TO ASK WORK ON BANKHEAD EAST

B. C. D. Request Maintenance of Old Road While Construction Is In Progress East

EMPLOY • SAM GOLDMAN
Colorado Director To Take Charge Sweetwater Band—Will Play at Hyllton Picnic

Efforts will be made at once to secure some improvement in the road situation east of Sweetwater where construction companies are at work on the new Bankhead highway and where the old road is said to be almost impassable, according to plans outlined at the regular meeting of the Board of City Development here Monday night.

In a discussion of the road situation it was pointed out that the Bankhead Highway east of Sweetwater was in a very bad condition and that no maintenance work had been done along the highway for some time. Construction crews are at work on contracts that call for grading the road, which has been changed to some extent in a new routing, and for the construction of bridges and drainage structures.

While this work is going on, it was further pointed out the old road must be traveled and the road at this time is a "disgrace," according to members of the board.

It was said at the meeting that tourist travel is being diverted around Sweetwater on account of the road situation, while in some sections, reports are out that roads are torn up in this section, that detours must be traveled and that the roads are in a bad shape. As a matter of fact there is practically no detouring necessary on the highway east, and tourist travel and other traffic may travel the Bankhead without inconvenience, providing the old road is repaired to some extent until the new road is thrown open, it was brought out at the Monday night meeting.

Requests will probably be made at once through the proper sources for maintenance work on the Bankhead highway, it was indicated.

The session Monday night voted unanimously to employ Sam Goldman, director of the Gold Medal Band at Colorado, to instruct the Sweetwater Band once each week until further arrangements can be made in connection with the band situation.

The board also voted to send the local band to Hyllton Wednesday morning to play for the Hyllton picnic and Old Settlers reunion. The board also voted to purchase the necessary music for the band and to keep all music and supplies under the supervision of the board.

The board through Nolan County sheriff Jack Yarbrough, will extend an invitation to the Sheriff's Association in Sweetwater in 1926. Yarbrough will attend the convention in Beaumont and present the invitation from Sweetwater.

Prayer is being held each morning at 8 o'clock at the First Baptist church at Dayton. Rev. Moffett was pastor of the Baptist church in Sweetwater about fifteen years ago, and is well known here by many Sweetwater people who were living here at that time.

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LINES BURST AND FLOOD NEW YORK

Subterranean Floods Again Menace New York Traffic and Buildings—Clearing Tunnel

MORE PIPES BREAK
Two New Water Mains Burst During Night—Break Pavement—Shuttle Service Blocked

NEW YORK, July 14.—Subterranean floods continued to menace New York traffic and buildings today, and while authorities were hopeful of clearing the Steinway tunnel of water this morning they had to consider to damage caused by two additional breaks in water mains during the night.

One of these flooded Third avenue, the second occurring west of First avenue.

The Steinway tunnel, containing subway tubes under the East River, was filled for blocks, early today, with hundreds of thousands of gallons of water from the broken 20-inch main which burst Sunday night.

New breaks resulted in the upheaval of pavement and miniature geysers spouted from the streets. These were from smaller mains.

Shuttle service between the Grand Central terminal and Times Square was blocked.

PRAYER IS ISSUE IN SCOPES TRIAL

Heat, Humidity and Packed Court Room Augmented by Bitter Dispute at Opening of Session

DARROW IS STORM CENTER
Objects to Morning Prayer—Former Sweetwater Pastor Prays to Open Trial Monday

DAYTON, Tenn., July 14.—With heat and extreme humidity in the packed court room augmented by a bitter dispute at the very outset, the Scopes trial entered its third session amidst a flurry of argument today.

Clarence Darrow, one of the defense counsel whose thunderous speech in behalf of evolution and against "religious bigotry" created a sensation Monday, was again the storm center today.

Darrow objected to opening the sessions with prayer. He made the objection a formal one, and was overruled by Judge Raulston who said that prayer at the opening of court was not unreasonable.

"I don't object to praying in secret, but I do object to turning this court into a meeting house," exclaimed the famous Chicago lawyer.

Darrow asked Judge Raulston if there would be a prayer each morning. "Yes," answered the judge.

"And we will ask that the records show an objection each morning," said Darrow.

Judge Raulston then opened a recess to permit photographers to make pictures, and then adjourned court until 1 p. m. to complete his study on the argument for the dismissal motion.

