



#### MITCHELL WINS AGAIN

Brig. Gen. Mitchell has a steadfast friend in Congressman O'Sullivan of Connecticutt, who represented the house aircraft committee in the recent anti-aircraft maneuvers at Fortress Monroe. Congressman O'Sullivan has reported to the house that the demonstrations were conclusive in that they proved first that warfare is a radically different from a series of heroic opisodes which made this republic possible; and see ondly it deovlves upon the nation's military experts to meet this chang-ed condition. The Congressman reported further that the only defense against modern enemy airplanes is a substantial air force, and he reproved the strategy board of the drmy and mavy for falling to be abreast of the times in this regard. Indeed, what the Connecticutt statesman said in criticism of the feasilized methods of the general strategy board somewhat stoned for the board's rough and discourteous treatment of General Mitchell.

"I am not concerned' 'the O'Sullivan report declared, "with the jealous rivalry, which exists, between one army corps and another; let that be settled in a game of quoits. What concerns me is-are the people of the United States protected against all kinds of military aggression? Our only defense is an adequate fleet of airplanes to meet possible enemy attacks. 
Moveable Base

Direction of the actual offense wil be in the hands of a mobile high com mand which probably will include Admiral Billard, commandant of the guard. This moveable headquarters will take up its base, now in New York, now in Jersey, again in Massa chusetts, or perhaps in the Carolinas or Florida. Like Marshal Foch, the high command intends to deal the rum forces smashing hammer-strokes gradually beating them down and breaking them up, hitting now here, now there.

The greater part of this ware-fare nationally will be toward the shoreat least within the 12-mile limit estab lished by he recent series of rum trea ties negotiated with many foreign maritime powers. Beyond this zon little can be done by the guard for the time being, but its policy in this zone will never be to let a rum runner get to shore.

Outside the12-mile limit the State Department will take up the drive. In formal notes to maritime government whose flags have been observed waving over the ramshackle and seedy looking scows that ply in the rum trade, this government will ask that they take steps to persuade their citizens from conspiring to break the laws of the United States.

"Seize Every Rum Ship!" While making this manoeuver with a smile on its face, the United States will be gripping its fist to deal another blow at the rum fleet if it fails. 

#### FOIL AUTO THIEVES

Private Identification for Every Car Is Urged-Helps Officers

A hig problem in combating automobile thieves is describing the car that is stolen and identifying the car in case it is recovered, according to officers, and in conection with this, automobile manufacturers have urged that every car owner put private marks of some sort in obscure places over the car.

The ease with which auto thieves alter engine numbers, serial numbers, and other standard identifications make it necessary for some hidden and unique mark about the car to be made by which the owner may positively identify it.

In addition, every auto owner should have written down, his highway numbers, serial number, engine number, of his car, and serial numbers of his tires. The average car owner cannot say off hand just what the license numbers are, it is stated. A record of all numbers on the car, in addition to some secret identification mark vill greatly aid authorities to trace the stolen cars and bring the thieves to justice.


