Did you ever hear of the perversity of the inanimate? And just when the Reporter desired to have an edition on the street early was the time of all times that a defective roll of paper got by the mill inspectors and insinuated itself on our big Duplex press. The Duplex, being nearly human in its operation anyway, promptly suffered an acute attack of indigestion and refused to work, maintaining that such provender was entirely unsuited to its disposition. The rumors concerning this officer killed, and that member of the posse wounded, etc., were evidently in circulation in the crowd that was present at the scene of affairs, for the Reporter placed call after call in its attempt to get the facts. To add to the difficulties, it was necessary for intervening operators to relay the messages.

city and county authorities working together, not only within the confines of a county, but among the various counties as well. Another fact is that peace officers have a risky occupation. They are dealing with the rougher element of humanity continually. They never know when one of these will be the killer type like Lopez Morales, or that will become his type given any chance. Peace officers may seem to have an easy, well paid life. But the opportunity may be just around the corner when they will pay for their co-sition with their life. And it will be observed that Nolan county and Sweetwater officers were in the big middle of the Morales affair from beginning to end.

THE ST. PAUL'S MISFORTUNE

For several years the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad has been struggling along under a debt of \$765,000,000. It overcapitalized its efforts when it extended its lines to the Pacific coast. The road might have struggled through under this load that approximated a nation's "war debt" if the farmers and industries in the territory reached by it had not been hit by depression, the same that produced an indignant farm bloc and a brief term in the senate for Magnus Johnson. A receivership has been established to reorganize the road's financial structure, which means squeezing out many of the bondholders and preferred stockholders. Time was when St. Paul securities were rated as an excellent investment. It was so good that upwards of ten millions of its bonds are in the possession of insurance companies, which are neither stupid nor blind in employing the funds of their policy holders. It was another New Haven of the west much of its stock being held by individuals along its lines, for whom it was hoped to be a source of income in their old age. Every effort will be made by the receivers to protect this class of investors, but many of them will be certain to suffer. The misfortune that has come to this railroad enterprise has informed the northwest that gilt edge bonds and preferred stocks are not always able to redeem their pledge. The road took too deep a plunge into the pool of debt, misjudged its earning capacity, and the near ruin of industry and business in the district it serves, along with competition from

the Panama canal, completed the disaster. When insurance companies can go wrong in their guess as to the worth of an investment, as many have done in the case of the St. Paul, the individual with a few hundreds or thousands to put into securities surely has need of both caution and good counsel.

