Aerial Seekers of Pole Return

Road Amundsen and Lincoln Ellsworth Return to King's Bay, Spitzbergen— Receive Messages Signed By Them.

GONE SINCE MAY 21

Started To Explore North Pole Region Via Airplane—Absence of Report Led To Rumor Expedition Had Perished.

NEW YORK, June 18.—The North American Newspaper Alliance announced today that word had been received from King's Bay, Spitzbergen that Roald Amundsen, Ellsworth, and all members of the party have returned safely from the North Pole flight.

Information that the polar explorers had returned safely was contained in a message signed by Amundsen and the members of his party. No details concerning the flight and territory covered were contained in the message.

Left May 21

Road Amundsen and Lincoln Ellsworth left King's Bay, Spitzbergen on May 21 for a flight to the North Pole and return. Their planes were without wireless equipment and the world has been without advice during their absence. In fact they had been well night given up as lost and at least one relief expedition had started out after them.

The distance from King's Bay, Spitzbergen to the North Pole and return is around 1400 miles, about the same as the round trip from Dallas to St. Louis and could have been very easily negotiated in the type of planes used by the explorers if no mishap occurred. It was understood however that Amundsen had plans of his own in connection with some exploration of the area north of Alaska. This may have delayed the expedition.

The trip was financed by the father of Lincoln Ellsworth, a wealthy eccentric American from Akron, Ohio, who died just a short time after his son started on the trip.

If the Amundsen-Ellsworth expedition succeeded in reaching the North Pole, it will be the first time that has been done by airplane and as a notable achievement in its way as the round the world trip by the American navy last year.

TWO FIRES REAP HEAVY DAMAGE

Flames Sweep Seven Buildings In
Artillery Quarters of Ft. Sill.—
\$200,000 Loss

BIG LOSS AT CLARKESVILLE

Blaze Causes \$50,000 Damage In
Texas City—Paris Fire Department
Called Out

LAWTON, Okla., June 18.—Fire that swept seven buildings in the student's quarters of the field artillery at Ft. Sill late yesterday caused more than \$200,000 property damage, it was estimated today.

Fanned by a high wind, the flames leaped from one building to another with ease for more than three quarters of an hour before fire departments coming from town, aided by hundreds of soldiers, had the blaze under control. Fifteen firemen were over come by smoke.

Phillips and Silas Brann, both of whom were arrested at the scene of the raid, are being held in jail with similar charges filed against them.

Officials stated that an examining trial for the trio would probably be held next week.

Lunch Club Endorses Legion Picnic July 3-4

Over 50 Sweetwater business and professional men left the Wright hotel at 1:30 this afternoon, following the regular luncheon of the Sweetwater club, imbued with a contagious spirit of enthusiasm over Sweetwater's annual Fourth of July celebration which is to be held two days, July 3 and 4 this year, as results of a number of unusually splendid and rousing speeches made by various Legionnaires and Sweetwater club officials.

The sentiment of the club is strong for backing the local post in putting over the great picnic which will outrank any celebration ever attempted in this section of the west, it was revealed.

Addresses by Roy Scudday, post commander, E. D. Cox and James Henry Beall of the Legion, Will Wade, president of the Sweetwater club, and D. A. Clark who reported on the annual trade trip, were features of the Thursday session of the club.

FUGITIVE SHOT DETECTIVE

Attempted Assassination of Detective
In Office Robert Crowe—Believe
Mistaken Identity

CHICAGO, June 18.—After 48 hours of a strange man hunt in the 63 miles of underground road way under and around the Loop, police today depended upon starvation to drive out the man wanted for an attempt to assassinate a detective in the office of state attorney Robert E. Crowe.

Police believe the man was after the life of Crowe and shot the detective in the belief that he was the state attorney.

More than 200 policemen, armed with revolvers, shotguns and gas bombs rode through the tunnels on an underground train, playing searchlights over every possible hiding place.

Captain of detectives John Stege believes the man, held to be Tom Acosta member of the notorious Genna gang of bootleggers, is still in the tunnel. "We'll starve him out if it takes a week," Stege said.

Water in the rock crusher at Tiffin, Texas, however, is holding up shipments of crushed stone used in the paving work. Paving officials stated that the street would not be torn up and prepared for paving until the shipment of rock is made.

As soon as the rock is shipped, work will begin on completing the paving of the street from Elm to Pine street.

Fighting Bob In Last Battle

Senator R. M. LaFollette Of Wisconsin Dies Of Heart Trouble In Washington Home After Short Illness—70 Years Old.

WAS ALWAYS AN "INSURGENT"

Many Years In Public Life Exceedingly Stormy—Ran For President As Independent—Ousted By Republican Party.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Robert Marion La Follette dies. "Fighting Bob" for 20 years United States senator from Wisconsin, staunch defender of what he believed the popular will, and independent candidate for president last year, passed on at his home here at 1:21 today.

A gradual weakening of the heart muscles induced by bronchial asthma brought the end. He was 70 years old last Sunday.

Robert Marion La Follette, considered one of the most powerful orators of his time in the United States Senate, was a storm center of personal and political controversy throughout the nation and in his home state of Wisconsin for more than quarter of a century.

"Fighting Bob" the name by which he was known to political friends and enemies alike, was a title well earned almost from the moment he stepped into the political arena when scarcely more than a boy. Facing battles such as few if any of his political contemporaries were compelled to fight, he eventually became a representative in congress, then governor of Wisconsin, and finally United States senator. He served three terms in the house, three as governor of Wisconsin, and was four times elected to the senate.

BUILDING TRACK

Race Course For Celebration Is Nearing Completion—Build Half Mile Track

The 50 acres of additional park land, recently purchased by the city, is being laid off this week for a first class race track, and the course will be ready and in good shape for races to be staged during the celebration here July 3 and 4. County Engineer John Focht and Street Commissioner Walter Trammell are in active charge of construction of the track.

The course has been surveyed by engineers, and staked out. Present plans call for establishing a half mile course. The long oval will be graded and parked, and celebration officials believe that a splendid track will be ready when the time for the races arrives.

There will be no attempts made to build a grand stand or fence in the course, it was stated. This will probably be done later in the year.

For the picnic, temporary arrangements will be made for taking care of the spectators.
