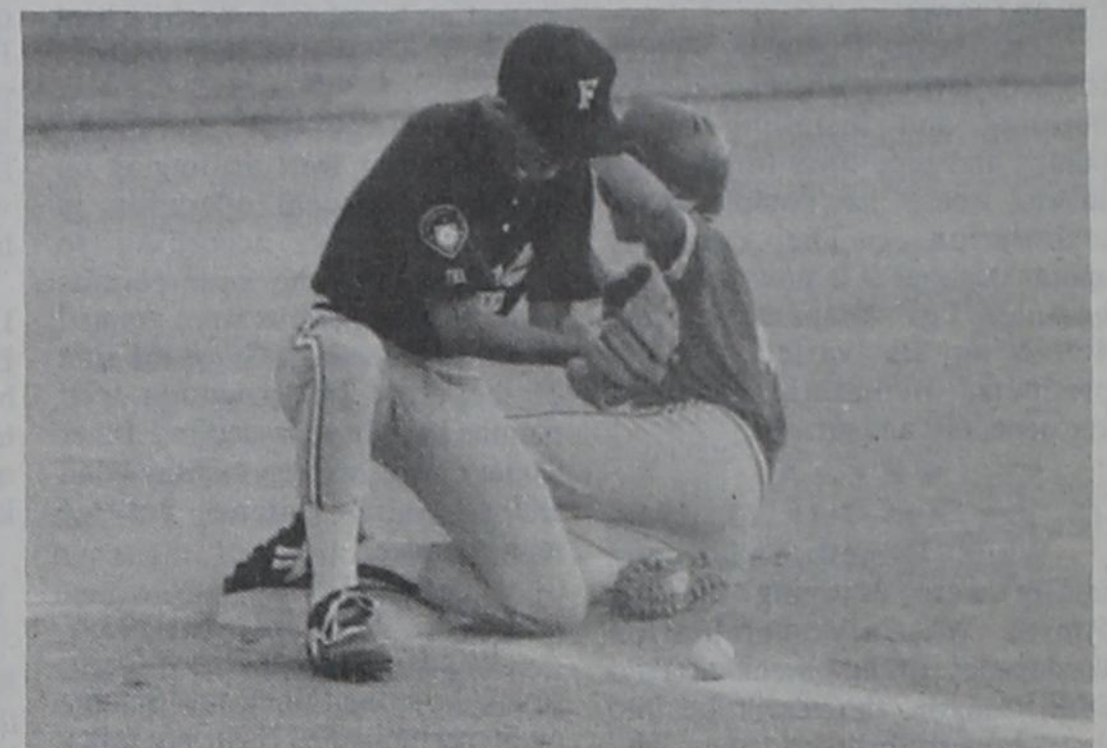

## New Dialing System Is Being Introduced

Area customers of telephone service providers such as West Texas Rural Telephone, GTE and Southwestern Bell are reminded that effective July 3, it will be permitted to include the 806 area code when making a long distance call within the 806 area code.

Effective January 3, 1995, including the area code on all long distance telephone calls will no longer be optional. Customers will

created new area codes to address the situation.

New codes will be phased in beginning in January of 1995, and will have a middle digit of 2 through 9, where previously, all area codes had a 0 or 1 as the middle digit.

Southwestern Bell reports that when the new area code plan is introduced, many office phone systems, including PBX's and Key Systems, will be unable to process some types of calls unless appropriate changes are made. Any necessary changes to PBX or Key System equipment to accommodate the new 11-digit dialing pattern and new area codes must be complete by January 3, 1995. Failure to (Continued on Page 9)

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

## 65 Yrs. Ago--July 12, 1929

The City Commission Tuesday morning granted a franchise to the West Texas Gas Company for supplying gas to the city for lights, fuel and power.

The Texas Company, which has been erecting offices and sales building and installing tanks, pumps and pipe lines for the past several weeks, has completed the installation. The company announces that it is now ready for business of dispensing and delivering its varied line of products, including gasoline, kerosene, oils and greases.

