Worst Tornado in History United States Sweeps Part Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee.

MANY THOUSAND ARE INJURED

All Relief Fecilities of Red Cross Rushed To Scene---Nation Stunned by Ghastly Tragedy Revealed in Wake Wind, Fire.

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CHICAGO, Ill. March 19 .--- Upward of 1,000 persons have perished and at least 3,000 were injured in the most disastrious cyclone that ever visited the country.

Nearly a score of populous towns have been destroyed and as many more badly damaged.

Fire followed the cyclone at many points.

The full force o fthe storm centered at Murphysboro, Ill. This town was completely leveled with the list of dead reaching staggering proportions. At noon today it was estimated that the deaths would total 400 and might go as high as 800.

School children attending classes appeared to be the greatest sufferers of the storm.

A school collapsed at West Frankfort, 88 little bodies have been removed from the debris.

At Murphysboro another school building was demolished and 200 school kiddies are dead.

At a small town known as Orient a school building was destroyed and all school children are missing.

At Gorman where the death list is estimated at 30, at least half of those killed werestudents in the school which collapsed.



BULLETS RIDDLE YOUTH'S BODY

Robertson Staggered at First Shot, Fell At Second-Two More Pumped Into Lifeless Body While Mother Screamed.

WICHITAAFALLS, March 19 .- The jury to try former Mayor Frank Collier of Wichita Falls on charges of killing his son-in-law was completed today and the first witness for the state was called to the stand.

Bob Wyndham, a special officer who stood at a distance of a few feet from Collier Then the shooting took place, described the killing of Robertson. Wyndham tetified how Collier fired four shots into the body of young Elzie Robertson,

The boy's mother also stood nearby, Wyndham testified and cried to Colliert "Don't shoot my hoy. Don't shoot him in cold blood." Then Wyndham said she screamed again: "Don't shoot him again."

As Mrs. Robertson screamed this, Collier pumped two more bul-


