NEGROES JAILED AFTER BEER RAID

Officers Make Two Raids in Negro Sections On Eve of Emancipation Day-Five Arrested.

FIND KEG OF CHOC BEER

Beverage Found-Third Raid Within Week.

On the even of Emancipation Day, June 'Teenth, city and county officers carried out the third "choe" beer raids within the week which resulted in the confiscation of two 10-gallon kegs and two 1-quart fruit jars of alleged illegal beer, the arrest of five negroes, and doubtless the wrecking tors to observe their day of freedom in the good old-fashioned way.

Officers got into action late Thursay afternoon and swooped down on e negro settlement where colored embers of high society were already busily engaged in preparing for June 19. A raid there by county officers resulted in the discovery of a 10-gallon keg of beer, almost "ripe," and wo quart fruit jars of the beverage.

The jars were secreted in a small ouse, and the keg was found outside in a coal bin. Two negroes were jailed in connection with the raid. The negroes were J. P. Long and Frank Dawson.

The craft picked the party up in the northermost tip of Spitzbergen where they landed in a single airplane, with only a few gallons of gasoline left as they were winging their way home-

ward. Starting in two planes, one was bandoned, at the furthest north point reached, after being stuck in the ice. A rumor has reached here that the two planes became separated at one time during the northward journey. During the separation, according to the rumor, a pilot and mechanic nearly drowned. 



BILIOUSNESS

Retired Minister Tells How He Keeps in Good Form With the Assistance of Black-Draught.
