

SLEEP NECESSARY

Physician Says at Least Seven Hours Daily Required.

NEW YORK, April 7.—(United Press)—People who sleep less than seven hours a day are "going on their nerve," for sleep not only knits up the ravelled sleeves of care, but it is an important factor in the prevention of its ravelling, according to Dr. Chester T. Brown, of Newark, N. J.

Dr. Brown, who is associate medical director of the Prudential Insurance Company, made this statement in a reply to the query, "How much sleep is necessary, and why?"

"It is a mistake to say that every adult should have eight or any other specified number of hours of sleep," he said. "The present day tendency is to under-indulge in sleep and over-indulge in eating and other pleasures. Such unbalanced judgment does not make for a healthy or efficient people. For sleep is a pleasurable pastime as well as a great healer."

LABOR BANKS ARE SWIFTLY GROWING

First Labor Bank Sponsored by Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. Makes Record Achievements

WARREN STONE, RESPONSIBLE

Former Freight Engineer, Founder of Great Organization of Chain Banks—Huge Resources

(EDITOR'S NOTE—Four years ago last November the first labor bank was opened in Cleveland, Ohio, sponsored by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The remarkable banking achievements of the Brotherhood since that time are outlined in the following article written for the United Press by Albert Coyle, editor of the Locomotive Engineers' Journal)

CLEVELAND, O., April 7.—Four years ago last November the first labor co-operative bank opened its

doors in Cleveland, sponsored by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The bank had \$51,000 in capital, contributed wholly by members of the brotherhood and the International Union itself. Many financial experts predicted early failure of the venture.

Meanwhile the B. of L. E. Co-operative National Bank of Cleveland has accumulated as much as \$23,000,000 in resources and served thousands of depositors scattered from south Mexico to northern Canada and from the Atlantic to Pacific.

In addition to the present co-operative bank, the B. of L. E. now owns or controls 10 other banking institutions and a twelfth co-operative bank is now preparing to start business in Tacoma, Washington.

This remarkable chain of banks extends from the Boston bank to the new brotherhood bank of Portland, Ore., and from four banks along the Great Lakes to the thriving institution in Birmingham, Ala.

The resources of the 10 banks now owned or controlled by the brotherhood is approximately \$145,000,000.

As auxiliaries to these banks, the Brotherhood has founded five investment companies with a total capitalization of \$19,000,000 and is heavily interested in four other affiliated investment concerns with resources of \$5,000,000.

The man responsible for this remarkable financial achievement of the B. of L. E. is Warren S. Stone, for 20 years grand chief and president of the organization. For 20 years he drove a "freight hog" on the Rock Island railroad.

Stone did not have a new vision. He knew that co-operative banking existed in Europe as early as the 14th century and that today 65,000 workers' and peasants' co-operative banks are flourishing throughout Europe and Asia. He felt that if organized labor in Europe could successfully mobilize its credit power under its own control, organized labor in America is intelligent enough to do as well if not better.

Incidentally, co-operative banking is set the only achievement in which the Engineers have pioneered. They pub-

lish the oldest officials labor magazine, dating back to 1865, which now has a circulation in excess of 32,000.

Two years later they founded the first international union insurance association, which today carries over \$200,000,000 in life, accident and disability insurance for its members, in addition to pension insurance for both members and wives.

In 1910 the Engineers erected a 14-story office building in the business section of Cleveland and its success inspired other labor unions to own their own homes. Across the street from the office building a magnificent 21-story bank building is being completed, to house the present B. of L. E. Co-operative National Bank. Four blocks distant is still another building—17 stories high—also owned by the B. of L. E. Building association. In the suburb of Nottingham, a few miles away, a two-story bank building is nearing completion to care for a branch bank the B. of L. E. operates near the New York Central Shops.

Other progressive labor unions have been quick to follow the lead of the Engineers. The Railroad Telegraphers, Railway Clerks, Railway Carmen, Brotherhood of Boilermakers, Clothing Workers and other powerful international unions have instituted their own co-operative banks.

Within half a decade cooperative labor banking has become a powerful, vigorous movement, growing more rapidly than any other form of banking activity in the world.

What will this young American giant do in the future. He doubtless will continue to grow. Consider for a minute that the total resources of the 31,000 banks in this country, according to the last report of the Comptroller of the Currency, are \$51,000,000,000. Remember further that the annual wage bill of the 26,000,000 workers and the income of the 8,250,000 farmers total in excess of \$40,000,000,000. With an increasingly large percentage of this annual wage and income going to the labor banks, it is easy to figure the future for cooperative labor banking.

JAPAN FIGHTS WHITE PLAGUE

TOKYO, April 7.—A city-wide drive against tuberculosis took place here on March 27. The Anti-Tuberculosis Society had four airplanes circle over Tokyo, dropping hand-bills, exhorting the citizens to beware of the disease which is said to be increasing each year. It is estimated 122,000 persons die annually in Japan from tuberculosis, or about 10 per cent of the total number of deaths.
