MANY TO ATTEND STAMFORD MEET

Oscar McDonald Post American Legion Planning for Big Delegation to District Convention

TO ASK FOR STATE MEET

Drive to Be Launched for State Convention in Sweetwater in 1927
—Will Ask for Support

A drive to win for Sweetwater the 1927 State Convention of the American Legion will, in all probability, be launched by the Oscar McDonald Post of Nolan County at the Convention of the American Legion of the 17th District at Stamford Sunday, according to reports from various officials of the local post who were today completing plans for a record attendance from this city at the Stamford meeting.

It will not be surprising if the local post formally announces its intentions of going after the big State Convention from the floor of the Stamford Convention, and asking the support of the 17th District Sunday for landing the affair, it was indicated by officers of the local post. The convention goes this year to Fort Worth from Brownwood, and a number of cities are in the running for the 1926 convention. Sweetwater's aim will be to draw the convention here for 1927, it was stated.

Present plans are that half a hundred Legionnaires and members of the Legion Auxiliary will attend the Stamford convention Sunday. Over a score of cars have been pledged to make the 60 mile trip, and roads are reported to be in excellent condition. The automobile train of ex-soldiers and Auxiliary members will leave here early Sunday morning. Those who make the trip will meet at the west side of the square not later than 7 o'clock, Post Commander Roy Seuld day stated. Every Legion member in the county is urged to go with the delegation to Stamford and space in the pledged automobiles will be provided for every ex-soldier who wishes to attend the convention. Legionnaires who wish to make the trip are requested to report to Commander Seuld day or vice commander Robertson before Saturday night.

The Sweetwater Saxophone band will make the trip with the Nolan County delegation, it was announced Friday, and will appear on the morning program at a Stamford church, where union services will be held. The band will play another program in a Stamford hotel lobby later in the day Sunday. The union services at the church will be featured by Addresses by Alvin Owsley former National Commander, Mark McGee State Commander, and Adjutant General of Texas, and Mrs. W. M. Armstrong, State President of the Legion Auxiliary, according to advance programs from Stamford sent to Legion officials.

A luncheon for all visiting Legionnaire, their wives, and the Legion Auxiliary will be held at noon Sunday in a Stamford hotel, followed by the business session of the convention at the Alceve theater. E. P. Maxwell, Breckenridge, District Commander, will preside at the business session.

DUNN BROTHERS GUILTY MURDER

Jury Returns Verdict Against Men Charged With Killing Deputy Sheriff and Pro-Law Officer

TO TRY THIRD BROTHER

Another Member Dunn Family To Court Soon On Same Indictment—Officers Killed in Raid

LAKE CHARLES, La. April 17.—Robert and Byron Dunn, brothers charged with murder of deputy sheriff Sam E. Duhon of this city and prohibition agent W. E. Collins of Shreveport were found guilty by a jury late today. The officers are alleged to have been shot down while reading a search warrant to the Dunn brothers on the night of March 6. The bodies were found 24 hours after the killing in an abandoned automobile in a nearby cemetery.

Another Dunn brother remains to be tried on the same charges.

SUE BETHLEHEM STEEL COMPANY

United States Government Files Suit for \$15,000,000 For Alleged War Over Payments

FOR WORK ON SHIPS

Steel Company Suing Government for \$9,000,000 Alleged to Be Still Owing It Since War.

PHILADELPHIA, April 17.—The Government today sued the Bethlehem Steel Corporation for return of 15 million dollars which it is claimed was over paid on construction contracts during the war.

The work was on ship construction, and four subsidiaries of the corporation were named in the action.

File Counter Charge

NEW YORK, April 17.—The Bethlehem Steel Corporation filed a bill of particulars in a suit for nine million dollars against the United States government, this amount being still due the corporation declared, on ship construction done for the government during the war.

Preliminary action in this suit has already been taken so the Government suit filed at Philadelphia against the corporation is regarded by Bethlehem officials here as in the nature of a counter claim.

MINERAL WELLS READY FOR RALLY

Expect Huge Delegation of Sweetwater Boosters At West Texas C. of C. Convention

MC CURDY AND GEER RETURN

Report Excellent Camping Facilities At Mineral Wells—To Plan Fight for 1925 Convention

J. A. McCurdy, secretary of the Board of City Development, and L. J. Geer returned late Thursday from Mineral Wells where they went in connection with arranging for Sweetwater proposed big delegation to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention May 4, 5, 6, and reported that the convention city was ready to take care of the huge crowd of visitors from this city.