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SOLDIER KILLED

San Antonio Private Gets Charge From Shot Gun In Chest—Investigating Killing

SAN ANTONIO, July 14.—Private Harry V. Steidman, Headquarters Co., 20th Infantry, is dead and military police are investigating circumstances surrounding the shooting.

Steidman received a charge from a 12 gauge shot gun in the chest, dying instantly.

Another soldier, the only eye witness, said he was trying to prevent Steidman from taking the shot gun from the store room when it accidentally discharged.

TRY TO PROMOTE CHINA MEETING

President Coolidge After International Accord to Carry Out Obligations To China

WANT CUSTOMS REVISIONS
Extra-Territoriality and Customs Are Important Matters to Be Discussed at Session

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 14.—The president is trying to promote an international accord under which all obligations made to China at the Washington arms conference will be carried out including conferences soon on both extra-territoriality and customs.

The president knows of no joint action in the Chinese situation by the United States, Great Britain and Japan, his spokesman said at the summer White House today.

Dispatches from Tokio reporting such agreements, with a view of postponing conferences on these two important questions, were based on a misunderstanding, Coolidge believes.

Is Encouraged
By United Press.
WASHINGTON, July 14.—The United States government is encouraged by the results of its conversations with powers for the holding of a Chinese conference on extra-territoriality and customs revision without main said today.

Negotiations are proceeding in Peking for unified action of all powers, and are expected to be completed so that the conference may be held early in the fall.

There has been no separate agreement reached by the United States and Great Britain for conferences, department officials said.

KANSAS CITY, July 14.—One person died from heat prostration here yesterday and two others were overcome when the temperature reached 95.

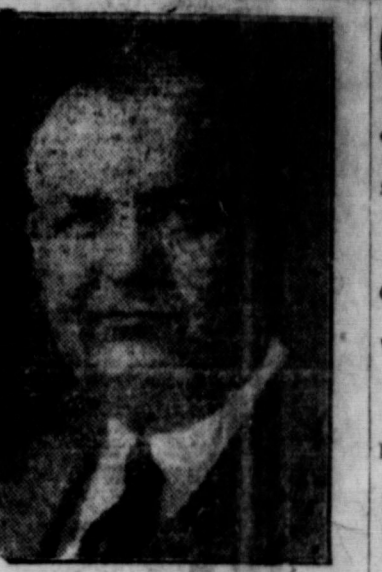
The excessive humidity added to the discomfort caused by the heat. Showers last night cooled the city off somewhat.

GERMAN UNION IS FEAR OF NATIONS

France and Italy Believe Real Issue in Possibility of German-Austro Union

MINISTERS ARE OPPOSED
Maintain Discreet Silence But Are Known to Oppose Union—Of Economic Value

BERLIN, July 14.—Europe's ears are being reshuffled in connection with negotiations for a security pact. France claims that Germany has a king up her sleeve, along with plenty of well-armed jacks. The French also fear that Germany, once granted a seat around the green cloth with other players, will suddenly produce the highest trump in the form of a union with Austria.

In one sense, France and Italy are certainly justified in regarding Austro-German union as a real living issue; the inhabitants of both Austria and Germany are overwhelmingly in favor of breaking down their frontier and becoming a single state. A plebiscite in wide sections of Austria a few years ago showed that more than 85 per cent of the population wants to join Germany and considers this the ultimate solution of Austria's dilemma. No political party in either country would dare to come into the open against the demand for union.

A Striking Fact
It is a striking fact, however, that the present foreign ministers of these two nations, while maintaining a discreet silence on the issue are at heart equally bitter adversaries of union. The Austrian foreign minister, Mataja obviously fears that such a union would mean the submergence of the political strength of the Austrian Catholic church beneath the dominant protestantism of Prussia. The German foreign minister, Stresemann, fears that his Socialist opponents in Germany would be greatly strengthened by the voting power of more than a million organized social-democrats from Austria. Moreover, the parties of the Right, which Stresemann represents, are monarchist in sympathy and objective. Almost the entire voting population of Austria is Republican. Therefore, if Austria were able to throw her Republican vote into the scale of the German elections, Stresemann and his royalist friends would be faced with certain defeat at every poll.

Ruse of Diplomacy
And so nations are witnessing the amazing spectacle of two foreign ministers resorting to every use of diplomacy to prevent the union of Germany and Austria, while the vast majority of their fellow citizens ardently wish to obliterate the frontier and unite.

