LEGION PLANS FOR BIG FOURTH

Executive Committee in Meeting Thursday Night Outline Plans For July 4 Celebration

EXPECT 10,000 PEOPLE

Post Will Prepare for Huge Crowds—Plan Many Events and Attractions for Two Days

Preliminary plans were launched Thursday night at a meeting of the executive committee of the American Legion, for the biggest Fourth of July celebration ever held in the county and one that is expected to bring more than ten thousand people into Sweetwater for two days and nights. The plans, as far as outlined, feature two days packed with activities and attractions and the biggest barbecue ever served here.

The committee is composed of R. C. Scudday, Jess Robertson, George McKnight and R. D. Cox, and will make a report to the Oscar McDonald Post at its next regular meeting.

The program as tentatively outlined Thursday night will probably include a big, free barbecue on one day, four baseball games, balloon ascension, public speaking, fiddlers' contest, swimming contests, athletic contests, carnival, horse races, a play, and a big fire works display at night.

It is probable that the program will be changed considerably, but efforts will be made to afford as large a list of attractions as possible. The affair will be held at the City Lake Park and will continue through Friday and Saturday, July 3 and 4. The merchants will be asked to close on Friday for half a day, it was indicated.

Considerable funds will be needed to stage the two celebrations and it was stated that the merchants of the city would be asked to assist and cooperate with the Post in staging the affair.

STAMP CHANGE CONFUSED

Some P. O. Have Half Cent Stamps—Tear One In Two

NEW YORK, May 2.—Complications over the new postal rates are already arising.

The new rate requires 1-1/2 cents on third class mail matter under the weight limit, and failure of the government to supply all postoffices with the new stamps, accounts for the fact that supplies of third class matter have been received by the postoffice here bearing a one-cent stamp and half of another one.

Postal officials declared, however, that bisecting the "ones" will not be recognized hereafter.

MAYOR IS DEAD

EUROPE AT PEACE ON THIS MAY DAY

Communist Outbreak Expected Failed To Materialize—Workers Are Orderly

MANY PARADES STAGED

Employees Of Many Countries Stage Quiet Parades—Guards In Financial Center

Up until a late hour the "Communist Menace" against which practically all Europe steeled itself, failed to materialize this May day.

The presence of May 1, traditional strike day for workers, was orderly, and especially so where trouble was most feared.

Paris was quiet under the eye of watchful police who were augmented by the mobilization of thousands of troops.

Sofia passed May Day without trouble.

Spanish workers and their families picniced in the fields.

The workers staged parades in Tokio, Berlin, and Mexico City without untoward incidents of any kind disturbing the situation.

In Mexico City, the American ambassador could not use his car owing to a mandatory strike of chauffeurs.

In the United States there was little attempt to cause any disturbance in the larger cities. Certain parts of the country, including the financial district of New York, were protected by special guards.

GIRL AND CAPTOR FOUND IN A LOFT

Eleven Year Old Girl and Her Ex-Convict Kidnaper Discovered By Aid Police Dog

SAID PARENTS ABUSED

Refuses At First To Greet Her Father Had Gone Without Food and Sleep—Man Held

RANDOLPH, Va. May 1.—Haggard and worn and without food for 24 hours, little Lucile Chatterton, 11, and her alleged kidnapper, Earl Woodward, an ex-convict were brought here today by George Geri who had captured them with the aid of a German police dog at dawn in his hay loft near Brookfield and turned them over to authorities.

On arriving there, the girl told a story of parental abuse and at first refused to greet her father, Walter Chatterton. She finally yielded to his persuasion and was gathered into his arms.

Woodward refused to talk except to support the story of the girl in monosyllables. He is being held in custody.

The group of natives gathered for the home coming of Lucile were strangely stirred by the girl's story as she told of alleged abuse at home.

During the chase for the missing pair, there had been talk of "shoot to kill" but after hearing the girl's story, sympathy went the other way.

PLANES COLLIDE

Hit 50 Feet In Air And Fall to Ground—Two Student Flyers Escape Uninjured

SAN ANTONIO, May 1.—Two Brooks field airplanes collided 50 feet up in the air today and were demolished in the resulting fall.

The accident occurred at Yturri field just south of Brooks Field.

The two student flyers extricated themselves from the wreckage unharmed. They were unhurt.

MIDLAND BUILDING

Contract for New Three Story School Building Let in Abilene

MIDLAND, May 1.—Contract for the erection of a three-story school building and installation of equipment was awarded, according to David S. Castle of Abilene, architect for the structure. All contracts call for the expenditure of approximately \$135,000.

