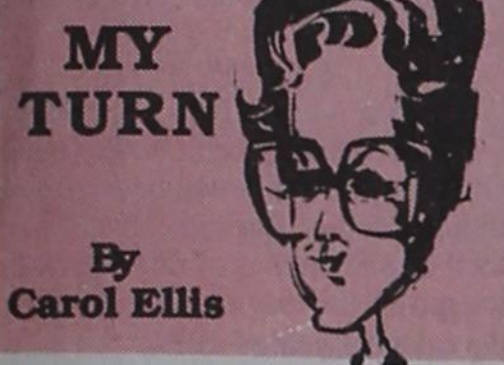

I DREAMED that I woke up in the year 2094 and it was the Fourth of July. I got up and got dressed in my nifty, patriotic red-white-and-blue outfit, pinned on my little rhinestone flag and headed out to the park to check on the day's activities.

On the way, I noticed that there were no flags flying on people's front porches or in front of the business firms and I wondered what was going on.

Nobody was at the park except an elderly City employee who was watering the grass. Thinking that I had gotten there too early, I asked him about tickets for the barbeque and he told me they couldn't have barbeques anymore because the Government Health Alliance had announced a few years ago that beef consumption was bad for people's health and so there were no more feedlots, packing plants or beef industry. A few die-hard folks out in the rural areas still raised their own beef and would occasionally have a big cookout for all their friends but it was mostly on the hush-hush.

He said they had tried to have a fish fry on the Fourth for a few years but, eventually, even that was outlawed because of so much pollution in the oceans, lakes, rivers and streams. The only meat a person could buy at the grocery stores anymore was turkey and some fake hamburger meat made out of soy bean curd.

I wondered aloud about all the fun we used to have at the Fourth of July celebrations. He said the SPCA had outlawed the turtle race and the pet show as being cruel to the poor little animals. Plus, some kid had sued his dad for falling down on him and breaking his leg during the father-son three-legged race, so they finally just quit trying to have any fun and games for the kids.

He said people usually just stayed home and worked in their yards on the Fourth. "A lot of folks are afraid to get together in large groups now, since that foreign terrorist group bombed the Super Bowl several years ago," he said. "It sure has cut down the attendance at the sporting games."

He told me that no one puts out the American Flag on patriotic holidays anymore out of respect for those people who had come to the USA from other countries. Somebody thought it might hurt their feelings if we showed a lot of honor toward our own country's flag. And he said I'd better take off my little rhinestone pin or I might offend someone.

My informant mentioned the fact that drugs are all legal now and guns are illegal, which seemed a strange turn around to me. He said that religious people meet in each others homes, as they are afraid of being seen in the churches and synagogues now.

I was beginning to get pretty upset about all this, but the topper was yet to come. I asked when the fireworks display would begin and he said we hadn't had fireworks in many, many years. The EPA folks and the OSHA folks had gotten together and decreed that fireworks were dangerous for that hole in the ozone layer so there would be no more fireworks anywhere, anytime.

I told him that I could remember back in 1994 when they were working up a frenzy over that fictitious ozone hole thing and if it hadn't destroyed the earth by now it probably wasn't going to happen.

I went home and went back to bed, hoping that I would wake up again in 1994 while there was still time to correct some of these terrible mistakes before they happen.

For the second straight year, the Friona Noon Lions Club is sponsoring the city's Independence Day celebration, scheduled on Monday, July 4.

The Lions Club is once again planning to cook up hamburgers and French fries for the residents of Friona on the holiday.

Also on the schedule are a musical program, food and drink booths by numerous clubs and organizations, the "Texas Pedal Pullers" for the youngsters, and a fireworks display.

Serving will begin at 6 p.m. at the City Park. The Noon Lions will charge \$2 for hamburgers (including the garnish). With French fries, the price will be \$3 each.

The schedule of events reads as follows:

6:00 p.m.--The Great American Hamburger Cook-off; Texas Pedal Pullers.
8:15 p.m.--Music.
9:30 or 9:45--Fireworks.

According to John Gurley, president-elect of the Friona Noon Lions, here are some of the "goodies" that local residents can expect at the park on Monday:

*Homemade ice cream by the Chamber board members. "Last year, each board member was responsible for one freezer of ice cream. This year, each one is bringing two," Gurley said, reminded that the group ran out of this precious commodity far too early in the evening in 1993.

*Baked goods and Swan ice cream, by Modern Study Club.

*Cokes and other canned drinks, brownies and cookies, by the Women's Division, which also plans to have a booth to sell bricks

to those interested in their park project.

*Sno-cones and balloons, by the Friona Girl Scouts.

*Lemonade, ice tea and "water weiners," by the Friona Boy Scouts.

*Local talent for the entertainment portion of the program, under the direction of Clint Mears and Geary Brogden. The musical program should run until 9:30 or 9:45.

*Fireworks, under the direction and sponsorship of the Friona Fire Department.

*Sausage on a stick, by the Explorer Scouts.

*Water Polo exhibition by the Fire Department.

"We urge everyone to bring their own lawn chairs or folding chairs and blankets, as they did last year. Come on out to the park and enjoy the July 4th holiday with your friends and neighbors and support your local clubs and organizations," Gurley said.