## 60 Yrs. Ago--July 13, 1934

While Everett Talbot and family were enjoying the big Fourth of July celebration Wednesday of last week at Palo Duro Canyon, thieves broke into their home north of town and carried away a large number of articles including family apparel and other property.

Arrangements have been completed for the "Musical Grays Big Tent Show" to be in Friona one week starting Monday, July 16. This same show was in Friona last summer.

## 55 Yrs. Ago--July 14, 1939

Roy Price, who has for the past decade or nearly so, been operating a jeweler's shop here, informs the Star that he has decided to move his equipment to his home on the farm near Black and discontinue his business here.

The room in the M. C. Crum building, which has been vacant since the Regal Theatre moved from it a few weeks ago, is again occupied as a grocery store. The new stock was placed in the store and the store opened for business Monday with Mr. P. Dobbs, formerly of Friona, in charge.

## 50 Yrs. Ago--July 14, 1944

A meeting was held at the Club House on Thursday afternoon, July 6, for the discussion of a proposal to organize what will be known as the Friona Cemetery Association. This was a preliminary meeting of representatives of various civic and religious organizations.

The rate on government wheat loans has been increased seven cents a bushel, it was announced this week at the local AAA office. The newly announced rates are \$1.35 a bushel on warehouse-stored wheat and \$1.42 a bushel on farm-stored.

## 40 Yrs. Ago--July 9, 1954

Irrigation well drilling is no longer a seasonal operation in Parmer County, according to committeemen who issue permits here. Fifteen permits were granted at the last meeting. Since the first of the year, 240 irrigation well permits have been issued to Parmer County residents, reports Raymond Euler, Farm Bureau Service representative.

## 35 Yrs. Ago--July 9, 1959

Winds of tornadic velocity struck the entire Friona area Sunday night, accompanied by heavy rains. One tornado was reported about 9:15 p.m. on the J. E. Knight farm about two miles east of Friona. It was reported by Jack Williams, who was combining on the farm immediately before the weather struck.

## 30 Yrs. Ago--July 9, 1964

The sale of Harry's Supermarket in Friona and Dimmitt, was announced this past week. Roy Keith Moore of Chilicothe and Kenneth Moore of Olton purchased the store from Harry Brown of Dimmitt. The brothers currently operate grocery businesses where they live.

## 25 Yrs. Ago--July 10, 1969

Mr. and Mrs. Leland Hutson are celebrating the opening of their new White's Auto Store with a grand opening sale Friday and Saturday. The store is located on West Highway 60 and Highway 214.

The Friona City Council passed Ordinance 424, raising water rates for the city, and establishing a water tap fee and new water deposit fees, during the regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The new rates, which will go into effect on September 21 after the annual summer water rates expire, will increase the water bill

of Friona residents an estimated five to six per cent on the average.

## 20 Yrs. Ago--July 14, 1974

Johnny Spring, 14-year-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Paul Spring of Friona, was injured Sunday while practicing roping a calf during the weekly "playday" activities when he became entangled in the rope and was dragged a considerable distance by his horse.

Fred Locker, an employee of Longhorn Spraying service, Lazbuddie, escaped with burns after his spray plane crashed and was totally demolished about three and one-half miles southeast of Lazbuddie Wednesday afternoon.

## 15 Yrs. Ago--July 15, 1979

Friona's major industry, MBPXL beef processors, added to the plant's appearance this week by installing eight flags on the front of the building, representing the eight locations of plants and offices in the corporations's chain, which sprawls across six states.

Jim Johnston was installed as the new president of the Friona Evening Lions.

## 10 Yrs. Ago--July 22, 1984

Cotton farmers in the Friona area have experienced massive damage from the herbicide, 2,4-D, it was reported this week. The damage appears to cover an area from Farwell to Friona and Hereford, and south to Muleshoe. Representatives from the Texas Department of Agriculture have been in the Friona area all week, inspecting the cotton and documenting the situation.