While the Clerical Party in Austria and the Nationalist groups in Germany continue to be the strongest powers—and this is likely for many years—

OREGON SCENE OF JAP LABOR ROW

Score of Japanese Mill Workers Are Forged Out of Toledo by White Laborers

GOVERNOR IS SILENT
Will Not Comment on Situation—Complain of Jap Wages—Tokio Japan Indignant

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—Except to admit that the situation is "serious", Governor Walter M. Pierce so far has refused to comment on the affair at Toledo, Oregon, where a score of Japanese mill workers were forced out of town Sunday.

Some action was looked for from the Governor's office.

Citizens of Toledo appeared before him and complained about the importation of Japanese laborers into that city by the Pacific Spruce Corporation. They showed that the Japanese laborers were paid \$2.40 a day, while white laborers were paid \$3.60 to \$4 a day for the same type of work.

Expect Peaceful Settlement

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—Differences between the white laborers and the owners of the Pacific Spruce Corporation over the employing of Japanese laborers will probably be settled peacefully, C. H. Cram, state labor commissioner told Governor Pierce today.

Tokio Aroused
TOKIO, Japan, July 14.—The foreign offices are investigating reports from Toledo, Oregon, that a mob ejected 15 Japanese laborers of the Pacific Spruce Corporation from the city. Newspapers carried the dispatches which aroused wide-spread indignation.

NOT RESPECTED

Lecturer at University of California Says College Students Show No Respect for Elders

BERKELEY, Cal., July 14.—American college students are a likely lot but they have entirely too little respect for their elders. And American college professors are overworked.

These opinions represent the attitude of Dr. Franz X. Schaffer, geologist at the University of Vienna. After delivering a series of lectures at the University of California.

"I live in constant dread of being called 'Franz' by some sociable girl or being slapped on the back by some young freshman," he said. "I am amazed at the familiarity of American students."

Judging from what he has seen at the university here, the Austrian geologist believes that American professors work too hard.

"They give too many lectures," said Dr. Schaffer.

"Then too, they assume too much responsibility. Why should a professor concern himself whether the students attend lectures or not? The professor should not be responsible for the progress of a student. That is the student's business."

NAME PRIZES IN YARD CONTESTS

Fifty Dollars in Cash to be Awarded Winners in City's Annual Beautiful Yard Contest

NAME THREE DISTRICTS
City Divided in Three Divisions With Set of Prizes for Each District Want New Yards

Prizes that are to be distributed among Sweetwater residents who have the prettiest yards by August 3 when this city's annual Beautiful Yard contest ends, were announced today by the Board of City Development the organization that is sponsoring the affair.

The prizes total \$50 and will be distributed in various districts for the various divisions of the contest which include the prettiest front yards, the prettiest front yards this year and the prettiest back yards.

The city has been divided into three sections for the contest and a full set of cash awards will be given each district.

The eastern district includes all of the city north of the Texas and Pacific railroad and east of Oak street. The western division is that portion of the town lying west of Oak Street and the southern district is the entire south side, south of the Texas and Pacific.

For the prettiest front yard in the entire city, regardless of district, a first prize of \$10 will be given with \$5 a second prize.

Prizes of \$5, \$5 and \$2 will be awarded in each of the three districts for the prettiest yards, the results of this year's work. This is to encourage the development and beautification of new yards over the city. B. C. D. officials stated, and these prizes will go to residents who have developed their yards since the first of the year.

The back yard contest is open to all. Prizes of \$3 first and \$2 second, will be awarded in each of the three districts in the back yard contest. The active management of the contests are in charge of the ladies auxiliary to the Board. A committee of ladies will make tours of the city after August 3 to select the winning yards.

SCATTER PHOTOS OF THRILL KILLER

Army Airmen to Drop Hundreds of Pictures of Deserter-Slayer Over Northeast States

TRAIL DOUBLES BACK
Search for Phillip Knox Knapp In His Home Town—May Have Returned To Scene of Crime

NEW YORK, July 14.—While an army of airmen prepared to scatter hundreds of photographs of Phillip Knox Knapp, "thrill slayer," from Plattsburg along the Canadian border the statewide man hunt doubled back today to Syracuse, the missing man's home town, and to Long Island.

Authorities were endeavoring to check a report that the Cornell graduate and army deserter, who is wanted for the murder of Louis Panella, taxicab driver, July 1, had returned to Syracuse after the crime, fleeing with a companion in a stolen automobile.

He also had a mysterious long distance telephone call from Long Island which is taken as a possible clue that the fugitive had returned to a hiding place near the scene of the crime.

