Horse Race Will Be Picnic Feature

Sport of Kings Added to Program of Activities For Celebration Here on July 3 and 4; Expect Many Entries.

TO CONSTRUCT RACE TRACK

Dirt Course To Be Laid Off In New Park Property; American Legion Organizes Band; Boogar Red Rodeo Ready

As a final attraction for the Sweetwater Fourth of July Celebration which is being sponsored by the American Legion Post here, the sport of kings has been added to the daily program of the jubilee and this feature will take the lead over all other events with four horse races daily making an otherwise good program, complete. Legion officials announced Saturday that all plans for this latest addition to picnic attractions were complete and that picnic crowds here on July 3 and 4 would be assured of the opportunity to witness a series of the best races probably ever held in this section of West Texas on one of the best tracks in this part of the country.

Followers of the turf from miles around will doubtless come to Sweetwater for the two days to see the eight races in which a number of famous racers have already been assured. It is believed that the horse races will be the favorite attraction of the entire celebration, and this event will at least rank with the rodeo, barbecue, and fire works display in popularity.

Four Races Daily

The program for the races for the two days include four events daily. They are the five-eighths of a mile race, the half mile, three-eighths and the quarter. Those in charge of this attraction stated that at least five entries would be required in each race, with at least three to start. It is expected, however, that considerable number over five horses will be entered in each race, as rumors are already circulating that some of the fastest racers in West Texas will be brought here to participate. It is known that horses from a radius of 150 miles are to race here. Fleet footed racers from Snyder, Haskell, Monday and other localities have practically been ascertained for the events.

Purses Total \$700

It was stated Saturday that attractive purses were being made for winning entries. Present plans call for purses totaling \$700. Prizes will be awarded entries that place from first to third. The total purse for the five-eighths, three-eighths and half is \$100 each, while a purse of \$50 will be divided among entries placing in the quarter.

The recent purchase of 50 acres additional park ground by the city assures a splendid race track, with preparations beginning at once for construction of the course. The ground will be surveyed and the track laid out this month, and a fine dirt course will be ready for the eight celebration races.

It will be impossible to construct a grandstand at the race tracks in time for the Fourth, but it was indicated that the race track would be permanent and would be constructed in the program for providing permanent County Fair buildings, and equipment, it is reported.

Other celebration attractions are being rapidly obtained. Legion officials said. At a meeting of the Legion Friday when the race events were worked out, an American Legion band was also organized. This band will be the official musical organization of the day, and will lead the grand parade.

Four Bands to Play

John Focht is manager of the band, and 28 members have so far been obtained. This will raise the total of picnic bands to four, and music for the two days is assured. The Colorado Gold Medal band, under the direction of Sam Goldman, will play for the picnic the first day, July 3. This band was the winner in contests held at Mineral Wells during the Chamber of Commerce convention. The Hermeigh band, under the direction of Claude Henderson, will be on hand for the celebration. This band was also a winner at the Mineral Wells convention.

MAID TESTIFIES IN GERM MURDER

Former Employee in Shepherd Home Says Defendant Maintained Secret Chemical Laboratory

WANTED OYSTER POISON

Owner of Oyster House Says Shepherd Wanted Secret of Obtaining Poison From Oysters

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, June 13.—William D. Shepherd on trial for the alleged murder of Billy McClintock, maintained a complete chemical laboratory in his home for many years, Enna Drexford, a former maid in the Shepherd home, testified today.

"He kept 75 to 100 bottles of medicine locked in the closet of his bedroom," Miss Drexford told the jury. "He told me not to come into that room—it was secret."

"Once I went in by mistake and he was holding a bottle over a gas flame and was laughing as the medicine bubbled. Once I caught cold and he gave me some medicine and I got deathly sick. I had to go to a hospital."

Louis Sarbars, former proprietor of an oyster house was next witness called. He told of a conversation with Shepherd "seven or eight years ago," in which Shepherd wanted to know where one found the poison in oysters. He also declared that Shepherd made the following statement:

"I am guardian of a wealthy boy and I get \$7,500 a year doing it. Some day I am going to have a barrel of money."

JAIL KKK DRAGON

Leader of Colorado Klans Ordered Jailed by Federal Judge Pending Probe by Federal Agents

DENVER, Colo., June 13.—Dr. John Galen Dooce, grand dragon of the Colorado Ku Klux Klan, was ordered confined in the county jail today by Federal Judge J. Foster Syms until he produces personal books before government agents.

The government agents are now making an investigation into his income for the past eleven years.

THREE KILLED IN CHICAGO BATTLE

Two Detectives Shot To Death and Third Fatally Wounded in Running Gun Fight

NOTORIOUS GANGSTER DEAD

Detectives Kill Cousin of Prince of Italian Feudists—One Gangster Captured

CHICAGO, June 13.—Two detectives and one gangster were killed and another detective was probably fatally wounded in a running battle in the south side here today. The battle started when two Italians in a motor car opened fire without warning on the detectives who were trailing them in another car.

