**NATURE SENDS HER BILL**

When the aged Franklin lay suffering from an infirmity caused by rich food and an easy life, he wrote an essay on "The Moral Benefits of Gout," in which occurs this colloquy: Franklin: "Eh! oh! ah! What have I done to merit these cruel sufferings?" The Gout: "Many things. You have eaten and drunk too freely, and too much indulged those legs of yours in your indolence."

An uncommon number of important personalities have passed from the stage of life in the last few months; most of them in the full vigor of apparent health. The news stories of all these deaths read as one: "He appeared to be in the best of health."

The world is rightly surprised and shocked at the death of men and women in the prime and vigor of life. Yet there is a reason. Franklin's diagnosis is true in the main: Too much food of rich variety, too much drinking of stimulants, too little exercise to work off the surplus fat and energy.

Nature exacts a penalty of those who break her laws. Nature holds a mortgage on your body and you overdraw your health account at her bank. She may loan you all you want, but be sure she will foreclose some day. Nature does not excuse a man for ignorance of her laws. She demands that he be ever at the top of condition. In his mode of life and the environment in which he lives beguile him into excesses, that is his responsibility.

These sudden and unexpected deaths that bring loss to the nation and sadness to many circles of friends; these men who drop out of the line of march in apparent full vigor of life, are straws in the wind pointing to new and insidious perils of present-day civilization.

Doctors who are battling with these diseases that creep up in the dark and strike a fatal blow have little to add to what Ben Franklin implied in his essay a century and a half ago.

Rayon, the coined trade-name for fibre-silk, not only marks the progress of American manufacturing skill in this difficult fabric, but is a milestone along the way that leads to truth in advertising.

By co-operation of the fibre-silk producers in the adoption of a distinctive name for the artificial weave demand of the Better Business Bureau of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World. No legislation was needed to prevent the substitution of fibre-silk for natural silk. The advertising clubs and the manufacturers took the law in their own hands and

produced the new name that conforms to the new code of ethics in salesmanship.

Rayon can stand on its own merits. Its price is less than a third of that of worm silk. Its production quantity was ten million more pounds in 1924 than the production of the natural silk. In fact the latter industry has remained stationary for many years. Refinements in the weaving and wearing qualities of Rayon threaten the silk-worm industry of the Old World.

But the point we have in mind is the sensible setting up of a standard of truth in the advertising and sale of a product that is so like the costlier fabric it displaces as to dupe the average buyer. This is good sense and better business, and a credit to the national association that brought about the change in the name and the cause of honesty.

**Chicken Patties**  
2 t. butter  
2 t. flour  
1-2 t. salt  
few grains cayenne pepper  
1 cup chicken stock  
1 cup cold diced chicken

Melt butter in saucepan; stir in flour; add chicken stock; season and bring to a boil; add chicken and cook slowly 5 minutes. Fill patty shells and serve at once.  
**Patty Shells**  
2 c. flour  
1-2 t. salt  
ice water  
2 t. baking powder  
4 t. shortening  
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add shortening and rub in very lightly with tips of fingers; add very slowly enough water to make stiff dough. Roll out thin; cut into circles and form on the outside of patty tins or muffin tins; bake in hot oven open side down until light brown; remove carefully from tins and return shells to oven and bake 5 minutes open side up.

**Fish Chowder**  
2 or 3 slices salt pork  
8 lbs. fresh fish  
6 medium sized potatoes  
2 qts. milk

small onion. 2 t. salt, 1-2 t. pepper. Cut pork in dice pieces; fry crisp and turn into chowder kettle. Peel and cut potatoes into pieces. Peel and chop onion fine. Put potatoes into kettle with part of onion. Cut fish into convenient pieces, and lay over potatoes; sprinkle over with rest of onion; add seasoning and enough water to come to top of fish; cover closely and cook until potatoes are soft; add milk and let it seeth up again. Pilot bread or crackers, split and soaked, may be added just before last boiling.