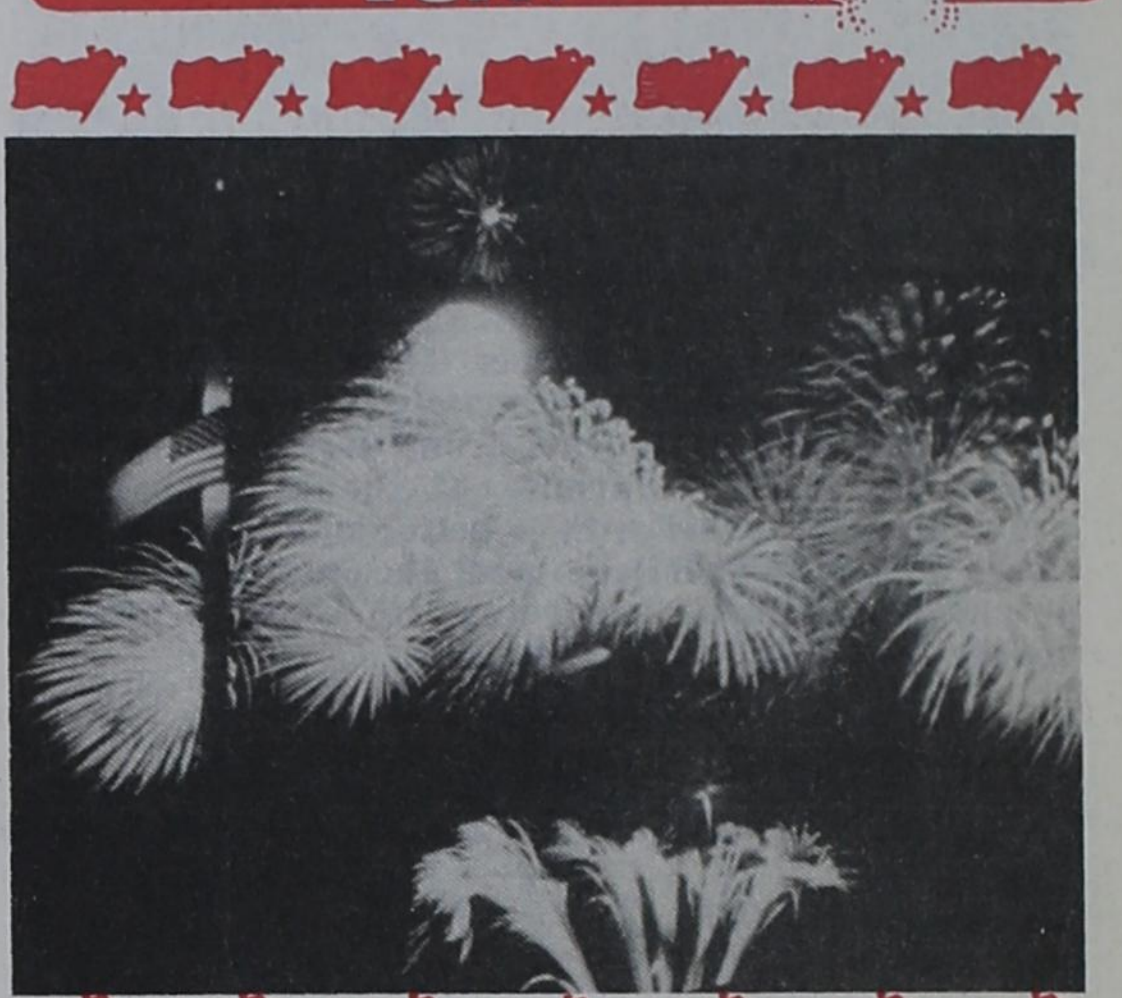
Tables and chairs will be set up especially for the senior citizens who would like to use them.

Gurley said that the Noon Lions were much indebted to the Excel Corp. for furnishing the hamburger meat to be used on Monday, and to Leon Hitt and his meat department at D.L.'s Thriftway for making the patties. D.L.'s also assisted the Lions in securing the garnish (lettuce, tomatoes, etc.), at the lowest possible price.

"We appreciate those who have donated or helped our July 4th project in any way," Gurley said.

City's Fireworks Ordinance Will Be Enforced

The Friona Fire Department wants to remind the public that it is against the law to shoot off fireworks within the city limits.

"It is very, very dry, and we want to stress this in order to keep down possible fires caused by fireworks," said a spokesman for the department.

If caught shooting fireworks, the offender's fireworks will be confiscated and there will be a fine of up to \$200.

The Friona Fire Department will be in charge of the fireworks display the evening of July 4 in the City Park.

Train Derails Near Clovis, N.M.

A Santa Fe train derailed one mile east of Clovis, New Mexico early Monday, June 27 when a 1976 Buick collided with the train when the train was halfway through the crossing, according to police reports.

The driver of the car, 30-year-old Wanda Wall of Clovis, was killed. There were no other passengers in the vehicle. There were no injuries to the train crew, said Linda Gustis, a spokesperson for Santa Fe Railway.

The collision caused 29 double-stacked railcars to derail.

Wall died after she apparently drove her 1976 Buick through the south railroad traffic arm at Sugarbeet Road and East Mabry Drive, across the highway from Cook's Truck Center and Restaurant, about 2:30 a.m. Her car collided with the seventh car of the train.

About a dozen of the railcars had tipped over and crashed about three-quarters of a mile east of the accident site.

One of the railcars was carrying hazardous material, but it did not pose a threat to the public, said Senior Patrolman Rick Durham of

the state police.

The material was acrylamide, a plant dust, and a hazardous material cleanup team from Amarillo arrived to help in the clean-up.

Gustis said the derailment blocked both mainline rails. The train was enroute from Los Angeles destined for Chicago.

Senior Patrolman K. R. Terry of the state police said an autopsy would be done on Wall as part of the investigation.

The car-train collision caused nearly \$2 million in damages to Santa Fe Railway equipment and contents, a company spokesperson said.

Santa Fe Railway spokeswoman Linda Gustis said about \$1 million damage was done to nine railcars carrying 76 containers that had derailed and almost \$1 million damage was done to Santa Fe Railway equipment, track and a warning signal in the accident.

This is the second derailment in 10 days in this area.

A cracked rail bolt caused a 23-railcar derailment about five miles northeast of Bovina on June 17, forcing temporary closure of one lane on U. S. Highway 60.

The 1934 harvest season in the Friona territory has been unusually quiet as compared to that of the past six years, when the elevators were working double crews and long rows of trucks stood waiting in the streets for their turn to unload. Despite the fact that the harvest season appears to be at its height at this time, there are no such scenes. The fields of the locality are giving a yield of from four to fifteen bushels to the acre, with an apparent average of about eight or nine bushels.

55 Yrs. Ago--June 30, 1939

The county commissioners, in session here Monday, passed a resolution submitted by County Judge Lee Thompson, which will limit the amount of financial aid to be extended indigent persons of the county. In offering the resolution, Judge Thompson said that in recent months the county had received bills from hospitals for care given county residents with bills that had never been authorized officially and he felt that some action must be taken to curb practice of this nature.

