LEE SPEAKS TO SLATON CROWDS

South Plains Hears President of West Texas C. of C. in Address Wednesday Afternoon

DISCUSSES

Raps Too Extensive Policy of Cultivation-Urges Production of Livestock and Feed

Special to Reporter. SLATON, July 16 .- The South Plains heard R. Q. Lee of Cisco, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce expound his doctrine of intensive and diversified farming when Mr. Lee spoke at Lubbock Tuesday night before one of the largest crowds that has yet gathered to hear him. Wednesday afternoon he spoke at Slaton to a gathering of farmers and business men and a number who heard him at Lubbock made the trip here to hear his speech again.

In the gathering were a number of county agriculture agents and the agricultural expert of the Santa Fe railway.

Lee rapped too extensive policy of cultivation, declaring that West Texas farmers are prone to spread over too much ground. He mentioned irrigated farms he had visited that were suffering and causing their owners loss solely because one man was trying to cultivate too much land.

## BRYAN TO SPEAK AT SCOPES TRIAL

Will Address Judge Raulston This Afternoon on Prosecution's Motion To Exclude Experts

FIGHT SCIENTIFIC EVIDENCE

Prosecution Maintains Scientific Evidence Not Warranted-Defense Declares Is Necessity

By United Press.

COURT ROOM, Dayton, Tenn., July 16 .- William Jennings Bryan will make his first formal appearance in the Scopes evolution trial this afternoon.

He will address Judge Raulston on the motion of the prosecution to exclude scientific evidence concerning evolution and the Bible which the defense seeks to offer. The morning session was devoted to a series of arguments by counsel on

both sides on the motion. The defense held that neither the judge nor the jury could decide the issue in the case without expert testi-

The prosecution maintained that the Tennessee anti-evolution law is sufficiently clear as to what evolution is and what the Bibical theory of creation is as to not warrant such evi-






Orient Railway Calls Attention To Problems Contronting New Management

Some persons may have the mistaken idea that reorganization solved the Orient Railway's operating difficulties. Such a step did nothing to remove causes which contributed to the trials of receivership. Two chief difficulties harassed the Orient management during receivership and still exist. The line where completed serves a new territory and does not provide sufficient local traffic to meet costs of operation. It lacks completion which is necessary to make it a trans-continental carrier as originally

There has been an increasing local traffic with the development that has come to southern Oklahoma and West Texas. However, it will require several years for local traffic to reach a point of sufficient volume to become an important factor in the Orient's maintenance. We are able to handle California business satisfactorily through arrangements with our connections. We are constantly improving this service.

It is the purpose of the new company to complete the line from Kansas City to our Pacific port of Toplobampo in Mexico, as quickly as funds for this purpose can be procured. Our immediate problem is the replacement of equipment necessary to maintain the quality of service the new company is determined to give its patrons. Our old box cars are being completely rebuilt in our shops at Wichita, Kansas, and 500 cars (new) are to be bought to augment this supply. Five large freight locomotives are under construction for delivery by early fall. The road bed is being re-tied and a ditching machine has been purchased for use in improving the right-of-way. We feel the Orient is now able to offer a service comparable to any other western road.

The policy of the new company will be to maintain the co-operation of our patrons by giving the best service our resources will permit. We hope to maintain the cordial relationship that always has existed between the Orient and its people. Our chief aim is to serve our people well. Toward this end our program is directed.