The general contract for the building was awarded to J. M. Morgan of Big Spring. J. C. Korloth and company of Sherman receiving the plumbing, heating and oil burning equipment. The electrical and program clock fixtures will be installed by J. C. Johnston Company of Dallas. The Berger Manufacturing Co. of Dallas and Abilene will install the steel lockers.

INSPECT ROUTE

BUSINESS BETTER

Encouraging Report From Eleventh District Federal Reserve

Deposit accounts at the banks were 1924. The demand for credit showed 24 per cent greater than in March, and an appreciable decline.

W. R. Lence of Kansas City, assistant to president W. T. Kemper, J. J. Lane, general traffic manager for the Orient from Wichita Falls and Superintendent A. J. Clary and W. H. Hargrove passed through Sweetwater late Thursday in the Orient motor car southbound on an inspection tour.

TO SHIP BUFFALO

Two Thousand Head Young Buffalo To Be Taken 700 Miles Thru Canada to Game Reserve

WAINWRIGHT, Ala. May 1.—Two thousand young buffalo from Wainwright will make a 700 mile trek northward this summer to the buffalo reserve on the Slave river, where they will be turned loose to mingle with the wood bison which roam that area, according to an official announcement here. Young stock at the park are already being segregated in readiness for the journey.

"Moving day" at Wainwright park will begin as soon as the grass is green in the Slave river reserve, so that the bison will find ample grazing land. The animals will be loaded on cattle trucks at Wainwright and on arrival at Edmonton will be transferred to box cars on the Alberta & Great Waterways line and carried north to the end of steel. They will be taken from the cars at Fort Mc Murray and herded on boats for a 250 mile water trip down the Slave river.

The point of disembarkation will be LaButte on the Slave river, where the buffalo will be liberated and headed direct for the northern buffalo reserve. The wood bison that have been ranging this country for years have been increasing rapidly. The Dominion government recently set aside their habitat as a wild game sanctuary.

Over population of the Wainwright herd is the reason for the decision to move the young buffalo north. The park can support 6,000 head of bison, but increases in the last two years have brought the herd close to 9,000. There is comparatively little difference between the wood bison and the buffalo. The wood bison is the Great Slave Country is believed to be the remnant of the vast Northern buffalo herd, driven into the northern wilderness when the Canadian Pacific line cut the American herd in two.

BETTY BLYTHE IS LOST IN DESERT

Film Heroine Carried Away By Bedouins After Severe Battle in Palestine Desert

ASK U. S. TO AID

Seek to Rescue Kidnapped Actress—Company Had Been Making Picture—Frenchmen Wounded

LONDON, May 1.—Betty Blythe, the film star, has been kidnapped by Bedouins in Palestine, according to a cable received here today by John Harding, her London agent. The Colonial office here, however, has had no report of the alleged attack.

Harding has applied to American authorities, and also the British, to rescue the actress. Troops have been dispatched, according to the cable, from Raifa.

The company had started making scenes in the Palestine countryside, and Betty Blythe and some of her supporting cast had gone for an automobile ride to Raifa.

According to the cable received by Harding, which was dated Thursday, a band of Nomad horsemen who roam the Palestine and Syria country, attacked the auto in which the star was riding. Two Frenchmen who were riding with Miss Blythe were wounded in severe fighting with the Bedouins before the actress was dragged from the auto and carried away into the desert.

WONT TRANSFER STATE OIL MONEY

Comptroller Terrell Refuses to Accept Deposit Warrant For University of Texas

WILL RESULT IN TEST

University Expected to Institute Mandamus Proceedings—\$96,000 Involved

AUSTIN, May 1.—The refusal today by the State Comptroller, S. H. Terrell, to accept a deposit warrant conveying \$96,000 in oil royalties collected from University of Texas oil land to be placed to the credit of the University building fund, will result in a test of the constitutionality of the act of the legislature providing for the placing of oil royalties in the available instead of the permanent fund.

The Board of Regents of the University is expected to at once institute mandamus proceedings to compel the issuance of the warrants as requested.

AFTER OLYMPIC

Amsterdam May Get Olympic Meet In 1928—Proposal May Be Submitted to Parliament

LONDON, May 1, 1925 (United Press).—After all, Amsterdam is likely to be the scene of the next Olympic Games in 1928.

Following objections raised in the Dutch Parliament to the granting of a subsidy of 1,000,000 florins and a very determined opposition by conservatives as to the advisability of holding some of the games on a Sunday, Dr. De Visser, the Minister of Education, has drawn up a memorandum which has been the means of overcoming the majority of the objections.

The subsidy proposal, Dr. De Visser states, should be limited to participation in the guarantee fund by the florin spread over four years.

