NIGHT AIRMAIL Flight to North TO START JUNE

"Path of Light" Between Chicago and New York Is At Last Completed.

HAVE STRUCK VARIOUS DELAYS

Better Service Between Two Largest American Cities Will Be Provided.

WASHINGTON, April 23 .- The air mail "path of light" between Chicago and New York is at last completed. Special "local" night airmail service between these cities is scheduled to start on or before June 1.

This is the announcement of Colone Paul Henderson, second assistant postnaster general, in charge of airmail. hen postal authorities first decid ed upon the new service they planned to start it April 1. Various delays

"This special overnight service will be in addition to the regular transcontinental airmail service, in which outbound planes leave New York and San Francisco every morning at 10:00 o'clock and inbound planes arrive each evening.
"It will mean a complete 'two-a-

day, airmail contact between Americas two largest cities.

"The stretch between Chicago and New York is the most dangerous for flying on the entire transcontinental The Allegheny Mountains sof They are not as high as and Sierras, but the

"The Alleghenies are covered with trees and it is impossible for an avia-tor to land on them in an emergency. "For this reason particular care had to be exercised in constructing the Chicago New York 'path of light.' It was no easy task.

"But now the trail is dotted with powerful beacon lights, throwing their rays for miles in the air. Emergency landing fields have been built at intervals of 18 miles. No effort has been spared to make the course safe

and to expedite the deivery of mail." The airmail 'path of light' now extends from New York to Rock Springs Wyo., a distance of more than 2,000 day. The marriage came as a surmiles. DRIVE TO CLOSE SATURDAY

Damage \$2,500,000 Caused By Flames Which Destroy Over Two Mil-

Co-Operative Marketing Association Leased Elevators-Fire Believed Spuntaneous Origin.

CHICAGO, April 23-The worst elevator fire in 20 years here gutted two huge structures and destroyed over two million bushels of corn and oats at a damage estimated at over \$2,500,000.

Nearly half the fire fighting apparatus of the city was summoned in a frantic fight to stop the threatened destruction of adjacent packing plants, lumber and coal yards, as well as flimsy homes of poor families in the

During the 1924 year of operation there were 22,368 accidents as con pared with 27,497 in 1923, a reduction of 5.129. More than half of the mishaps last year and the previous year

resulted from derailments. While the Comission ascribed n reason for the huge reduction in accidents, it is generally believed that locked upadded employmnt of automatic control devices and more rigid and stringent methods of inspection are responsible