## 5 Yrs. Ago--July 15, 1989

Wayne and Judy Rhodes celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary with a surprise family party at their home on Wednesday, July 5.

Funeral services for Calvin Talley, 68, were held Friday morning, July 14 at First Baptist Church.

The Friona City Council considered bids that the city had received on the proposed purchase of a new fire truck at the council's regular meeting, July 10.

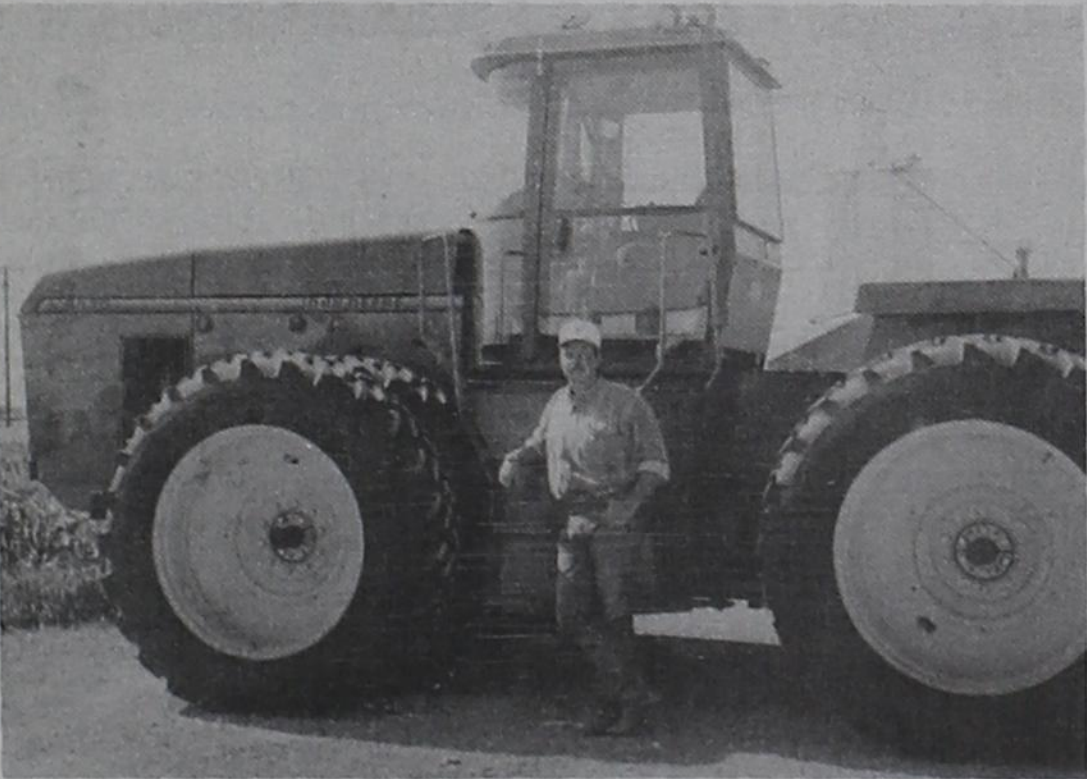

## Photographer Documents Panhandle Communities

This summer exhibit at the Square House Museum in Panhandle will appeal to every resident of the region as well as to

the traveling public.

Jim Jordan of Amarillo has spent two years photographically documenting the communities which lie along the Panhandle's major highways. The exhibit consists of 50 pairs of black and white photographs, each pair depicting the skyline and an in-town view of a city or town.

The 100 pictures are organized by the highway that passes through the community, resulting in four groups of pictures: I-40, U.S. 287, I-27 and U.S. 60.

These are the routes that cross the region from corner to corner or border to border, each one passing through and intersecting the others in Amarillo. Each group of photographs includes a large map for orientation, and the exhibit as a whole is introduced by Mike Harter, Amarillo teacher and regional geographer.

"The Panhandle, being majestically open and flat, is a place where you can count the trees twenty miles away and see from town to town thanks to the grain elevators," says Jordan. "Many of these stately structures were appropriately spaced by the railroad companies at the turn of the century as collection points for their freight business."

