Brisk Shower Nets Another .42 of An Inch, Bringing Total For Year to 5.86 Inches

MOISTURE FAIRLY GENERAL

Good Rain All the Way North on Orient But Lighter South- Extends West to Big Spring

Another .42 of an inch rain fell in a brisk shower that began shortly before daylight Wednesday morning and continued until 8 o'clock. The rain was fairly general in its scope, according to reports reaching here from the various railroads.

The total for the year, according to the Sweetwater Vulcanizing Co., now stands at 5.86 inches. Of this amount, 4.86 fell in April beginning in the latter part of the month.

According to the Orient railway, the rain was general all the way north and of about the same intensity as here except around Benjamin where a heavy rain was reported. The rain grew much lighter to the south and none was reported beyond Blackwell.

The rain extended at least as far east as Baird, according to the T-P offices and west to Big Springs, about the same amount of moisture being reported throughout that territory. Rain was falling Wednesday morning from Toyah to El Paso.

FIREMEN DIE IN **BLAZING BUILDING**

Cotton Warehouse Fire Results in Tragedy As Lives Six Firemen Are Snuffed Out

FOUR OTHERS INJURED

Death Comes When Walls and Roof Cave in on Eight Fire Fighters -Cause Was Unknown

ATLANTA, Ga., May 6 .- Six firemen were killed and four injured in a fire which destroyed a cotton warehouse here today. The six dead were caught inside the burning building and had no chance of escape.

The roof of the warehouse collapse snuffing out the lives of the six fire fighters, while four others were carried from the smoking ruins to hos-
