LIGHTNING BOLTS Flaming Sewers STRIKE IN TOWN

Two Bowie Street Residences Damaged in Friday Night Downpour Inmates Dazed by Shock

RAIN TOTALS 1.63 INCHES

Total For Year Here Is 8.40 Inches -Lake Trammell Not in Path of Downpour-Local

Two houses were struck by lightning and three persons had narrow escapes from death during the violent electrical and hail storm that swept over Sweetwater for a half hour late Friday.

The homes of C. C. Cooper, city engineer, and D. L. Lindsey, Texas and Pacific telegraph operator both on Bowie street, were considerably damaged when a lightning bolt struck the two residences simultaneously at about 4 o'clock Friday. Cleonnis Cooper, 8-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cooper, was within three feet of the lightning bolt which crashed through the top of the Cooper home, ranged down the side of the brick wall and entered the ground directly under a window. The girl was lying on a bed next to the window, and was slightly dazed by the blinding flash which burned out telephone and electric light wires in the house and shattered a number of electric light bulbs.

HIGH SPEED AUTO

New Racing Car Developed With Speed of 180 Miles Per By United Press.

LONDON, May 9 .- The speed de mon is forever making progress. Its latest achievement concerns the automobile world. A new racing car is being built with a cylinder capacity of 450-h. p. and an estimated speed of 180 miles an hour.

This mammoth of the speedway is being assembled for Calcolm Campbell, the well-known racing motorist, who last year lowered the world's record with a speed of 146 miles an hour. Not content with this, Malcolm is seeking new worlds to conquer.

On the test bench the engine has deeloped close on 600-h. p., but the deigners estimate that it could be tuned up to give 700-h. p. Theoretically this would give a speed of over 203 miles our. The engine has 12 cylinders ach the size of a small car engine, which are fed by three carburetors,

Experiments have been made to build a frame of immense strength. A firm of tire-makers are making tests to find the most suitable type of cover. The Westinghouse compressed-air sysem controls the brakes.




