MIDSUMMER MONITORS

It is interesting to note how some of the American Senators are carrying on through their summer vacations. Not all of them are enjoying junkets at government expense. Senator Butler of Massachusetts loses no opportunity to put a few links for return to government by responsible political parties instead of non-partisan general noise. Senator Cole Blease of South Carolina, with an eye upon the hill vote, has set up a recruiting station for Bryan's army of salvation by law. He is exhorting the South Carolina legislature to pass a bill that will make every school teacher subscribe to a test oath certifying to his belief in every jot and tittle of the bible. Senator Moses is employing his oratory when occasion serves to combatting the Dawes plan No. 2, which would muzzle the senate and reduce it to a state that would make it the vassal of privilege. Senator Borah is taking care to see that the republic in the absence of its congressional wardens, does not approach a step nearer the danger line which Washington gave his countrymen for their protection against being involved in European quarrels and pitfalls. Senator Bruce of Maryland is hammering away at an issue that needs both thinking and attention. He is for guarding his country against any more such mistakes as it might have made had it heeded the invitation to adopt the mis-called child labor amendment. He would have the states retain the powers that the constitution gave them, and avoid the evil of paternalism. The newspapers are not giving enough attention to what the Maryland senator says:

"The just dissatisfaction of the American citizen with the federal power begins only when the long-established boundaries between matters of national and matters of local moment are invaded by congressional enactment, judicial construction or constitutional amendment," he argues. "In other words it springs up when the federal hand is thrust into the purely domestic concerns of the states, such as education, the care of children, marriage and divorce, and suntuary restraints and produces the irritation, resentment, derangement and discord which never fail to follow the attempt of a central government to prescribe general and inflexible rules of conduct for communities widely separated from each other in point of historic traditions, social usages and habits, and economic wants. What is wholly agreeable or beneficial to one of such communities may be wholly obnoxious or prejudicial to another. Of this truth there can be no better illustration than the fact that not only is the general attitude of the various states of the union toward national prohibition quite different in some respects, but this difference is not infrequently found to exist even as between urban and rural communities within the same state; indeed, some times even as between parts of the

same city. Leave to the federal government the care of all the interests too universal, too continental, too national to be reconcilable with mere local prepossessions, prejudices or peculiarities, and leave the rest to the states. That is the line of partition originally drawn by the federal constitution, though now marked by more than one melancholy deflection; and no safer line can ever be traced for the guidance of the American people."

Upon the whole the American senators are good midsummer monitors. But many of them could reaffirm the Maryland statesman's opinions without offending the majority of their constituents.

DOGS

A heat wave has evidently settled down over Texas, and while the fact that the mercury stands at around 100 and above does not cause any extreme discomfort in West Texas, still it is history that an epidemic of mad dogs usually strikes the country with excessive heat. This city has already had its quota of mad dog bitten persons, and every effort should be made to halt the injuries, tragedies and trouble usually scattered when a rabid dog runs amuck. Citizens should heed the warning of officers to keep dogs off the street unless same dogs are muzzled.

ADVERTISEMENTS

Good and bad advertisements have placed several cities in the United States into print and the public mind this year. Some cities that we never heard of before, never dreamed existed, are on the tips of everybody's tongue. Some of it is good advertising and some is bad.

