America Will Demand Responsibility of Chinese Government Following Murder of American Rancher by Chinese Bandits

AMERICAN CAPTURED SECOND

Head of Rockefeller Institute In Pekin Is Thrown In Prison: This Nation to Also Demand Responsibility for Seizure.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 23.—America's demand for responsibility of the central Chinese government, strong enough to protect foreigners' lives and property, will be made more severe following the killing of the American, Morgan Palmer and the seizure of Dr.

Harvey Howard.

Official confirmation of the United Press reports of the killing by a band of Chinese bandits of Morgan Palmer and the capture of Dr. Howard, Americans, in the Sun Gari river district of Manchuria,

PEKIN, July 23 .- While working on his experimental ranch on the Sun Gari river, near Harbin, Morgan Palmer, American organizer of the Manchurian Development Co., was killed by bandits, as was also his servant.

Dr. Harvey Howard, departmental head of the Rockefeller Institute of Pekin, has been imprisoned by Chi

The American consul at Harbin is making a representation to Marshal Chang Lin, war lord of Manchuria, in the Palmer case.

The Pekin legation is presenting preliminary statements to the foreign office.

Officials are inclined to absolve the Pekin government from any responsibility since it has only nominal control over the Sun Gari region.