The proposal should be submitted to the Parliament because, for the first time the Central Powers will be invited to send representatives and it would be wise for the government to have a voice in this world event.

None of the games should be played on Sundays, and, following the mismanagement of the finances at Paris, where the games were held last year, a Government Commissioner assisted by accountants be appointed to supervise closely the entire financial arrangements dealing with the games.

GALVESTON ASKS FOR RANGER AID

Secrecy Shadows Presence of Dozen Texas State Rangers at Water Front Today

FEAR I. W. W. TROUBLE

Rumors Current That May Day Celebration May Start Disturbance—San Antonio Worried

GALVESTON, May 1.—Secrecy shadowed the presence of a dozen rangers on the water front and about the streets of Galveston today.

Reports were current that the troops were here to quell any possible May Day disturbance in connection with a reported I. W. W. celebration. The business interests of the city was said to have asked for Ranger protection.

Police here declared that they knew nothing of a possible disturbance. The Rangers, headed by Captain Frank Hamer, were noncommittal.

POLICE EXPECT TROUBLE

SAN ANTONIO, May 1.—Local police officials and Department of Justice agents are on the alert today to check any demonstration of Communist leanings following the distribution during the night of a manifesto calling all workers to remain idle today.

The manifesto was signed by the central executive committee of the Workers' Party and was placed on the porches of many homes.

Employers report that industries were going ahead as usual and no indication was given that the manifesto was taken seriously by employees.

GOVERNOR SILENT

AUSTIN, May 1.—Both the governor and the adjutant general were silent today as to the movement of state rangers to Galveston. Neither would make any statement in response to questions asked in an effort to ascertain who had requested Rangers to be sent to the Texas port.

Adjutant General Mark McGee treated the matter lightly, saying "The Rangers may have desired to go fishing."

SALVAGE BOATS

Seven German Destroyers Taken From Waters Scapa Flow By Working Crew

LONDON, May 1.—Day by day is going on the picturesque work of salvaging the German fleet sunk off Scapa Flow.

So far seven ships—all destroyers—have been dragged to the surface. The work will go on till twenty three huge destroyers are reclaimed, and also two great dreadnaughts, the Hindenberg and the Seydlitz.

A shipwrecking company, Cox and Danks, won from the Admiralty a contract to raise these ships—if they find them and if the salvage is possible.

When the ships are raised by steel-hawsers, beached and inspected for valuables they are broken up and sold as scrap steel. The profit is said to be considerable.

The last destroyer which came out of the dep was raised in four days. It came up festooned with sea weed and a mass of barnacles. Much more difficult will be the raising of the Hindenberg and Seydlitz, weighing about 25,000 tons apiece.

"We tried to get up one of the bigger destroyers with heavy chains," said a member of the firm speaking of the extreme difficulties in the salvage operations, "but when it had been lifted eight feet from the bottom, every chain broke."

"Then we used galvanized steel wire salvage ropes, nine inches in circumference, which were equal to the job."

"Very few curiosities have been found. A cat o nine tails, with a German officer's name on it, was one of the few."

"The destroyers are what is technically known as good condition for scrap. They are cut up in steel work sizes and melted down as new steel or used otherwise. The copper and brass are also valuable."

The destroyers are in ten fathoms of water.

City Is Ready For C of C Convention

Fair Weather After Good Rains Renews Enthusiasm of Sweetwater Boosters And Brightens Prospects For Record Breaking Delegation To Mineral Wells

WANT 1927 CONVENTION

Band and Stunts to Be Used in Advertising Sweetwater and In Fighting for 1927 Convention Meeting; Local Citizens Unanimous In Urging Big Attendance

Satisfying rains, followed by fair and warmer weather today, coupled to add brightening prospects to this city's plans for invading Mineral Wells 500 strong Monday when the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention gets under way. Meantime, Sweetwater citizens and boosters have caught the convention fever and, bubbling over with pep and enthusiasm, hundreds of them will stage a demonstration in the convention city next week that doubtless will place Sweetwater before the eyes of the State and make it the talk of the big three-day show.

This was the sentiment of various committees late Friday. Men who have been active for several weeks in starting the convention-bound ball to rolling, declared today that the outlook for a successful and sensational representation at the convention was never brighter. Sweetwater, unannouncedly, has forgotten everything else to a great extent, and has its attention focused on Mineral Wells and the happenings that will be there during the first three days of next week.