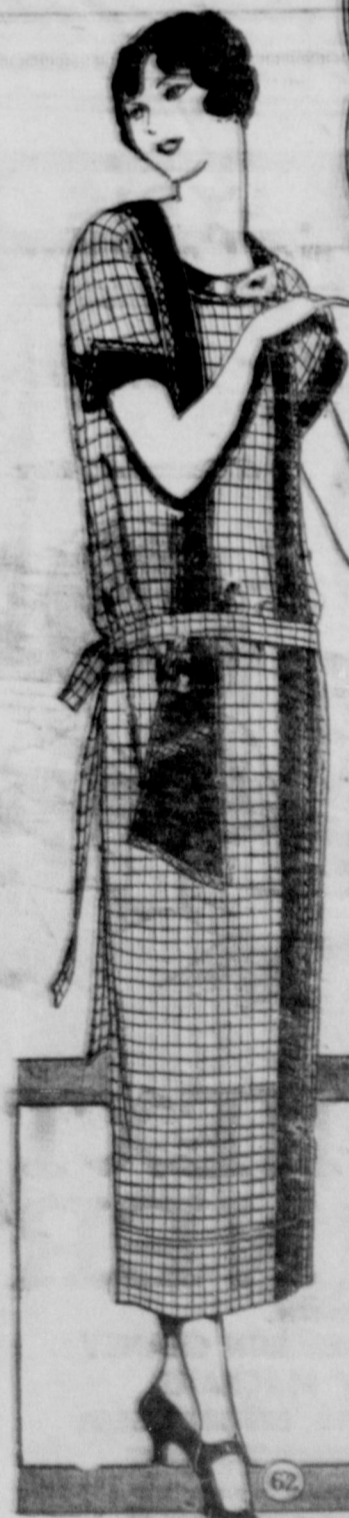

**AN ORDINANCE**  
 Be it ordained by the Commission of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, that fishing in Lake Trammell, in the future, will be permitted upon the following terms and conditions, to wit:

All persons who shall fish in said lake shall first obtain a permit to do so from the Commissioner No. 1, which permit shall be in printed form executed and signed by said Commissioner No. 1.

The following charges for such permits are hereby fixed, and shall be collected by said Commissioner No. 1, before the issuance of the same, to wit:

For resident citizens of the City of Sweetwater for one year, ten dollars; For any one residing outside the limits of the City of Sweetwater, for one year, one dollar and fifty cents.

For any one residing outside the limits of the City of Sweetwater, for one year the sum of fifteen dollars.

If such permits be issued to the head of the family, both husband and wife as well as all of the children under the age of majority, shall be permitted to fish by reason of such permit.

Permits to fish in said lake may be issued to all active members of the Fire Department of said City of Sweetwater free of any charge; and such

permits may also be furnished free of any charge to all active ministers of the gospel residing within the limits of said City of Sweetwater.

All such permits, shall before the holder thereof shall do any fishing, be exhibited to the Lake Keeper at said Lake Trammell.

Any purchaser of such permits shall when he or she shall make application therefor, state to the said commissioner No. 1 how many members there are in his or her family who have not reached their majority; and the number of members of such family shall be written in said permit.

It shall be unlawful to fish in said lake earlier than 5 o'clock a. m. or later than 9 o'clock p. m. of any day.

It shall be unlawful to fish nearer than 200 yards of the intake at said lake, and the line indicating such 200 yard limit shall be indicated by a sign erected or constructed by the City of Sweetwater under the supervision of said Commissioner No. 1.

It shall be unlawful for any one to catch more than fifteen pounds of fish in said lake in an one day, i. e. between the hours of five o'clock a. m. and nine o'clock p. m. of any one day.

It shall be unlawful for anyone to camp or hold a picnic or other social gatherings of a like nature on the water shed that throws or conveys water into said lake.

It shall be unlawful for anyone to wade, swim or seine for fish or other things in said lake.

It shall be unlawful to fish with anything else than artificial or live bait, and no artificial bait consisting of meat of any kind, nor shall grasshoppers nor worms be used in fishing in said lake.

Any such permits may be, at any time on account of violations of these regulations, cancelled by order of said Commissioner No. 1.

No pleasure boating on said lake shall be permitted, but holders of such permits may be permitted to launch their own boats on said lake for fishing purposes only;

It shall be unlawful for anyone to exporate in said lake.

Should anyone catch from said lake any Crappie less than 7 inches in length, or any Bass fish less than 11 inches in length, such fishermen shall immediately throw such fish back into the lake.

It shall be unlawful for anyone to leave any fish or turtles, or the remains or the parts of remains thereof on the water shed of said lake.

If anyone shall do any of the things herein prohibited, or fail to do any of the things herein commanded to be done, he or she shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Upon motion of Mayor Joe H. Boothe, seconded by Commissioner L. E. Musgrove, the foregoing ordinance was passed upon its first reading by a unanimous vote of the Commission on the 19th day of March, 1925.

Finally passed by a unanimous vote of the commission upon its second reading on the 2nd day of April, 1925.

Moved by Commissioner W. T. Trammell seconded by Mayor Joe H. Boothe and carried by a unanimous vote of the Commission, that the following ordinance and emergency clause thereof be passed.

**AN ORDINANCE**  
 Be it ordained by the Commission of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, that hereafter, it shall be unlawful for any one to operate or drive any tractor upon any paved street within the limits of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, if such tractor wheels or any of them

shall have thereon any lugs, spikes or other protuberances reasonably calculated to tear up or injure the paving on said street, unless the wheels of such tractor shall have securely attached thereto some metal band so attached as to not allow such lugs, spikes or other protuberances to touch the paving.

Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than has lately had some new pavement installed on some of its streets, and has contracted to have other streets newly paved at great cost to the said city and that if tractors were permitted to run or be run over or across said newly paved streets without protecting the streets from injury done by such lugs, spikes or other protuberances on the tractors wheels, such streets would be greatly damaged, creates and constitutes an emergency requiring that the rules providing for ordinances to be read at more than one meeting be suspended and requiring that this ordinance be passed as One Hundred Dollars.

The fact that the City of Sweetwater an emergency measure, and all such rules and requirements are accordingly suspended, and that this ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and shall be in force and effect immediately from and after its passage.
