## DIVIDE DRENCHED BY HEAVY RAINS

Dora Reports Heaviest Rain Of Year With Roads Impassable And Lakes Full Of Water

LAKE TRAMMELL RISES

Estimated Five Feet Of Water In Reservoir-Rains Extended Clear To Alpine-Light Here

Sweetwater was the extreme northern edge of a heavy rain that thoroughly drenched the southern part of Nolan county, put five feet of water in Lake Trammell and extended as far west as Alpine where the Orient junction with the Southern Pacific is lo

Precipitation estimated at between one and a half and two inches was reported on the Lake Trammell watershed, with the heaviest rain near the head end of the lake, Louis Polk of the City

Water works reported Thursday. The telephone operator at Blackwell estimated the rain there at one and a half inches, with good rains at Ft. Chadbourne, south, Norton and others surrounding points. Great benefit to crops is reported.

Mr. Jones at Dora reported the heaviest rain of the year in that section with more water in the lakes on that part of the divide than ever before. Auto traffic in that section is at a complete standstill and the roads will probably continue impassable until Friday or Saturday in Mr. Jones' opinion. Crops on the divide will be greatly benefited by the rain.

The Orient railway office here reoort heavy rains all the way from Sweetwater to Alpine but nothing to he north. It rained all night at San Angelo. Bronte, Robert Lee and other points reported good rains.

The rain in Sweetwater amounted to 41 of an inch according to the rainguage at the Sweetwater Vulcanizing company, bringing the total for the year to 18.39 inches.

#### NEFF IN LIMELIGHT

Quite a bit of interest has been stirred up in political circles by a reported interview with former governor Pat M. Neff while in Chicago this week attending a convention of a fraternal

The former governor dropped out of sight very thoroughly and very suddenly about January 1, 1925, but came ack from obscurity on the wings of what seems to be a sort of "tempest in a teapot."

According to the alleged interview, which Neff denies, the former governor landed on the Ferguson administration with both feet, criticising the pardon record, among other things, and concluding that while the Klan issue was dead in Texas politics, clean law enforcement was not; that it would be an issue at the coming election but would not require Attorney General Moody to decide it.