50 Yrs. Ago--June 30, 1944

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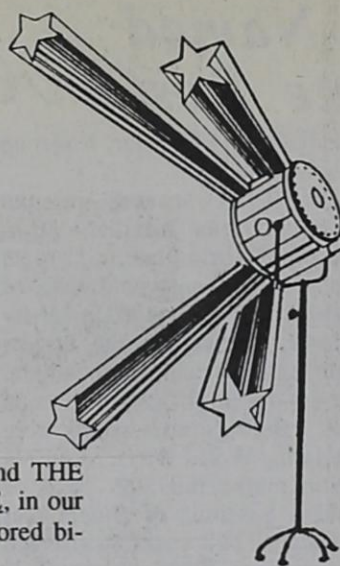
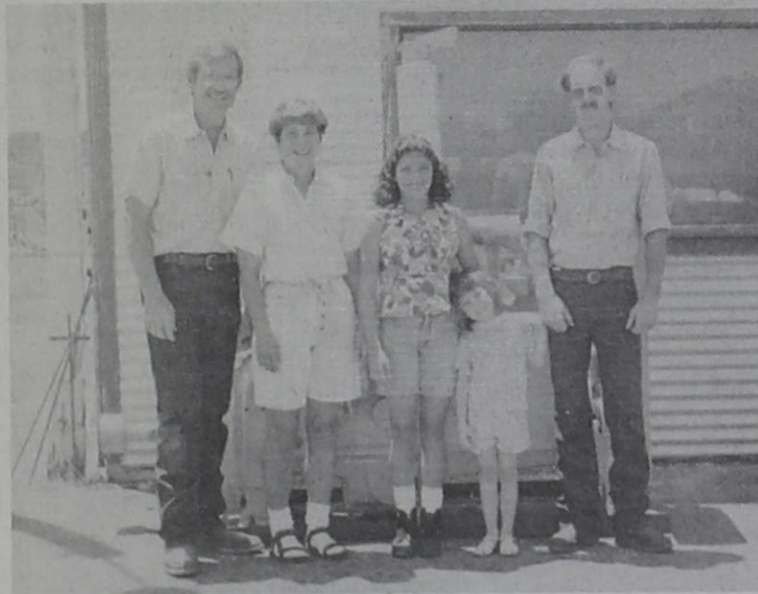

Business is a two way street. When a business offers good service, it brings in good customers. Irrigation Engine Service is a prime example of this theory.



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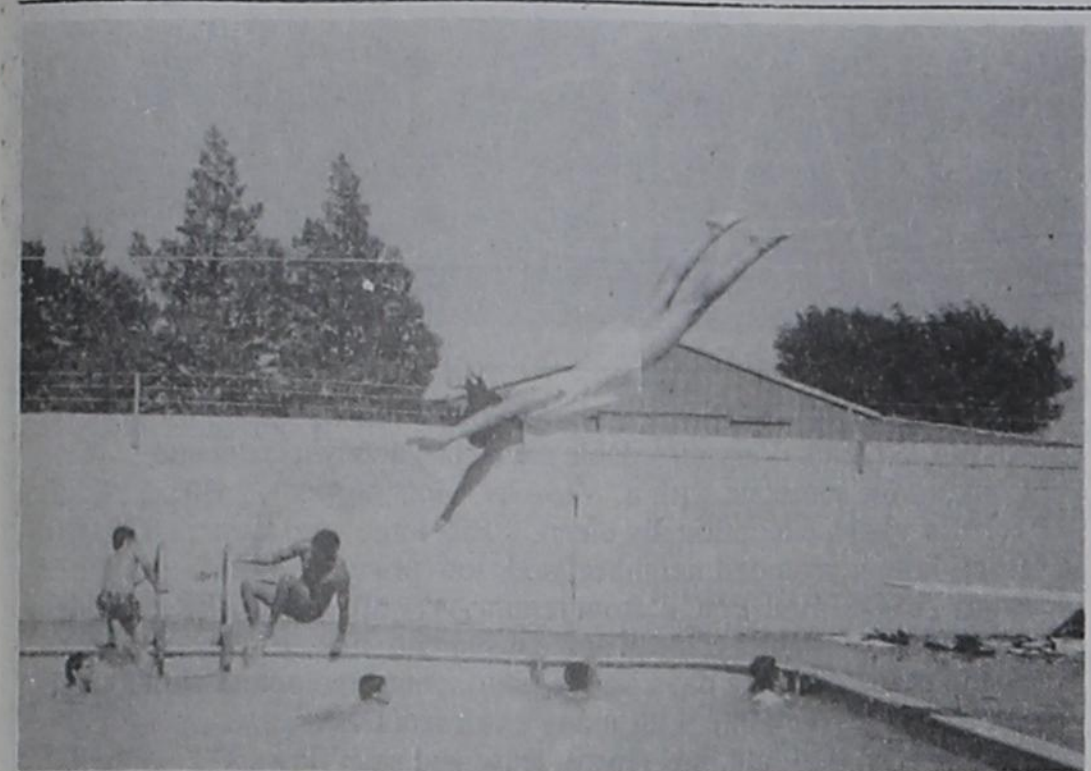

Did You Know?

By 1860, there were nearly 4,000,000 slaves in the United States. One of every seven Americans belonged to another. Yet most confederate soldiers didn't own any slaves.

Before the Civil War, it was rare to find chaplains in American armies. During the war they earned a lasting place.