There are a lot of elevators in this exhibit, of course, but not everywhere. Only in an exhibit of this scope can the viewer see and appreciate the differences as well as the similarities across the 26,000 square miles of the Texas Panhandle.

Jordan was born in Plainview and "missed being a native son of the Panhandle by about nine miles." He is a retired City of Amarillo wastewater treatment supervisor and considers himself an avocational photographer specializing in Texas Panhandle rural photography and landscapes.

A graduate of Amarillo College, he has attended the University of Texas-Austin and studied photography at Amarillo College.

"Xing the Panhandle" will be on exhibit in the Hazlewood Building through August 28. The Square House Museum opens to the public at 8:30 a.m., Monday-Friday, 9 a.m. on Saturday and 1 p.m. on Sunday, and closes at 5:30 p.m. every day. Admission to the museum and to the exhibit is free. The public is also invited to a reception for Jim Jordan from 3-4:30 p.m. on Sunday, July 17. For more information, please call 537-3524.

boisterous thunderstorm moved across the area, following a day of much cooler temperatures, on the heels of a light "norther." The high temperature registered at Friona's National Weather Service recording station was 81 degrees, which felt considerably better than the 100+ that we had endured earlier this month and in late June.

Friona's official gauge caught 1.26 inches of rain that night, while Bovina got .57 inches. On Saturday night, Bovina added another .06 inches. The rainfall was somewhat heavier to the north of Bovina in the Rhea community.

Then on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings of this week, a couple of wicked-looking clouds traversed the area, leaving not too much moisture, but threatening with lightning, along with high winds.

Both evenings, tremendous down-draft winds kicked up dust at the perimeter of the clouds, giving a tornado-look. The clouds produced very little beneficial moisture, with Bovina measuring .11 inch and Friona .31 inch on Wednesday, and none from Tuesday's "blow."

It was reported, however, that the Lazbuddie area received better luck from the Tuesday cloud, with one farmer reporting .7 inch that evening.

High temperatures during the week ranged from the 81 of last Friday to 94 on Monday and Tuesday. Thursday morning's low was 57 degrees—the first time for a reading in the 50s since early in June.

For the most part, crops are looking good, in spite of the high temperatures during the past month, accompanied by some high winds. Farmers have had to keep their pumps running constantly, however.

# Happy Homemaker

As a general rule, grapes produce bountifully each year and grape jelly is a favorite of many Panhandle residents. I've canned an immeasurable amount of grape juice, but had never known it could be canned as recommended by Donna Miller Mears in the Miller-Roysden Cookbook and Genealogy. Could anything be simpler?

### GRAPE JUICE

In half gallon jars, put 4 cups grapes and 3 cups sugar. Pour boiling water until it runs over the top. Seal immediately. Let cool, then invert. (If you prefer to use a syrup pack, use 2 cups sugar to 1 cup water.) Store in cool place.

For quart jars, use 2 cups grapes and 1-1/2 cups sugar.

Most of the ingredients in the following recipes grow in the garden of Roy and Eva Miller, as well in gardens all over the country. **CHA-CHA or CHOW-CHOW**  
2 gallons large green tomatoes  
1/2 head green cabbage  
5 large or 8 small white onions  
10 bell peppers  
1 quart white vinegar  
3 cups sugar  
2 tablespoons salt  
2 tablespoons ground mustard  
2 tablespoons celery seeds  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon allspice  
1/2 teaspoon cloves

Run tomatoes through colander. Let drain. Grind cabbage and onions and mix together with all other ingredients. Cook until mixture changes color—about 30 minutes. Fill sterilized jars to 1/4 inch from rim and seal immediately.

### CORN FOR FREEZER (CREAM STYLE)

Corn should be done the same day it is gathered.

Shuck, silk and clean your corn and place in cold water. Clip grains from cobs using corn cutter and scrape ears for milk and germ.