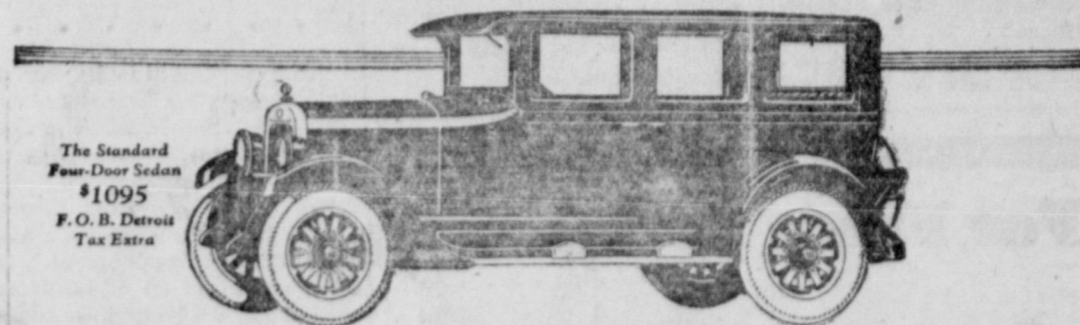

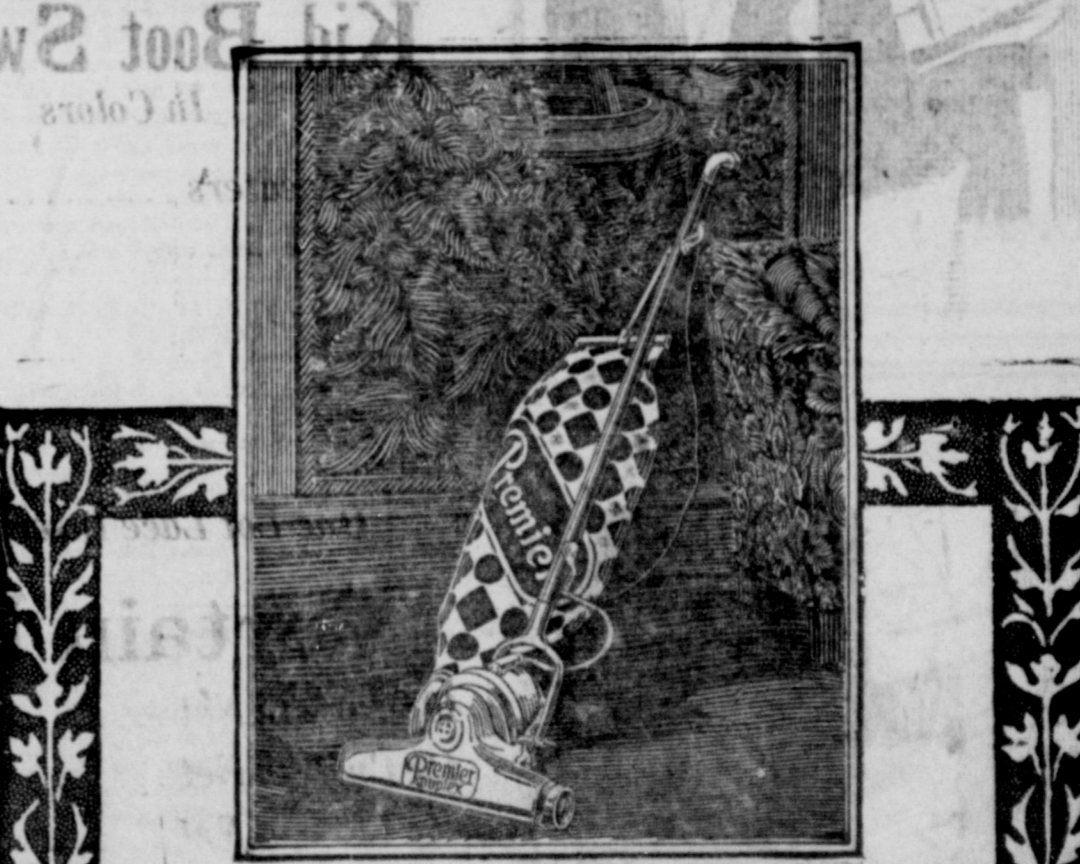

THE MARKET PAGE

Apple Pudding (Steamed)
 2 c. flour 1 tsp. butter
 3 level tsp. 2-3 c. milk
 Baking Powder 3 or 4 apples,
 1-2 level tsp. salt cut in slices
 Mix flour, baking powder and salt together and sift twice. Work in butter with tips of fingers and add milk. Line bottom and sides of a well buttered mold with sugar, 1-4 teaspoon salt and 1-4 teaspoon nutmeg, mixed. Steam one hour and twenty minutes. Serve with cream sauce.

MENUS

Italian cooking is really very simple, although often composed of many ingredients some of which are quite unknown in the average American kitchen but the majority of which are such as we use every day. There is, however, this difference—the simplest Italian dinner is usually properly balanced and made up of those foods which supply the greatest nourishment for the least cost.
 The diet of the average Italian is rich in carbohydrates in the form of flour pastes or cornmeal, ample in the amount of protein as they eat much cheese but sometimes very little meat and has an abundance of oil to supply the fat content.
 Italians also know the value of the health-giving green vegetables, and salads are practically never omitted from luncheon or dinner. A trip thru the Italian section of the city will usually discover a large supply and variety of green vegetables at a low price even when there is a scarcity elsewhere.
 What do Italians eat in this, their adopted home? Below Roman spaghetti and the other pastes hold sway, above Rome rice takes their place and French influence is felt in the cooking. In a land where sugar is a luxury and salt a scarcity, preserves figure but little cheese, bread and fruits, generally forming the desserts.
 There would seem but little to export from the mother country for the use of the Italians living here, yet, in looking about in the most modern of Italian grocery shops, countless unfamiliar labels greet the eye, staring back from the shelves filled with odd-shaped bottles, cans, packages, and boxes of various sizes.
 You will see in these shops festoons of large dried mushrooms, ropes of garlic and a long row of which there are twenty kinds represented. Italian bacon is stuffed with sweet peppers before smoking, then rolled. The circular slices are well seasoned and spiced through and through and are very firm and delicately flavored. The plain bacon is left in pieces and has but a light smoking. Some of this comes without smoking like salt pork which is used frequently as the meat in boiled vegetable soup or chowder.
 The Italian pastes include the long stick package of spaghetti, and macaroni, several varieties of noodles, and while speaking of the pastes, we must not forget the "ravioli" which comes already stuffed ready for cooking in hot salt water and a special spaghetti sauce in cans is often used with the ravioli. The Italian oil and cheeses are also favorites everywhere.

RECIPES

Bread Pudding
 1 loaf stale bread 2 eggs
 1 qt. milk 1-2 level tsp. salt
 1-3 c. sugar 1 tsp. vanilla
 2 level tsp. Bk. Pdr. 1-4 c. butter melted
 Remove soft part from loaf and grate on coarse grater. (There should be two cups of crumbs.) Scald milk, pour over crumbs. Let stand until cool. Beat eggs thoroughly; add sugar, salt and baking powder, well mixed. Combine this mixture with the milk and crumbs; add butter and vanilla. Bake in a buttered baking dish one hour in a slow oven. Serve with Caramel Custard Sauce. Raisins may be added to the pudding if desired.

Caramel Custard Sauce.
 3-4 c. light brown butter 1 1-2 c. milk
 3 level tsp. flour 2 tsp. butter
 2 eggs
 Mix sugar and flour well. Then add well beaten egg and milk. Place over double boiler and when hot add butter. Cook until thick and creamy. Serve over the pudding, either hot or cold, as desired. One-half the amount of pudding and sauce is required for four.

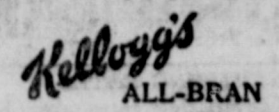