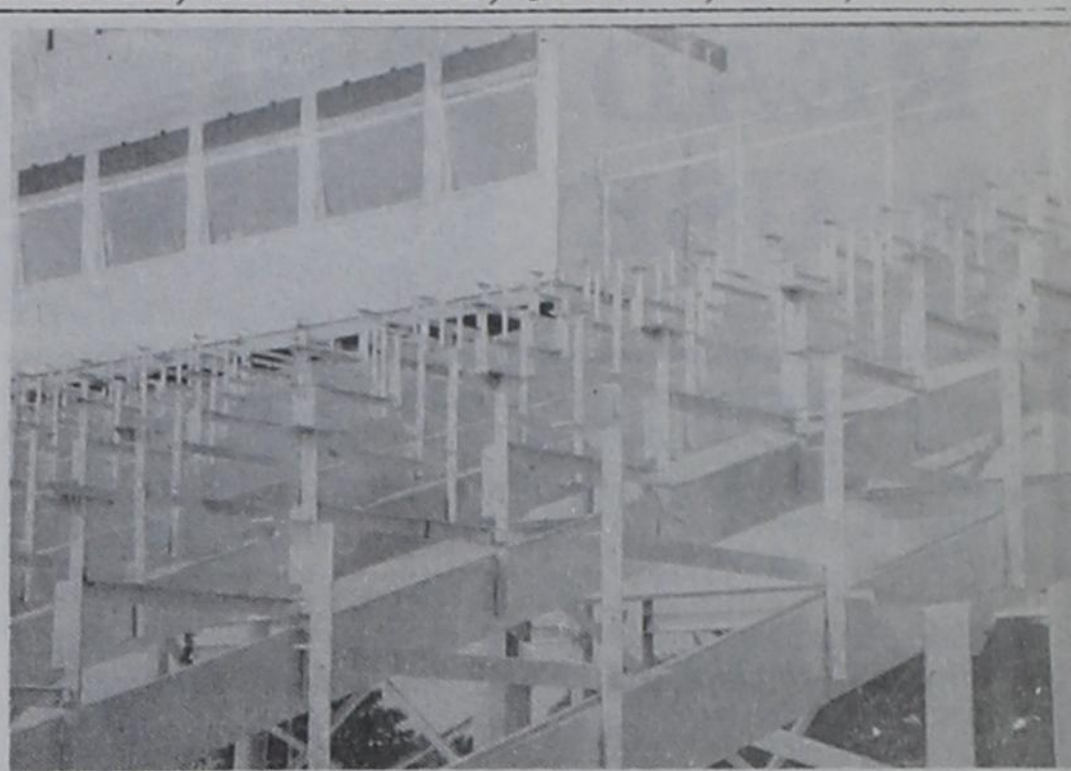
One of the strongest Christians during the Civil War period that I have read about is Robert E. Lee. One historian put it this way, "Robert Lee was one of the small company of great men in whom there is no inconsistency to explained, no enigma to be solved. What he seemed, he was--a wholly human gentlemen, the essential elements of whose positive character were two and only two, simplicity and spirituality."

Robert Lee advocated gradual emancipation of slaves. When he received slaves from his father-in-law's will, in fact, he released them.

Was he really this kind of a man? Following the war Colonel T. L. Brown relates this incident which occurred on June 4, 1865, in Lee's church. As the rector was about to serve holy communion, "A Negro advanced to the communion table. He was tall, well-dressed and black. This was a great shock," the congregation froze. Those who had been about to go forward, remained in their

pews. Then General Lee, "Arose in his usual dignified and self-possessed manner.....and reverently knelt down to partake of the communion, not far from the Negro." The other communicants then went forward.

The first letter of John chapter 1:6, 7 "If we say that we have fellowship with Him and yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not practice the truth; but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus His Son cleanses us from all sin." Chapter 2: 9, 10, 11 "The one who says he is in the light and yet hates his brother is in darkness until now. The one who loves his brother abides in the light and there is no cause for stumbling in him. But the one who hates his brother is in the darkness and walks in the darkness, and does not know where he is going because the darkness has blinded his eyes."

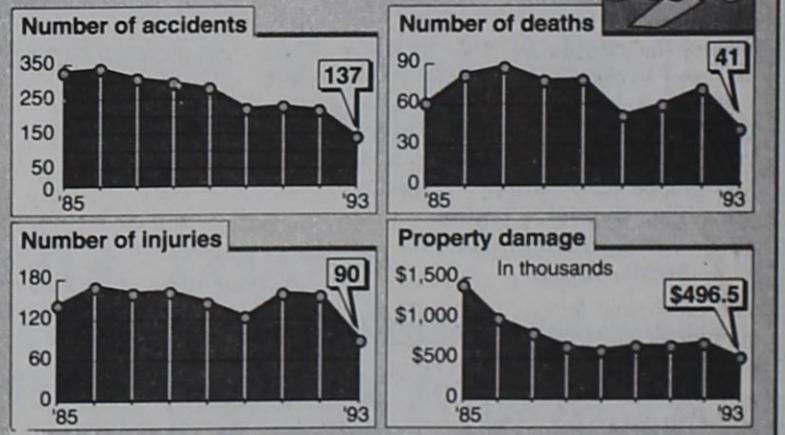

June Floyd Has Been Writing News Of Parmer County For 38 Years

June Floyd is an institution around Friona, and especially around the *Friona Star* and the *Bovina Blade*. In 1956 when W.H. "Sonny" Graham Jr. asked June to go to work for the Star, she told him that she would help him out temporarily until he could find someone else to do the job permanently. Now 38 years later, the Star still hasn't found anyone to do her job permanently, so June is still at it, and in the meantime she's done just about every job there is to do around a newspaper office and printing plant except to run the presses.

The current editors thought it was high-time someone turned the tables around and wrote a feature article about June, who down through the years, has written hundreds of features on just about everybody in this area.

Mrs. Floyd just celebrated a birthday last Sunday and says she isn't an octogenarian yet but is getting pretty close. She was born in Beckham County Oklahoma south of Eric to Mr. and Mrs. A.R. McCown. She was the second child in a family of seven children, six of whom grew to adulthood. Their farmland was in the family for about three generations and the family still owns the mineral rights under the land. But June says, her Dad was a person who liked to move around, so she attended two schools in New Mexico, two in Texas and three in Oklahoma.

She graduated from high school in Dimmitt in 1932 and went to work immediately for the John Deere dealership there. Three years later she went to Amarillo, where she worked in a lawyer's office and held various other secretarial positions while taking courses at night school.

She and Glenn Floyd were married February 6, 1938 in Plainview. During their first seven years of married life, Glen did construction work, so they moved around quite a lot. In 1945 they moved to a farm in Northwest Lubbock County and stayed there three years before moving to a farm in Parmer County. Having grown up on a farm, June was well-acquainted with farm life and helped with milking cows, cutting feed, harvesting grain and just about every other aspect of farming in general.