I use the microwave. I cook the corn in a large Pyrex bowl. Fill the bowl with corn until almost full. Add 1 cup water. Cook 12 minutes. Stir. Cook 12

more minutes (covered both times). Remove and cool.

Or, I also use roaster pans and cook in 350 degree oven—stirring occasionally until corn is transparent—about 15 or 20 minutes.

Cool. Bag and seal in Seal-a-Meal bags of desired size. Freeze immediately.

### PEAS FOR FREEZER

(Crowder peas, black eyes, butter beans or butter peas)

Pick and shell peas. I prefer not to leave them in refrigerator overnight. If you do, do not wash until you are ready to prepare.

Put in large kettle of boiling water. Make sure peas are covered. Cook 10 minutes. Drain. Place in ice water until chilled. Bag and

seal.

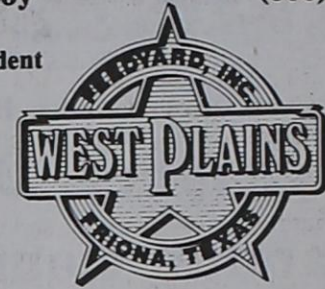

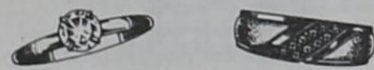

At 7 p.m. the entertainment was provided by each family representative, some comedy and some very serious, with not just a few tears shed, but all enjoyed remembering the wonderful past and present fellowship by the Phipps Clan.

A mock wedding was held with Minister Billy Jack Phipps. The bride, Beth Watson was lovely dressed in a long emerald green gown of the 1890's period, decorated with braid and beads and featuring a lace inset in the skirt, was given in marriage by father, Clark Phipps. Marjorie Richuber, dressed in a long blue gown trimmed with white braid, fashioned in the 1890's period also, served as bridesmaid. Glen Phipps served as groom. Playing soft music on the harp was Sarah Watson.

The dresses were designed and made by Beth Watson.

Tables were covered with maroon taffeta skirts with lace overlay, centered by a three tier wedding cake featuring large buttercream roses and ribbons. Silver and crystal appointments with fruit, melon, assorted vegetables and finger foods were enjoyed for the evening meal, as

Mary Alice died January 31, 1948 and Jerry Clark died February 5, 1959.

Charlie and Jerry came to Bailey County in 1925. Jerry Clark had purchased two sections at Stegall. He sold one section to Charlie and that is where they settled. Charlie moved to Muleshoe then on to Friona in 1945. Jerry bought 178 acres at Circleback and farmed there many years. He sold the land and moved to Muleshoe where he now resides.

Pete came to Bailey County in 1934 and farmed at Stegall until his death August 27, 1956.