The increase in enthusiasm during the latter part of this week has been remarkable, committee workers report. Additional good news came in Friday with the report that all roads to Mineral Wells were passable in spite of the heavy rains that have drenched Texas. The Bankhead highway will be in good condition for overland travelers, it was reported. With the coming of this news, and with the report that Mineral Wells is well prepared to take care of the crowd regardless of size, it is believed that many cars will be added to the Sweetwater automobile train at the last minute.

The rains and fair weather will increase the attendance 25 per cent, several convention workers said, and all indications point to a record breaking meeting.

Sweetwater's part in the three days of activities will be great, it was declared Friday. With sponsors, three bands, novelty stunts, advertising features and other attractions, it is believed that Sweetwater will attract as much if not more attention, than any single delegation there, regardless of size. Various reports from over the West Texas District indicated that all towns are looking to Sweetwater for a terrific convention drive by virtue of its campaign inaugurated at Brownwood.

It is believed that a vast majority of West Texas delegations will swing their support to Sweetwater when the battle begins for deciding the next convention place. Whether Sweetwater asks for the convention in 1926 or '27, many West Texas reports indicate that the town will realize its wishes, and emerge victors as convention winner.

The sentiment of Sweetwater as expressed by merchants, officials and men in all walks of life is "go to Mineral Wells strong and bring the convention to Sweetwater". Quoting from just a few of Sweetwater's leading citizens, as below, show that this city to a man, will doubtless extend every effort possible to be represented at the convention by a huge delegation, and make a fight for a following convention.

Mayor Endorses Trip
John J. Ford, Mayor: "The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is all right. It is a big thing. I wish we could get the convention here. I believe Sweetwater could handle it in 1927. I am sincerely sorry that I will be unable to attend the convention this year."

M. D. Willis, photographer: "I'd like to see Sweetwater made the biggest attraction at the convention."

Judge Ragland: "I can hardly say enough for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the convention. I am for the convention strong; I think the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is today doing more for Texas than anything else. My only fear is that the convention is drifting too far east."

Will Scott, county superintendent: "I think it would be a calamity if Sweetwater did not enter the convention with all the enthusiasm, pep and vigor possible. Sweetwater is the logical place for the next convention and it is up to Sweetwater people to make good that claim."

Jess Robertson, Robertson Cafe: "I think Sweetwater is going to the convention stronger this year than ever before. There is no doubt in my mind but what we can land the 1927 convention. If we land it for that year, I believe we will have a third larger crowd than any other convention ever had on account of location, completion of new highways and railroad facilities."

D. A. Clark, Insurance: "I am in favor of getting the convention and anything else that will put Sweetwater in the fore front."

B. C. Pace, Pace Brothers Grocery: "Sweetwater should go and go strong, and bring the convention here."

Zach Taylor, Sweetwater Fire Department: "This city will make a great showing at the convention and it will land the convention any year it wants it."

L. E. Musgrove, water commissioner: "I think Sweetwater ought to go to Mineral Wells and go strong. It will be the best town there, and the best town in which to have the 1927 convention."

MORE COTTON

In advocating a "More Cotton From Fewer Acres" campaign, the Reporter did not have the raising of more cotton in mind, primarily, but more efficiency from the acreage devoted to that crop, as well as more efficiency from the acres planted to foodstuffs.

It would be a sorry day for Nolan County if every available acre in the county were planted to cotton. Were that crop worth 50c the pound, and every acre produced 1,000 pounds of lint cotton, the county could not buy its necessary foodstuffs as cheaply as it could raise them.

This county has less than one-tenth of the number of hogs it should have and a proportionately less number of dairy cows. The poultry situation is improving but there is always room for more improvement.

Hence, the "More Cotton From Fewer Acres" idea. Make the same investment in land produce more cotton, and leave a comfortable surplus of turn leave a more comfortable surplus land for feed, hogs, etc. which will in of cash for the county and everybody in it.

BOY WEEK

Boy Week is being celebrated nationally this week, with various and sundry sermons and boy activities of one sort and another, including in some cities the placing of boys in charge of city governments for a day and that sort of thing. All of which is very fine. Preceptors and sponsors for the movement doubtless have in mind an idea that the enthusiasm thus created will sort of last over the other 51 weeks in the year with subsequent enhancement of the boy.

No great ripple has been aroused in Sweetwater the current week in connection with the observance. For one thing Sweetwater had paid some attention to its boys throughout the year. It has provided a skilled hand director, with one of the best boys' hands in the state to show for it. Around 50 youngsters have been learning music, discipline, and perseverance. They have been given a training that could not be duplicated not only for its own merits for pleasure but also for a possible source of livelihood in years to come.