The deserter has shown unusual cunning in making good his escape up to the present.

HUNT BANDIT

Posses With Bloodhounds Trail Hijacker That Killed Man and Injured Daughter

CAMDEN, Ark., July 14.—Posses with blood hounds were out today searching for a single hijacker that shot and killed James N. Moore, 65, and wounded Miss Tricie Moore in a robbery attempt near here during the night.

AND NOTHING HAPPENED

Delegates to the national convention of the Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs in session at Dallas, did not spend all their time sightseeing. If the very beginning they heard an address from their vice-president, Miss Florence Sands of Dallas, giving "nine reasons why women fail in business." The specifications were: Too much rouge, lack of confidence in other women, distraction by outside interests, and lack of vision, initiative, intolerance, co-operation and self control. News dispatches report that the convention accepted this analysis of causes with not a single delegate's entering a protest or suggesting an amendment. But would there have been such passive harmony or concurrence if some hard-boiled organization boss were to offer the same set of reasons to account for the failure of the balloting ladies to set the world afire when they dedicated their talents to the uplift of politics, and public service? Let any boss try it and he would provoke an indignation meeting that would extend from coast to coast.

IN NOLAN COUNTY

Two hundred eager, lively trained Boy Scouts from three West Texas counties will join their brother Scouts of Nolan County in a ten-day camp on the Rudd ranch early next month. After searching all over West Texas, Scout officials of the Buffalo Trail Council have come to the decision that no where in this entire section is there such a beauty spot, an ideal camping place, as that beautiful ranch land in southwest Nolan county. And so the boyhood of four counties will gather in Nolan county for ten days to study and practice those things which are a part of the great Scouting program.

To many people who are not well versed on the greatness of their own county, the many beauty spots and the scenic beauties where mountains, hills, woods and streams lie untouched where nature left them a trip to the Scouts' camp in August would be a revelation. And Scout leaders are especially anxious that friends and parents of the boys visit the "Boy City" on the Rudd ranch next month. It will be well worth while for the grownups to actually see what 200 boys learn and do under direction of splendid, honorable men, Scout leaders of the highest character.

Sweetwater and Nolan county is proud of the fact that the boys and their leaders have chosen our own neighborhood as their camping place, of the ranch owner who offered the splendid camp site, of the leaders who are giving their time and best efforts in carrying on the worthy Scout program and of the scouts themselves, who are already on the right road to honorable and upright manhood.

SPIKING A FALSE ALARM

Once in a while some bureau of government manages to make excellent time in tracking a public misapprehension to its lair. Last week a report was going the rounds of the newspapers, repeated from previous statements by public speakers and writers to the effect that farmers' wives are more subject to insanity than women of other vocations, because of the alleged monotony of their lives. Dr. C. E. Thorne, director of the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station at Wooster, resolved to refute this statistical libel then and there. A request for information addressed to the superintendents of all state hospitals for the insane in Ohio brought instant replies, the substance of which was well expressed in that received from Supt. Guy H. Williams of the Cleveland state hospital. Supt. Williams reported: "Inasmuch as we very seldom receive either a man or a woman in this institution who has been living on a farm, our statistics would not be worth anything along this line."

Director Thorne then pursued his inquiry into all the state hospitals throughout the country and found that not only was the proportion of women admitted nearly twice as great from cities as from rural communities but relatively more men than women were received from both community classes. This prompts the director to remark: "The majority of farmers' wives are happy in their vocation, even though it does involve hard labor and privation. No lover of truth will willingly add to the burden of the few who, because of ill health or other reasons, are discontented, by leading them to believe that because their vocation they are peculiarly liable to the most terrible human misfortunes."

years to come—France and Italy have their most trusted allies in the foreign offices of the two countries which they wish to keep apart.

Sooner or later, though, Austria's amalgamation with Germany is destined to become a grave probability, and perhaps a fact. The interests of both countries in the opinion of competent European observers must lead them to join one another.

Brailsford's Prediction
In the early days after the war, the British political publicist, Brailsford, predicted that if Austria were forced to live according to the conditions fixed by the Versailles and St. Germain treaties, Vienna would become a "desolate village, surrounded by a cemetery." Mr. Brailsford's phrase was probably coined too picturesquely, but his fundamental thought has been

The rich grain stores, upon which the defunct Austro-Hungarian empire formerly drew, now belong to Roumania, Jugoslavia and Hungary, and high tariff walls make these food supplies almost inaccessible to Austria.

