by Secretary of War Weeks today.

"I will abide by any decision of the War Department in regard to myself" was Mitchell's only comment.

## GENERAL BETTER

Pershing Plans Attend Memorial For Sailors Who Died in Maine Explosion.

HAVANA, March 6.—Although his condition was somewhat improved today, General John J. Pershing continues to remain in bed at his hotel here.

If the General's health permits, he will visit President Zayas of Cuba tomorrow and Sunday he will attend a Memorial Service in honor of the sailors who died when the Maine was blown up in 1898.

### ADVOCATES ADVERTISING

Battle Creek Man Cites Unadvertised Features of U. S.

BATTLE CREEK Mich. March 7.—"Made in U. S. A." archeology was advocated by George R. Fox, Three Oaks, Michigan, president of the Michigan Archeological Association, in an address before the members of the association here.

"Ask anybody the question 'where are the pyramids' and the answer will be 'Egypt,'" Fox said. "As a matter of fact there are only 60 pyramids in Egypt. Mexico alone has 800 pyramids."

Some of the world's most interesting relics are to be found in this country, but lack of advertising has left the people ignorant of their worth, Fox said. Indian mounds in Ohio, Michigan and Wisconsin and the garden beds of Michigan were named as phenomena worthy of pilgrimage from long distances.

"There are wonderful things to be found right here in North America," said Fox. "The more you know about your own ancient the better will be your capacity to appreciate that with which you come in contact in future travels. All about you are the marvels that God put here and in addition the work of mankin' thru generations, much of this being in the form of antiquities, the preservation of which depends largely upon the generations now living."

Many of the North American pyramids were constructed of earth and mud, he said, although the Yucatan pyramids were made of stone.

## Aged Coke County Hermit Is Found Dead by Neighbor

ROBERT LEE, March 6.—Mark Key, a recluse in the Edith neighborhood, was found dead in his hut recently by Wade Ackleson, a neighbor. Mr. Key had been dead for several days. The coroner, A. J. Taylor, pronounced the death due to natural causes.

The coroner said that he judged Key had been dead since Saturday. Three fresh eggs were found on his bed when Mr. Ackleson found him, and a hen was on the bed apparently laying another. Mice had eaten the flesh from a part of the fingers on one hand.

Key was a hermit who was known of by many people in Coke County, but seen only by a very few. At Robert Lee it is said he has been to town only twice in the thirty-odd years he has lived in this county.

## ARREST RICHMAN IN BRIBRY CASE

Former Army Officer Arrested in Dallas on Request of Authorities District Columbia.

### WAS WARE BRIBE CASE

Richman Convicted Accepting Bribe Automotive Concern Dealing With Government—Appealed.

DALLAS, Texas, March 6.—A former army officer who federal authorities declare is Charles A. Richman, under 18 months sentence from the District of Columbia on charges of accepting a bribe, was arrested here today.

Richman, a former captain in the quartermaster corps, was sentenced two years ago upon conviction of accepting a bribe from an automotive concern which sold vehicles to the government officers said.

Richman appealed his case to the United States Supreme Court, the latter tribunal affirming his conviction March 3. Richman failed to appear and warrants were issued for his arrest.

## PAVING HEARING HELD THURSDAY

City Commission Listens to Interested Property Owners Concerning First Street.

### BRADFORD MAKES OFFER

Would Cut Off Corner of Property Owned by Him—Some Owners Prefer Brick Paving.

Arguments for and against the proposed paving of north and south First streets and portions of other streets affected in the latest paving contract let by the city were heard by the city commission at the official hearing Thursday afternoon, which was attended by over a dozen Sweetwater citizens, representatives of the Orient railroad, West Texas Construction Co., officials and officials of the Elrod Engineering Co., city engineers. At the conclusion of the session which continued over two hours, the city commission announced that all protests, suggestions and propositions would be taken under advisement and continued until Thursday, March 12.

The hearing was based on a contract placed with the West Texas Construction Co., holders of contracts for various other paving projects here paving on North First street from Lamar to Musgrove; South First st., from Orange to Musgrove, and Crane street from Second to First. The contract for this project is the result of an agreement reached by the city with the Texas and Pacific railroad whereby the latter would construct a modern subway under the Musgrove street crossing, and move as many of the tracks as possible out of town, providing the streets leading to the subway were paved.

Of the many property owners present at the hearing, the sentiment of the great majority seemed to be strongly favorable to the proposed paving. City officials, Elrod engineers, and representatives of the paving company answered all questions asked in connection with type of paving, specifications and individual costs.

