See display at Sweetwater The coroner has told the legislature Dry Goods Co. that every competent driver of an automobile knows that his dangers are multiplied by the incompetent driver. Everyone feels that it is not what he does, but what some reckless driver in front of him, or behind him, or beside him does, that strains his nerves or wrecks his car. The good driver has his car under constant control and could handle it safely if all other drivers were good. Then the chief danger would be from the jay walker, and even the stupid or thoughtless pedestrian could be dodged in safety if all drivers were of high class, and responded wisely, promptly, and efficiently to a sudden dangerous situation. It is Cornier Wolff's argument that "any fool can drive a car, and most of them do. Almost any adolescent can drive a car, and a great many of them do. With the exception of the drivers for hire, they take no examinations and need no licenses. The result is chaotic as attested by 230 fatal tragedies in Chicago alone."

Coroner Wolf!'s purpose is to correct that situation. He would do so by requiring a strict examination and licensing of every person in the state who wishes to drive an automobile. Instead of the family car being driven promiscuously and recklessly by every member or friend of the family, it should be driven only by those who have proved their ability and judgment Every person thus driving should have the license card on his person. If found driving without it he should be subject to arrest and punishment. If found breaking any traffic law or displaying incompetence either of judgment or of mechanical ability he should lose his license or