The dead gangster is John Genna, cousin of Angelo Genna, Prince of Italian feudists, who was shot to death by competing beer runners recently.

The detectives were Charles Walsh and Harold Olson who died shortly after the battle. Another detective, Michial Conway, was reported dying. The other gangster was captured.

The fight followed efforts by the three Italians to evade capture.

Shortly before the clash, the three men sent a volley of bullets and shotgun slugs into another car containing several men.

A flivver squad with policemen Walsh, Olson, Sweeney and Conway, driving along another street, saw another car shoot past them. Conway, suspicious, yelled for the driver to halt. A burst of speed answered and the squad gave chase.

The gangster's car smashed into a fence as the police drove up. Conway leaped out and was met by a blast of gun fire. He collapsed, shot through the lungs, while another blast followed and Olson and Walsh slumped down, riddled.

It was three to one, but Sweeney leaped out and the gangsters separated and fled. Sweeney took after Genna, firing as he ran. Genna turned around and fired a sawed-off shotgun, but missed.

Genna leaped head first through a basement window, as Sweeney yelled for him to surrender, but Genna had gone through a door and into a back yard. Sweeney leaped to the back and was almost on top of Genna as the latter tried to scale a wall.

With an oath, Genna whirled around aimed his gun at Sweeney and pulled the trigger.

The gun was empty.

Genna hurled his gun at Sweeney but the latter sent a bullet crashing through his heart. Leaving the gangster where he had fallen, the policeman rushed out to run down the others, but another police squad had taken their trail and shot them down.

So far police have not been able to find out who the gangsters had tried to assassinate. It is believed, however, that they sought vengeance on the man who killed Angelo Genna.

ADJUDGED INSANE

William B. Walker, Ex-Soldier Who Fought Mayor, Adjudged a Lunatic by Jury Friday

William B. Walker, the alleged attacker of Mayor John J. Ford in the Mayor's office last week, was adjudged insane by a jury in County Court Friday and will be removed from the Nolan county jail to the insane asylum shortly.

Walker, who is an ex-service man, has been held in custody following the fight, and it was reported that his trial for lunacy was favored by relatives. Walker was placed on the stand for a short time during the trial.

It is reported that his compensation application was turned down by the Government some time ago, and he has since attempted to obtain financial support from both the county and city.

The fees for jury service, at the request of each member of the jury, was given to Walker's wife.

BIG CROWD HEARS MASONIC BAND

A large Saturday afternoon crowd heard the open air concert by the 28-piece Masonic Home band of Fort Worth at the court house here from 8 to 9 o'clock Saturday evening, the concert completing a two-week tour of the band over Texas.

The band, which is made up of boys of the Masonic Home and School gave a splendid program of varied selections, and the neatly uniformed musicians showed unusual ability and knowledge of their respective instruments.

The band, and Masons who are accompanying the party, were brought to Sweetwater shortly after 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon from Roscoe where they gave a concert from 3 to 4 o'clock. The boys were guests in the homes of various Sweetwater Masons over Saturday night. They will leave this morning at 10:30 over the Texas & Pacific for Fort Worth.

WHIP PRISONERS

Houston Attorney Receives Letter Charging Wholesale Floggings at Ferguson Prison Farm

OIL PROMOTER JAILED

San E. Davis, Sentenced to 5 Years Federal Prison, Is Surrendered

TEXARKANA, June 13.—Sam E. Davis, sentenced to five years in Leavenworth penitentiary a year ago for fraudulent promotion schemes in the El Dorado oil fields, was held in jail here today following his surrender by bondsmen.

Davis has been at liberty under a \$20,000 bond and an appeal was submitted in Federal Court at St. Paul, June 1.

MORE INFANTILE PARALYSIS HERE

Four Additional Cases Not Reported To City Health Authorities and Not Quarantined

TOTAL IN CITY IS EIGHT

Most Dreaded of All Diseases of Children—Emphasizes Need For Clean-up Campaign

With the discovery of four additional cases of infantile paralysis existing in the city, which had not been reported to health authorities and which consequently had never been quarantined, the total now stands at eight of this, the most dreaded and feared of all diseases of children. All cases that have so far developed are on the south side of the city.

Parents are warned to keep children away from gatherings of children for a time until the possible spread of the disease has been ascertained. All parents of suspected cases are urged to get in touch with their physician or city health officer, Dr. G. Burton Fain at once.

There is a state law as well as city ordinance which provides stiff penalties for the wilful non-observance of quarantine regulations as well as the spreading of contagious disease.