J. A. J. Bradford offered a proposition to the city relative to cutting off a corner of a piece of property owned by him on one of the streets to be paved, paying the city \$500 or offering an alternative of paying the city \$600 and keeping the corner property providing the city would do the paving, a proposition which was continued along with other matters brought up at the meeting.

J. H. Snell stated his approval of the streets being paved but expressed his preference for brick paving.

**PAVING HEARING THURSDAY**

sale district on South 1st street expressed desires to have the curb left off that section of paving in order to leave space for trucks to pull up to loading platforms or doors in wholesale houses along that street.

L. Favor entered a protest on the type of paving and stated his preference for brick paving.

A. J. Clarey, superintendent of the Texas division of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad, as spokes man for a group of Orient officials told of the Orient's inability to pay its assessed cost on its part of the paving project. The Orient is affected by a track running along South 1st street and is assessed to the amount of approximately \$700. As a result of the financial condition of the Orient, Mr. Clarey asked that the railroad be allowed to improve the crossings in question, individually, instead of going the route of other property owners in that district and paying the regular paving costs. This proposition was withdrawn later, however, upon indication by Mayor Joe H. Baethe and the city commission that such an arrangement would not be advisable, and it was later indicated by the Orient officials that the road would meet its obligations in connection with the paving along the track in question.

Two protests were entered against the closing of the two grade crossings just east of the subway, the Hailey and McCauley streets crossings. The proposal of the Texas and Pacific to close the crossings were protested by two property owners present, but the city commission pointed out that with the construction of the subway, there would be little use for either of the crossings. Inasmuch as the Bankhead highway will cease to cross the T-P track on Hailey street when the new road is built, but will continue on north of the tracks, there would be little travel over the Hailey street crossing, it was declared. With the closing of the two grade crossings, two more railroad hazards would be eliminated, it was pointed out, a situation on which this entire project is founded.

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

There was a time when the family knew from long experience that mother's busy day always resulted in a pot of baked beans for the family meal because it was so quickly prepared and required little attention. Some families interpret stew in the same manner.

Here are suggestions that will lend variety to the busy-day dinner and please every member of the family.

### American Pot Pie

2 lbs. meat, 1 cup celery, 2 large potatoes, 3-4 cup diced carrot, 1 onion.

### Crust for Pie

1-2 cups flour, 6 tsp. evaporated milk, 3 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt, 6 tsp. water, 2 tsp. butter.

Cook meat until tender. Cut in pieces. Make gravy of broth by adding 2 tsp. flour which has been mixed with 2 tsp. cold water. Put meat in baking dish and add vegetables which have been cooked until tender. Pour gravy over all. Cover with crust which has been rolled to 1-2 inch thickness and in which halves have been cut to allow steam to escape. Bake 30 minutes.

### Mexican Casserole

1-1-4 lbs. lean pork, 4 tbsp. pimento, 2 large onions, 1-4 cup bacon fat, 2 cups noodles, 1 tsp. salt, 1-2 cup grated American cheese, 1-2 tsp. paprika, 1 cup tomato sauce, 1-2 cup green pepper, 4 tbsp. parsley.

Cut meat into cubes. Place bacon fat in frying pan and cook meat until golden brown. Mince vegetables. Add meat, noodles, and cheese and mix well. Place in a casserole, pour tomato sauce over it and bake 1-1-4 hours in a moderate oven.

### Baked Vegetables with Ham

1 lb. ham, 6 potatoes, 2 carrots, 2 tbsp. chopped parsley, 1-2 onion, 1 cup evaporated milk, 1 cup water.

Parboil ham 20 minutes. Oil baking dish and place a layer of sliced potatoes, then carrots, onions and parsley. On this place a slice of ham. Repeat layer of carrots and onion and put layer of potatoes on top. Cover with hot evaporated milk and water. Bake in moderate oven.

### Pantry Surprise

2 cups cold flaked fish, 2 tsp. butter, 1-4 cup chopped nuts, 1-4 tsp. salt, 1-4 cup grated cheese, 1-2 cup evaporated milk, 1-2 cup buttered crumbs, 1-2 cup water.

Melt butter, blend in flour and salt and add milk and water gradually. Cook until thick in a double boiler.

Add cooked fish and reheat. Place layers of fish, salt, pepper, nuts, cheese and crumbs in an oiled baking dish and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.

### Cottage Pie

4 cups mashed potatoes, 6 tsp. evaporated milk, 1 1-2 cups cold meat, 6 tsp. water, 1-2 cup carrots, 1-2 onion.

Parboil carrots and onion for 15 minutes. Use left over fowl or roast and cut meat in 1-2-inch cubes and mix with carrots and onions. Place fresh or cold mashed potatoes into a well oiled baking dish scooping out potatoes in center so the cavity is large enough to hold the meat. Pour over the milk and water. Put remainder of potatoes on top. Bake in a moderate oven for 1-2 hour until potatoes are a golden brown.