In those days, small town weekly newspapers had what was called the "country correspondent" in each of the small communities around in the area. In 1955 June was asked to be the correspondent from Friona for the Farwell newspaper, *The Stateline Tribune*. This was something she could do while at home and earn a little spending money at it.

Graham had taken over running the "Trib" from his father "Hop" Graham Sr. About a year later Bert Neelley (father of Friona State Bank president Robert Neelley) sold the *Friona Star* to the partnership of Sonny Graham and Joe Osborn. That was when Graham invited June to become a full-time member of the Star staff and she agreed to try it on a temporary basis.

In 1958 Graham and Osborn sold all the old letterpress printing equipment and changed over to a brand new method of publishing,

Susan Phillips Injured In Explosion At Home

Susan Floyd Phillips of Lewistown, Montana, was critically injured in an explosion and fire at her home early Monday morning.

Her family was asleep when she was awakened by an unknown odor. She and her husband, Wes, went to the garage area to try to find the origin of the unfamiliar odor. After the couple entered the garage, an explosion occurred and fire consumed the structure.

Mrs. Phillips was able to return to the inside of the home and wake her three sons, Clint, 17 years old, Kory, 14 and Tye, 10, who were asleep. They managed to get out of the home. Shortly after the four of them were safe out on the lawn, Wes escaped from the garage area. The house was a total loss.

Susan was taken to the local hospital and immediately transferred to the Burn and Trauma Center in Salt Lake City, Utah, where she is in critical condition in the intensive care unit. She sustained second and third degree burns over 56% of her body.

Wes received some serious cuts to his shoulder but the boys were uninjured.

The boys are currently staying with an uncle that lives nearby. Susan's two sisters, Geneva Osborn and Frieda Dickson and brother, Gerald and his wife, Jana, are all in Salt Lake City with her.

Susan is the youngest daughter of June Floyd, a longtime employee and feature writer for the *Friona Star* and *Bovina Blade*.

Neighbors of the family finished hay harvest, which was in progress, and shipped cattle for the family.

which was known as offset printing. The offset press in Friona was at that time one of only two such presses in the state of Texas.

Graham set up a central printing plant here, hiring a staff of approximately 30 people to publish papers for many other cities, some as far away as Denver and Albuquerque. The plant was known as Plains Publishers and also served papers in Lubbock, Amarillo, Olton, Vega, Hart, Happy, and of course Farwell, Friona and Bovina. They published papers for military bases in Roswell, Clovis and Altus.

Someone from each of these newspapers would send their news copy and advertising layouts to Friona. Then the staff at Plains Publishers would type up their copy, put their ads together, paste the paper up and run it all off on the presses.

In addition to writing the news for the Friona paper, June remembers those hectic days when Plains Publishers was in full-swing. Meeting deadlines for a couple of dozen different newspapers could be quite a challenge. She can remember chasing the train down the tracks while throwing bundles of newspapers onto the train. If you missed the train, someone had to drive all the way to Albuquerque with the printed papers.

Dolph Moten was the ad salesman for the Friona paper at that time. He and June were the only two full-time employees for a few years. Moten had established the *Bovina Blade* the year before, and had it until it was purchased by Bill Ellis in 1971. June remembers several Friona editors: Leland Boyd, Dave McReynolds, Vernon Stewart, Richard Hapke, Travis Harrell, and then there was Bill Ellis who later became the owner of both the Friona and Bovina papers.

June tells about a funny event which happened while Dave McReynolds was the editor. The Star, which was then housed in the old Friona State Bank building, was anticipating moving into the brand new building at Sixth and Euclid as soon as the building was completed. The group finally got word that they could move in during the weekend, but it happened to be a weekend when the McReynolds family had gone out of town on a little trip. So the staff just moved all the stuff to the new place by themselves. The McReynoldses got in late Sunday evening. Early Monday morning, before daybreak, Dave got up and went down to the Star office... the old Star office... and found there was nothing there. He didn't have a key to the new place and he didn't want to go home, so he just rolled up some old newspapers and napped until it was time for the coffee shop to open.

June says the following incident ranks as her most embarrassing moment. She tells it here in her own words:

In the late fifties, when Maize Days was in its infancy, Dave McReynolds, who has been my friend almost 40 years, was the editor of the Friona Star.

He was a graduate of the Texas A&M University School of Journalism and was a top notch editor. However, he wasn't the best

when it came to grammar and punctuation, so one of my jobs was to edit his copy before it went to press.

One morning, a stranger walked into the office and Dave introduced him to me as John Doe and informed me that he would be writing Maize Days features for us.

Several mornings later, I found some copy on my desk, which I presumed had been written by Dave. It had the usual amount of errors, which I corrected then put it on his desk.

Upon entering Dave's office the next morning, John Doe remarked, "I see you don't like my grammar."

Of course, Dave had no idea what he was talking about, but I knew.

Later he asked, "Do you know who that man is?"

I answered, "All I know is that he is John Doe and was hired to write some Maize Days features."

I've never been more embarrassed than when Dave replied, "He's John Doe, all right, but he's also Dr. John Doe, head of the journalism department at one of our state universities."

Soon there were similar offset printing plants being established around the country, bringing stiff competition, and Plains Publishers closed up in 1968. But June stayed on with the *Friona Star* and has been writing the "Town Talk" column ever since, plus doing many weddings and feature articles for both the Friona and Bovina papers.

She currently is also writing the "Happy Homemaker" recipe column for Friona and Bovina.

June and Glenn Floyd raised five children on their farm West of Friona where they lived for 21 years. After the children were grown they moved into town in 1969 and lived at 1301 Columbia where June still resides. Glen passed away in 1984.

Their oldest child, and only son, Gerald lives with wife Jana in Elkhart Kansas. This couple has two children, Jason and Sarah. Jason lives in Friona and is a self employed parture cattle caretaker. Sarah has just finished her freshman year at Southwestern Oklahoma State University at Weatherford, Oklahoma.

The couple's oldest daughter Geneva and husband John Osborn reside in Tipton, Oklahoma. Their two children are both married. Joel Osborn and wife Rhonda live in Stillwater, Oklahoma. Heather and husband Curtis Ward live in Abernathy.