Mineral Wells has excellent camping facilities, McCurdy reported, and will be able to take care of the big automobile train of Sweetwater boosters if the delegation from here decides to make the trip that way.

Four tourist parks are available for camping, it was stated, each equipped with running water, electric lights, natural gas and gas stoves, with indications that this convention will be the greatest "camping convention" ever seen during the history of the big West Texas get-togethers.

McCurdy and Geer inspected the assigned headquarters of the Sweetwater delegation and stated that its location was very satisfactory.

TERROR REIGNS

At Least 145 Are Dead and 200 Injured From Explosion—Attempt Made Recently to Kill King

VIENNA, April 17.—Continuing their campaign of terrorism, enemies of the Bulgarian government assassinated the Superintendent of Prisons in the main street of Sofia today.

Latest accounts of the bomb outrage in the Sofia cathedral yesterday place the dead, which included 6 generals and a score of officers, at 145, with at least 200 injuries.

An attempt was made to assassinate King Boris recently.

BLAZE DAMAGES TRUANT CRUISER HOME KLAN HEAD OF SKY IS SAFE

State Fire Marshal's Investigating Origin of Blaze in Stephenson Residence.

FIND OIL AND GASOLINE

House Saturated With Combustibles—Stephenson Under Indictment For Assault On Girl

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. April 17.—The state fire marshal's office was requested by police today to investigate the mysterious blaze which did heavy damage to the home of D. C. Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Indiana Ku Klux Klan, during the night.

John O'Brien, fire chief, declared positively the blaze was of incendiary origin. Twenty-nine gallons of a mixture of gasoline and kerosene were found in the house, O'Brien said, and the gas jets were open but were not lighted when firemen arrived.

Stephenson, who is under indictment alleging that he kidnaped and assaulted Miss Madge Oberholzer, has not lived in the house for several weeks.

GET TERM IN PEN

Cincinnati Policeman Must Serve Time in Federal Penitentiary At Atlanta For Bootlegging

CINCINNATI, April 17.—Brushing aside appeals for new trials, Federal Judge Smith Hickenlooper today passed sentence on three Cincinnati policemen convicted of bootlegging.

Fred I. Bullerick and James Hayes were given 18 months in prison and fined \$2,000. Robert Kinney was sentenced to serve one year and one day and fined \$1,000. The terms are to be served in Atlanta Federal Penitentiary.

Nine additional policemen indicted in the Federal graft probe here come to trial Monday on similar charges. Most of the 71 policemen and dry agents named in the original indictments, however, have pleaded guilty. They will be sentenced following the trial of the remaining nine defendants.

NAME TRAMMELL FOR SPEED COP

Street Commissioner Made Superintendent of Parks and Traffic At Commission Meeting.

COMMISSION DEFERS PAVING

Petitions From Elm and Crane Deferred Until Later Meeting—Extend Water Line Sewerage

An active business session featured the first meeting of the new Sweetwater city commission Thursday afternoon although several important matters, including the passing on petitions for paving from property owners on Elm and Crane streets, were deferred for later meetings.

The petition filed by Elm Street residents recently, was read. It asked for paving on that street from 3rd st. north to be paved 50 feet wide from 2nd to 5th streets, and 30 feet wide the remainder of its length to the city lake. Over a score of property owners' signatures were affixed to the petition. A similar petition signed by about 20 Crane street property owners asking for paving on that street, was also read. Action on both was deferred until a later date upon the recommendation of Mayor John J. Ford.

An engineer of the West Texas Construction Co. offered a resolution of the completed paving on Pine Street and asked that a date be set for formal acceptance of the street. This matter was deferred until a later meeting.

A petition of residents living in the southwest part of town asking that a new water main be laid through that section, was read and approved, and the commission voted unanimously to lay the water line. It was declared by property owners that there was no water pressure during parts of the day when the pumps are running.

Upon suggestion of Mansie Woods, who attended the session, a raise in salary was given Walter Trammell, street commissioner, and the new duties of speed officer, and park superintendent were assigned him. In addition to his duties as street commissioner, Mr. Trammell will aid the police department in cutting down speeding and racing on city streets and will oversee the city park and improvements of same.

The Water Commissioner, Len Musgrave, was instructed to obtain plans and specifications for a sewerage disposal plant in view of having a new one constructed.

Several applications for positions as overseer of the tourist park and city lake have been filed, but they were not discussed at the meeting.

