MAINTENANCE OF HIGHWAYS URGED

This City To Be Scene of Organization First Road Maintenance Club In Texas

MAUZEY AND BURKETT CONFER

County Judge Is Aiding Highway Commissioner In Planning Association—Met Thursday

What is considered one of the most important moves ever made in Texas toward the perfection of a state wide highway maintenance campaign, and the first step ever taken in this state toward an organized and active program of maintaining improved highways in Texas, will be made in Sweetwater on August 6 and 7 when Joe Burkett, State Highway Commissioner, officials of the Highway Department, county judges, commissioners, engineers and state maintenance engineers from throughout the state will meet here for the 2-day session in which it is believed there will be formed an organization to be known as the Highway Maintenance Association of Texas.

This announcement was made Saturday by Nolan County Judge A. S. Mauzey following his return from Baird where he was in conference Thursday with highway commissioner Joe Burkett and where the plans for the meet and proposed organization were worked out.

Burkett had previously called a meeting of county judges, and others interested and connected with highway construction, for Sweetwater on the dates named, following a conference with Mauzey here some time ago. It was only at the Baird meeting, however, that Burkett told the Nolan county judge of his intentions of forming the proposed organization. Plans for the forming of such an organization originated at the session of the two at Baird where Burkett outlined plans of uniting those connected with road building over the State into such an association that would have as its purpose the maintenance and repair of good highways already constructed.

Burkett and Mauzey were alone in originating the proposed work although county judges, commissioners and road engineers everywhere in Texas will now be speedily consulted and it is believed that great activity will feature the August meeting here. "The purpose of this meeting, which was originally called simply as a good road rally, will be to create a more thorough understanding of road construction and maintenance; a more definite purpose in maintaining highways after they have been built, and most important, the organizing of the Highway Maintenance Association of Texas," Judge Mauzey said.

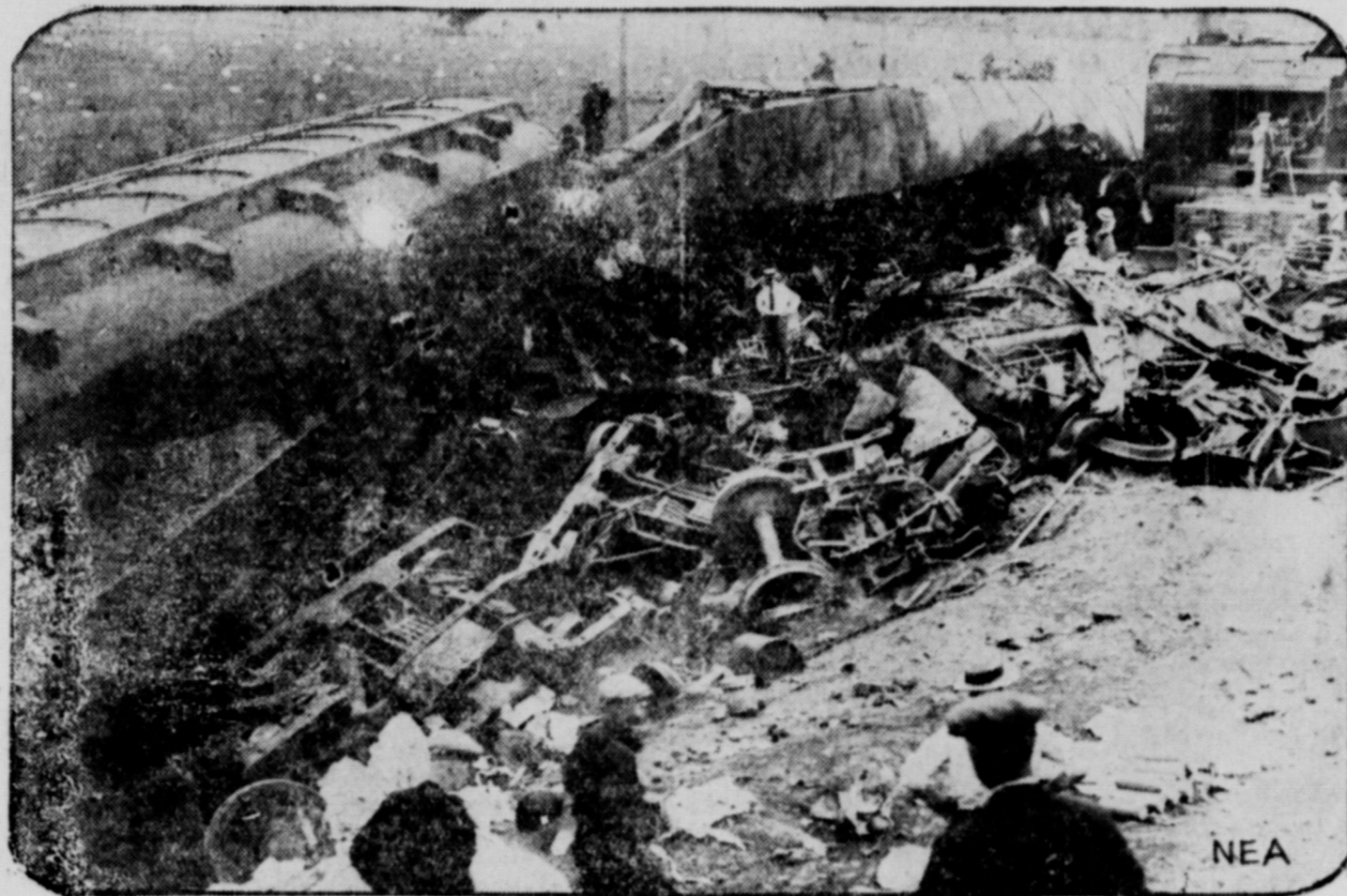
Major A. H. Wilson of the United States team was the individual star of the match.

