By Special Correspondent. INADALE, Tex, April 20.-Inadeal the new West Texas city, is located on the R. S. and P. Railroad, and on State Highway No. 7, 21 miles west of Sweetwater. When Inadale gets on the map, it may be located at a point 21 miles from four county seats, Sweetwater, Colorado, Snyder and Roby, and 11 miles from the towns of Roscoe, Loraine, Hermleigh and Hob-

It is in the southeast corner of Scurry county about one mile of the corners of Scurry, Fisher, Mitchell and Nolan counties

Inadale came into being in a small way, but has a very promising future. Three years ago the late M. D. Cranfill, pioneer of the gin business at Roscoe and Lorraine, first saw the need of a gin in this neighborhood. FURIOUS STORM SCOURGES EAST

Rain, Hail, Sleet, Snow and Cyclones Feature Sunday Weather Over Midwest and Eastern States

PROPERTY DAMAGE HEAVY

Several Persons Killed and Many Injured In Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York.

By United Press.

NEW YORK, April 20.—Spring storm ranging from small squalls to cyclones swept New England, West Virginia, Ohio, Illinois and Pennsylvania Sunday causing deaths and injuries to scores of persons and property damage aggregating millions of dollars.

Two persons were killed and damage estimated at \$500,000 was caused by a storm at Peoria, Ill. Considerable loss also was suffered at Pekin, across the river.