J. D. moved to Earth in 1944 where they still farm.

Mrs. Wright had been a resident

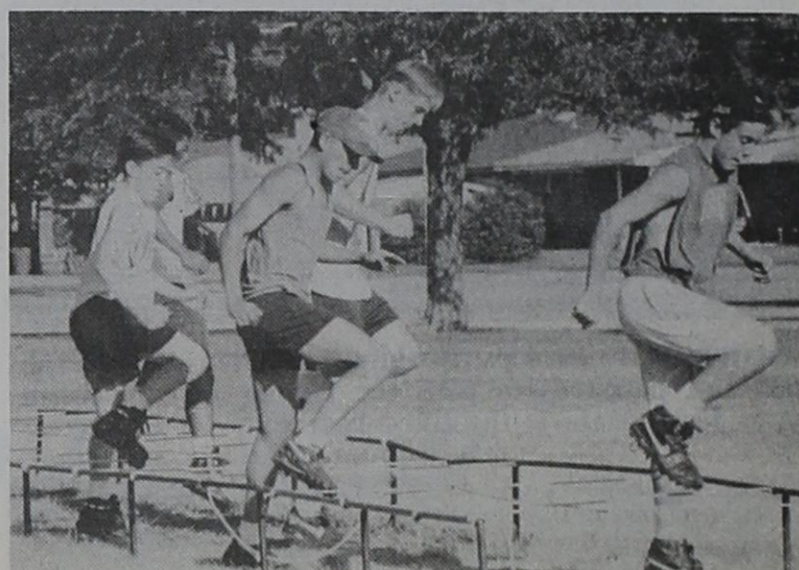

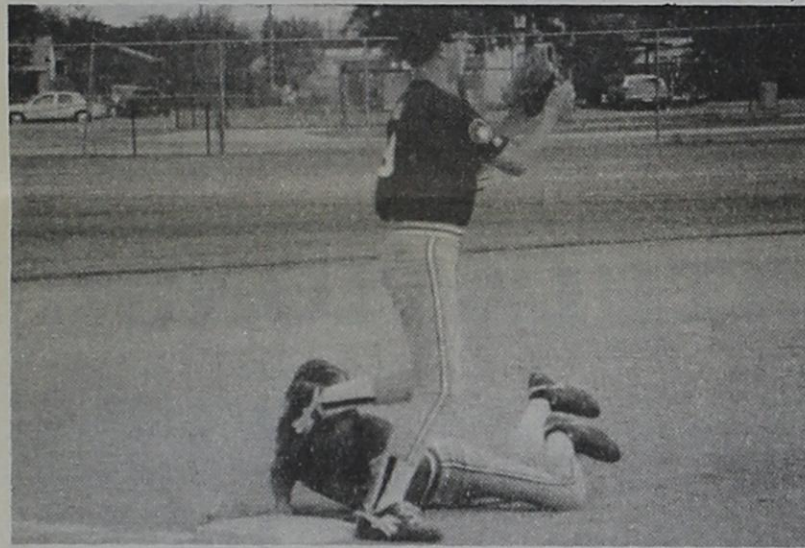

## YOUR EYES

### Comfort At The Computer



If you work at a video display terminal, you may have experienced headaches, burning sensations, itching, eye strain or other discomforts. They don't have to happen. With care, it can be more comfortable to work at a computer. There are two elements: your computer environment and your eyes.

The screen should be adjusted so that the top is no higher than the operator's eye level and the bottom no more than 40 degrees below eye level. Glare can be distracting and uncomfortable. If there are windows in the field of vision, they should be shaded. A hood and antiglare filter on the screen will help, too.

If you normally wear glasses for distance or near-vision correction, consider getting another pair for middle-distance work. It will enable you to see well while working at the correct distance from the screen. Full-lens, middle-distance glasses help avoid neck strain better than would an added middle-distance line on bifocals.

### Chasing Winners Can Make You A Loser

Serious investing is done with the future in mind; yet, some investors are tempted to look only at the current hot performers when picking stocks. After all, because we can't predict the future, going with today's best-performing investment may seem to make sense, right? Wrong. One way to illustrate the folly of this practice is by looking at what happens when you always follow last year's top-performing mutual fund.

Let's assume that on January 1, 1973, you invested \$10,000 in the best-performing fund of 1972. On January 1 for the next 20 years, you moved your investment to the best-performing fund of the previous year. Assuming all capital gains and dividends were reinvested, and allowing for all sales and redemption charges, Table 1 shows, year by year, what would have accumulated by switching to each year's top performer. By December 31, 1992, your original \$10,000 would have grown to \$95,571. That's not a bad return, even considering these were good years for stocks. It even beat the market as a whole by about 10 per cent.

But what would have happened if you had made a one-time, \$10,000 investment on January 1, 1973, in a conservatively managed growth-and-income fund, and you let it compound undisturbed for the same 20-year period? The table shows the results of three such funds—Fund A grew to \$107,915, Fund B to \$122,724 and Fund C to \$126,109. All three outperformed the investor who switched to the best performer of each year.

None of these three funds was ever recognized as the top performer in any of those 20 years. In fact, they seldom or never even made the top performance lists of financial publications that rate mutual funds annually. The secret of their success was to consistently aim for reasonable investment results, total return or a combination of growth and income.

The examples show that consistent results without big surprises can put you ahead over the long haul. It beats trying to chase winners.