LEAVE WHALING TOWN

Final Farewells Said As Expedition Departs From Wiscasset On Sheepscot River, Maine

The explorers turned the prows of their staunch little vessels, the Peary and the Bowdoin north to the open sea and were soon lost to sight.

MAY PROMOTE

Secretary of Navy Favors Application Of Temporary Admiral Robinson For Retirement

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Admiral (temporary) J. K. Robinson, chief of the bureau of engineering of the navy has applied to Secretary of the Navy Wilbur for retirement as rear admiral, and Wilbur has recommended to President Coolidge that the application be approved.

Robinson approved the naval oil reserve lease negotiated by former Secretary of the Navy Denby and former secretary of the Interior Fall.

He was three times past over for promotion to permanent rear admiral because of the doubtful outcome in court of the suit to break the oil leases.

DENTIST BURIED HIS WIFE ALIVE

District Attorneys Charge "Scientific Murderer" Rendered Wife Senseless With Somniform

INTOXICATED PLEA

Defense Maintain Dr. Young And Wife Were Intoxicated When She Died; Says Not Guilty

LOS ANGELES, June 20.—Mrs. Grace Grogan Young was buried alive after husband had rendered her senseless by the use of the dental gas, somniform.

This is the charge that will face Dr. Thomas W. Young when he goes to trial here August 17 for the "scientific murder" of his society wife.

District attorney agreed on this theory of the murder today after an extended review of evidence.

Dr. Young's three confessions, which were repudiated when he pleaded not guilty, may not be used at the trial, District Attorney Keyes declared.

Dr. Young's defense will be that his wife died a natural death while they were both under the influence of liquor, according to his attorneys. The slayer also contends that his confessions were secured while he was intoxicated.

WAN'S ELECTION

Wisconsin Governor May Call Session Legislature To Select LaFollette Successor

MADISON, Wis., June 20.—Governor Blaine of Wisconsin will probably call a special session of the legislature to choose a successor to Robert M. LaFollette, it was learned today.

The Wisconsin executive prefers this course to making an appointment which the law permits.

In a message, the decision is a tribute to the late Senator who preferred election of all officials rather than appointment.

There is a possibility that "Bob" LaFollette, who knows his father's plans and policies better than any one else and who has years of legislative experience despite his youth may run as a candidate for the senatorship.

FOREIGN POWERS TO DISCUSS RIOT

Nations May Seek Solution of Problem Concerning Foreign Domination of Chinese Seaport

WANT STATEMENT

Lack of Agreement Broke Up Shanghai Conference—Raise Relief Fund in U. S.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—Foreign domination of the international settlement of Shanghai from which China jurisdiction has been excluded for many years may be taken up by the powers in a discussion of the Shanghai riot, the state department announced today.