### Stuffed Fish

Sprinkle fish with salt and fill with stuffing. Cut gashes on the sides, and put strips of salt pork in them. Place on greased baking sheet and dredge with flour, salt, and pepper. Put into baking dish with pieces of pork fat. Cook 20 minutes to the pound.

### Stuffing

1 cup mashed potatoes, 1-4 tsp. pep. per, 1 egg yolk, 1 tsp. chopped onion, 1 tsp. chopped parsley, 2 tsp. melted shortening, 1 tsp. salt or green pepper.

Mix all together in order given.

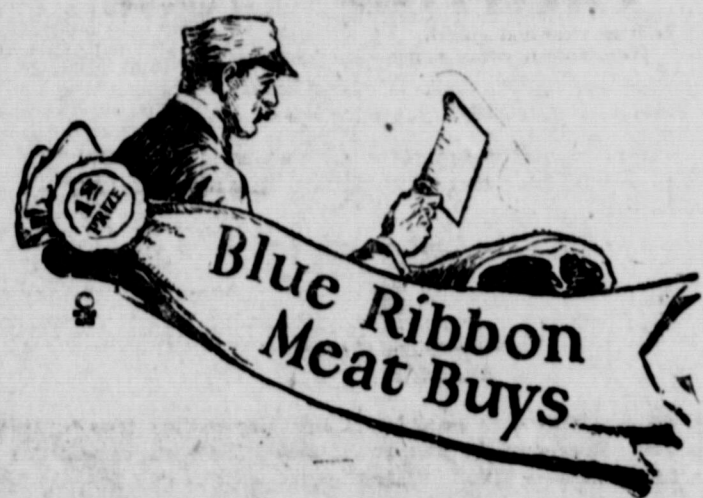

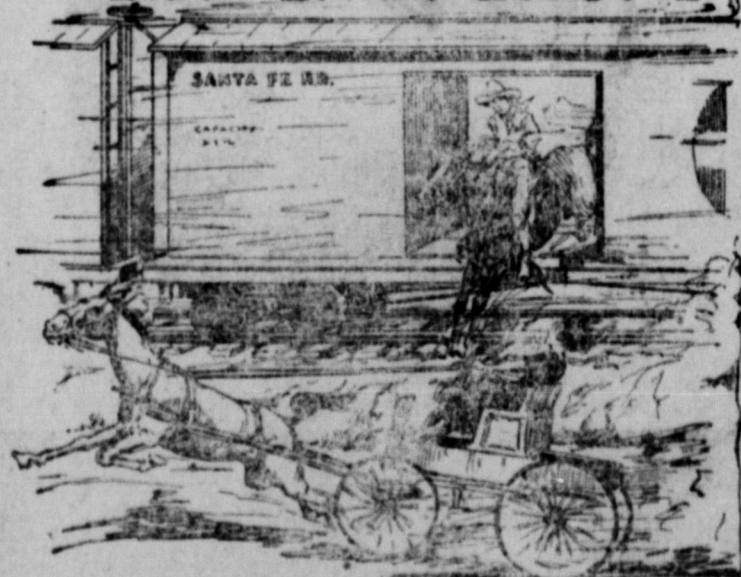

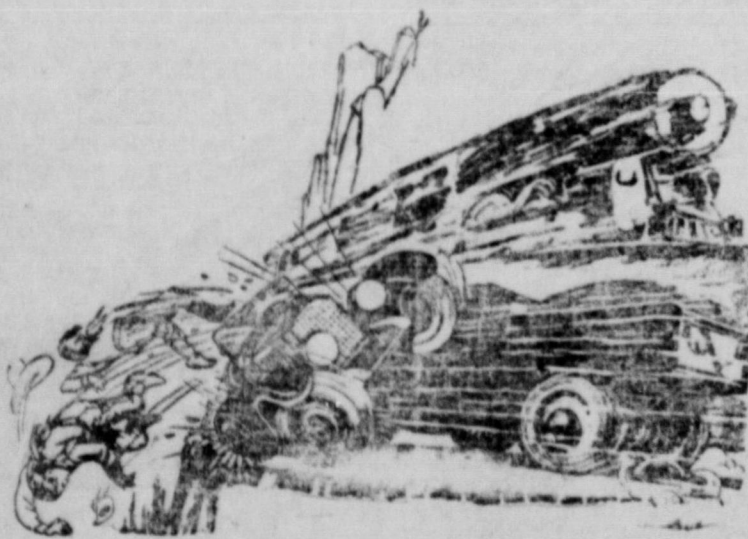