Joel Osborn was the first Floyd grandchild, but he was followed two months later by Jason.

The couple's third child, Marilyn, lives in Lubbock.

Their fourth child, Frieda, is married to Richard Dickson and they live in Ruidoso, New Mexico. Their boys are Brandon, age 16, and Barrett, age 4.

The youngest of the Floyd five is Susan who is married to Wes Phillips. They live on a ranch near Lewistown, Montana, where they raise cattle and boys. Their sons are Clint, age 17, Kory, age 14, and Tye, age 10.

There is a 22 year age span between June's oldest grandchildren and the youngest. Joel, Jason and Heather are college graduates and Sarah will be a Sophomore at college next year. Clint will be a High School Senior; Kory will be a Freshman; Brandon will be a Junior; Tye will be in the fifth grade; and Barrett, the youngest, will start to pre-school.

All the grandchildren love coming to Friona to visit Grandmother June who entertains them royally without the benefit of a television set. She doesn't own one.

When the little ones are here they enjoy quality time with Grandmother, playing games, taking nature hikes, baking cookies, working puzzles, doing crafts... all the basic things people did together before there was such a thing as TV. June says she enjoys not having to monitor what the kids are watching on TV, as most of it is not fit for children's minds.

June has always been a hardy, healthy person who was almost never sick until her open-heart bypass surgery in 1989.

"Heart problems run in the family," she says. "Two of my brothers have died of heart related problems at an early age."

She had eight years of perfect

attendance at school and worked full time for 18 years without ever missing a day because of illness. Perhaps this is because she enjoys walking and would rather walk somewhere than ride in a car.

June also enjoys all sorts of sewing and handwork and has made five beautiful quilts just this year, piecing and quilting all of them. She enjoys crochet, knitting, tating and cross-stitch and of course she sewed most of the clothes her girls wore while they were growing up. She remembers making lined and tailored suits, coats and even two wedding dresses for her daughters.

She also loves to work crossword puzzles, jigsaw puzzles and play word games such as Boggle and Scrabble. June says she can hold her own with any of her family's college graduates when it comes to word games.

She says she isn't much of a club-joining person. She attends Sixth Street Church of Christ and belongs to the Parmer County Historical Society and the Parmer County Chapter of the American Heart Association. She and Glenn belonged to the Senior Citizens group for awhile.

June counts among the extra-special times in her life in recent years, the "Sister Get Togethers." She and her three sisters, Ola Bowers of Seagraves; Mary Bell Clements of Dalhart, and Rena Vaughan of Odessa, plus two brothers-in-law, Pete Clements and Homer Vaughan, like to arrange to spend several days together at one home or another for a three or four day session of "eating, sleeping and playing 42."

One of her very most favorite things to do is to go to Montana to visit her youngest daughter and son-in-law and three boys who live in a beautiful part of the country. She says Susan and Wes have lived there for 19 years and in that time, June has made 23 trips to visit them.

One time she went by plane and

did not enjoy the motion sickness at all. So she has traveled overland for the rest of her Montana visits, usually by bus and sometimes in someone's camper. She enjoys traveling by bus because you meet interesting people and smoking is not allowed on the buses. One time she traveled with her cousins Bill and Fadene Wooley of Ruidoso in their luxurious mobile home RV.

Her most harrowing travel experience was when she was returning home from Montana around Thanksgiving time in 1992. A huge ice storm had just hit the Midwest. She left by bus on Sunday evening and didn't get home to Friona until late Thursday afternoon.

"Snow was neck deep to a moose," June said, "And we had to stay overnight in Cheyenne."

The bus company put the travelers up at a hotel and they were able to catch another bus going south the next day. A local television commentator was at the bus station to interview June and the other stranded travelers. They got to watch themselves on the news that night at their hotel. June had met a nice lady on the bus. She was traveling to Denver and was crocheting an afghan, so the

two ladies struck up a friendship and shared their emergency hotel room that evening. June was amused by the fact that her bus driver thought she was Barbara Bush, the President's wife, traveling incognito.

June says the things she is best at are procrastination and cluttering up.

"But that's because I only have a slow gear now," she notes. "If I get up early and stay at something all day, I might accomplish what I used to do every morning before I went to work."

Her New Year's resolution for 1994 was to finish all the projects that she's already gotten started before she starts something new.

She has a little sign on her desk at home that reads: *"Procrastination is my sin. It brings me endless sorrow. I really must stop doing it. In fact, I'll begin tomorrow."*

However, in spite of what she says, June Floyd has accomplished quite a lot. In addition to raising a lovely family, she has been a part of the history of this area and there are 38 large bound volumes of newspapers down at the *Friona Star* office to prove it.

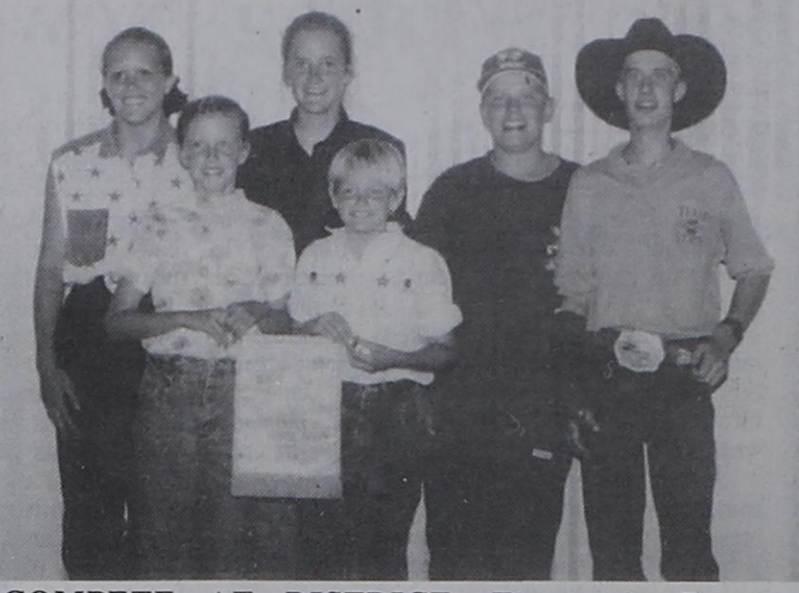

Cream margarine and powdered sugar until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Stir in flour. Add extract. Bake in loaf pan at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until done.