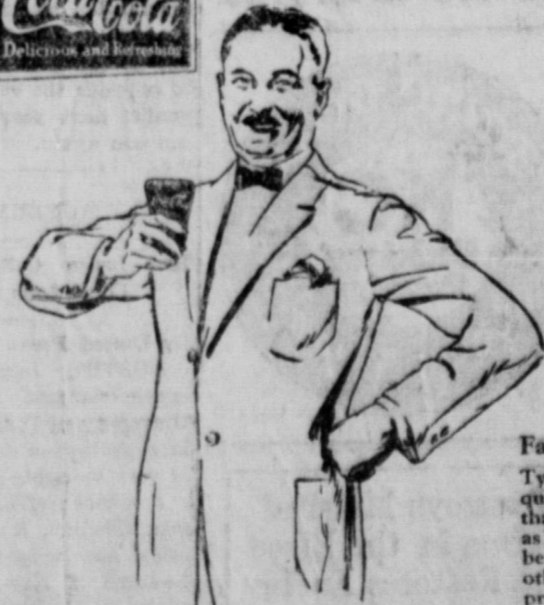

Peddlers at Convention Have Monkey Trial—Chitwood on Defense

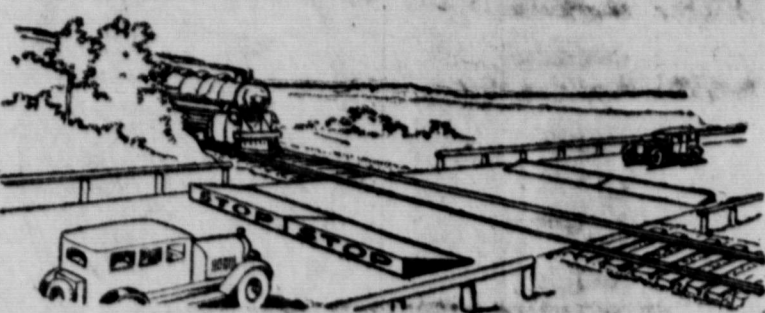

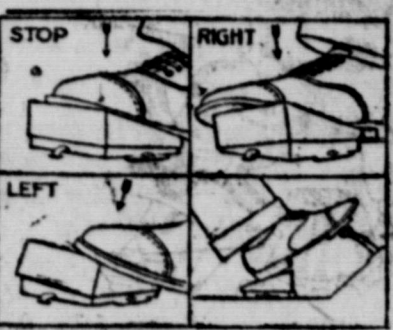


Roadway Raised as Barrier to Guard Crossings

Barricades operated by hydraulic pressure applied by the trains, have been suggested for prevention of accidents at railway crossings. They are to be constructed as triangular platforms elevated from the road level by the weight of the engine and cars, and sink back to a horizontal position when the train has passed. Vivid "Stop" signs on the sides, illuminated at night, would give motorists ample warning at a distance.

Foot Switch for Car Signals Increases Auto Safety

Stop-signals and direction lights are flashed for the guidance of motorists by pressing a foot switch fitted on the bot-



tom of the car so that the driver need not remove his hands from the steering wheel. It may be operated either

by the heel or toe, pressure in the middle turning on the stop light and a turn of the foot to the right or left, making contact that light the corresponding signal lamps. The switch is also adapted for opening electric latches on office doors, and for ringing call or alarm bells and buzzers. It is easily installed and has no parts likely to get out of order.

Hundred Bolts of Lightning Flash Every Second

According to a London weather-bureau report, there are about 1,800 thunderstorms in progress every minute throughout the world, giving 360,000 lightning flashes an hour or 100 every second. Observations made from 3,000 stations, indicate that the earth experiences 10,000,000 storms of this character each year, about 44,000 daily. At certain points in tropical countries, during the rainy season, distant thunder is such a common occurrence that the observer frequently forgets to enter it in his register.

"Deadliest Ray" Is Reported

Said to be more destructive than any previous invention of its kind, a new death ray discovered by a German has an effective ground range of forty miles and operates at an altitude of more than 45,000 feet. Men and animals are rendered unconscious by the mysterious force of its waves, the paralyzing influence lasting for six hours, according to reports to the department of commerce.

