Many Battles In Wild Night Along San Antonio Roads

SAN ANTONIO, June 19.—Two men were killed in a battle with officers; officers fought a battle with two other groups of highwaymen with many believed wounded; an attempt was made to assassinate a physician returning from a professional call; a police decoy party of one man and woman was held up and robbed, and one man was arrested among the participants in one of San Antonio's wildest nights on highways near the city.

The physician returned fire, and wounded one of his attackers. Miss Wilma Thompson arrived home Thursday from Fort Worth where she has been attending school.

WILL CONTINUE CLEAN UP DRIVE

City Commission In Session Thursday Announce Trash Truck Will Start Rounds Again Monday.

Further discussion of the clean up campaign in Sweetwater was made of the Sweetwater City Commission, following a report by City Health Officer, G. Burton Fain, in connection with the removal of trash over the city.

Residents in some sections advised that the trash wagon had so far failed to call for collection of trash and rubbish. The trash truck has been behind schedule for some time, it was revealed, but it is expected to catch up, however, by the end of the week. Monday, the truck will start on its round again as it started when first put on, it having made the round the entire city since established.

Residents are advised to have their trash in containers by the rear end of their premises all next week as the trash wagon will eventually visit every section of the city during the week.

Dr. Fain reported to the city commission that the infantile paralysis situation was well in hand, with no new cases reported and only three under quarantine.

The First National Bank, the only bidder, was selected as depository. The commission passed on regular accounts and other routine business.

Important business pending, including the order for advertising for bids on two paving projects, has been held up on account of the serious illness of Roy Bardwell, water commissioner. Bardwell has been unable to attend the past two meetings of the commission.

Important matters which will be taken up upon his return include advertising for bids on paving Fourth and Elm streets, discussion of a milk ordinance, and further work toward enlarging the sewerage basin and making a survey of the city in connection with compiling data on the number of residences not connected with sewer lines.

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NEGROES JAILED AFTER BEER RAID

Officers Make Two Raids in Negro Sections On Eve of Emancipation Day—Five Arrested.

FIND KEG OF CHOC BEER

Two 10 Gallon Kegs Alleged Illegal Beverage Found—Third Raid Within Week.

On the eve of Emancipation Day, June Twelfth, city and county officers carried out the third "cho" beer raids within the week which resulted in the confiscation of two 10-gallon kegs and two 1-quart fruit jars of alleged illegal beer, the arrest of five negroes, and doubtless the wrecking of plans of various dusky celebrators to observe their day of freedom in the good old-fashioned way.

Officers got into action late Thursday afternoon and swooped down on the negro settlement where colored members of high society were already busily engaged in preparing for June 19. A raid there by county officers resulted in the discovery of a 10-gallon keg of beer, almost "ripe," and two quart fruit jars of the beverage.

The jars were secreted in a small house, and the keg was found outside in a coal bin. Two negroes were jailed in connection with the raid. The negroes were J. P. Long and Frank Dawson.

Thursday night, Sheriff Jack Yarbrough, deputy Sheriff Mark Musgrove and chief of police Gordon Hedrick searched a negro house at the Sweetwater Oil Mill and discovered another 10-gallon keg of the alleged cho beer. Three more negroes were arrested and the five are being held in the county jail pending an examining trial.

Silas Brann, who was arrested in the first beer raid on an Oak street house, and D. M. Mercer, who was arrested east of town in connection with the finding of 89 bottles of cho beer at the house, both waived examining trial in Justice Court late Thursday.

Judge I. W. Brashear set their bonds \$2,000 each. Late Friday the pair had failed to make bond. Mrs. Mercer, who was taken into custody in connection with the same raid, is held in custody on the third floor of the county jail. Her three children are with her.

Mrs. J. H. Fultz has returned from Snyder where she attended a meeting of the Snyder W. O. W. circle Tuesday evening. The drill team which she organized a short time back, put on their floor work in a most creditable manner. Fluvanna and Iris groves had representatives at the meeting. Judge Holly of Snyder gave the welcome address.

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RAIN FRIDAY AFTERNOON

A brisk shower fell in Sweetwater shortly after 2 o'clock Friday, netting .07 of an inch and appreciably cooled the atmosphere, and with cloudy skies overhead, indications were that heavier showers might follow later in the evening and night.

