



Were the plant to run at full capacity it could easily turn out 6000 loaves daily. Approximately 150 barrels of flour are used each month, which in yearly figures means seven solid carloads of flour. It is doubtful if a car of sugar would ast out a year in this busy bakery, for people do have a sweet tooth new and again.