Oil Extracted from Locusts Lubricates Watches

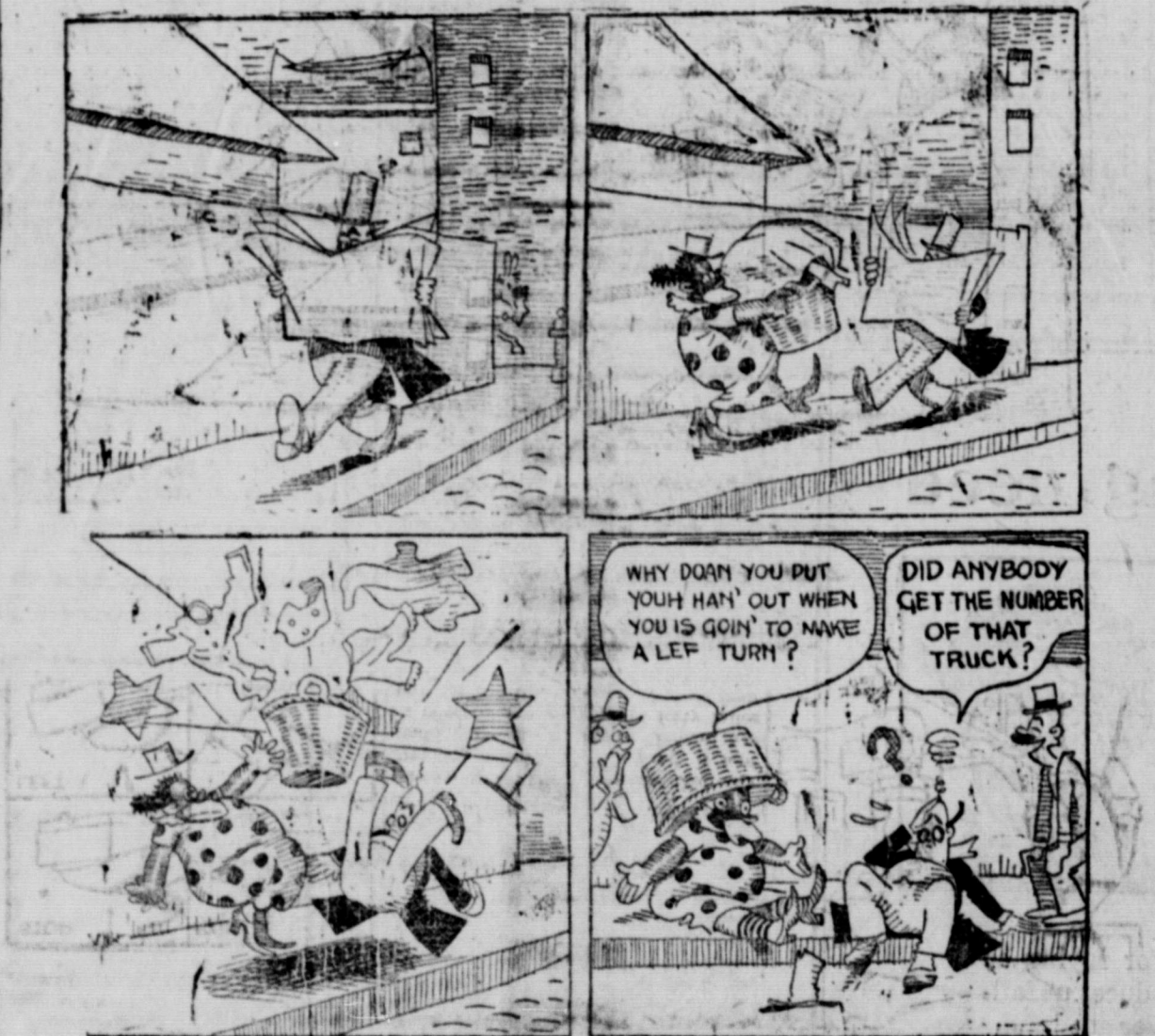
Oil extracted from locusts is being used in South Africa as a substitute for kerosene oil as a lubricant for watches and other delicate mechanisms. The insects are fed into presses which crush them and the resultant oil is refined and allowed to stand for a year. Its quality is then determined by its color, consistency and odor. The solid matter remaining after the oil is extracted, is made into cakes that are used for poultry feed and defray much of the expense of making the oil.

Improved Electric Stove

When one housewife wanted an electric stove, she took a tin can, 6 in. square and 6 in. high, and cut a slot, 6 in. long and about 1 in. wide, in one side with a can opener. One end was also cut open. The electric flatiron was slipped into the slot with the bottom up, as shown, and the stove was ready for cooking. All kinds of liquids may be kept hot on it, and it has various other uses.