Cave City, Ky., is probably reaping a harvest of gold from the pockets of tourists this year, from free publicity. Had you heard of that place last January? Santa Barbara, Calif., was freely discussed a few weeks ago by people from coast to coast. Chicago came in for its part by taking a rest from murders and shootings and filling front pages with the Shepherd germ murmur trial. The Noel brothers spoke for Dallas, and then, of course, there is the evolution trial in Dayton, Tenn., where Judge Raulston is presiding over the Scopes trial on the court house lawn. As we said before, some of it's good advertising and some is bad. What we are driving at, however, is that Sweetwater has a whole host of perpetual advertisements that are off duty from the fact that they are probably overlooked by the average citizen. We have far better advertised than Dayton, Tenn. Santa Barbara is not in it, and Cave City is better a mile. We don't have an evolution trial, but we have three railroads and twelve passenger trains a day. We are minus earthquakes, but we are a logical distributing point and center of all West Texas. No one was ever trapped in a cave here, but two of the most important highways in the state cross in Sweetwater. Our sensational murder trials are lacking, but we have one of the best forces of peace officers in the country and crime is almost unknown in this city. We have had no strikes, disastrous fires or lynchings recently, but we are paving block after block of streets lined with hundreds of beautiful homes. We have no disastrous explosions or storms, but we have an abundance of pure water and a fine filtration plant. Then on the side, we have a beautiful park, free fishing and swimming, splendid bands, progressive city officials, a congenial and progressive citizenship, and sites are plentiful for other desirable citizens who would like to come to a good city to live.

These are advertisements that can be broadcast by Sweetwater citizens. Advertising in this manner is just another word for boosting.

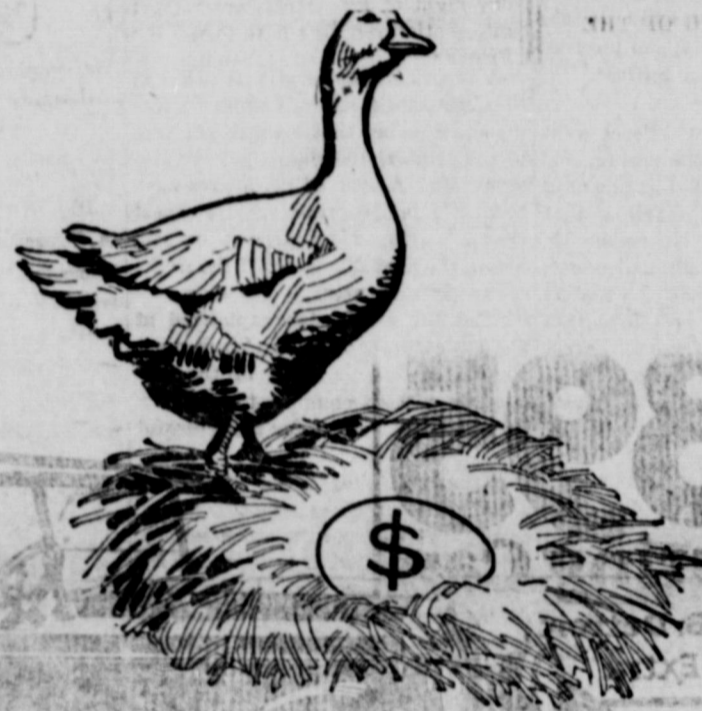
The previous high mark for the 1925 season here was 103 degrees, and that record was broken by 5 degrees Sunday.

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Aside from the inevitable scraps and squabbles to occur over legislation, two bitter battles of a purely domestic nature are due to be waged next winter on Capitol Hill when congress convenes.

Both the Senate and House are scheduled to engage in a heated controversy over existing methods of running their respective household. In the Senate a fight is eminent over vice-president Dawes' proposal to modify the rule governing debate. Republican leaders in the house are intent on repealing the changes in rules forced through during the last con-

"You and I Killed This Man" Anti-Capital Punishment Slogan

Opponents of capital punishment are preparing an appeal to the governors and legislatures of all the states wherein the death penalty is still enforced, demanding the abolition of official hanging, shooting and electrocution. The appeal will be based on a concrete instance illustrating the horrors of a state-inflicted death, even when it is done through the method generally regarded as the most humane. It will be circulated by Dr. E. E. Dudding, President of the Prisoners' Relief Society, Washington, D. C., said to be the largest organization of its kind in the world.

