A REFORM COMES TO GRIEF

Chicago courts are trying to unscramble the intricate affairs of the \$26,000,000 grain marketing corporation, which was organized a year ago ers. This venture into co-operation failed because those who were to have been its beneficiaries tacked faith in the merit of its purpose and the identity of its backers. In leader ship it was so close to the Chicago wheat pit and to the grain and beef trusts to inspire much confidence from the prairies. Indeed, some of the agricultural journals of that region openly counseled their readers against investment in its stock. Besides, the skyrocketing price of wheat and other farm products, which set in last midwinter gave every producer a convenient means of relieving his own worries. He had only to drive to the nearest town to solve the problem of co-operative marketing, with considerable advantage to his pocketbook. Now that the big effort to encourage nation-wide co-operation has failed it