Sweetwater took the lead in the Boy Scout work in this section and several lively troops have resulted from that phase of activity. The reins of city government have not been turned over to the boys of Sweetwater—but some day they will be. Boys who have had the mental training and discipline of these things under the leadership of men worth while, will be much more capable of handling them as they should be handled because of that fact. To say nothing of handling their own affairs more satisfactorily.

Pass the corner of Third and Oak most any time of day but especially about the time when it is customary to put on the feed bag and you will hear the shriek of skidding tires to keep from ramming somebody else. For one thing there seems to be a whale of a lot of traffic. And for another there is not much acquaintance with traffic rules and just who has the right of way as there should be. And now and again, just to make it interesting, a couple of cars will tangle up with subsequent damage of fenders, running gear and morals of drivers.

Sweetwater, however, is just beginning to get its touch of what larger cities are experiencing in the shape of traffic troubles. The first experiment was in the shape of a traffic cop stationed in the center of the intersection in an endeavor to direct traffic. This works, after a fashion, but is expensive. Red light traffic control semaphores blink their "go" and "stop" signs at street intersections in other cities with a cop stationed handily by in the office to flag down anybody who does not take the fool things seriously.

And a number of cities, who strove most strenuously to have main street highways pass through their principal business street, have found to their dismay that the ensuing stream of traffic has been more than it should be to be convenient, and instead of attracting business repelled it. Sweetwater is planning to bring the Bank head highway into this city over 2nd Street. And here is betting that it will be regretted some of these fine days, when that highway is paved throughout its length and the fact becomes generally known. And it won't be many years off either.

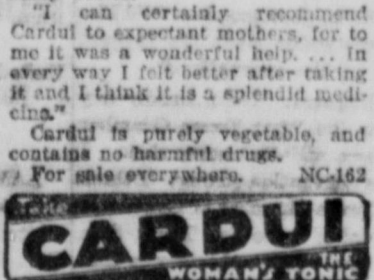

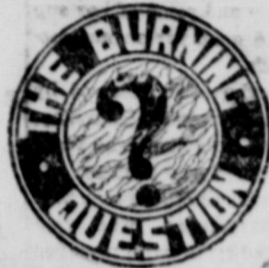

Cross-Word Puzzle Cocktail

1 cup diced grapefruit pulp, 1 cup diced orange pulp, 1-3 cup cherries, sugar, lemon juice or grape juice.

Mix orange and grapefruit pulp. Sprinkle with sugar and a little lemon juice or grape juice. Place on ice until thoroughly chilled. Have glasses chilled so that the whole when served may be very cold. At the last moment fill the glasses with the fruit mixture, garnishing with candied or Maraschino cherries.

Cross-Word Salad

Arrange thick, round slices of fresh or canned pineapple, peeled and cored on lettuce leaves. Arrange thin strips of pimento on top of pineapple to represent a flower; fill center with sliced cream of cottage cheese, sprinkle with paprika. Have, everything ice

cold and over all pour Cream Fruit Dressing.

Puzzle Pudding

2 tbs. granulated gelatine, 1-4 cup cold water, 2 cups strong boiling coffee, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 tsp. vanilla, 1 pint whipped cream.

Soak gelatine in cold water 5 minutes, add coffee and sugar, and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Let cool and just as it begins to harden fold in 1 cup of cream, stiffly beaten. Set aside several hours until firm. Serve cold with rest of the cream, whipped stiff. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

CAKE MAKING

All modern recipes call for level measurements. The rounding measure for dry ingredients is too uncertain to use with the uniform liquid measure. Use the same size cup and spoon in measuring all ingredients.

When using pure leaf lard for shortening, use one-third less than of ordinary lard. When oleomargarine is used the result will be the same as with butter, if a little salt is added to the oleomargarine and a little less is used than is called for in butter.

Too much sugar makes the crust soggy. Dry, crumbly crust is caused by too much baking powder. Crust of good cake is light golden brown, one eighth to one-fourth inch thick and tender. Proper mixing insures uniform texture.

Cakes differ in the:

- 1.—Method in which the ingredients are combined.
- 2.—Oven temperature required for baking.
- 3.—Length of time required in baking them.

Procure:

- 1.—The best ingredients are essential.
- 2.—Great care should be taken in measuring and mixing ingredients.
- Pans must be properly prepared.
- 4.—Oven heat must be regulated and cake watched during baking.

Oven test for cake:

One of the requirements of a good cook is knowledge of her oven. It is through experience only that a person becomes adept in baking in that oven. It is difficult to give any set rules for testing an oven for baking unless the ovens are of the same type and similarly used.

Heat your oven at least fifteen minutes before testing it. Then use your own method of trying it for the right heat before putting in the food to be baked.

Use regulator and baking chart if possible.