The concrete example is the recent killing of Antonio Viandante by electrocution at Sing Sing prison, New York State. While the details of hanging and electrocutions are not generally permitted to be published, Boyden Sparks, a well known descriptive writer, secured permission through a private arrangement to be present when the state took its toll of a life for a life and shocked Antonio Viandante to death.

In his description of the gruesome event in the current issue of Hearst's International Cosmopolitan, Mr. Sparks leaves out no harrowing detail from the moment Viandante walked into the death chamber with his limp and lifeless form was rolled out on a wheeled table.

One paragraph of the article which an attempt has been made to suppress, reads:

"An indefinable sound rattled in my ears with the drone of the dynamo that was pulling up the roots of Antonio Viandante's soul. It seemed as if some one was moaning, frantically through tight lips. The lips protruding between those leather bands were changing color. They became deeply red—then purple. A few bubbles formed in their juncture. There was another sound, a smothering. I saw a wisp of greenish smoke rising from the calf of the bare leg.

Above the knee where it was gripped by an electrode the white flesh was swelling as yeast dough rises in the heat of a hearth." On account of the gruesome character of Mr. Sparks' story, it is understood that the opponents of capital punishment will make it the basis of their appeal to the governors and legislatures and may circulate it with the magazine picture of the man throughout the United States.

gress by Independents. Since Dawes started his campaign for a tightening up of Senate proced-

ure, only a small group of Senators have announced that they would support his proposal to set a time limit on debate. Dawes believes unlimited debate encourages filibustering and other dilatory tactics. Sen. Moses, N. H., president pro tempore has come out openly against any alteration in existing rules covering debate.

Some observers here believe a compromise which Senators in the future will promise may be reached in the Senate be required to address themselves to the subject matter under consideration. Under existing rules speeches can be made on any subject without regard to pending business.

House leaders expect considerable opposition to reverting back to the old method of requiring 200 names to be attached to a petition for discharging a committee from further consideration of a bill, but are confident they can effect the change. The Republicans have a clear majority of about 25 in the next house, excluding Independents.

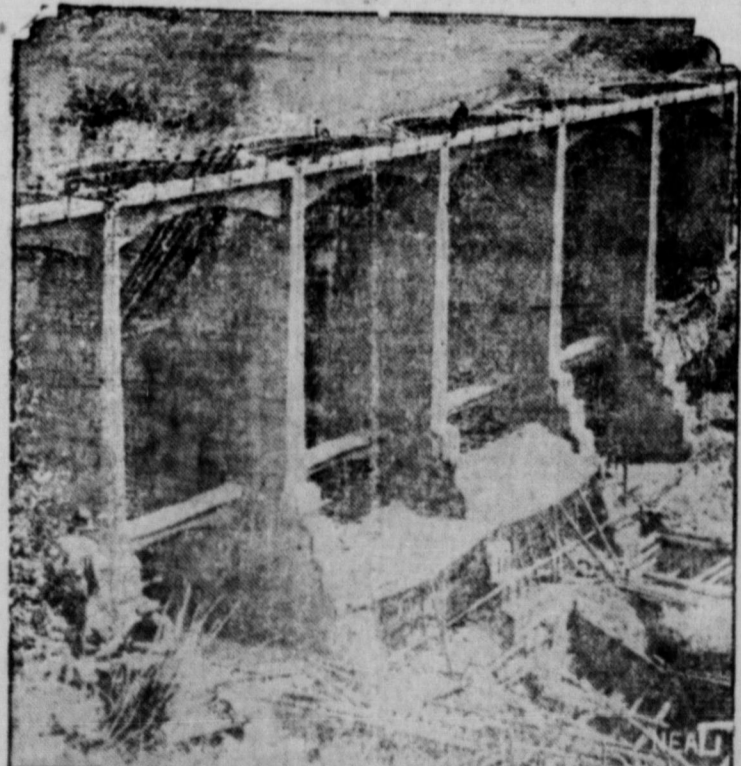
