Coolidge Nominates J. B. Sargent U. S. Attorney General

Sends Name Old Personal Friend From Vermont to Eenate in Place of Charles B. Warren-Believe No Opposition.

WARREN WITHDRAWS HIS NAME

Tells Coolidge Deeply Appreciates Confi- HAVE FIRST FIRE dence But Declined to Accept Recess Appointment -- Fight Ends in Draw.

WASHINGTON, March 17 .-President Coolidge today nominated John B. Sargent, Ludlow. Vt., an old personal friend and attorney general of the state of Vermont, to be attorney general in the place of his first choice, Charles B. Warren, who was twice rejected by the Senate.

Sargent is expected to receive the approval of the Senate.

The nomination of Sargent was sent to the Senate shortly after the president had announced that Warren had declined to accept his offer of a recess appointment to the position.

Senator Curtis and Robertson, Republican and Democratic leaders, called at the White House today to inquire if the president had any further business to place before the Senate. The president replied by dispatching the ation of Sargent thus ending the bitter controversy between the White House and the Senate over the nomination of Warren.

It is expected that the Senate will adjourn tomorrow after a routine con firmation of Sargent's name.

In his letter to the president declining the recess appointment, Warren said that he deeply appreciated the president's confidence but felt that his withdrawal would prove to be a million dollar estate.
