**VON HINDENBERG NEW PRESIDENT** 

Former Field Marshal Germany New Head German Government As Result Sunday Election

MUCH RIOTING REPORTED

Berlin and Ratibor Among Cities Where Election Rows Occurred -Several Shot.

LONDON April 27-Uncertainty and some concernation has been expressed by officials and the press in Allied capitols today over the election of former Field Marshall Paul Von Hindenberg by a plurality of nearly a million votes to the presidency of the German Republic.

Gets Big Vote

By United Press. BERLIN, April 27-Field Marshall Paul von Hindenberg, Germany's World War Hero, was elected president of the Republic with 1,600,000 votes.

Von Hindenberg, once again the idol of the German people, will take the oath of office in the Reichstag Thursday or Friday.

The Communists, who, in a measure had conceded the victory have begun agitating a general strike, and protests against Von Hindenberg's election.

BERLIN, April 27.—Field Marshal Paul Von Hindenberg has been elected turn over contents of the theater safe. president of the German Republic by a pluralty of 776,000 votes, according to complete unofflicial reutrns of Sunday's balloting.

Riots are reported from Ratibor, a Prussian city of about 25,000 persons, and the woundings are reported as many, but without fatilities.