TUTTI-FRUITI SURPRISES
Ione Arnold

This is like fruit cake, full of good things.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees.
2 eggs
1 cup sifted powdered sugar
3 tablespoons shortening, melted
3/4 cup sifted flour
1-1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup chopped dates

Scrape sides of bowl into freezer and add enough milk to the ice cream mixture to fill to the line indicated on the freezer. This will make a 5 quart freezer full. Be sure to pack freezer with ice and then with ice cream salt (rock salt), several layers of each. Every time you add ice you may need to add salt.

1/2 cup butter
1 cup firmly packed light brown sugar

1/4 cup honey 1 teaspoon vanilla
Put the popped corn in a large shallow roasting pan. Sprinkle the almonds over it. Melt the butter in a quart sauce pan over low heat. Stir in brown sugar and honey. Increase heat to medium and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil gently 5 minutes without stirring. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Pour mixture over popped corn and almonds; stir until well mixed. Bake in a 250 degree oven stirring every 15 minutes for 1 hour. Cool completely and break apart. Store in tightly covered container. Makes about 3 quarts.

LIME SHERBET

1 package lime Jello
1 cup hot water 1 quart milk
1-1/2 cups sugar Juice of 2 lemons
Dissolve Jello in hot water. Add sugar, juice and milk. Hand freeze.

1-1/2 cups orange juice
Grated rind of 1 orange
1-1/2 cups sugar 3 cups milk
1/8 teaspoon salt

Mix juice, rind, salt and sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Blend slowly with milk, stirring constantly so milk will not curdle. Hand freeze.

PINEAPPLE-APRICOT SHERBET

1 can crushed pineapple
1 can apricot nectar
1-1/2 cups sugar
2 cups heavy cream

Whip cream. Add nectar and fruit. Pour into freezer and finish filling with milk. (1 package frozen peaches and 1 can peach nectar may be used in place of pineapple and apricot nectar.)

PERFECT PINEAPPLE SHERBET

2 cups buttermilk 1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-9 ounce can crushed pineapple
1 package Knox gelatin
2 tablespoons water 1 egg white

Combine first four ingredients. Add gelatin which has been softened in cold water and dissolved over hot water. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Freeze in freezer trays 3 to 4 hours. Stir once during freezing.

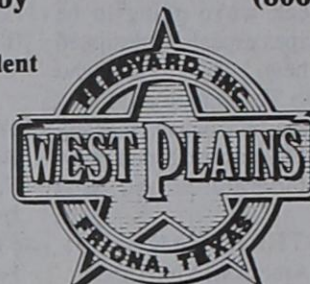

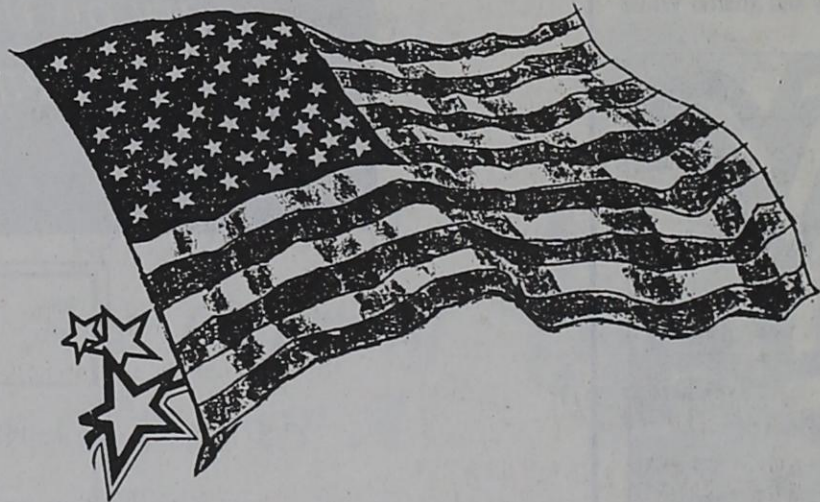


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Library Corner

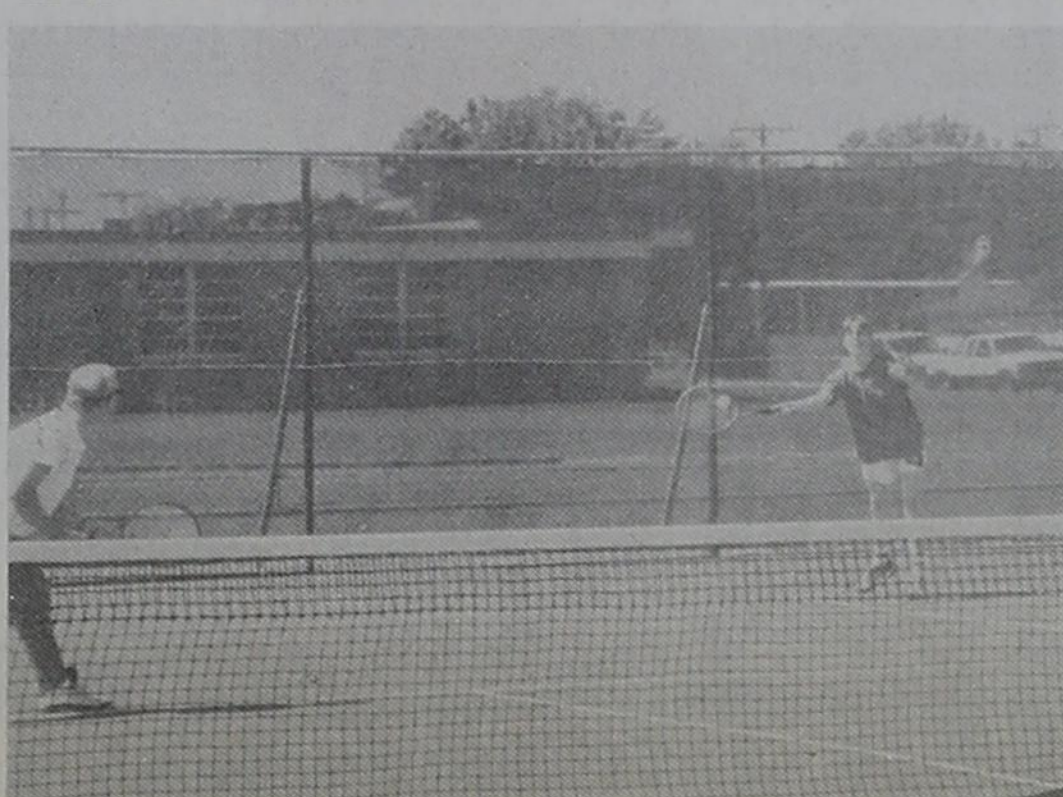
He had been a resident of Friona since 1962, moving from Springlake. He had been employed by the City of Friona in the sanitation department.