OVERSELLIN WHEAT

It will interest the farmers of America to know the extent to which gentlemen who could not tell a wheat field from a potato patch are dealing in wheat in the Chicago market. Sales of wheat for future delivery amount to 2,395,000 bushels on the Chicago board of trade in March, the largest of any month for which records are available. It is said that "one fact concerning wheat is that all the trading in recent weeks has caused so much speculation." The U. S. department has just estimated that the remaining stock of the 1924 wheat supply in the country is only 259,000,000 bushels with a total production of only 372,000,000 bushels of wheat of all varieties for last year. When these figures are contrasted with the more than two billion bushels extracted to sell the country can understand where the farmers who get their headlines with which to make howling sermons of their political followers.

AUTOMOBILES

What can't be blamed on the war is blamed on the automobile. The divorce evil, the crookedness of public officials, the looseness of the younger generation, the high price of tobacco, but the automobile is a curse of these things, if you will believe the amateur philosophers, have a definite and logical connection with the popularity of motor transportation. In a thousand little harness shops, disgruntled saddlers sit in an atmosphere conducive to concentrated thought and conjure up new ways of blaming one thing and another on the sedan, coupe, and puddle-jumper. The devil may be given his dues, but but the automobile is a curse of humanity, and a kind word in its behalf is a sedition as a true word in wartime.

The fact is that the automobile has done us a great deal of kindness aside from its beneficence of speed and convenience and its optimistic effect on the rubber industry.

It has given us at least one important thing—an opportunity for privacy. Any civilization may be judged finally by the amount of that rare social commodity. As long as solitary tactics prospects on the streets and vendors of patent furniture polish meet their blusher between the door and the jamb of the home, it does not matter whether you can listen to a Los Angeles Hotel orchestra by turning a hand rubber dial.

The automobile, of course, hasn't stopped this sort of barbarism. But it has made it possible for a man to ride to work in physical and mental comfort. Men will get along with each other a great deal better once they aren't forced into such violent contact in public conveyances. Any man who can ride to or from work packed in with a hundred other fretful individuals in a bus that is desirous to hold thirty without being ruined for the rest of the day isn't capable of doing good work in the first place. A certain amount of sensibility is necessary to any craftsmanship.

The greatest lovers of humanity retired into the high places for solitude before they did their heavy work. Moses didn't take an interurban excursion between Dan and Beersheba before announcing the laws. Zarathustra didn't get his ideas riding on a bus. The gentleness and gentility of Jesus did not spare Him the necessity of going into the Mount of Olives.

There is nothing snobbish or unfraternal in the desire for privacy. Anybody who has studied psychology at all—in a book or in its raw material—knows what happens to people when they become members of a crowd.

The automobile has carried this opportunity for privacy beyond the mere

convenience of making it possible for one to ride to and from the day's work in corporeal and spiritual comfort. Time was when every man's social contacts were limited to this neighborhood and his friends were based entirely on the accident of location. Now he can go far to join a kindred spirit. This is not cheating anybody. It's merely giving everybody a better chance to chum with people he really likes.

You may have noticed that the moth er-in-law gag is growing stale. It is losing truth and popularity in proportion with the increase in the use of automobiles.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

HOT BREADS FOR SPRING
 The majority of home-making women who are looking for suggestions of what to serve and hints as to "how to do it" quicker and better have one or more favorite recipes of the family's that they prepare on special occasions.

Visiting the various tea rooms and reading articles and advertisements in the National magazines, give many ideas, but a greater inspiration is to awake on a bright morning with the sun pouring in the windows. It isn't hard to go out into the kitchen and light the oven immediately and quickly mix up and bake a pan of hot muffins; put the coffee in the percolator, get the eggs out to poach or boil and have the table set and ready by the time the family is in the dining room ready for breakfast.

The morning is the best time to do the day's baking, and especially Monday, to restock on baked goods. After breakfast things are out of the way and plans are made for lunch and dinner, perhaps a trip to the grocer and thus are ready to bake a cake, cookies or doughnuts, perhaps a pan of coffee cake or buttered rolls for tomorrow morning.

Nut and fruit breads are a welcome change and are especially good for lunch and even for afternoon serving. Baked brown bread in place of the three hour steamed bread is also popular and delicious with either the canned or home baked beans.