"The diplomatic body at Peking has intimated to the Chinese government that if the government desires they are disposed to request authorization of their respective governments to discuss in the most friendly spirit the problem presented by Shanghai," a department announcement said.

These propositions which concern the organization of an international settlement and administration of justice there were large factors in the lack of agreement which caused the breaking up June 11 of the Shanghai conference between representatives of diplomatic corps and the Chinese government.

Frisco Chinese Working
SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—Actual solicitations of funds for the relief of suffering in the Shanghai stricken area began today in San Francisco's China town.

Headed by B. S. Fong, president of the Chinese chamber of commerce, the Shanghai sufferers relief association, newly formed took up the work of securing money.

A committee started a door to door canvass in the Chinese quarter.

Cable advices to the local Chinese newspaper which is supporting the campaign for funds, indicated that there is now much suffering in Shanghai among women and children due to the strike of workers.

Municipal Pier Drops Crowd Into Ocean Near Cape May—Philadelphia, Reading Men Injured

The pier was crowded with persons watching a live saving demonstration being staged for the benefit of the visitors.

The railroad men were dropped 40 feet into shallow water. Relief trains took the injured back to Philadelphia.

MANY SIDEWALKS BUILT IN YEAR

City Engineer Surveyed For 21,500 Feet Sidewalks In Year Ending June 1—1 Miles of Walks

COOPER MAKES REPORT

Statement Given City Commission Shows Great Improvement In Sewer Lines, Curbs, Streets

The year from June 1, 1924 to June 1, 1925 saw a great improvement of the street and sidewalk condition in Sweetwater, and during the same period, the extension of sewer lines and water lines throughout the city was record breaking.

This is shown in a report submitted to the city commission by C. C. Cooper, city engineer, in which it is revealed that among other things, Cooper surveyed for 21,500 lineal feet of sidewalks over the city during the 12 months.

Sidewalk building in Sweetwater during the year ending June 1 was far above the average of any similar period.

The building of sidewalks that followed survey jobs by the city engineer actually totalled in excess of 21,500 feet; approximately 4 miles of sidewalks in 12 months.

Other work done by Cooper during the year, according to the report, includes surveying for all street paving since the first of the year. This included the Pine and North Third projects, with a total of 3,625 feet of paving being finished up to June 1.

Another unusual record which reveals improvements made in the city during the period is the extension of sewer lines. Surveys of 6,298 feet of sewer extensions were made, and that amount of extensions followed.

Beside curb surveying on the paving projects and sidewalk building additional surveys for curbs alone totalled 900 feet during the year.

PARDON RECORD

Woman Governor Again Shatters Record—Frees 58 Convicts In Week—13 Murderers

AUSTIN, June 20.—Governor Miriam Ferguson has established a new clemency record during the past week, according to a survey of certificates on file in the state offices.

Fifty-eight persons, including 45 negro convicts freed June 19, Emancipation Day, constituted the week's clemency roll.

Eight life terms, 7 murderers and one serving for criminal assault, were pardoned today.

Thirteen murderers were on the list freed by the executive on the closing day of the week.

Only one liquor law violator received clemency.

KING OF FIDDLERS LAYS BOW ASIDE

South's Most Popular Old Fiddler Has Played Last Number—Polk Harris Is Dead

FIVE STATES CHAMPION

Had Won Medals in Many States—Nolan County's Wealthiest Pioneer War Veteran

The South's most popular old fiddler, who was also a Civil war veteran and one of Nolan county's wealthiest men, has stood before the footlights and plied his bow across the violin strings, thrilling hundreds with his rollicking, old fashioned melodies, for the last time. The violin that won J. K. Polk Harris championship medals from five states has been laid aside forever.

The gray-bearded old fiddler who made this county his home for over a quarter of a century died Wednesday at Longview at the age of 78 years.

J. K. Polk Harris was the owner of the S. O. S. ranch, one of the largest ranches in this section, 16 miles south of Sweetwater on Oak creek; including some 9 or 10 sections of one of the largest undivided ranch holdings in the county.

For many years Harris managed his ranch in Nolan county, and only a few years ago did he move to the town of Maryneal where he built another home and lived until his death at the residence of relatives at Longview the past week.