No rain was reported in the immediate section of Sweetwater up to 2:30 p. m., although a light shower had fallen at Lake Trammell.

CHINA IS BITTER AGAINST BRITISH

Plans Being Made By Chinese To Inaugurate Strike Against British On June 25.

SOVIET WORKERS AID.

Send 10,000 Pounds To China Strike Fund—China Government Does Not Interfere.

By the United Press. LONDON, June 19.—A Peking dispatch to the Evening News today reported that a strike against the British was being inaugurated through all China for June 25.

The same source said the Soviet workers had sent an addition of 10,000 pounds for the Chinese strike fund.

Other Peking advices said the Chinese are at present being bitterly attacking England, while the situation is said to have serious features from the fact the Chinese government is disinclined to prevent Communist propaganda.

The rupture yesterday of negotiations looking to adjustment of difficulties in Shanghai was regarded as grave.

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ARTIC IS PROUD OF POLAR HEROES

Oslo, In the Northland, Is In Gala Dress For Return of Amundsen—Ellsworth Party.

JOURNEY OF HARDSHIPS

Expedition In Frozen Wastes Has Set Backs—Abandon Plane—Quest Was Fruitless.

By United Press. OSLO, June 19.—Oslo decorated with flags today while crowds in the streets toasted Roald Amundsen and his Norwegian pilots as national heroes.

Advices here described Amundsen, Ellsworth and the four other members of the polar party as greatly fatigued and with blood-shot eyes as they arrived at King's Bay on the fishing boat Sjo Liv.

The craft picked the party up in the northernmost tip of Spitzbergen where they landed in a single airplane, with only a few gallons of gasoline left as they were winging their way home.

LA FOLLETTE

One of the most unique figures in the history of American politics is gone in the passing of R. M. LaFollette, who represented Wisconsin for so many years in the halls of congress as senator and as representative and who also served as governor of his state.

Impenetrable foe of monopolies and gifted oratorically as he is given to but few men, LaFollette could always depend upon a large popular following while he was decried as a charlatan by an even larger group.

A large percentage of the population of Wisconsin is German and it is to be presumed that LaFollette, who opposed American entry in the World war, represented his constituents in this attitude. The idea is strengthened by the continued popular support he received there. But this attitude hurt LaFollette nationally and there was a noticeable decline in his political prestige from this time.

This perhaps may have had some bearing on the "dog in the manger" tactics adopted by the Wisconsin senators in more recent years when the evenly divided strength of the republican and democratic members permitted the LaFollette "bloc" to hold the balance of power. This small group which included Brookhart, Ladd, Frazier, etc., could carry or defeat any measure they chose when the senate was divided on strictly party lines.

Members of the LaFollette "bloc" were elected on the republican ticket in their home states but they never supported the administration when it suited their attitude not to. In fact their hostility to the republican party broke out in open revolt when LaFollette ran for the presidency on an independent platform.

dependent platform. He carried Wisconsin as usual.

Such open treason could not be overlooked. When congress reconvened, the rebels were promptly read out of the party, and the choice committee chairmanships and positions due them by virtue of their seniority taken from them.

But they were strangely alive for persons supposed to be officially dead as the administration and Charles B. Warren discovered when the latter's nomination as attorney general failed of ratification.

The coming session of congress was being awaited with great curiosity in this connection. But the leader of the LaFollette "bloc" is gone and the nation will now have to rely mostly on vice president Charles D. Dawes for the senatorial fireworks.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When windows stick, rub a little floor wax along the groove in which the sash runs, and after it stands for a few minutes polish with a cloth. Also good for drawers that do not slide easily.

Apply a paste of salt and vinegar to brass and let stand for ten minutes. Then polish in the usual way.

A moistened rubber sponge is an excellent thing to use in cleaning lint, fuzz, or hair from woolen clothing.

The secret of making confectioner's sugar icing taste like a cooked icing is to always add something hot to the sugar, as hot butter, hot cream, milk or water.

A teaspoon of honey stirred into the French dressing makes a pleasing change, being especially delicious with tomatoes.

Tea will remove vegetable stains from fingers. Let tea remain for a few minutes, then wash in clear warm water.

In clamping a food chopper to an enameled kitchen table top place a piece of cloth over the enamel and under the clamp to protect enamel from cracking.
