## Santa Barbara Stricken By Earthquake Which Levels Business Section Causing Damage to Property—Many Casualties.

HUGE DEATH TOLL PREDICTED

Sixty-five Dead Counted at 10 A. M. In Partial Survey of Disaster-Flames Add to Horror-Water Works Not Functioning.

By United Pre SANTA BARBARA, June 29 .- At least eight persons were killed and approximately 300 were injured with property damage totalmore than two million dollars, caused by the earthquake which laid this famous resort city in ruins early today. Two bodies were re-covered shortly before noon and at least six others are missing.

State Street, beautiful main thoroughfare of the city, was a mass of ruins from the ocean to the Arlington Hotel. Buildings for blocks tumbled into the street. Early reports indicating that the loss of life was great were probably based on the fact that more than 100 inhabitants were missing and unaccounted for during the morning hours, it was said-Several others are still missing and the casualty list may yet run

information. Buildings were demolished, pavements were uprooted and the collapse

Rush Relief Workers

Santa Barbara and surrounding cities are isolated with rail and wire mmunication paralyzed. Special trains left Los Angeles and San Fransco with Red Cross and other relief. The tremor was general throughout outhern California, but apparently centered around Santa Barbara where damage and loss of life were greatest. The leading hotels tumbled to pieces and business blocks are in ruin.

Many Tremors Felt

The first tremor was felt over a arge area at 6:45 o'clock. At Santa Barbara and other cities the tremors shook a wide area at intervals of 20 minutes. Another tremor, of less evidence, shook Santa Barbara at 8:30 a. m. ,and spread further terror among the inhabitants.

There were a number of tall buildngs in the Santa Barbara business section and it is feared that many more persons lost their lives when they collapsed.