And poliomyelitis or infantile paralysis is highly contagious. It attacks children only, however. During the 1916 epidemic in New York city, 27 per cent of the cases were fatal—45 per cent from 25 to 45 per cent of the sufferers were left with a permanent paralyzed leg or arm, one or both, or some other portion of the body. Epidemics or isolated cases have also appeared at various times in practically every state in the union.

Infection is conveyed through the nasal passages or mouth, nose and throat. The germs attack the spinal cord and base of the brain. The germ may be carried by a person not himself a sufferer. The first ten days or so of the disease are the most dangerous from the standpoint of contagion.

The disease usually appears suddenly in a healthy child, who becomes listless and loses appetite. Vomiting and diarrhoea are usually in evidence, such as would be the case in a stomach upset. Fever from 100 to 105 and a dull headache with an accelerated pulse are other characteristics. In from three to ten days the paralysis sets in with twitching muscles and a very sensitive skin, so sensitive that the patient is unable to bear the weight of the outer clothes.

Spraying the nose and gargling the throat with a normal saline solution made by putting a tablespoonful of salt in a pint and a half of water and then boiling it down to one pint, is the preventative recommended. No serum has yet been devised for the prevention or treatment.

No additional cases of smallpox have been reported since that of Mrs. McKain at 209 Orange street which was attended by Dr. A. H. Fortner.

Additional emphasis to the city's clean-up campaign and war against flies is given by these cases, it is pointed out.

Rioting Chinese Wreck Legation

British and Japanese Consulates at Kiu Kiang Torn Down and Burned by Anti-Foreign Demonstrators

SITUATION GROWING WORSE

Chinese Foreign Office Protests To Great Britain Over Killing of Eight Chinese In Recent Rioting

SHANGHAI, June 13.—The anti-foreign spirit, bursting here and there in China, for more than a fortnight, flamed out today in the British possession, Kiu Kiang on the Yang Tse river and the wrecking of other buildings.

The mob which drove on the consulates, was inflamed with anti-British and anti-Japanese spirit. After attacking the consulates, the mob put torches to them, and then proceeded against other buildings which the rioters tore down.

In the course of the orgy, the mob attacked and injured many Japanese.

Japanese marines were put ashore after the attack had started and succeeded in restoring order.

"Kill the foreigners" were cries which greeted the 2,000 troops under Chang Liang, son of General Chang Tso Lin, when they arrived today to guard the city. Thousands were on hand to welcome them.

Chang stated his only intention was to restore order.

Threw Lye Over Wife and Child As They Slept

Physicians today said that Mrs. Cooke may not live and the child is hardly recognizable. Both are horribly burned by the caustic alkali.

Cooke is thought to have thrown the lye while they were sleeping.



Broncho Buster Is Busy

Boogar Red, rodeo king and broncho buster de luxe, has been in town for several days arranging for his four rodeo performances to be given during the celebration. The cowboy clown, Pete Jones, is building pens and preparing the park for huge crowds who are expected to witness one of the best rodeos ever seen here. Boogar declared that he was going out of the way to stage for this section of West Texas a real, old time, rodeo in which a great array of cowboys and cow girls, mean horses, pitching steers and wild mules will thrill picnic crowds. Boogar stated Saturday that he had been requested by several to give an advance performance before the picnic officially opened, and that he was planning to stage his rodeo on the night of July 2 for the benefit of Sweetwater people.

Advance Rodeo Planned

"The management has made arrangements to give a big full and complete program on Thursday night, July 2, as the rodeo grounds will be in good shape by then and plenty of wild stock on hand to give 'em the best exhibition that was ever pulled this side of Fort Worth," Boogar Red said. "There will be a lot of people here in Sweetwater that will be too busy to go to the big rodeo on July 3 and 4, and so we are going to give everyone a chance to witness the best rodeo and broncho bustin' contest ever pulled out here."

The program for the night of July 2 will begin at 8:30, Boogar Red said, and will include a bronc riding contest, steer riding, roping contest, bull dogging, boys' calf riding, trick roping and cowboy clowns. Boogar Red will give a special exhibition by riding a bad horse at the program, he said.

"This'll give all the rodeo hands a chance to limber up for the two days and nights," Boogar pointed out. "There will be over two carloads of wild stock on hand for the two days."

Prepare For Barbecue

Boogar Red will also aid in preparing the barbecue which is to be on the first day. Over 40 beeves are to be barbecued and served free to 8,000 to 10,000 people expected here the first day. Pickles, bread, side dishes and ice water will also be served with the barbecue. A barbecue pit 100 yards long will be required to cook the meat, and officials stated that in all probability, additional beeves to the 40 planned would have to be barbecued on the morning of July 3 if crowds in Sweetwater exceed the expected 10,000.

Legionnaires will send in an order shortly for several hundred dollars worth of fireworks, as an elaborate display of fire, sparks and smoke in every conceivable form, shape and design will climax the picnic late on the night of July Fourth.