The passing of Polk Harris is the passing of a figure who was seen on the stage at every "old fiddlers contest" of any consequence in the entire south. He has won the championship of Texas over and over again. In addition, he has, at various times, won medals as the champion "old fiddler" of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Alabama. He has won medals, prizes and premiums of every description. One of those prized highest, however, is a beautiful medal awarded Harris by a number of his many Sweetwater friends, several years ago, when he won championship honors here.

Harris was a Confederate soldier in the war between the states, serving in Company C, 15th Texas Cavalry. His death again cuts the ranks of the gradually dwindling wearers of the Gray in Nolan county.

SHEPHERD WILL TESTIFY MONDAY

Man Charged With Murder of Millionaire Foster Son, Billy McClintock to Stand Own Behalf

GRILL DEFENSE WITNESSES

State Attorney R. E. Crowe Extracts Important Testimony On Cross Examination Saturday

CHICAGO, June 20.—His own defense witness having failed to bolster his case W. D. Shepherd must now depend upon his own testimony to save him from conviction on a charge of murdering Billy McClintock, his millionaire orphan.

Shepherd, according to his attorneys, will take the witness stand some time Monday and tell his own side of the strange murder case.

Shepherd's most severe blows were dealt today in the form of testimony extracted from defense witnesses by State Attorney R. E. Crowe on cross examination.

The defense hopes to complete its case some time Tuesday in the event Shepherd takes the stand Monday. In this event the case will go to the jury before the end of the week.

MEXICO

Mexico, warned informally by the American secretary of state that she had better be good and attend more strictly to the safeguarding of American rights has developed a brainstorm. At least, the Mexican government has. And perhaps the Mexican people feel the same way about it. President Calles indignantly denies what he regards as charges against the honor and ability of his government, and tells Uncle Sam where Uncle gets off. Uncle comes back in similar vein.

It may prove to be a tempest in a teapot, or it may develop into something serious. The situation has struck the American public with surprise. It has been supposed that things were going well in Mexico, since Obregon restored order and turned the government over to President Calles, after an honest election. But it appears that Mexicans are ignoring the land laws and occupying property owned by American citizens without compensation. The Mexican supreme court itself recently complained to the Mexican government that its own decisions in agrarian cases were ignored by squatters.

That is not nearly so bad as many outrages that occurred during the recent revolutionary period, but it is bad enough to justify formal protest and call for corrective action by the Mexican authorities. Nothing has been revealed so far justifying the talk of "intervention" and that arises among certain classes of American financiers and investors whenever a pretext offers itself.

The Mexican outburst seems to be more a matter of hurt pride than anything else. In dealing with a Latin-American nation the manner is often more important than the matter. The situation at present may call for delicacy and courtesy rather than a club.

TEA POT DOME

The mountain labored and brought forth—nothing!

After 15 months of very expensive preparation that included an exceptionally liberal use of taxpayers money, charges and more charges, and the retirement of several noted gentlemen from high positions in the government, Federal Judge Blake Kennedy has ruled that the leases where by the naval oil reserves at Teapot Dome and Elk Hill were acquired by Harry F. Sinclair and H. F. Deberly were entirely legal.

That there is something very radically wrong about the whole proceeding is entirely evident. Either the charges have been false and based on political or other enmity from the beginning or else the esteemed government jurist has erred in his rulings.

There is one item that has not been cleared up and upon which Judge Kennedy refused to permit any light to be shed. And that is the money which Fall is known to have received shortly after the Teapot Dome lease was signed. Fall himself refused to reveal its source.

The government counsel are preparing an appeal to the Federal court at St. Louis. It may be that the Federal Judge there will not see matters in the same light that Judge Kennedy did. Jurists have been known to disagree.