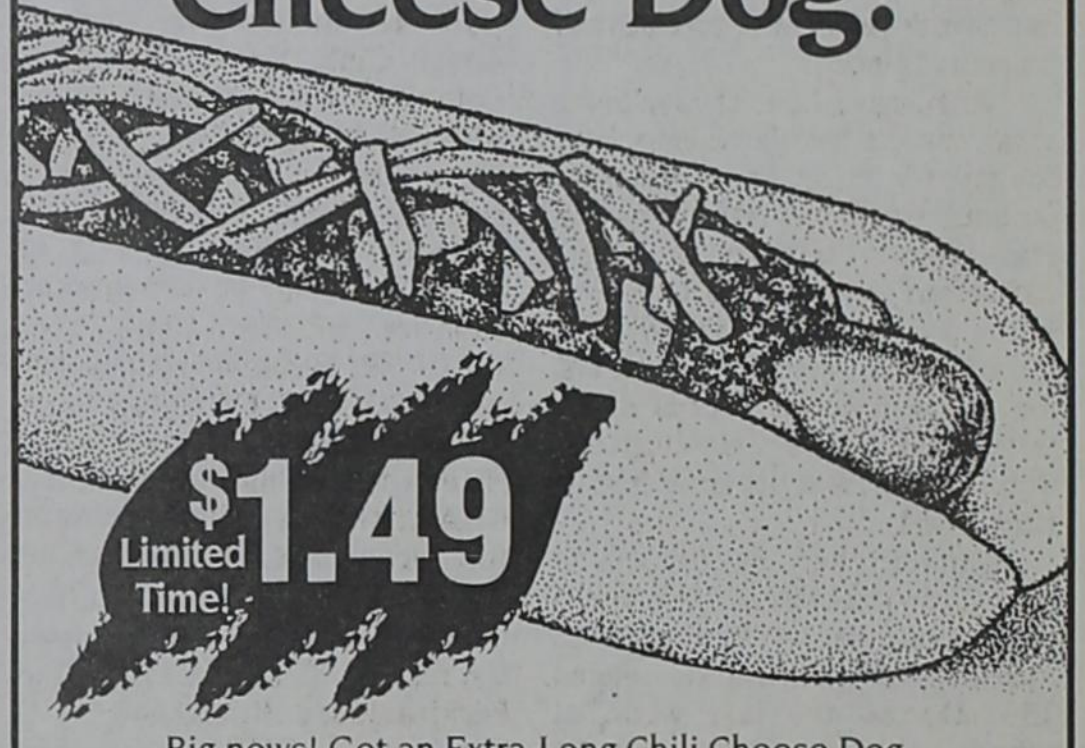

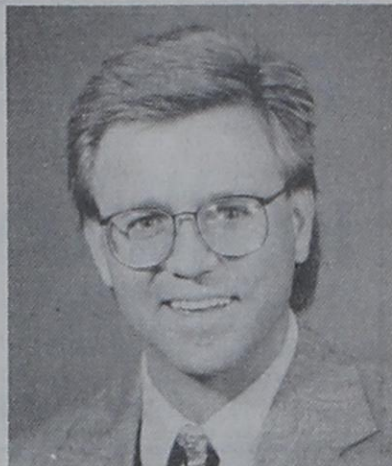

Two Employees Complete Texas Tech Bank Course

What You Should Know About Systematic Withdrawal

Systematic withdrawal is a service offered by many mutual funds. At your request the fund will send you regular checks for a specified amount. This can be a real benefit to individuals who need monthly checks to help meet living expenses.

Most mutual funds with a growth-and-income objective pay quarterly dividends and annual capital gain distributions. With systematic withdrawal, you can have part of the total return (dividends plus capital gains) distributed to you each month.

For example, assume a fund has historically averaged a total annual return of 12 per cent, consisting of a 4 per cent average annual dividend and an 8 per cent average annual gain. You set up an annual systematic withdrawal of 10 per cent, leaving your principal undisturbed as well as adding about 2 per cent a year to its value. As long as the fund continues to earn 12 per cent or more, your investment is working as planned.

However, what if the mutual fund has an unusually bad year? Suppose the fund is able to maintain its regular 4 per cent dividend, but due to a declining market, there are no capital gains. If you continue to withdraw the same amount, the fund will be

required to return part of your principal, and eventually you could run out of money.

To use systematic withdrawal properly, think of your fund as a bucket full of water. At the bottom is a faucet from which you regularly draw a cup of water. As long as you replace this with as much or more water than you withdraw, you will continue to have plenty of water. But if you continue to withdraw more than you replace, your water level will decrease, and your bucket may eventually run dry. The same happens if you systematically withdraw more than your fund is earning--your principal will decrease, and your investment may eventually run dry.

Does this mean you should avoid systematic withdrawal? Not at all. It just means that flexibility is the key. If total return decreases, decrease your withdrawal. By taking smaller withdrawals, you can monitor your investments until the principal begins to grow and builds a cushion. Or you can delay beginning withdrawals until the initial investment has grown.

Systematic withdrawal from carefully selected mutual funds can be an excellent way to receive regular income and still allow your investments to grow. But it requires understanding, monitoring and the flexibility to adjust to economic changes.