Hot Cross Buns
 2 lbs. flour, 1-2 tsp. cinnamon, 1-2 lb. sugar, 1-2 tsp. nutmeg, 1-2 tsp. salt, 1 yeast cake, 1 lb. currants (carefully washed and picked over.)
 1-2 lb. melted butter, milk.
 Mix the flour with the sugar, salt, currants, cinnamon and nutmeg. Make a hole in the center and pour in a pint of warm milk, in which a yeast cake has been dissolved. Beat well, then set before the fire in a warm corner until the leaven begins to work. Then add the half-pound of melted butter and enough more milk to make the batter soft. Dust with flour and let rise a half hour. Then shape the dough into the buns, lay them apart on a buttered pan and let rise for half hour. Press a cross mould on each and bake in a quick oven fifteen or twenty minutes. Dust with powdered sugar.

 1 cup well cooked rice
 1-8 teaspoon salt

Mix ingredients thoroughly, adding enough flour to make a medium batter. Bake the same as any griddle cakes.

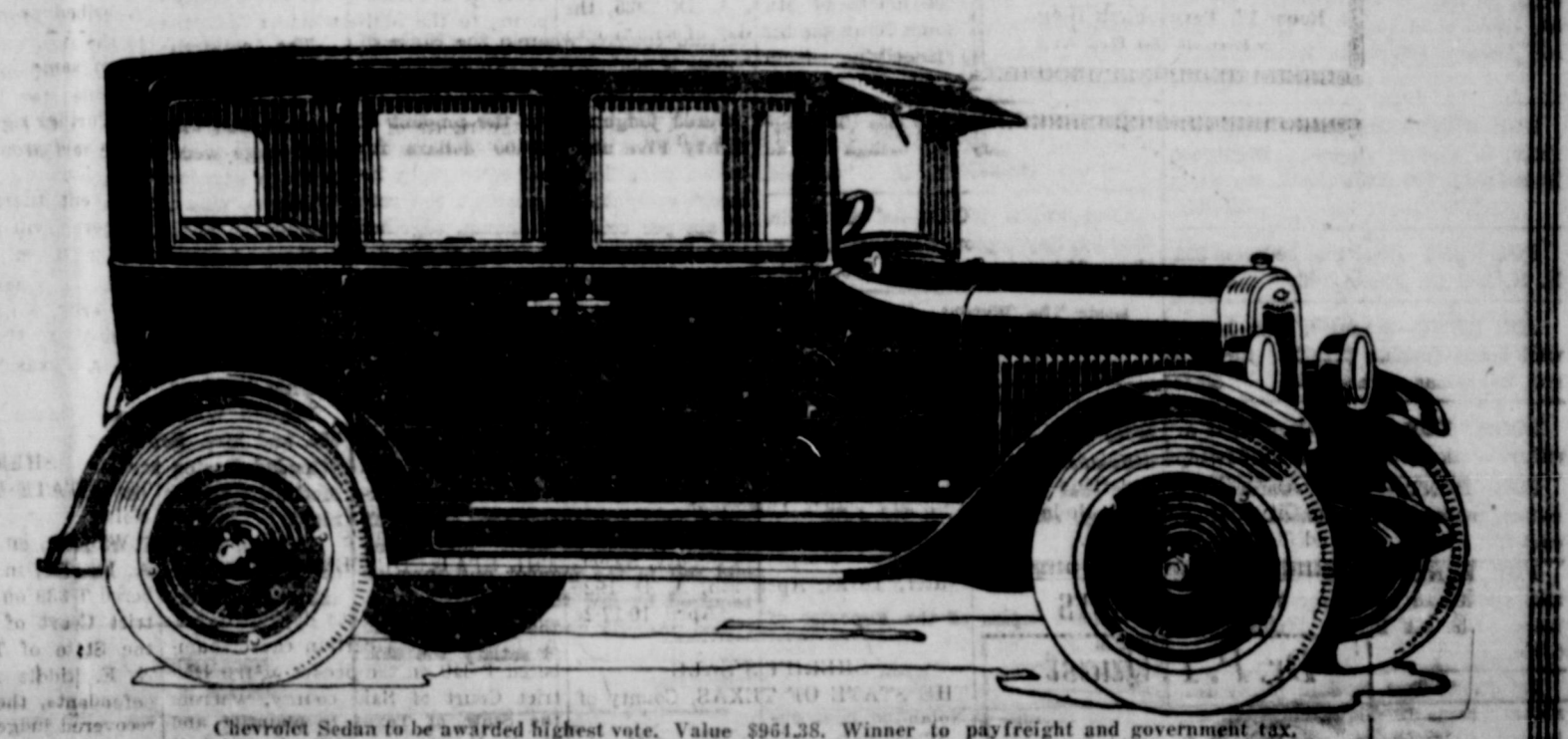