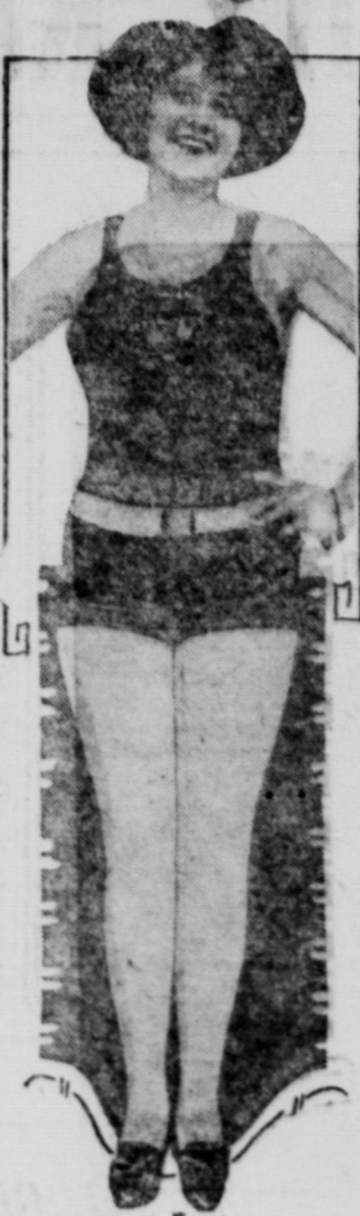

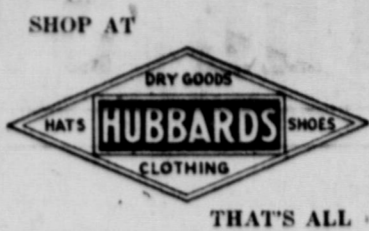

FIGHT LENDERS

War Opens On Money Lenders Who Take Ex-Soldiers' Compensation Certificates

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—A nation wide drive to stamp out activities of money lenders who are offering loans to ex-service men and who take up adjusted compensation certificates for security, started today by the United States secret service.

Chief Moran announced that operatives in San Antonio had received 235 certificates said to have been held by money lenders making approximately 100 per cent in advancing funds to ex-service men.

Evidence uncovered by the agents has been turned over to the United States district attorney at San Antonio "for determination," Moran said.

MAINTENANCE URGED**

The Nolan county judge pointed out that all states and the United States had their highway construction organizations, road building associations, and good road associations and the like but that Texas is without some form of an organized body with a purpose of maintaining, conserving, and keeping highways in good state of repair after they are built.

Judge Mauzey hinted that such an organization, if it is perfected here in August, and he has every reason to believe it will be, he said, will possibly have as its first problem and purpose, the securing of a sufficient road maintenance fund for maintaining the good condition of hard surfaced and other highways.

It was indicated that the association, following its organization, would set about securing what legislative acts that may be necessary in providing for such a Highway Maintenance Fund. This much was gathered when Mauzey pointed out:

"Up to 1917 roads were built and maintained by the respective counties. In 1917 there was created the State Highway Department and the department has been financed by registration fees of automobiles, aided by Federal funds. In 1924 there went into effect, the highway department's authority to maintain roads. But that does not mean that there will be more money spent in that work, and it does not mean there will be any more money for that purpose."

Mauzey declared that the next logical step was to provide for maintenance with sufficient funds to carry out work of keeping good roads and expensive roads in repair. It will be the intention of the body to work in cooperation with the State Highway Department in maintaining roads; and other purposes of the association will be to promote road maintenance in general and strive to educate the public mind to the necessity of maintaining highways as well as building them.

"We use to think that you could pave a stretch of highway; use a good asphalt top or brick pavement, and it would last forever. But that is not a fact. A road will wear out just like everything else," Mauzey said, "and it will mean a saving in money in the long run to spend some money in keeping the highways in good condition."

With this thought in mind, Burkett will put the proposition before the

hundreds of judges, commissioners, courts, and engineers at the August meeting here where the two believe the association will be realized.

Meantime, Highway Commissioner Burkett will leave shortly for California to inspect the highway system of that State, he told Mauzey. He will also visit certain northern states on his trip in the same connection, and will doubtless make some report at the gathering of road builders in Sweetwater in August.

A Faithful Builder
 Who is there that doesn't delight in a juicy slice of carefully seasoned, well baked ham? It is not necessary to bake an entire or even a half a ham, when you crave a serving of this popular meat. Just purchase a ham end, the upper part of a shank or a piece of shoulder. If too salty soak a few hours or parboil, then cover with a paste made of brown sugar crumbs and eggs and bake slowly uncovered for the first part of cooking and covered after it has nicely browned so that a juicy ham will result. Cloves inserted in the fat section adds also to its delightful flavor.

When there are four or more in the family it is a thrifty custom to purchase a whole ham. It can be served part boiled the first time with spinach or other greens, or cabbage. Baked for a meal, omitting serving it again the day following its first appearance, then left overs for home made club sandwiches, croquettes, ham hash or ham a la king will take care of all that remains. Compared with the price of ham by the slice—you'll find a saving of about thirty cents per pound.
